Turn Off the Lights! Birds Are Depending on Us.

Deep in the heart of Texas, the stars at night burn big and bright, but if you're hoping to catch a glimpse of the Milky Way over Austin, you are probably out of luck.

As the region continues to experience rapid growth, Austinites are robbed of the spectacular night sky - but none are as harmed as birds. BY CALEY

Excessive artificial light causes birds to shift migratory and communication patterns, which leads to disorientation and more collisions with buildings. Experts estimate that 1 billion birds die from building collisions each vear.

That is why initiatives like Lights Out, Austin! are so critical.

Spring migration is underway as millions of birds prepare to fly through Texas. Lights Out, Austin! aims to lower the use of extra outdoor lighting throughout the city to reduce migratory bird deaths from now until mid-April (or the end of spring migration).

Most outdoor lighting is designed in a way that produces too much light upward into the sky. From 11pm to 6am, residents and businesses are encouraged to turn off nonessential lights throughout the season. Residents can also turn off landscape lighting to avoid disturbing birds nesting in trees or gardens. These small steps can make a big difference for birds by reducing the likelihood of collisions with buildings.

Lights Out, Austin! is coordinated by Travis Audubon, a coalition of city, county, and nonprofit leaders, such as Defenders of Wildlife. The campaign is part of a statewide Lights Out led by Audubon Texas in collaboration with Cornell University. This campaign is gaining critical community support, but additional outreach

> and awareness efforts are needed to influence the design stages of future commercial and residential development in Austin.

According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, which supports the Dark Skies program, natural darkness is disappearing due to the increase of arti-

ficial light used by businesses and residents. The Dark Skies initiative, led by the University of Texas McDonald Observatory, works with businesses and local communities to keep lights on the ground and out of the skies. Simple solutions like addressing the shielding, color, intensity, and timing of lights decrease light pollution significantly.

Austin is home to 950,000 people and is growing rapidly. In 2021, about 116 new residents moved to the Austin metro area each day, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. Texas state demographers predict the metro area will surpass 3 million residents by 2045, and some predict this could happen even sooner. An increase in residents naturally results in an increase in light pollution. With numerous people migrating to Austin, current residents, businesses, and policymakers should make turning off nonessential lights, especially during migration season, a priority.



HELP THE HOUSELESS

Dear Editor.

My experience after eviction makes me realize housing corporations are concerned with only profit.

Months before my eviction in Travis County I sent a letter to the apartment management company and the current manager of the apartment complex. I was asking for changing a two bedroom to a less expensive one bedroom and possible going according to income as some apartments were designated for this. I did not receive a response to my letter. A few weeks prior to the eviction court date I asked my manager again. She said, "There is nothing here for YOU!" I then tried the county's assistance office for help locating housing. I was told, "No one in Travis County is willing to help YOU!" I thought that was an odd way of saying nothing was available.

So, sleeping in my car until I managed to find cheap weekly motel. I tried driving Lyft all night long but I did not do well, falling asleep at Traffic lights. I was not able to find an apartment after an eviction.

Why is it that apartment complexes are permitted to refuse evicted folks for SEVEN years. how long it takes to drop off the one's housing record! Do you think maybe this adds to the number of homeless here in Travis County? All these big new expensive apartment buildings. am sure with many vacant apartments, how about sharing some with low income folks? Any small percentage may help.

One more problem I encountered currently working as an independent contractor (driving Lyft or Door Dash) is the apartment complexes do not demand we have 3x the amount of monthly rent but 10x the amount of monthly rent. Does that seem fair being in the poorly paid service jobs? (I still do not know why an agency told me

We Have Seen the Future, and

Deconstructing Project Connect's new vision for light rail

Austin Transit Partnership unveiled their long-awaited transit plan revision at an open house at Austin Central Library on Tuesday, and for those wondering what ATP's reaction was going be, after inflation and a degree of mission creep had put the ambitious original plan in peril - well, what's the opposite of, "Damn the

torpedoes; full speed ahead"?

The Blue Line and Orange Line are gone; what we have now is a modest Brown Line. with optional add-ons, and some hard choices to be made. What ATP presented (and you can see the gist of it at their open house online) is a set of five options,

all based around a core running from UT, down Guadalupe through Downtown, and across the river and out Riverside to at least Pleasant Valley. Only one of the five plans goes to the airport; only one plan goes further north than 38th Street: only one plan retains an underground component. Two of the plans include a South Congress spur. None of the plans, obviously, does all these things.

One ATP representative told me that they had worked through as many as 40 plans originally, and whittled them down to these five. There's no favorite among them at this point; ATP staff want to get input from the public, and from civic leaders, before moving ahead with one of

these – or perhaps some combination of the features. We can afford to build any of the five plans, and all five satisfy the federal guidelines to qualify for funding, so

it's a matter of priorities: How important is it to go to the airport? To hit the Convention Center? To retain the Downtown tunnel to avoid Downtown traffic? To meet up with the Red Line? Presumably if we can answer those questions, ATP and its partners at Cap Metro and the city can move ahead with a preferred alternative.

Yet I can't shake the feeling that there's also some wishful thinking going on: the hope that folks will look at this and decide we really do want to do more than one of these things - to have the South Congress spur and to hit the population centers north of UT and the airport, for instance and that desire will shake loose the extra money from somewhere to make it happen. In that vein, one intriguing rumor floating around the room during the open house

(well, okay, I was one of the people spreading it, but it didn't come from me) was the speculation that the airport was omitted from most of the plans in hopes that Bergstrom itself would step in to help pay for that last couple of miles, which will be mostly elevated as it crosses Ben White and 183. That's the kind of creative financing ATP likely needs to be looking for, because frankly, at this point any of these five plans on their own would be a disappointment.

Anyway, here's a look at some of the other sticking points/question marks.

• **Crossing Lady Bird Lake:** The tunneling option is gone, and all five plans envision one new bridge – either at Trinity near the Convention Center or at South First. Both the "partial underground" and "partial elevated" routes would have a raised bridge and elevated stations from Eighth Street to Auditorium Shores; the others would remain at street level – though that's one of the elements that seem like they could be traded out from one plan to another.

• **South Congress:** In two of the plans there's a spur line down South Congress as far as Oltorf. This would be fully aboveground; the tunnel plan is gone, because somehow the previous fears about the Capitol View Corridor have evaporated. ("The media kind of misrepresented that," I was told by one ATP representative.)

• **Traversing the Drag:** Four of the five plans (all but the "tunnel" option) would extend light rail through the UT Drag, at least to 29th Street. I was told that they haven't gotten any closer to deciding just how that would be accomplished – options are open for everything from a pedestrian plaza with only trains and bikes allowed, to a transit plaza with a bus line, to retaining auto traffic as well.

• The northern terminus: Continuing north on Guadalupe past the Drag, two of the options stop at 29th Street (presumably saving Dirty's), one stops at 38th (or maybe 45th), and one extends on up Lamar to Crestview Station and across 183 to the North Lamar Transit Plaza. Council Member Chito Vela, who's also on the Cap Metro Board, told me he's torn on this one, because while it "obviously" does the most for his district, he has concerns about crossing the Red Line at Crestview, where a bridge would be needed because the lines can't cross at grade, and crossing 183, which would require a right-of-way negotiation with Texas Dept. of Transportation that he thinks could be problematic.

Confused? Go look up the current state of the planning effort, and leave your feedback, at publicinput.com/lightrailopenhouse. And there's a Capital Metro Board meeting this coming Monday, March 27, where we may get a better idea which way the winds are blowing.

Making Rail a Reality: New Project Connect Maps Unveiled

Community members, **Austin Transit Partnership** staff, and city officials gathered in a sweaty **Central Library** space to take in five Project Connect rail design options during a March 21 open house. With inflation and constantly rising real estate prices pushing up costs, ATP, the group tasked with building the light rail system, presented five scaled-back options. The options cover less ground than the initial vision of an **Orange Line**, which would have run from **North Lamar Transit Center** to Stassney Lane, and a **Blue Line**, which would have run from North Lamar Transit Center to the **Austin-Bergstrom International Airport**.

Instead, the options seek to create the core for a rail system that can be expanded in the future. One of the five has the rails reaching the North Lamar Transit, but the other four have the northernmost point of the line between **UT and 38th Street** (the one that goes to 38th could extend to 45th). The segments south of the river are more complex. Two of the five would split once the rail crosses the river, with one track heading east through Pleasant Valley and the other continuing south on South Congress. Only one of the presented designs would reach the airport.

Project Connect's architects also considered when the train would be aboveground, underground, or at street level – a key question when trying to keep the cost at \$5 billion in current-year dollars. While much of the previous discussion centered around putting rail underground in the Downtown area, only one option includes a stretch underground, and two would put the tracks aboveground from south of Eighth Street on Guadalupe to east of Auditorium Shores.

The open house kicked off a **six-week public comment period**, and people can visit publicinput.com/lightrailopenhouse to review designs and offer feedback. The ATP Board will then choose the final option in June, according to an ATP press release. – *Benton Graham*

ATP's Five Proposed Options

All five of the options ATP presented are based around a core running from UT, down Guadalupe through Downtown, and across the river and out east on Riverside.

