


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and everyone who eats in Texas. If we want to eat in the future, we should empower farmers and make checkoffs more transparent.

FEDS SUE ABBOTT The Department of Justice has filed a civil complaint against Gov. Greg Abbott for his refusal to remove floating barriers in the Rio Grande meant to deter immigration, arguing the barriers constitute a humanitarian threat that has already damaged U.S. foreign relations with Mexico.

PROFS ON THE CHOPPING BLOCK A respected opioid expert and Texas A&M professor Joy Alonzo was placed on administrative leave after "disparaging" Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick during a lecture. The Texas Tribune reported Tuesday. This news comes after A&M's president resigned last week amid outrage over UT Journalism professor Kathleen McElroy's hiring process being botched, wherein admins were skeptical of her work with diversity initiatives.

DOUBLING CAMPUS POLICE House Bill 3. which requires school districts to have at least one armed officer at each of their schools, will force Austin ISD to effectively double the number of school resource officers (i.e., campus police). According to KUT's Becky Fogel, the district is contemplating the addition of 70 SROs and the staff and equipment necessary to support them. The cost, not vet calculated, will deepen the budget deficit the district is facing.

INFRASTRUCTURE. THE MOST PROLIFIC SERIAL KILLER An update to plans for the ongoing Rainey Street Trailhead project includes steps to improve lighting and pedestrian safety following two recent drownings in Lady Bird Lake. Plans from the Parks and Rec **Department** and the **Trail Conservancy** will lead traffic away from the water.

Council Approves Operator for First Trauma Recovery Center in Texas

Safety > punishment by Austin Sanders

Austin is one step closer to opening the first ever trauma recovery center in Texas - a resource that can be key to reducing violent crime and supporting victims of violent crime that has been sought by community advocates for two years.

TRCs offer a place for victims of violent crime to receive recovery support - like clinical case management, psychotherapy, and legal advocacy - in a venue that is not directly connected to actors within the justice system. For victims of crime who fear the justice system, tying recovery to it can sometimes deter people from seeking such support. The quest to open a TRC in Austin gathered steam three years ago as uprisings against police violence spread throughout the United States. The provocative political debate over "defunding the police" that followed those protests largely obscured the broader goal of community groups and elected leaders engaged in that work - invest less of the city budget in policing so that more

money could be invested in alternative methods of reducing crime.

When City Council voted in 2020 to reallocate funding from the Austin Police Department into other programs that could address the root causes of violent crime poverty, lack of mental health care, insufficient support for people involved in violent relationships - that was their intended goal. The Reimagining Public Safety Task Force, established to generate policy ideas aimed







CASAR THIRST STRIKES Tuesday, U.S. Rep. Cyrus Gray spent four years in jail in San Marcos because he couldn't make ball

Free for Now

Cyrus Gray spent four years in jail, and now charges have been dropped by Brant BINGAMON

The capital murder case against Cyrus Gray is collapsing. On Monday, Hays County District Attorney **Kelly Higgins** announced that his office will ask that the charges against Gray be dismissed "pending further investigation."

Gray, who has been accused of robbing and killing Texas State student Justin Gage in 2015, is pleased that Higgins is seeking to drop the charges. He's not happy about the "pending further investigation" part. He wants the case dismissed "with prejudice" - the term prosecutors use when they close a case permanently. "In my mind, the way the state is trying to dismiss this case is a cop out," Gray told the Chronicle. "It does not mean it's over. I would still have to live with this on my back and my name. That's going to affect every aspect of my life. So if they're not going to dismiss it with prejudice, I'd rather go to trial."

Gray, a personal trainer with no criminal record, was arrested for Gage's murder in March of 2018, along with his childhood

friend. Devonte Amerson. After the arrest. he and Amerson were assigned courtappointed attorneys and began long waits in the Hays County Jail. Amerson is still incarcerated there. There has been no word from the D.A. on his case.

Chronicle readers will remember that Grav has already faced a trial for Gage's murder, in the summer of 2022. The trial revealed that Hays County had poor evidence against him, especially considering the gravity of the charges - no evewitnesses, video, fingerprints, or DNA connected Gray or Amerson to the murder. The jury was deadlocked for four days before the proceedings were declared a mistrial when several jurors came down with COVID. Gray was released on bond four months later.

Higgins' announcement came nine days before he was scheduled to retry Gray and three days before Gray asked District Judge Bruce Boyer to throw out the charges on the grounds that he has been denied a speedy

trial. Grav believes there's a chance Bover will grant the request. "At the end of the day, that is the only way for this to be done with," Gray said. "For me to be found not guilty or for this to be dismissed with prejudice."

Gray and the San Marcos advocates who have helped bring attention to his case are concerned that Amerson remains behind bars. Only last month, the D.A.'s Office offered Amerson a 15-year sentence to testify against Gray, as the Chronicle learned from Devonte's mother, Chelesta Amerson. She said her son rejected the offer right away.

"We commend the D.A.'s Office for making the correct choice in not proceeding with another trial against Cyrus, but we will not consider this a victory until the charges against both Cyrus and Devonte have been dropped conclusively and a serious effort is made to properly investigate Justin Gage's killing," said Amy Kamp of the social justice group Mano Amiga.

Kamp sat through Gray's 2022 trial and heard testimony from San Marcos detectives about other suspects in Gage's killing. "SMPD really botched this case," she said. "So are they going to get serious about investigating the murder and looking into the other suspects? Because Justin Gage's family deserves justice."

at achieving that goal, recommended a slew of priorities – one of which was the opening of a trauma recovery center.

The following year, when Council adopted a fiscal year 2021-2022 budget, which fully restored funding cut from APD in FY 2020-21, they also approved \$1 million to fund a TRC. At their July 20 meeting, City Council took another step toward that goal by authorizing staff to negotiate and execute a 24-month contract with African American Youth Harvest Foundation to "provide [TRC] services to survivors of violent crime and their families from underserved populations."

When the contract with AAYHF is signed Sept. 1, the nonprofit and Austin Public Health's Office of Violence Prevention will collaborate with the National Alliance of Trauma Recovery Centers on TRC operations such as service delivery, data tracking, and staffing. Previously, the OVP contracted with Dr. Chico Tillmon, a research fellow at the University of Chicago's Crime and Education Labs, to study community violence in Austin and develop programs aimed at reducing it. The TRC will be located in Northeast Austin along U.S. Hwy 290 near I-35; the city decided to locate the center there based on Tillmon's research and hospital data.

Housing in a Hurry

As heat blazes, Council OKs \$9 million emergency shelter, using some funding designated for permanent housing by Austin Sanders

With the summer heat still blazing in Austin, city leaders hope to open a new congregate shelter for people experiencing homelessness by the middle of next week, so that people living on the street would have a place to temporarily live out of the elements, if they desire. But advocates for the unhoused remain concerned first, because they're unsure what living conditions at the facility will look like, and second, because opening the shelter will require siphoning funds away from permanent supportive housing, which is the most successful way to end a person's homelessness for the long term.

At their July 20 meeting, City Council authorized staff to negotiate and execute a 12-month contract with Family Endeavors Inc., not to exceed \$9.14 million, to stand up and operate a temporary shelter providing between 250 and 300 beds at the city-owned Marshalling Yard in Southeast Austin. The idea for opening a new shelter in the Montopolis area, right next door to The Other Ones Foundation's Esperanza Community, was announced by Interim City Manager Jesús Garza in May. Now, Endeavors - a faith-based nonprofit that was founded in San Antonio and has operated emergency homeless shelters for the past 10 years, including in Dallas, San Antonio, and El Paso - could have the new shelter open to guests by Aug. 4, just 72 hours after signing a contract with the city.

Opening a new congregate shelter of any size within three months of announcing it, let alone one that will effectively become the city's largest, is fast, especially by Austin standards. But supporters say intense summer heat explains the urgency. "Individuals that are living either under bridges or in the creeks really do need to be someplace where they can have conditions that are climate controlled and not have to suffer from this heat," Garza explained to Council members before the vote. CM Zo Qadri, who represents Downtown, where a majority of unhoused people live, offered an amendment to the item that would require that Council vote on the contract after staff worked out terms with Endeavors. The amendment failed and later Qadri became the lone no vote on the full item.

The request for proposal initiated by the city sets out requirements that Endeavors will have to meet before the contract is executed. The shelter will have to be operated 24 hours a day, seven days a week, with designated intake hours and a curfew for the people staying there. It is unclear what the physical layout of the shelter will look like, but Marshalling Yard is currently a warehouse used as a staging ground for events held at the Neal Kocurek Memorial Austin Convention Center (according to the design firm that led renovations to the building last year, it can also serve as an "overflow option for emergency situations such as natural disasters").

Once the facility is converted to a homeless shelter, it must offer "separate space and amenities" for people of different genders who may not be comfortable in a coed congregate (i.e., dorm-style) setting. Endeavors will also have to help connect guests with social services, including case management, housing navigation, and assistance completing applications for other aid programs. The nonprofit will also have to provide a shuttle service to guests in need of transportation.

But group homeless shelters are typically unpopular among the people who actually need shelter; often group shelters are viewed as unclean, unsafe, or possessing restrictive rules that make living comfortably difficult. Jesus Gonzalez, known among the unhoused community as Denver, told CMs that he has experienced homelessness in seven cities across two

states, in a variety of different shelters. Gonzalez acknowledged the general lack of emergency shelter in Austin and that he was neutral on the Marshalling Yard shelter. But he also said it was "inconsiderate" for the city to ask for feedback on the shelter without providing many details. "We need to get more information on floor plans and services available before we can properly give feedback," Gonzalez said.