This composite represents all five options blended together as different colors: The green part at the top is only in the second plan, the yellow part only in the third, and the darker sections are the parts that are included in multiple options.

A) On Street: 38th to Oltorf to Yellow Jacket

Maybe the most middle-of-the-road option (pun intended), it touches on population centers north, south, and east, and could be extended to 45th Street and/or St. Edwards relatively easily.

B) On Street: North Lamar to Pleasant Valley

This option gets the best scores on all six of the metrics that ATP presents, but it too comes at a cost, cutting off at Riverside and Pleasant Valley, while all other options go out past Montopolis.

C) On Street: 29th to Bergstrom Airport


Having a train to the airport seems like an obvious thing to do, but while this option is the longest, it appears to do poorly on the metrics, with a bottom score on "Land Use and Housing."

D) Partial Elevated: 29th to Oltorf to Yellow Jacket

Similar to Plan A, but with elevated lines and stations through Downtown, which is faster for the trains and helps traffic on the ground. But all those elevators, etc. are expensive, cutting off a crucial mile to the north as well as those possible extensions, dropping the numbers for both overall ridership and affordable households served.

E) Partial Underground: UT to Yellow Jacket

This feels like it was just left in as a sop to the Downtown Austin Alliance, who would of course love the prospect of clearer streets and brand-new real estate in the form of an underground concourse. But that's expensive: This option is just 6.6 miles long in all, just two-thirds of what any of the street-level options would provide. Somehow, it switches from being underground to being elevated in the block between Seventh and Eighth streets; not sure how that works. - N.B.



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GOP Bill Would Nullify Austin Anti-Discrimination Ordinances

Cities could be sued over progressive employment laws

Typically when Republicans in the Texas Legislature get riled up over an ordinance city officials have passed aimed at improving the lives of their residents, lawmakers in the Lege have to pass a bill designed to undo that specific local ordinance. Republicans have found success in their war

on local control; in past Legislative sessions, they've enacted laws that prohibit municipalities from reducing police budgets, increasing property taxes to fund services, and regulating rideshare companies beyond any state limits.

But Republicans haven't always prevailed over cities. For years, they have repeatedly failed at undoing two Austin ordinances

despised by business interests – one that mandates rest breaks for construction workers and another that delays when employers can conduct criminal background checks on prospective hires. Instead of continuing to play the game as it has always been played – blue city adopts ordinance, red state lawmakers veto it – Republicans are trying (as they did in the 87th legislative session) a more scattershot approach.

A pair of bills filed by Rep. **Dustin Burrows**, R-Lubbock, and Sen. **Brandon Creighton**, R-Conroe, would apply what the **Texas Municipal League** calls a "super pre-

emption" approach. Rather than undo one city ordinance at a time, the Burrows and Creighton bills (House Bill 2127 and Senate Bill 814, respectively) would prevent municipalities from enacting ordinances that regulate labor and business practices, preservation of natural resources, and commerce more broadly, if they contradict existing state law. They allow anyone to sue a city or its elect-

ed officials if they have been injured "in fact, actual or threatened," by regulations imposed by a local ordinance. Neighboring city or county officials who don't like an ordinance a bordering municipality has adopted could also sue. If signed into law, the legislation would also have the effect of nullifying existing ordinances already on

the books in cities, such as Austin's rest break and fair chance hiring ordinances.

The Republican defense of these bills is familiar: Cities shouldn't tell business owners how to regulate their businesses and local officials are often out of step with their constituents when they pass ordinances requiring construction workers to be provided regular rest breaks. At a March 15 hearing on HB 2127 held in the House State Affairs Committee, Burrows said that his bill was written in response to a recent "explosion" of local ordinances regulating labor and business practices. "What I am starting to see is a different category of ordinances that have emerged," Burrows told the committee. Advocacy groups, stymied at the Lege in their attempts to protect workers and prevent employment discrimination, take their agendas to "some of our cities – more progressive cities – and have those adopted" there.

Labor advocacy organizations and city officials fear that the proposed legislation will have a much more far reaching effect, whether or not lawmakers intend it to. "We are still analyzing the full impact of HB 2127," a spokesperson for the city of Austin told us. But, for now, the city anticipates

Venton Jones, D-Dallas, who told the crowd, "As taxpayers, as people who occupy this state and people who occupy this space, we deserve to be in this space."

Inside the Capitol, in a quiet room where the mic echoed. state Sen. Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels, told the Texas Senate Committee on State Affairs March 16 that her bill, which would bar doctors from treating transgender minors with hormones or procedures, was really what was best for trans people, "This bill is not about adults, it's not about those of maturity that can make a fully informed decision ... [Senate Bill] 14 is all about child protection." Her first witness, from Michigan, described a transition process at age 15 that later speaker Dr. Megan Mooney, a psychologist who works with trans minors, described as "not aligned with standards of care" - meaning her doctor's actions were likely illegal. After a long day of testimony, the committee postponed voting on a slew of anti-trans legislation, reconvening on March 20 to recommend the Senate pass SB 14 (8 ayes, 3 nays). They have the same split on SB 162, which would block minors from changing the gender on their birth certificate. Still pending are SB 1029, which would block Medicaid from covering gender affirming care (including for adults), and SB 250, which would block professional liability insurance coverage for medical professionals who provide gender affirming care to minors. - Maggie Q. Thompson

Republican Border To-Do List Gets a Check Mark

Republicans moved forward with their promise to tackle their nebulous **"border security"** priority, filing a behemoth bill before the March 10 deadline. Among other things, House Bill 20 would create a border protection unit that would let the state enforce immigration laws that courts have previously ruled to be the responsibility of the federal government. For example, the unit would have the authority to "arrest, detain, and deter individuals crossing the border illegally" throughout the state and to return immigrants observed crossing the border illegally back to Mexico. To some extent, the bill is the logical next step for Republicans, who aim to build on the \$4.6 billion spent on **Operation Lone Star**.

The bill got a stamp of approval from House Speaker Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, who included it in his list of priority bills. He tweeted that HB 20 and HB 7 "would bring accountability & efficiency to our state's border operation by establishing the **Border Protection Unit**, a professional state agency." Both bills have been referred to the House's State Affairs Committee and are awaiting a hearing.

Bob Libal, who has been doing consulting work for Human Rights Watch around Operation Lone Star, said he sees the bill as an opportunity to "deputize border vigilantes" and take Operation Lone Star to the next level. – Benton Graham that it would undo various nondiscrimination ordinances Austin has adopted.

"It would also prohibit the City from offering protections against discrimination that are above and beyond what already exist in state and federal law in the future," the spokesperson concluded.

At the committee hearing, advocacy groups opposing the bill raised concerns over impacts it could have on cities that regulate **predatory payday lenders**. **Ann Baddour**, director of the Fair Financial Services Project at **Texas Appleseed**, told the committee that the threat to payday lending regulations was her organization's "top-line concern" with the bill. "Over the past decade [payday lenders] have drained more than \$18 billion from the pockets of the most vulnerable Texans," Baddour told the committee, adding that a 2022 report from the Perryman Group found that the lending practices damaged local economies more broadly. An analysis of the Austin-Round Rock Metropolitan Statistical Area found that from 2012 to 2022, consumers had an estimated \$201.8 million less cash to spend because of fees and debt racked up through predatory loans.

In Austin, local regulations prohibit payday lenders from issuing loans that exceed 20% of a consumer's gross monthly income, car loans that exceed 3% of their annual income, and loans from being refinanced more than three times. And analysis from Texas Appleseed shows that 46 cities across the state including more conservative cities like Amarillo and Midland - have enacted similar regulations.

Burrows insisted that a second version of his bill, published the morning before the hearing, would protect payday lender regulations, but advocates remain skeptical.

The bill was left pending in the committee, with Chair **Todd Hunter**, R-Corpus Christi, asking that opponents of the bill share their concerns with Burrows' office so that he can address them.

Does Sweeping Senate Water Supply Bill Hold Its Own?

In a public hearing Monday, Senate **Water,** Agriculture, & Rural Affairs Committee Chair Charles Perry, R-Lubbock, introduced his Senate Bill 28, intended to bolster Texas' dwindling water supply: "30% of the state water plan relies on conservation efforts, but we need bold new ideas." With the goal of 7 million acre-feet per year of new water supply by 2033, SB 28 would create the Water Supply for Texas Fund within the Texas Water

Development Board, which would provide low-interest loans to projects including seawater and brackish groundwater desalination, reuse of produced water from fracking, and transferring water from other states to Texas. Monday, several water advocates expressed support for water loss mitigation efforts included in the bill, but also gas f

voiced concern that seawater desalination and produced water reuse will be "fiscally and environmentally irresponsible."

Both Danielle Goshen of the National Wildlife Federation and Sierra Club's Alex Ortiz have warned previously of the

safety and environmental concerns associated with some supply-side projects. Ortiz noted that byproducts of desalination efforts could impact coastal salinity gradients integral to sustaining ecosystems, and urged better regulatory standards. The **Texas Commission on**

Environmental Quality has not adopted numeric coastal salinity standards, and instead goes by "narrative criteria."