1.000 BEDS

In remarks defending the shelter and the urgency behind opening it, Mayor Kirk Watson also referenced the broader lack of emergency shelter beds throughout the city. There are less than 1,000 available on any given night, but around 5.000 people live without shelter in Austin. "I believe that in the continuum of care," Watson told his colleagues, "we need to be providing [shelter beds] to those living homeless, and I'm not de-emphasizing, in any way, permanent supportive housing."

But some of the funding that will be used to stand up the shelter comes directly from one-time federal funding initially intended for permanent supportive housing construction. In the Council Q&A document for the July 20 meeting, CM Alison Alter asked staff to break down what American Rescue Plan Act dollars would be reallocated to fund the Marshalling Yard shelter: \$3 million will be taken from the \$14.1 million set aside

> for PSH construction, \$2.46 million of \$45 million from the Rapid Rehousing fund, and another \$9.7 million from other line items that provide support to organizations operating within the city's Homelessness Response System. Some of the reallocated ARPA funds are also being used to fund a 12-month contract with Urban Alchemy to operate the Salvation Army's Downtown shelter.

> Before Council voted, Sasha Rose, who provides direct support to unhoused Austinites through Austin Mutual

Aid, criticized the city for prioritizing what she described as "cleaning up ... the trashiness" that can accompany the unhoused living without shelter over building up PSH, which can serve as a long-term solution to homelessness. "I actually think it's trashier for us to be investing in these Band-Aid solutions on the gaping wound of homelessness," Rose said.

The Impossibility of Being Woman

AUSTIN WOMEN ENTREPRENEURS TASK FORCE TO TACKLE SEXISM IN BUSINESS

In the words of America Ferrera's *Barbie* character, "It is literally impossible to be a woman."

Just last month, the **Harvard Business Review** published findings that there is no good age to be a woman leader in the workplace, a problem dubbed "never-right" age bias. Young women reported they weren't taken seriously, middle-aged women were considered too involved in their families or too cold, and older women were perceived as out of touch and unhirable.

And prejudice against Black women in the workplace is not subtle: A 2021 study found that over the course of a 40-year career, Black women lose roughly **\$1 million** to the wage gap.

"There are very specific things that you experience as a woman in this industry, and as a woman of color in this industry, that you need to have support in order to navigate," says **Lauren Washington**, who co-founded the Al investing platform **Fundr**. "Generalized advice is not going to necessarily help me move forward, so being able to create community and resources to navigate a system that wasn't necessarily made for you is incredibly important."

Hoping to boost Austin's entrepreneurial ecosystem by creating support for women in business, Mayor **Kirk Watson** announced the formation of the Task Force for **Austin Women Entrepreneurs** this month. Members of the task force will seek ways to make the city's entrepreneurial spaces open to more women through city programs, higher education, and business partnerships.

The task force is chaired by longtime Austin businesswoman Carla McDonald, founder and managing director of investment firm Dynabrand Ventures. Its initial members are Washington; Cristina Silingardi, former VP of consulting firm vcfo; Jan Ryan, founder of consulting practice 3Hills Group; and Mellie Price, founder of investment firm Purposeful Capital. More members will be added in the future.

The women of AWE share more than entrepreneurial success and similar titles. They've all worked together previously as board members (with McDonald as chair) of **Beam**, a nonprofit that provided resources to women founders before it was disbanded in 2022. "We've all been very passionate about finding some way to continue having support for women entrepreneurs" since Beam's dissolvement, says Washington.

As the newest Austinite on the task force, Washington was drawn to Austin five years ago for its thriving tech scene, and she can attest to the city's unique culture that makes it a hot spot for new businesses. She says she's experienced a supportive community in Austin with a great networking culture. Watson seems to agree, describing Austin as "loaded with resources" for female entrepreneurs. But they both acknowledge that the experience can be uniquely difficult for women. "We're shifting Austin's economic development paradigm to be unapologetically focused on helping all Austinites be a part of the prosperity of our city." Watson wrote in a statement. "That includes making Austin the best city in the world for women entrepreneurs to start and build businesses."

AWE will consider ways to do just that. Watson wrote that the group will announce their recommendations "shortly after" the new year, with the implementation of the recommendations coming soon after. Watson has categorized AWE as an important component in achieving his economic goals for Austin and hopes that its recommendations will address other economic concerns for Austinites, such as child care.

For Washington, AWE will be a continuation of her work to support opportunity and equity among entrepreneurs while eliminating systemic bias. "We have to be really intentional about fighting back in some of those areas," she says. "It's really about creating a more even playing field for people, so that they have the opportunity to bring their dreams to life."

Doors Will Open for You

Austin's exclusionary housing policies are getting revolutionary rewrites after decades of resistance by Austin Sanders

Austin's land use rules may have more influence over who gets to live here than any other local laws. For decades, those rules have kept less-wealthy Austinites out of many of the city's central neighborhoods, and others out of Austin altogether.

But increasingly, middle- and low-income Austinites who have been excluded by those very policies are demanding new code that would make living here sustainable. And in the past three months, we've seen unprecedented progress toward that goal. The most reform-friendly Austin City Council yet has initiated major changes to Austin's Land Development Code that, just three years ago, were thought to be unachievable.

One year from now, it is plausible that Austin will have much less restrictive compatibility standards, allow up to three housing units on much smaller lot sizes in most single-family zones, and have no rules requiring at least 11/2 parking spaces for every single housing unit.

For any one of these LDC amendments to pass would be a transformative change to the complex, 39-year-old set of rules that govern housing development in Austin. That all three may become law, within about six months of one another, is revolutionary.

How could it be that we've arrived at this point? It's a long story, going back at least 10 years to when efforts to overhaul the LDC first began. But more recently, the clearest sign that the paradigm on land use policy had shifted in Austin came on Jan. 26, at the very first Council meeting following the 2022 election. Council Member Vanessa Fuentes brought an item to the meeting directing staff to modify the zoning regulations around child care centers. As drafted, the Fuentes resolution would slightly reduce their parking requirements - a modest reform in-line with the approach Council had taken on land use policy for the past eight years.

But then came a Chito Vela amendment. Why not just eliminate parking requirements at child care centers entirely, Vela asked? "I support the change," CM Leslie Pool responded. What? Pool, who for most of her six years on Council was a staunch member of the Tovo-Kitchen-Alter (that's Kathie, Ann, and Alison) alliance that routinely slowed or killed bolder progress on housing reform, was in support of a resolution that would eliminate (some) parking requirements? It was a surprising moment.

But what happened five minutes later was even more shocking. The resolution, as amended by Vela, was adopted unanimously. No one asked for a yearlong study from staff before the resolution could be implemented, or for any other bureaucratic hurdles that would have certainly come along with such a change in the past. Just a straightforward, impactful change to the LDC, passed without controversy.

Sitting in the Council chamber, I flashed back to 2020, when Council was holding its third meeting in as many days leading up to the second of three votes required to approve a comprehensive revision to the LDC. As was typical of the time, CMs held lengthy debates on less ambitious housing ideas like transition zones, preservation bonuses, and minor changes to accessory dwelling unit policy, which governs additions like casitas and apartments to existing homes (seriously, a review of my notes from the meeting in question shows that Council spent 20 minutes arguing about whether an ADU could be built within an existing house or only externally).

But less than three years later, sitting in the very same Council chamber, it felt like the ground had truly shifted in the bitter, protracted fight over housing reform that has raged in Austin for at least a decade. Could it be that the dam had truly broken? Council's activity since then suggests the answer is an emphatic "yes."

WE GOT NEW RULES. LET'S COUNT 'EM

The flurry of Council action on LDC changes began in May, when District 9 CM Zo Qadri brought a resolution directing staff to eliminate parking requirements entirely, all throughout the city. Eliminating "parking minimums" is a growing trend throughout the United States for a host of reasons: Parking is expensive to build (some estimates show construction costs between \$10,000 and \$40,000 per space); it takes away scarce land in urban areas that could be used for housing, parkland, or other people-oriented uses; and the minimums incentivize the continued reliance on cars, which worsens human-caused climate change. The resolution was approved 10-1, with CM Alison Alter voting against.

If eliminating parking minimums contributes meaningfully to any one of those goals, the policy change will have been worth it. But one thing the change won't do is eliminate parking throughout the city; it doesn't remove existing parking spaces, and virtually all new housing developments in the city will still be built with parking (if for no other reason than the banks financing housing will demand it). And it certainly won't eliminate accessible parking, which is mandated by federal law. But some developments will build less parking and thus more housing, especially on corridors served by Austin's growing transit system.

Like other apartment buildings built partially in the "trigger-zone" of a single-family home where height restrictions kick in, the roof stair-steps down closer to houses to remain in compliance, reducing the number of units possible in those shorter parts of the building.

Elan East sits on Manor Road, a corridor served by public transit, so if it were built post-parking minimums, it might likely have had much less parking, and more units as a result.

As it is, the roughly five acre area holds 270 units, housing roughly 540 people (assuming the average unit houses 2 people). The adjacent block is also roughly five acres and holds 27 houses, which likely house about 80 people (assuming the average house houses 3 people).


Also, existing rules have told Austinites that if you can't find an apartment or afford to live in a single-family house or duplex with fewer than four unrelated roommates then you may not be able to live in Austin. Not so anymore. June 2, a month after the parking reform passed, Qadri brought another item that in the past likely would not have even reached the dais, let alone passed with only one no vote (from CM Mackenzie Kelly) - a reform to occupancy limits in residential buildings, directing staff to modify the limits so more people can live in a single dwelling unit. While other LDC changes require building to happen before impacting housing costs, changes to occupancy limits could provide relief overnight.

One week after that, Council approved a Vela resolution that could bring massive, citywide change to Austin's compatibility standards, which impose a variety of constraints on development near single-family homes and are among the most restrictive in the nation. Compatibility rules are sometimes compared to a "force field" emitted by single-family homes; any development within the "trigger distance" in the rules (currently, in Austin, up to 540 feet or almost two football fields) can have building height, setbacks, and other development standards restricted. Vela's resolution could shrink the compatibility force field to at least 100 feet, all over the city, with additional reductions available to developments offering affordable housing.