Meanwhile, Goshen said produced water needs to be studied "before we can have confidence that we are safely using any of these water resources outside of the oil and gas fields." – Lina Fisher *Safety is our number one concern. No Counsel, No Compassion

Austin jailer breaks elderly deaf woman's arm after misunderstanding at airport

Karen McGee, a deaf, 71-year-old Florida resident, is considering a lawsuit against the city of Austin after what was supposed to be a three-hour layover at **Austin-Bergstrom International Airport** turned into an arrest, a weekend in the Travis County Jail, and an arm broken by a jailer and left untreated for three days.

McGee's ordeal began on the afternoon of Sept. 13, 2022, as she waited for a connecting flight from Austin to Seattle. She was flying alone for the first time in her life and nervous because her hearing aids weren't working well, so she sat within sight of the ticket desk to see when her plane would begin boarding. After noticing that it hadn't boarded on time she spoke with a ticket agent and was distressed to learn that she had missed an announcement that her gate had changed. With her plane already gone, she was issued a ticket for a flight leaving that evening.

While McGee waited for this flight, she texted with her cousin and learned there was another plane parked at the same gate, going to the same destination. She approached the ticket agent and asked if she could switch her ticket to this flight. She had trouble hearing the agent's response but understood the answer was no. She then made the same request to a different agent. Unbeknownst to McGee, this second agent called the police. McGee's attorney, **Rebecca Webber**, said she has video showing that the officers who responded did not ensure that McGee could hear them. During the exchange, an airport employee read McGee a trespass warning. "He doesn't get down on her level at all, which is the only way to get her to hear you," Webber said. "If they had any training about how hearing aids work they would know that in a loud area she won't be able to distinguish just one voice. The person needs to get down on her level, speak slowly, and then she'll be able to put it all together."

McGee was placed in a wheelchair and pushed to the front of the airport, believing she was in the process of rebooking her "This case, in my opinion, is Exhibit A for why Travis County and the city need to stop saying they can't put [counsel at first appearance] in place."


flight. Once outside, officers handcuffed her and took her to the Travis County Jail on suspicion of trespassing. "All I did was stand up and then they were all around me," McGee said. "And I don't remember them saying anything to me, or even to each other."

At the jail, McGee said, she was shoved against a wall as officers stripped off her clothes, and she screamed, "Not my ring!" when officers began to remove it. She said an officer then told her something she did not understand, she asked, "What?" and in response a different officer twisted her handcuffs with enough force to break her arm.

McGee says that she "lost time" and awoke in a jail cell with her clothes back on, but inside out. Her arm was aching and she held it close to her body. She was given Aleve but not taken to an emergency room. Upon leaving the jail after three days of detention, she collapsed. A police officer called an emergency medical technician, who helped her contact her husband and get her to a hotel for the night. She had surgery on her arm after making it home to Florida. After examining the trespassing case, County Attorney **Delia Garza** chose not to prosecute.

Webber said that McGee's ordeal could have been avoided if the city would commit to guaranteeing free defense attorneys to people when they are brought to the jail, a process known as "**counsel at first appearance**," or CAFA. "If Travis County and the city of Austin had instituted counsel at first appearance, every single person involved would have realized that Karen McGee does not belong in jail," Webber said. "This case, in my opinion, is Exhibit A for why Travis County and the city need to stop saying they can't put CAFA in place."

Council Says: Okay, Maybe We'll Bury the Power Lines After All

Austin Energy has been clear that untrimmed tree branches were not a major factor in the widespread and prolonged power outages that hit Austin during Winter Storm Mara. Power lines were damaged throughout the city because of all the ice that accumulated on branches and the lines themselves, which together caused unprecedented levels of damage to the city's network of overhead

power lines. But had the lines been buried underground, perhaps fewer people would have lost power, and repair crews from AE and neighboring electrical utilities could have spent less time repairing damaged lines. Plus,

buried lines are protected against other environmental hazards amid a changing climate – like extreme winds and wildfires – so why not just bury lines throughout the city? It's prohibitively expensive, Austin Energy says, estimating it would cost about \$1 million per mile to bury roughly 5,000 miles of overhead lines hung

However, a pair of resolutions from Council Members **Ryan Alter** and

Vanessa Fuentes would direct staff at AE and other departments to explore the question. Alter's resolution asks for a feasibility study and development of a "long-term capital improvement plan" for burying power lines in areas where high-priority uses occur and that are not expected to see new construction in the near future. The reso-

lution also directs staff to develop a methodology for prioritizing areas based on facts like surrounding critical infrastructure, health and safety resources, and areas that have endured frequent power outages.

Both resolutions also ask staff to start thinking about how electrical lines could be buried during construction carried out both by public and private parties. Specifically,

the Fuentes resolution asks staff to explore how underground power lines could be incorporated into capital projects – such as **Cap Metro**'s planned transit expansion, **Project Connect** – that are already in the planning and design phase. The resolution asks staff to identify projects that could be used as a pilot area for altering plans to include buried power lines, and also that factors similar to those included in Alter's resolution should be considered in choosing the pilot areas.

Both items are posted on City Council's March 23 agenda and they each have four sponsors and no opposition yet, so they're each likely to pass. – *Austin Sanders*

AISD TRUSTEES PONDER HIRING INTERIM SUPER FOR KEEPS, AND MORE

When the **Austin ISD Board of Trustees** appointed then-Chief of Operations **Matias Segura** to the position of interim superintendent last December, they told us they wanted someone stable to hold the position for only six months, until a permanent superintendent could be hired in June. Several board members said they were looking for a changemaker from outside of the administration. Now, with the search beginning, some on the board are implying that they'd like to see Segura get the permanent position.

Trustee **Ofelia Zapata** said the people she speaks to about the superintendent search mostly just want to talk about Segura. "What the community is saying about the superintendent is, 'Can we keep Matias?'" Zapata said at the board's March 9 information session. "And that's just evidence of how many people are feeling respected in a way that they haven't been before."

Segura, who grew up in Austin and attended its public schools, is the third person to lead the district this year; he's been on the job since December. His elevation came after two years of leadership struggles and COVID disruptions that have been blamed for a record number of teacher resignations and declining student enrollment.


His supporters say that Segura has brought stability to the district and improved morale. Trustee **Kevin Foster** echoed Zapata's comments at the March 9 meeting, telling the board he is also hearing the praise. "I'm hearing it over and over again, unsolicited, from the business community, teachers, families – I'm hearing it from all corners," he said. Trustee David Kauffman acknowledged the sentiment, but reminded those present that the board is not signaling that Segura is their choice.

The board covered other topics in the expansive five-hour session. They heard about the district's ongoing development of its Long Range Plan; its lobbying efforts at the state Capitol to bring more money to the district and oppose vouchers; the success of its multilingual education efforts; and its imminent development projects at the **Anita Ferrales Coy Facility** and **Pease Elementary**, among other things. They also addressed the very disappointing midyear math and reading **test results** from economically disadvantaged third-grade students of color. Of all the students affected by the pandemic, this group, who entered school in 2020, the first year of the pandemic, has been hurt the worst. The results demonstrated that they are far behind their peers in these critical subjects.

Trustee **Candace Hunter** choked up as she discussed the test results, reminding the audience that illiteracy is a pipeline to prison and homelessness. She quoted Frederick Douglass, who famously said, "Once you learn to read, you will be forever free." "I tell you, if literacy is freedom, then we are shackling yet another generation of Black and brown children," Hunter said, her voice husky with emotion. "I am requesting, pleading, and demanding that the interim superintendent declare a state of emergency and immediately design a plan that has an implementation in 2023-2024 – that includes parents as partners – to look at priority staffing and to shift resources where they are so desperately needed."

Trustee **Andrew Gonzales** amplified Hunter's remarks, recalling how his grandmother and father were allowed to drop out of the Eastside schools they attended. "This is a crisis and it has gone on for families like mine in this district for decades – for decades," Gonzales said.

Segura agreed – "I do believe it is a crisis" – but assured those in attendance that he and his team are working on proposals to address it. "It's gonna require y'all being brave, y'all considering things that haven't been considered before ... You're going to have to be brave with us." – Brant Bingamon

Killing Andre

The state of Texas can't kill an "insane" prisoner, but they're testing the limits with the most mentally ill man on death row

Content warning: self-harm, suicide, violence

Maurie Levin, the attorney representing death row inmate Andre Thomas, talked about what it's like trying to communicate with her client. "There is nothing that is linear about Andre's thinking," Levin said. "He lives in an alternate world and there's no way to make rational sense of his understanding of what happened, or is happening. It makes no sense to me. It would make no sense to any of us."

Thomas, 39 years old, is without a doubt one of the most mentally ill people ever sent to Texas' death row. During a psychotic break in his hometown of Sherman in 2004, he murdered his estranged wife, Laura Boren, their 4-year-old son, Andre Jr., and Boren's 1-year-old daughter, Leyha Hughes, telling authorities he'd done so on orders from God. Reading a Bible in jail in the days following the murders, he plucked out his right eye. In 2008, three years after being sentenced to death, he plucked out his remaining eye – and ate it – to keep the government from seeing his thoughts.