Finally, completing the slew of long-sought-after land use reforms, Council approved at their July 20 meeting a resolution authored by CM Pool that would cut the minimum amount of land required for building housing in Austin's single-family zones by half *and* allow property owners to build up to three units on any SF lot, by right (which means without an expensive, time-consuming rezoning process). The resolution passed 9-2, with Kelly and Alison Alter voting against.

To describe how these policies passed with near unanimity as a "paradigm shift" almost doesn't cover it. Leah Bojo, a land use consultant at Drenner Group who has deep experience working in and out of City Hall on housing policy, shares a reaction to the change on Council, common among other observers, that borders on bewilderment.

"Three and four years ago, when I would talk with policymakers about the most impactful changes they could make to the LDC," Bojo told us, "I always said: parking, lot sizes, and compatibility. But you would just get laughed out of the room, or told none of those were possible. It's almost inconceivable that the city is on the way to enacting all three."

Interviews with a range of stakeholders involved in Austin's land use wars – Council members, their aides, people who work in housing development, and housing advocates – point to a range of factors that could explain the shift. The COVID-19 pandemic and the explosive growth in Austin's housing costs experienced during it – most acutely felt by the city's low-income earners, but also by those in the working and middle classes – emphasized the urgency with which local policymakers felt the need to act to shore up housing security for everybody who isn't rich.

Some pointed to the fact that Austin is no longer attempting to blaze a trail by implementing many of these reforms. California eliminated minimum lot sizes statewide last year, and more locally, Houston reduced them to 1,400 square feet in 1998. According to the Parking Reform Network, more than a dozen American cities have moved to eliminate parking requirements citywide. And many American cities have compatibility standards that are far less restrictive than those in Austin.

Everyone we talked to agreed that, as the cliche goes, elections have consequences. In the 2022 election, two of Council's staunchest pro-housing members, Natasha Harper-Madison in District 1 and Paige Ellis in D8, won reelection handily. Vela, who holds the most liberal views on relaxing housing regulations, won a D4 special election in 2022 and will be up for reelection in 2024. Those three were joined by new members who campaigned vigorously on addressing housing supply and affordability: José Velásquez in D3, Ryan Alter in D5, and Qadri in D9.

For the past four years, a majority of Council has wanted to revise the LDC to greatly increase housing supply, but more cautious CMs – Kathie Tovo, Ann Kitchen, Alison Alter, and for a time Leslie Pool – checked those ambitions.

It's not just that Tovo held, arguably, the most restrictionist views on how much market rate housing the LDC should enable property owners to build, or that she consistently and often successfully pushed for higher affordable housing requirements at the expense of market rate units. It's that she possessed an ability, unsurpassed by

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

any of her colleagues, to delay, soften, or outright kill LDC reforms that veered outside her policy goals. When the Chronicle endorsed Tovo for reelection in 2018, the Editorial Board cited her "diligent work ethic," which really undersells what current and former colleagues, on the dais and off. refer to as an unrelenting doggedness. "If you were going to go against Kathie on one of her items, you had to be prepared to go back and forth all night," one Council aide told us. "It was like she only got stronger the longer a debate went on."

It is that tenacity that made Tovo a formidable force among Council and city staff. Her ability to research and prepare for policy fights was unparalleled, which sometimes discouraged her fellow policymakers from even tussling with her in the first place. Combine Tovo's work ethic with that demonstrated by Kitchen, Alter, and Pool, and the LDC restrictionists had a powerful alliance.

Here's where Mayor Kirk Watson fits in. With a shortened term. Watson has been biased toward action. He also promised to run an efficient Council meeting, which sounds like a minor commitment but may be an underappreciated factor in how this Council has been able to set so many potentially transformative housing reforms in motion, in relatively short order.

Under Mayor Steve Adler, CMs would often amend resolutions brought by their colleagues during meetings, sometimes trying to craft amendment language from the dais. This approach to running meetings fit with Adler's commitment to compromise. But this workflow also made meetings longer, more exhausting, and harder to follow as amendments (and amendments to amendments) were thrown around. This process was one of Tovo's specialties, and Adler's commitment to appeasing as many stakeholders on all sides of an issue as possible made him tolerant of that approach. But it's hard to imagine Watson allowing it; instead, he's instituted an informal policy requiring Council offices to submit resolution amendments the night before a meeting. This practice has not always been adhered to, but it has led to a noticeably more disciplined and efficient dais.

But more than just constraining on-thefly amendments, there is just less back-andforth debate happening on the dais, and less grilling of staff about a resolution's impact. If a resolution is posted to an agenda, chances are that debate with and guestioning of staff have already happened behind the scenes.

The pandemic, and how it highlighted societal inequities, also helped change individuals on Council - particularly Pool, who, with her support of the parking and compatibility resolutions and now her authorship of the lot size item, has made a notable pivot on housing policy. "Our society has changed," Pool tells us. "And our city has, too. We're now the 10th-largest city in the nation, which carries a different portfolio of obligations and responsibilities" such as creating housing that is attainable for people across the income spectrum -"[and] we should acknowledge that responsibility and take action to honor it."

Reducing the minimum lot size in singlefamily zones and allowing up to three units, by right, on those lots are unlikely to dramatically increase the amount of housing in Austin's historically exclusive neighborhoods. But it will make it easier for developers to build smaller, "house-scale" multifamily units - townhomes, cottage courts, and row houses - that are more attainable for people earning middle incomes. Pool represents several powerful neighborhoods that have historically opposed this reform and says she is "aware of the significance" that comes with her carrying the item. "I think it strengthens the resolution," she says.

Pool says she and her staff have been thinking about the concepts that form the foundation of her resolution for more than a year, with a focus on how to help the city's middle-income residents. "When I started thinking about what it means to preserve our neighborhoods," she said, "I realized

that means keeping the families in those neighborhoods where they live now, and making sure we can attract new families."

Pool says part of her thinking is that letting property owners subdivide their lots can serve as a kind of anti-displacement tool. When a lot is subdivided, the new lot could be sold, used to build rental housing, or used to build an additional structure that the property owner also owns, to accommodate grown children or aging grandparents. All of these are viable ways for people to age in place, Pool said, but are mostly out of reach now due to some of Austin's land use policies. "By and large, this will be a positive change for our community," Pool said.

BALL'S IN CITY STAFF'S COURT

But Council only initiates amendments to the LDC; it takes the work of dozens of city employees across a range of departments to turn Council's ideas into law. There is concern that staff might not be able enact it - whether as a result of too much work and not enough resources or by drafting ordinance language that does not live up to Council's policy ambitions.

Take one look at the staff-produced chart laying out all of the LDC amendments they are working on and you'll immediately get a sense of the mountain of work they face. Couple that workload with the fact that most of the departments that work on LDC amendments have staffing vacancy rates of at least 10%, and the overworked/understaffed problem becomes even clearer. In Housing and Planning, where the bulk of LDC work occurs, the vacancy rate is 20%; moreover, the people who have left HPD possess experience developed from working on previous city efforts at revising the LDC. The loss of their institutional knowledge presents its own set of challenges.

Council has pushed staff to reprioritize tasks and bring on outside consultants to ease some of the workload; already, the slated delivery date for some LDC amendments has shifted. The elimination of parking requirements, for example, was initially set to come before Council in April 2024, but now that date is in December of this year.

When Council approves the fiscal year 2023-24 budget, the Planning Department, which will now operate independently from the Housing Department, will have at least two more senior planners working on code amendments. Staff also anticipates hiring outside consultants to help in four areas of LDC work: Equitable Transit Development plans, a comprehensive analysis of the city's numerous density bonus programs, compatibility, and the creation of new zoning districts. Consultants, who would likely come equipped with

experience in making similar policy changes in other cities, would just draft the ordinance language – staff would still review it and Council would still approve it.

More internal staffing and outside consultants can help with the workload portion of the staff challenge, but another issue more related to knowledge gaps and ideological tensions - may be more difficult to address. Take the concept of "community engagement" as one example.

Community input is useful, to a degree. But it can also be undemocratic, because it overrepresents people who show up to community engagement meetings, but whose opinions may not represent the broader electorate, which after all voted in pro-housing candidates. Still, staff anticipates it will take seven months of "development and engagement" for the citywide compatibility amendment - even though reducing compatibility to 100 feet has been on the table since 2019.

Another cultural problem with staff is the siloed nature of each department, which is not at all uncommon within municipal governments. But it creates problems - the Planning Department may be done with an amendment, but is awaiting from input the Watershed Department. Perhaps Watershed has not delivered their piece of the code change because they are prioritizing other tasks, or they may just disagree with the intent of the amendment. This example is hypothetical, but these kinds of issues arise all the time.

To help free up these logjams, Interim City Manager Jesús Garza has formed the Code Cabinet, an internal group of city departments working on LDC amendments, headed by Assistant City Manager Veronica Briseño, that will meet monthly to review active amendments. The hope is that the cabinet will serve as a centralized place for interdepartmental disputes over policy or prioritization to be resolved.

None of our sources seem to doubt the intentions, or competency, of the city staff directly working on LDC amendments - but concern about their boss, Garza, is growing. In policy areas including homelessness, public safety, and telework, Garza has signaled - or outright declared - that he holds positions out of step with those of Austin's elected leaders and, by extension, the Austinites they represent. And it appears that Garza's - shall we say, dated - ideology extends to land use policy as well.