Since blinding himself, Thomas has been held at the Wayne Scott Unit, a prison southwest of Houston that houses the state's most mentally ill inmates. He continues to hear voices and see visions. Levin has records showing that within the last six months, Thomas has told prison workers that he has a "superhuman mind," that he sees images of the "Godhead" and pyramids, and that he is "one with the mind of God." After he tried to cut his neck with a sharpened spoon last year, a prison doctor reaffirmed Thomas' longtime diagnosis of schizophrenia.

Texas prison officials know that Thomas is insane. After all, they hold him in a psychiatric facility and feed him antipsychotics. However, they will kill Thomas if they're allowed to; until several weeks ago, he was scheduled for execution on April 5. The execution has been postponed for at least three months to allow Levin to prepare arguments showing that Thomas has no idea why he is to be executed – in other words, that killing him would violate the law. But the law is a mutable thing. It is what the courts say it is. Texas has executed many mentally ill people. As ill as Thomas is, there's no guarantee he won't be next.

VOICES, VISIONS, AND MURDER

Thomas was born in 1983 to a family riddled with mental illness. He was the youngest of six sons and grew up very poor. Often, the children had no parental supervision. Sometimes they had no running water and electricity.

Thomas began drinking at the age of 10, with his parents' encouragement. He also began hearing voices and made the first of what would be many suicide attempts. Another of these came at age 13, when his mother said she wished she'd aborted him. Thomas' father described it: "He went to my sink and got a butcher knife and began sawing on his wrist. I told him, 'Hell, if you want to kill yourself go out on the freeway and jump in front of a 18-wheeler.' He continued to cry and saw on his arm, so I knew he was serious. So I told him he needed to make long cuts down his arm so it would split open if he really wanted to kill himself."

At 15, Thomas began a relationship with a white girl, Laura Boren, who was the same age; they had a son by age 16. Thomas got a GED and took a job. On his 18th birthday he and Boren married. They separated within a year.

By then, the voices in Thomas' head had become persistent and hectoring. At times, they drove him to tears. He became obsessed with the Book of Revelations and the dollar bill, which he believed contained a code explaining the meaning of life. He knew something wasn't right and told friends and family he needed help.

Three weeks before his crime, a friend took Thomas to a mental health clinic. "Life is too much for me and I want to die right now," he told the staff. They advised him to go to the emergency room. Two days before the crime, Thomas stabbed himself in the chest and his mother took him to the hospital. The doctor who examined him described Thomas as paranoid, hallucinating, and suicidal but left him alone while he completed an Emergency Detention Order. Thomas walked out.

The next morning Thomas carried three knives to Laura Boren's trailer. With one, he killed Boren, convinced she was Jezebel, the wife of Satan. Using a second knife to keep the blood of the victims separate, he killed Andre Jr., believing he was the Antichrist. Thomas used the last knife to kill Boren's 1-year-old daughter Leyha, believing she was a demon. He cut the hearts out of the children and attempted to cut out Boren's heart. He then stabbed himself in the chest and lay next to Boren, expecting to die.

When he didn't, he stuffed the hearts in his pocket and confessed the murders to Sherman law enforcement, saying God had commanded them. As he sat in jail, Thomas read a Bible passage, Matthew 5:29, where Jesus preaches, "If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out." Using his fingers, Thomas pried out his right eyeball. He was taken to a psychiatric prison, where he was diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia and given large doses of antipsychotics. After 47 days he was pronounced sane enough to be tried for capital murder.



Thomas' court-appointed attorneys argued at the ensuing trial that he was innocent by reason of insanity. They did not, however, argue that he was incompetent to stand trial in the first place. Accordingly, the court did not decide whether he was sane enough to stand trial; in fact, no court has ever ruled on whether he is sane.

The Grayson County prosecutors conceded that Thomas was psychotic at the time of the murders but said he had caused his psychosis by drinking alcohol and cough medicine. They dismissed the gouging out of his eye as an impulsive act. After Thomas was found guilty by the all-white jury, his attorneys failed to fully describe his upbringing and history of mental illness during the sentencing portion of the trial.

"The jury was not given the information that would have helped them to see Mr. Thomas' struggles or humanity," Levin later said. "Without anything close to a full picture of Mr. Thomas' mental illness and the neglect and abuse that exacerbated it – which would likely have led the jury to see Mr. Thomas as deserving of compassion – the jury sentenced him to death."

CRAZY BUT SANE

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals denied Thomas' appeal of his death sentence in 2008, as they do in the vast majority of capital appeals brought before them. "This is a sad case," Judge Cathy Cochran wrote, while claiming, rather surprisingly, that "reasonable people might well differ on the questions of whether [he] was sane at the time he committed these murders or competent at the time he was tried." The judge said these crucial questions had been "appropriately addressed" at the trial. One sentence from the ruling stood out: "[The] applicant is clearly 'crazy," Cochran wrote, "but he is also 'sane' under Texas law."

Cochran could make that statement because Texas and the United States have never defined insanity for purposes of capital punishment. The only guidance on the matter comes from the 1986 Supreme Court decision in *Ford v*. *Wainwright*, which merely requires that those who are executed understand why they are being killed. Texas has killed many mentally ill prisoners since the *Ford* decision, and it continues to do so. Last year, the state killed Tracy Beatty, diagnosed as a paranoid schizophrenic. Just two weeks ago, it killed Gary Green, also diagnosed with schizophrenia.

One month after Cochran wrote that Thomas was crazy but sane, Thomas plucked out his remaining eyeball and ate it. He was taken to the Wayne Scott Unit. During 14 years of solitary confinement there, he has been fed daily doses of benztropine, olanzapine, and other drugs. But he continues to hear voices and see visions. "His delusions have not changed," Levin said. "He has very consistent kinds of hallucinations. He has consistently heard voices that often tell him the same thing. He certainly hasn't gotten any better."

Levin has represented Thomas since he entered Wayne Scott and has filed a variety of appeals with state and federal courts in that time. In 2022, the Supreme Court declined to consider her most recent argument demonstrating racism at Thomas' trial. Shortly afterward, the Grayson County district attorney's office asked that Texas proceed with Thomas' execution. It was set for April 5.

On March 7, a district court in Grayson County postponed the execution to allow Levin time to make the argument that has been staring Texas officials in the face all along – that Thomas is incompetent for execution by reason of insanity. Levin said she will probably present her case to the court in June.

CLEMENCY AND DECENCY

Proving that a defendant is incompetent for execution is difficult. So Levin has also presented a clemency petition to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles, asking that they recommend to Gov. Greg Abbott that he commute Thomas' sentence to life in prison. Seventy-seven of the nation's leading mental health professionals have signed on to the petition; so have 100 Texas faith leaders, representing many faiths and denominations.

Greg Hansch, executive director of the Texas chapter of the National Alliance on Mental Illness, is one of those

asking Abbott to spare Thomas' life. "We strongly believe that capital punishment should be taken off the table for [people with] severe mental illnesses," Hansch said. "We've done so for juveniles, we've done so for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, and it's time that we bring Texas law into alignment with the protections that have been put in place for other vulnerable populations."

Hansch is supporting Texas House Bill 727, which would exempt people convicted of a capital crime from the death penalty if they suffered from psychosis due to schizophrenia or other severe mental illness at the time of their offense. But if HB 727 passes, it will not be retroactive, so it would not affect Thomas.

The Rev. Jaime Kowlessar, senior pastor of Dallas City Temple, is also asking that Abbott commute Thomas' sentence. It's a long shot, but he is urging the governor, who professes to be a Catholic, to read the Bible story contained in Mark 5. In it, a man possessed by demons falls at the feet of Jesus and begs for mercy. Jesus heals the man by exorcising his demons. "When Jesus met this young man, his first word wasn't to execute him," Kowlessar said. "It was to have compassion and mercy."

New book ATX Urban Art catalogs Austin's graffiti, street art, murals, and mosaics BY RACHEL KOPER

Graffiti artists see through a lens, one of unutilized spaces and uncelebrated locations. As Austin grows we consider our urban spaces and density. Do we choose boring? Is it chosen for us? Does an absentee investment group dictate our visual surroundings?

Austin's public art has shifted culturally with the popularity of Banksy and the 50th anniversary of hip-hop. Some is paid for by the city and corporations, and some is just artists grabbing a space. Some of it moves on trains, some flashes by on billboards. There is art for car drivers, bike riders, and pedestrians. People watch you make it or it just appears magically on your commute. It lasts for a day or years, but who maintains it, and who removes it? Now a new book, *ATX Urban Art*, collects evidence that some of the original practitioners are here.

Editor and artist J Muzacz called the crowdfunded first edition "a two-year fulltime effort by me and the team." The work is wide-ranging and inclusive, documenting outdoor artwork from the 1950s to 2020. Documenting art is an art in itself, and this luscious book archives these works while accepting their impermanence, acting as a time capsule for some of our Downtown's great visual moments.

What Muzacz did was approach the creators of the art, not the photographers who take a picture of a mural and print an Austin postcard, and so many of the photographs were provided by the artists or friends. "I felt that the urban art history of Austin would be best told through the artwork and words directly from those most prolific and important artists," Muzacz said, "Tracking down artists and going through archives of some of the oldest known works from our city's graffiti pioneers and earliest mural history was a challenging and infinitely rewarding experience. I've become good friends with some incredible human beings and documentarians like Chale Nafus who captured in his photographs the birth of Austin's hip-hop movement in the early Eighties."

Muzacz even included blank pages in the back for collectors to add artists' signatures, and at one event in December he handed out gold, silver, and black Sharpies with the book. He said, "Since the book launch in November, we've hosted a few booksigning events, two exhibitions at 2324 [Studios] and Something Cool Studios, with a third show planned for this August at the Hill Country Galleria Art Center in Bee Cave." Most recently, it's been part of "The Art of Hip Hop" show at the Museum of Graffiti (806 E. Sixth, through March 28). "ATX Urban Art books were flying off the shelves," Muzacz said. "Holding space and creating platforms for people to connect with and patronage artists, purchase artwork, commission murals, and build a stronger community is really the most powerful aspect of what this project blossomed into."

Following Muzacz's technique of letting the community take the lead, I chatted with the artists about their contributions to the book, and to Austin's public art.

MAKING AN ICON: ARTIST'S FAVORITE WORKS

"The Tupac' mural on Sugar Mama's Bakeshop stands out. I painted it in 2019 because I wanted more hip-hop representation on the walls in Austin. I approached Sugar Mama's about it and they were happy to offer up the wall. It is my most tagged mural in Austin. Lol." -Niz

"Cooler than You' was a funny one as I was poking fun at the changing Eastside at the time. They all have at least some sort of story that goes along with them, be it the act of painting it, who I was with, what was going on in the environment." – *Mez Data*



"The 'Ghost Totem Pole' on South Lamar came to exist after I saw the old Shlotzsky's sandwich place closed and covered in graffiti. It was going to be demolished so I thought it was a safe place for some street art to stay up for a little while. I like to pick the spots that the graffiti guys look past. There was a fat pole that used to hold a sign on it. So I measured it up and went home to paint on a large roll of paper. I painted a ghost dog, a buff cat, an angry rainbow, a Siamese cat, and No-Face (from *Spirited Away*)." – *Matthew Rodriguez*

"I chose the 'Virgen de Guadalupe,' because hands down, it is the top requested stencil of mine, and there's something about her that folks just can't get enough of, and I mean everyone; not just Mexicans, but gringos. It is one of my top bootlegged images." -Fe De Rico

"One of the most noteworthy experiences would have to be tracking down a Mayan group of men in the Yucatán to paint their portraits in their village in the jungle. I painted the first piece of public art in the region on the only corner store in the village. Since then, I have painted a few more in other villages and it involves rallying local friends to talk to the commissioner, have a meeting, explain what we want to do and then ask for certain walls. In this case we usually involve the children in the village as well." – *Niz*

"Trains are not for everyone. Trains require crazy amounts of dedication. Each time you go out is a lengthy, dangerous process, a never-ending mission. There are so many factors, sometimes hiking for miles, barbed wire, sticker burrs, rattlesnakes, mosquitoes in your mouth and ears, etc. Not to mention the danger of the actual trains themselves. No wall or canvas can hold a candle." – Worms

"The wall that I have my Urban Outfitters mural up now on Guadalupe and 24th Street has some history to it. In 2002 I wanted to paint a mural on that wall so I asked the store called Legs Diamond, a clothing store that was currently renting the spot. They said they would love for me to, but the owners of the building wanted to keep the wall painted white. They said I should paint it anyway illegally at night. They even wrote me a permission note just in case the cops show up. That night the cops did show up. They parked below my ladder and shined the spotlight on me, so I climbed down and presented them with my fake note." *– Matthew Rodriguez*

IN MEMORIAM: PUBLIC ART AS A STATEMENT OF PUBLIC GRIEF

"I painted a portrait of my yoga teacher Lisa J, who passed away a couple years ago on a large warehouse door on East Seventh and [Highway] 183. She was a mentor and an Eastside native. I also painted a portrait of Little Richard on the rooftop of the Continental Club when he passed away." -Niz

"I have a R.I.P. mural I painted for my old friend Nekst during Dia de los Muertos at the walls in the Emo's parking lot. I turned his old lettering into green arm muscles punching and spelling out his name accompanied by the Boo Berry cereal ghost pouring out some milk for him." – Matthew Rodriguez

"One of my best friends was Slie, painting his murals were some of the hardest and most personal. I tend not to do a legacy mural unless that person actually had an influence on my life." – *Mez Data*

"Austintatious," Austin's first and most famous mural, celebrates its golden anniversary with a new interactive history **BY JOELLE DIPAOLO**

In 1973, equipped with paintbrushes and a dream, three art students walked off of the University of Texas campus to 23rd Street to create "Austintatious," Austin's first mural. Now, 50 years later, not only has the mural defied the odds and survived, but filmmaker Mike Woolf is preserving its story through a new interactive website.

"Austin's got this great vibe," Woolf says. "I think you can trace it all back to the 1970s in Austin, Texas, and the Drag was the very beating heart of the city."

Woolf and his team worked with Austin design agency the Graphic Standard to create an interactive website (23rdstreetmural. com). Viewers can click on different parts of the mural to watch short films depicting core parts of Austin history. "This was a mirror of what was happening on the streets and in the city in 1973," Woolf says. "Fifty years later you can look at this mirror and see this reflection of the people and what the scene must have been like. But it's two-dimensional and I think this project was a way to bring it to life."

In 1972, Austinites ultimately won over City Council to officially close down 23rd Street for the Renaissance Market. Michael Kleinman, the owner of Planet K and the Phogg Foundation, said the mural overlooking the street represents far more than its layers of paint. He explains, "That mural was a celebration of our victory."

Kerry Awn, one of the original mural artists, says he didn't expect the mural to become a lifetime job. "We thought it might last maybe five or 10 years," Awn says. "With Austin changing so much it's like, why keep this hippie mural up here? It is kind of amazing."

Over the years, each time the mural has been vandalized, original artists Rick Turner, Tommy Bee, and Awn come to the rescue. Awn says restoring the mural allows him to reconnect with his "best friends in life." He says, "We get together, it's like, let's make art, make each other laugh. ... It's a reunion with the artists because otherwise we don't really see each other ever really, for years."

Another film Woolf directed, "Crazy Carl and His Man-Boobs," inspired him to make an in-depth project focusing on the "That mural was a celebration of our victory."

mural, using unused footage from the film as a starting point. Video editor Landon Peterson says the mural is a "little portal to memories ... It was like being a kid in a candy store with all the fun we were having digging up these gems of history."

With each restoration of the mural, artists have added new elements. Peterson says it is "not just about lost Austin," but a celebration of the city's spirit. "It's about living Austin and some of the treasures that are tied to such a storied past."

Woolf says he hopes the video serves as a reminder of the specialness of the city. "[When people move here] they should have to go to the website and learn about what made Austin so cool that they want to overpay on rent." When Awn first painted the mural, everyone said it was "too California." Looking back, he's proud that Austin's first mural didn't end up being its last. "I'm glad that murals kept going on," he says. "It's like, just take [art] to the people on the street."

Austin PBS puts the city's walls in motion with new series Muraling Austin by Richard Whittaker

When you say "public art" in many cities, the first thought is statues. But in Austin it's murals, explosions of color and theme that have turned buildings, bridges, underpasses, and back alleys into open-air gallery spaces. "Murals are bursting all over the

walls of Austin," explained Natasha Davison, series producer and executive director for Muraling Austin, a new show for Austin PBS exploring how artists are beautifying the city's flat, gray spaces.

The three-part series begins on March 24 with "Pride of Place," focusing on Austin's most inspiring murals. "Women Rising" (March 31) explores works that feature expressions of female empowerment

and celebrate the achievements of women. Rounding out the trilogy is "Big, Bright & Bold" (April 7), a celebration of contemporary mural artists and their works. "There are such incredible stories behind the murals," Davison said. "The artists that created them.

the way that that mural came to be, the organizations that came together to secure the walls and the materials and the artists. And then what is depicted in these murals: Some are aimed at beautifying a space, some are depictions of community activists and

organizers who have a big impact in Austin, so it's a really rich, deep history."

In the initial discussions with Austin PBS. Davison said, "they were very interested in doing a television series on graffiti, [but] that is really hard to do for TV. We could do it, but it's hard to capture footage, and a lot of this is illegal, and it's at night."