In a private meeting with Planning commissioners held earlier in July, Garza made his skepticism of eliminating parking mandates clear - despite a growing body of evidence that they hamper urban affordability. Eliminating parking requirements would harm neighborhoods, Garza lamented, like Travis Heights - his old stomping grounds because drivers accustomed to abundant and free parking at nearby commercial areas would suddenly have to park in residential neighborhoods. Garza has been public with his concern that LDC changes could harm neighborhoods, as well. In an unusual move, the interim city manager popped in at the June 13 Council Housing and Planning Committee meeting. There, he reassured CMs that while working on citywide compatibility reform, staff would not forget some-

> thing that is "essential to a vibrant and healthy city ... our neighborhoods." One of his goals, he said, would be to ensure that as staff write LDC policy changes to increase affordability, they'll "balance that with the interests of neighborhoods."

> represent an assumption that was accepted in previous LDC debates - that increased housing density in historically neighborhoods is in itself a threat to the vibrancy of those neighborhoods. This belief is less widespread in Austin's land use politics now, but it remains

the engine that drives opposition to LDC reform. For the interim city manager - who controls the pace and depth of LDC changes - to express a version of this view was alarming to some CMs and housing advocates.

Though staff will do the bulk of the work of drafting language around amending the LDC, it will ultimately fall upon Council to approve those changes - and strengthen them through the amendment process, if necessary. "The key in all this is Council," João Paulo Connolly, organizing director for the Austin Justice Coalition, told us. "Council members need to step up to make sure staff delivers what they voted on. I keep telling housing advocates that we can't treat these resolutions as decisive victories. A longer campaign lies ahead."

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

Review: The Stage Austin's The Real Inspector Hound

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Through July 29

Running time: 1 hr., 20 min.

The director, not the dead guy, is the victim in Tom Stoppard's critique Of Critics by BOB ABELMAN

Every playwright who has received a negative review - which, let's face it, is every playwright – has no doubt laid awake at night formulating passive-aggressive revenge on the reviewer.

A few have actually carried it off in impressive fashion. A theatre critic is stabbed to death in the opening act of Ken Ludwig's comedy The Game's Afoot. In Conor McPherson's St Nicholas (recently revived at the Hyde Park Theatre), a theatre critic is kept alive only to serve as a food forager for a coven of vampires. Samuel Beckett makes the profession the most grievous insult among the many exchanged The Stage Austin's between the two main characters in his avant-garde The Real Inspector Hound play Waiting for Godot: "Curate!" "Cretin!" "Critic!" **Dougherty Arts Center. 1110**

Whatever panning multi-Tony Award-winning playwright Tom Stoppard received came early in his long career of being justifiably described by critics as too academic, too verbose, and, according to The New York Times, "too clever by half." Said The Guardian in 1993 of Arcadia: "There is no one like Stoppard for making you feel both spoilt and inadequate as an audience."

His revenge is The Real Inspector Hound. First staged in 1968, the one-act play presents and parodies a whodunit murder mystery but with an absurdist, meta-theatrical twist that throws under the bus the two self-obsessed, parasitic theatre critics in attendance. It is being given a fun but somewhat problematic production by the Stage Austin.

Moon (a terrific Scot Friedman, channeling fictional sports journalist Trent Crimm from Ted Lasso) is an ambitious backup critic with an inferiority complex. He is attending the evening's production of The Real Inspector Hound because the first stringer – a man Moon wishes was dead so he could advance up the byline food chain - has disappeared. To prove his worth to himself and rival veteran critic Birdboot. Moon's running narration while watching the play overanalyzes the production. When the show starts late, Moon suggests that the play is "opening with a pause." He compares the script to the works of Kafka, Shakespeare, Beckett, and others, and finds intense meaning in a story where none exists.

> Birdboot (a delightfully fumfering Rick Felkins) is a critic for the sole purpose of getting laid by whatever young actress he has given a rave review.

Late in the play, when a prop telephone rings at Muldoon Manor and no actor is onstage to answer it, an annoyed Moon does and hands it off to Birdboot because it's his wife is on the line, accusing him of sleeping with the actor playing Felicity (Maddie Scanlan, nicely overperforming all the tropes of the ingenue). While Birdboot is

onstage, actors plaving Muldoon Manor denizens (including Alexandra Russo as the alluring Lady Cynthia Muldoon, Darren Scharf as the grumpy Magnus Muldoon – both owners of the best physical comedy in the play - and the wonderful Bobbie Oliver as the expositionspouting housekeeper) enter and treat him as if he was the dashing and dangerous murder mystery character Simon Gascoyne.

Later, Moon comes onstage and the actors treat him as if he were Inspector Hound, who has been assigned to solve the murder. While all this takes place, the actors playing Simon (brilliantly overplayed by Jacob Bernelle) and Inspector Hound (a miscast,

misguided Clay Avery) take Moon and Birdboot's seats and assume the role of critic.

Too clever by half? You bet.