However, the line between traditional graffiti and murals has blurred

long ago. Take "The Beauty of Liberty and Equality" on the side of the Line Hotel, one of the images covered in episode 1: Shepard Fairey, who created it with Canadian artist Sandra Chevrier, may be an internationally acclaimed creative, but as recently as 2015



of the artists that we talk to in the series got their start doing rogue art or graffiti," Davison said, "but it's got subcategories even within that art culture, where they'll say graffiti is illegal lettering and they're like, 'Well, if I'm doing a figure that's not really lettering, but it's still illegal." But Muraling Austin concentrates on

art that has been invited onto spaces by the city, businesses, and property owners, and Davison credited organizations like the Downtown Austin Alliance Foundation for connecting property owners and local artists. However, just because there is institutional support for these works, it doesn't mean that they're not transitory - subject to the whims of the weather, redevelopment, tagging, and even redesign by the artist. That's why the show is an opportunity to record or maybe even memorialize these works at a certain moment, but it meant the Muraling Austin team was constantly trying to beat the clock. Davison said. "One of our artists created a mural over at the soccer stadium, but they change them out every eight weeks. We wanted to shoot it, but they went, 'Oh, we already changed it!"

Review: The Tavern

Not to be melodramatic but, damn, this is a satire worth sitting through **BY BOB ABELMAN**

George M. Cohan – the turn-of-the-20th-century entertainer whose bronze statue holds court in the middle of New York City's Times Square – has earned many monikers over the course of his remarkable career. Among them are "Mr. Broadway" (the result of the dozens of hit musicals and revues which he wrote, composed, produced, and performed in) and "The Yankee Doodle Boy" (from the wildly popular patriotic tunes he penned during World War I). But one thing he has never been called is "evergreen," since little of his work held up over time.

His 1920 play, *The Tavern*, is the rare exception. The show, now in production by Different Stages, brilliantly satirizes the

popular melodramas and melodramatic vaudeville blackout sketches of Cohan's era. Sure, these art forms have largely gone the way of the dodo and the saucy McRib sandwich, but good satire – which calls out and holds up for ridicule the familiar tropes of its target – has not. Just watch Saturday Night Live, read The Onion, or access The Menu, now streaming.

The Tavern takes place one stormy night in the 1800s on a dark and lonely road. There sits an old inn run by coldhearted Freeman (Michael Lucas). He lives with his cowardly man-child son, Zach (Jack Baziuk); their high-strung servant, Sally (Frances Bello), who Zach loves; and an utterly clueless hired man, Willum (Tom Chamberlain). Zach stumbles upon a mysterious, devil-may-care vagabond (Greg Ginther) sleeping in the woodshed along with a strange and frenzied woman (Jessica Medina) who claims she is heading to the state capital to tell the governor some rather shocking news. Later in the evening, the tavern is visited by said governor (Ev Lunning), a powerful and privileged man, accompanied by his dutiful wife (Kristin Fern Johnson), his flirtatious daughter (Annie Nicole Merritt), and her aristocratic fiancé (Ty Wiley), who have been held up by bandits during their travels and need a place to spend the night. The hard-nosed sheriff (C. Robert Stevens) and his deputies (Steven Fay and Sebastian Garcia) arrive in the morning to discover the truth behind the vagabond, the woman, and the robbery.

> Let's see. Stormy night, lonely road, and one-dimensional characters whose wardrobes (courtesy of Ann Ford) define them? Check. Convoluted storyline filled with heightened drama followed by odd coincidences and quick, convenient conflict resolution? You bet. Overacting, loud speaking, and broad gestures? For sure.

Earnestly performing these melodrama tropes while simultaneously turning them into comedy is no easy task and comes with risk. When satire fails it fails hard. Director Norman Blumensaadt knows this and has found himself a talented ensemble that completely buys into the play's satirical world and has the chops to live in it.

At their center is Ginther as the Vagabond. Like Feste in *Twelfth Night*, his wit, charm, and lack of loyalty entertain while giving him leeway to speak the truth about the characters around him. Here, a mere wink and a nod allow him to unveil and lay bare the mechanics of the very melodramatic storytelling. The role, like Feste, also requires great physical dexterity and the

effortless delivery of complicated, lightning-fast wordplay, which Ginther has mastered. Each of the other players are also given their moments to shine, which they do in hilarious fashion.

Blumensaadt, Charlie Boas (scenic design), and Amy Lewis (lighting design) have created the perfect place for this clever cast to play. The Scottish Rite Theater stage itself, with its pronounced proscenium arch, shouts vaudeville from the get-go while Freeman's Tavern – built with a balance of realism (authentic furnishings and props) and overt theatricality (a freestanding door and window, a hand-painted canvas canopy that engulfs the tavern with a treescape) – allows for melodrama and satire to unfold. Outside the door a storm is brewing, with realistic flashes of lighting and claps of thunder that are comically accentuated with well-timed Foley sound effects (courtesy of J. Robinson Wheeler), particularly when the door opens for someone to enter or exit. Funny stuff well-executed.

It's hard to imagine *The Tavern* being more audience-pleasing than when in the hands of Different Stages. George M. Cohan would likely agree.





Meow Wolf is coming to Texas.

This summer, Grapevine - and Houston in 2024 - will join the municipalities hosting the immersive art installations. "The House of Eternal Return," the original Meow Wolf, opened in an old bowling alley in Santa Fe in 2016. Since then, "portals" have opened in Denver and Las Vegas.

Didi Bethurum, chief communications officer with Meow Wolf, was in Austin for South by Southwest and gave us some hints of what to expect at the new installations.

"They will be completely different," Didi said. "New characters and new storylines."

For those uninitiated to Meow Wolf, imagine if a group of artists built an indoor amusement park. There are forests glowing under black lights, refrigerators that lead to other rooms, tunnels that come out of washing machines while giving clues to a story. Or visitors can just wander the colorful chaos for fun.

Didi was secretive about the storyline, the name, and even the opening date of the Grapevine location. What she would say is that it will be in a former big-box store in the Grapevine Mills shopping mall. It will be the second-largest Meow Wolf installation, with 70 rooms. A third of the 90 artists working on the art project gone wild are local.

The Houston installation will be north of downtown in the Fifth Ward, a booming arts and cultural district near the Saint Arnold Brewery.



When the Santa Fe artist collective opened the first Meow Wolf in a building donated by George R.R. Martin, they expected around 70,000 visitors annually. They met that goal in a few months. Last year the three locations welcomed 2.7 million visitors.

Didi credits the success to Meow Wolf's multigenerational appeal. "It's a place for kids to act like adults and adults to act like kids," she said.

Attacking Blueprint Hits Early Season Snag

On paper, it looks gorgeous. Sebastián Driussi, perhaps the most skilled and lethal goalscorer in Major League Soccer, penned in as the central figure in Austin FC's attack. To his left, Austin's adopted favorite son, Diego Fagúndez. To his right, Driussi's countryman, fellow Designated Player and theoretical creative equal Emiliano Rigoni. And front and center, a proven goal-sniffing striker in Gvasi Zardes. In the words of legendary Greek manager Thanos, "Perfectly balanced, as all things should be."

There's just one problem: Through the first month of the MLS season, that perfectly balanced guartet has delivered exactly one (1) stinkin' goal - an individual moment of brilliance from Driussi in the season opener. As for the other three? Bubkes.

"Sebastián Driussi can't be the only guy that scores for us," Josh Wolff said plainly following a discouraging 0-2 loss to the Houston Dynamo at Shell Energy Stadium over the weekend that only further magnified El Tree's struggles in front of goal.

Once again, Rigoni failed to capitalize on multiple scoring opportunities in dangerous areas. Zardes had the majority of the night off, only clocking eight minutes as a late substitute for Maxi Urruti. who is clearly Wolff's preferred No. 9 at the moment.

And then there's Fagúndez, who hasn't done much of anything of note since assisting on a

Jon Gallagher goal in the February 25 opener. His subpar performance Saturday in Houston earned him an early hook just 10 minutes into the second half, as his minutes have continued to decline in recent weeks. Wolff did not mince words post-match when asked for clarity as to why.

"It was a poor performance," Wolff said. "For Diego, the standard that he has had here in Austin for two years, the ability to do what he's done - and he certainly got rewarded with a good contract - in the first part of the season so far, he's not [up] to his standard."

Fagúndez signed a three-year contract extension with Austin prior to the start of the season after two consistently productive years in the Verde and Black. He is the club's all-time leader in assists with 22, to go along with 13 goals. However, questions

about fitness intruded upon the early season for one of the club's most valuable players. "We need Diego. We need him to be operating in better form," Wolff said.

The same can be said for Rigoni, who is now going on 16 straight appearances without a goal since arriving in Austin

last August for a \$4 million transfer

fee. It certainly hasn't been for lack of opportunities, and Wolff is convinced Rigoni simply needs to see the ball hit the back of the net one time to open the floodgates. "I'd say he's our most consistent guy at getting in great spots ... I think the sooner he breaks the seal,

it'll be good for all of us," Wolff said. "He needs that validation for himself right now, more than anything."

In the case of Zardes, the hope is that the 31-year-old can be more than just a poacher of rebounds and tap-ins, the sort of goals he's become synonymous with in recent seasons. On that front, the pickings have been slim so far this campaign, and Zardes has managed just four shots (zero on target) in 249 minutes despite a steady diet of crosses and deliveries into the box.

Zardes, along with his line mates, will look to break several seals as Austin FC welcomes Zardes' former club, the Colorado Rapids, to Q2 Stadium Saturday night. The Rapids sit dead last in the league with just one draw and three losses on the young season, having conceded seven combined goals in the process.

A billion bullets later, John Wick: Chapter 4 offers a surprisingly touching denouement for Baba Yaga himself by Richard WHITTAKER

JOHN WICK: CHAPTER 4

Nine years ago, star Keanu Reeves and director Chad Stahelski debuted a little action flick called John Wick in Austin, and the rest is history. Now a leviathan franchise, the story of a killer continues in John Wick: Chapter 4. and the question is simple: Does the history of John Wick finally come to an end?

After all, the series has gone from a hyper-

violent, hyperstylized, and vet oddly heartfelt story of a widower and dog lover out for revenge to a globe-trotting Looney Tunes adventure with lots of headshots. Wisely, for this fourth film Stahelski embraces that silliness. Everyone is bulletproof, even

the endless hordes of wannabe assassins that have been unleashed to kill the unkillable Wick.

What's surprising is that so many of the players seemingly left on the board from earlier installments don't make an appearance in the most massive and incendiary Wick to date. At least hotel manager Winston (a perfectly roguish McShane), concierge Charon (the always impeccable Reddick) and the Bowery King (Fishburne, deliciously bombastic) return as John follows his bloody trail of revenge to its inevitable, bloody conclusion. The script by Shay Hatten and Michael Finch understands that the story has blown past John's quest for vengeance and has now become a war with the out-of-control Marguis de Gramont (Skarsgård vamping as aristocratic eurotrash), who has realized that it's not enough to kill John Wick - he must kill everything he represents.

Yet again, John globetrots unhindered, to a neon-soaked Osaka (home to Sanada and Sawayama as more old friends of Wick's we have never seen before), a glossily skeezy New York, and a Berlin that's basically a giant, rain-soaked. leather-fetish rave. Of course, there are two killers who have a realistic shot at taking down Baba Yaga: Shamier Anderson as the Tracker, a freelancer with canine commitments of his own, and Donnie Yen as Caine, a Zatoichi-esque blind

swordsman. Their dynamic is more than a little reminiscent of The Good, the Bad, and *the Ugly* – and the film knows it. With this story arc clearly coming to a conclusion before Anderson, Lance Reddick. (R, 169 min.) it collapses into absurdity (although martial arts mainstay Scott Adkins submerged

> under a fat suit and a questionable German accent comes questionably close), it's a chance for Reeves and Stahelski to throw in every action star and reference they can before the last casing hits the ground.

The end result is undeniably overstuffed. Yet even in the hail of bullets, shrieking needle drops, and blinding lighting effects, John Wick: Chapter 4 still works as a cohesive, linear film with a strangely philosophical heart. It's a tribute to Reeves and Stahelski that even as these films have become uncontrollably wild, John's fate gives the series, the fans, and John himself the touching denouement that is so richly deserved.

A GOOD PERSON

D: Zach Braff; with Florence Pugh, Morgan Freeman, Celeste O'Connor, Molly Shannon, Chinaza Uche, Zoe Lister-Jones, Alex Wolff. (R, 125 min.)

A Good Person is set squarely in the present - distracted driving and oxycodone addiction are both major plot points - but constitutionally it's an old-fashioned film. cut from the cloth of a nowunfashionable genre, the melodrama. And the thing with melodramas is, no matter how preposterous the plot contrivances are, or how wincing the big swoops at tear-jerking become, you'll follow a film anywhere if the cast is good enough. Writer/ director Zach Braff has not one ace in the hole but two: Florence Pugh and Morgan Freeman.

Pugh plays Allison, a young woman we meet briefly in happier times before a car accident results in two deaths and upends her life. The film cuts to one year later, the first of several extreme time jumps or montages that scurry past opportunities for conflict and character revelation. Allison, who was the driver in the accident, is now at seeming rock bottom, living at home with her mother (Shannon) and powerfully addicted to pills. As this only covers about the first 20 minutes of the film, you can rest assured there's a lot more rock bottom to explore, as well as halting attempts at recovery, which is where she meets Daniel (Freeman, neatly lacing acid into his avuncular mien), the father to one of the highway fatalities.

Scaffolding his story on an illogical foundation, Braff (Garden State, Wish I Was Here) continues to be an aggravatingly unsubtle filmmaker, over-relying on totems of profundity (a train set, a tattoo) and showboating with the camera in ways that distract rather than enhance the drama (an off-balance framing, a confrontation delivered between stair balusters). Still, rising star Pugh is watchable doing just about anything, including sweating through her shirts as Allison tries to kick her addiction. The bond she forges with Daniel doesn't make a lick of sense, but what keeps the film motoring along is the pleasure of their company. **1 - Kimberley Jones

Obsession is what they call it when you're wrong. When you're right, it's called conviction, and that's the story behind The Lost King, the remarkable, charming, and true-ish tale of Philippa Langley (Hawkins), the amateur historian who made one of the most important archeological discoveries of the century.

What's true is the most ridiculous part. Langley, a divorced marketing worker in Edinburgh, Scotland, became obsessed with Richard III, the last Plantagenet king of England and infamously defamed throughout history by Tudor propagandist

William Shakespeare. She went on a mission to find his lost grave, convinced the city and University of Leicester that he was buried under a parking lot, raised the funds for a dig – and found him, day one. As archeologist Richard Buckley (Addy) tells her, finding a needle in a haystack would be easier. However, that's exactly what happened.

Where the delightful and warmhearted *The Lost King* (scripted by the *Philomena* duo of Steve Coogan and Jeff Pope) does deviate from reality is – as is often the way in biopics – in the details. Langley wasn't the first person to suggest the parking lot as Richard's last resting place, even if she did find the best evidence; nor was this a solitary quest, as there were plenty of other people involved in the "Looking for Richard: In Search of a King" project.

But the narrative trimming allows the story to center on a touching theme of what it is to be demeaned and belittled. Diagnosed with chronic fatigue syndrome, a middle-aged woman, and with no formal qualifications, it's all too easy for Philippa to be ignored and muttered about behind her back – or even to her face. It's the kinship she shares with Richard III, who has been on the receiving end of slander for over 500 years. That's something she discusses with his ghost (another thing that probably didn't happen), played by Lloyd as her soulful and often-silent sounding board.

As Langley, Hawkins evokes a certain British contrariness, a polite determination to do the right thing, and a quiet indignation when the same is not done for her. The University of Leicester is the villain here, while Richard gets his history publicly and valiantly reassessed – exactly what Langley wanted all along. $\star \star \star$ – Richard Whittaker

ONE FINE MORNING

D: Mia Hansen-Løve; with Léa Seydoux, Melvil Poupaud, Pascal Greggory, Sarah Le Picard, Nicole Garcia, Fejria Deliba. (R, 112 min., subtitled)

Cogent thought does not come easily to someone suffering from a neurodegenerative disease, but unexpected poetry can happen. A former philosophy professor quietly drifting away from present-tense living, Georg (Greggory) struggles to articulate himself to his adult daughter Sandra (Seydoux). "It's a bit difficult at times ..." Georg starts, before landing on the source of his difficulty: "Living."

One Fine Morning is not predominantly about Georg's plight, though it is beautifully performed and sensitively dramatized. (Writer/director Mia Hansen-Løve has said the film was inspired by her own father's illness.) The focus instead is on daughter Sandra, a translator in Paris and widowed mother to a young child. The film in its way is an itemizing - matter-of-fact, unsentimental, and terribly moving - of the difficulties Sandra faces every day with grace. There is how to manage her father's transition into assisted living; he will cycle through four care homes over the course of the film. There is how to raise a daughter (Le Picard) in the city on limited means. There is how to navigate a new relationship when the man in question - Clément (Poupaud), a scientist and friend of her late husband - is still married.


Admirers of Hansen-Løve's previous film, her English-language debut *Bergman Island*, may be surprised at how straightforward *One Fine Morning* is, how resistant it is to delivering a capital-letter Cinematic Moment. There's no equivalent here to Mia Wasikowska's dance to "The Winner Takes It All" – a heart-clenching collision of desire and despair and dawning understanding – and that's rather the point. Sandra is nowhere near catharsis. Who has the time for that?

In inferior material – for instance, a couple of pretty lousy Bond films – Seydoux can present as somewhat low-energy. Here, her preternatural stillness makes sense: You feel the heaviness of her stresses. You also feel her regular joy in the mundanities of raising a kid and spending time with a new lover. If this all sounds a little anti-dramatic, then that too is the point. That's living.

RODEO

D: Lola Quivoron; with Julie Ledru, Antonia Buresi, Cody Schroeder, Dave Nsaman. (NR, 105 min., subtitled)

Gasoline wafting up from hot pavement and the low growl of a motorbike engine are the first things that come to mind when thinking of *Rodeo*. Director Lola Quivoron's latest film is tactile, focused on Julia (Ledru), a girl who has one aim in life: tearing it up on the open road. *Rodeo* is a moody, chaotic character study: at once engaging and mysterious, letting the viewer get a sense of Julia and her unpredictable nature without any straightforward answers.



In the male-dominated motorbike world, Julia is an outsider, but hungry to ride no matter the cost. She hopes that she can work her way into the bike club she is on the fringes of one day, even if they mostly ignore her. In one of her first scenes, she steals a bike from a man who unwittingly thinks this is a sale. As she rides away, dust trailing behind her, she flips him off. It's frankly cool as hell, and a succinct, near-perfect encapsulation of Julia's character – or at least what she projects.

She can be soft, too. There's tenderness in the second half of the film between Julia and Ophélie (Buresi), the wife of the bike club's incarcerated boss, as well as their son, Kylian (Schroeder). Julia is also haunted by the accident of a friend from the bike club, Abra (Nsaman). Abra is one of the only guys in the club who was kind to Julia instead of simply being ambivalent or cruel. His accident will haunt her and echo her fate as well. As Julia leverages her skills in swiping bikes to gain the respect of the club, the group plans a heist. Meanwhile, she'll have to contend with vicious misogyny as well as her own reckless desires.

Rodeo is engaging and gritty, but what makes the whole film hold together overall is Ledru. She gives gives Julia a real presence and believability that isn't always made explicit through the narrative. Where the film falls short or gets too vague about Julia, Ledru's emotive performance kicks in. She can go from wiry and electric to introspective and tender with equal verve. Her performance is what saves the film from going too far into being an empty mood piece, giving *Rodeo* a lead we feel compelled to root for precisely because of her messy, chaotic, and human tendencies.

O TETRIS

In 1989, a large hunk of the world was introduced to the heroin in digital form that was *Tetris*, the interlocking blocks game that became of the most popular video amusements ever to lock in eyeballs. Aside from its addictive nature, *Tetris* also came with an intriguing backstory, one made into an entertaining if not terribly thrilling thriller in *Tetris*.

The year is 1987 and Henk Rogers (*Rocketman* star Egerton), the Dutch American, Japan-based head of tiny game publisher Bullet-Proof, is watching his computer version of Go tank at the Consumer Electronics Show. That's when he discovers *Tetris* a few booths over and immediately becomes convinced that he needs to license this game as soon as humanly possible. In fact, he's willing to risk his family's house and income on it and eventually, given the complexities of licensing a video game from a Soviet company as the country is falling apart, his own personal safety.

The short version: In 1984, Soviet government computer programmer Alexey Pajitnov (an excellent Efremov) developed *Tetris* on a computer that didn't even have a graphics card. It was bootlegged all over the Soviet Union, attracting the attention of everyone from fellow game publishers like Andromeda owner Robert Stein (Jones) to media mogul Robert Maxwell (Allam) and his wormy son Kevin (Boyle). Everyone has an angle, everyone is trying to out-think each other, from local translator Sasha (Lebedeva) to the increasingly corrupt KGB agent Valentin Trifonov (Grabuzov). There are deals and

double-deals, contracts that aren't enforceable over licensing rights that may or may not exist and cash access that various players may or may not not have, all as the Soviet Union is inching toward the end of an era.

The script by Noah Pink feels distractingly expository at first, but director Jon S. Baird adds a canny visual flare with 8-bit animated sequences that serve as character introductions and sharp act breaks and will appeal to nostalgia-driven Gen Xers curious about the story of the game that caused them to dream in falling blocks. Indeed, during a key car chase, every bump and bonk causes the cars to pixelate, as if to remind viewers that exact verisimilitude might not be the reason to watch Tetris.

It all plays out as a tad more weightless than it could be, thanks largely to Egerton's singleminded yet salesman-upbeat determination to get Tetris into the wider world and the constant, low-level, video gamey score. The pieces all fit, if a little predictably. – Joe Gross



SPOTLIGHTING Women Wavemakers Of Antone's

Austin Club, Thursday 23, 6pm Antone's Nightclub, Sunday 26, 7pm Antone's Nightclub, Friday 31, 9:30am

From Antone's co-founder Angela Strehli to everlasting matriarch Susan Antone, women built Austin's world-famous Home of the Blues, now staging three separate spotlight events on the subject.

Women of Antone's kicks off the triptych on Thursday 23 at the swank, 150-year-old Millett

Opera House, home of the Austin Club. There, ivories trader Marcia Ball, blues firebrand Lou Ann Barton, Tele shredder Sue Foley, R&B oracle Ruthie Foster, and Antone's Records bandleader Eve Monsees chat with and play for Antone and booker Zach Ernst. That benefits the Austin History Center Association as it transforms into a resource center in the Downtown historical corridor. Tickets start at \$150 for AHCA members, \$250 for the public.

Three days later, Sunday 26, Nancy Coplin stages another philanthropic affair doubling as her 75th birthday. HOME (Housing Opportunities for Musicians & Entertainers) helps local musicians with shelter and rent, so she's gathered a chorus to deliver the message. Piano whisperer Henri Herbert; HOME All-Stars Shelley King, Carolyn Wonderland, and Eve Monsees; and pop trio Tje Austin, Miggy Milla, and Zack Morgan as Midnight Snack. \$20 GA, but upgrade to VIP for a private acoustic set by Ruthie Foster.

Closing out March on Friday 31 while aiding the Clifford Antone Foundation, Wavemakers host a three-tier music biz schooling: an industry insiders panel, a 40+ women in music convergence – Taméca Jones, Amy Edwards, Sue Foley, and Kathy Valentine – and midday acoustic sets. Attend for \$75 or stream online for \$35. Classic rock to classic soul, Americana, and blues, expect unplugged bling. – *Raoul Hernandez*

HELL'S HOTTEST VOL. 2 Empire Control Room, Friday 24

The word "showcase" shall get shelved indefinitely after its annual 10 days of SXSW-induced notoriety. So, let's call Empire's two hip-hop shows this weekend an unofficially intertwined platform for a multitude of underground MCs in the Austin and San Antonio areas. Friday's show, hosted by rapper/producer Hellcat!, hones in on lyrical prowess and lo-fi sonics emanating from both aforementioned cities while Saturday features an all-512 lineup (see more in "Music Notes," p. 44). Friday, Naalah of SATX shines with unashamed confessions over weeping strings on "Manic Maniac." Locals on the weekend kickoff bill include laid-back rhymer Blakchyl, Censored Dialogue, and Khxnidl, who finally tells us how to address him in latest single "whatsforme?" Ben Buck paces affairs on the 1s and 2s. – Derek Udensi

FUCKEMOS Lost Well, Friday 24

Like bat meat brisket tacos, FuckEmos are a celebrated local delicacy that have been closely guarded from outsiders for three decades. Sludge rock with vocals pitch-shifted hellward, the Russell Porter-led project has thrived on anthems that can be unfathomably depraved, bizarrely left field, or, on occasion, strangely innocent. Classic albums *Can Kill You* (1994) and *Lifestyles of the Drugged and Homeless* (1995) document the weirdest rock from an era when people could freely buy Rohypnol to use on themselves. Speaking of Nineties Austin, John Motard – a variation of garage punk favorites the Motards – also appears after Porter's dance rock consortium Sex Pümp. – Kevin Curtin


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BLACK FLAG Mohawk, Saturday 25

If only we still had Spot around to share stories from the recording of the album that saw Black Flag turn hardcore punk into an endurance test. Longtime Austinite Glen "Spot" Lockett – who died at 71 earlier this month – was the studio architect for *My War*, part of an astonishing run of albums he helmed as SST Records' in-house producer (with others including Big Boys, Meat Puppets, Hüsker Dü, and Misfits). After a recording hiatus due to a legal battle with its distributor, Black Flag pivoted to sludge metal on the 1984 LP and stretched its anger across overlong songs, including a closing trifecta that clocks in just shy of 20 minutes. With guitarist Greg Ginn as the only original member still in the fold, the Austin stop kicks off a 40th-anniversary run performing *My War* in its entirety. *Chad Swiatecki*

MEET ME @ THE ALTAR Antone's, Monday 27

Meet Me @ the Altar is transforming the pop-punk landscape – and they don't need Travis Barker's help. On debut full-length *Past // Present // Future*, the femme trio of color channels Warped Tour and Avril Lavigne to breathe new life into an old-head genre. Opener "Say It (to My Face)" demonstrates the Fueled by Ramen signees' mastery of pop-rock earworms, while "Kool" spins playfully reminiscent of Radio Disney. After performing at nostalgia fest When We Were Young and bagging a Taco Bell commercial placement, these rising rockers might even land at a stadium. For their inaugural headlining tour, however, Antone's will do. – Kriss Conklin

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

I'm still mad because I know I didn't do anything word, but I don't want to lose her as a friend over something like this. Should I call her and apologize or give her some time to come around? — Tipsy

I don't know about the bartenders out in L.A., but you can always tell Austin bartenders by their sick drip, their Maseratis with customized "BRTNDR" plates parked in the handicapped zone, and their flossy black HOKAs with gold laces. Perhaps you can also share with her your first-hand knowledge of service industry pay. If she's not willing to listen, maybe she's not your friend.