Critics are not the only ones thrown under the bus by Stoppard. So is every director staging this play, due to the near-insurmountable logistics of seating the critics where they can be seen offstage as they are watching and commenting on the production of The Real Inspector Hound. The Stage Austin's Jeff Hinkle has chosen poorly in this regard, for he places the critics squarely and artificially behind the performance and is indecisive and inconsistent in how best to light them when they are speaking as the play is being performed. He is also indecisive about what to do with the actors performing the play within the play when Stoppard provides them with no dialogue or action during the critics' often long exchanges. Slow pacing is another problem with this production.

While Veronica Dobell Prior's costume design is spot on, MacKenzie Mulligan's lighting design and Jeff Miller's sound design do little to make the parody of The Real Inspector Hound and its often-ominous moments more melodramatic. Missed lighting and sound cues don't help.

Not missed are the many comedic moments in this play within a play and an opportunity to stage a clever curtain call that ends the evening in true Stoppard fashion.

Review: "De Tierra"

Exhibition unites two profound figurative sculptors, immigrants more than a century apart

A new exhibition of sculpture by Alejandra Almuelle adds further beauty to that familiar gem anchoring the quietly busy, tree-lined Hyde Park neighborhood: the Elisabet Ney Museum.

But: Who was Elisabet Ney?

Born in 1833 in Münster, Province of Westphalia, Ney was the first woman admitted to Munich's Royal Academy of Fine Arts. She left Germany as a political refugee in 1871, wound up in East Texas, and after years of struggling to farm and raise a child - she renewed her long-deferred sculpting career in Austin, Formosa, built in 1892, was the home and studio where Nev created her iconic figurative sculptures and held salons and generally supercharged the cultural and intellectual scenes of this thenyoung capital city.

And now that lovingly preserved historic venue, officially the Elisabet Ney Museum since 1911, presents "De Tierra," highlighting the work of Alejandra Almuelle. So the next question must be: Who is Alejandra Almuelle?

Born in 1962 in Arequipa. Peru - a country where the abundance of clay has made it a sort of language for artistic expression - she spent a few years in Pizac, in the Sacred Valley of Cuzco, a center for ceramic-making.

After she moved to Austin in 1988, her work with clay addressed the functionality of the medium as well as its sculptural expression. The artist's had exhibitions of her sublime figurative explorations all over town in the past three decades, showing in such places as Gallery Lombardi, Cloud Tree Studio, Dimension Gallery, Moya McIntyre's superlative "The Femme Abstract" showcase, and more. Now, here in the stonework building in Hyde Park, Almuelle's works are displayed alongside Ney's impressive oeuvre for greatest resonance.

"This show has two parts," Almuelle said. "There are mortars and pestles made with terra cotta and porcelain, in honor of the working people, in honor to the dedication and time that working with one's

hands requires. And there are four urns, as a commentary on the body as place and receptacle of memory, like the land itself." These pieces, part of the artist's ongoing exploration of what tradition means and the ways in which it's embodied over time, complement the storied creations of Elisabet Ney, adding a singular, modern view

of personal history to an array of sculptural portraits that, now historical, were once contemporary. The iuxtaposition provokes an eerie sensation: Which of these collections of sculpted apparitions, a visitor might wonder, is haunting the other?

"It is really a sweet feeling to place eight small pieces next to Ney's large works," said Almuelle. "As a guest artist I feel welcome, and embraced somehow, in her space. I clearly remember going to the Ney Museum for the first time, more than 30 years ago. Moving to Austin gave me opportunity to grow beyond the constraints of my place of origin - I'm not sure, if I stayed in Peru, I would have been able to develop my work." But, like Nev in her own time, Almuelle does continue to develop her work. "I'm currently creating a solo show for Women and Their Work that will open next year."

For now, Hyde Park's cultural treasure holds your chance to witness this display of the enduring beauty of figurative clay shaped well by human hands.

Review: "I See You See Me"

Photo exhibition sheds gentle light on LGBTQ+ and disabled lives

Photographs capture still moments and preserve them through a process of light and intention. With "I See You See Me" (the current exhibit in the Julia C. Butridge Gallery at the Dougherty Arts Center) intention is paramount as the photographers behind the 55 curated images intend to show their lives as queer, trans, nonbinary, disabled, neurodivergent, and chronically ill with hyperreal accuracy.

ISYSM is the result of several threemonth workshops taught by the Begin Collective, a photography-based creative group started by siblings riel and Bianca Sturchio. Participants, first selected through an open call and then nominated by the previous class, were equipped with 35mm cameras and color film to learn the processes of scanning, editing, and creating narrative photos. While neither sibling lives in Austin currently, the city was where riel made their home during the pandemic, which was one reason for ATX as ISYSM's first landing place. Another was the

intrinsic meaning of holding queer-specific art space in a state that saw over 140 anti-LGBTO bills filed in the most recent Texas Lege session.

"It is also where our in-person portrait sessions took place," riel relayed over email, "and it was important for folks to be

able to build community by interacting with others in their local, immediate area.'

Altogether the show bears the handiwork of 18 local artists. They range in age, identity, and approach: Digital intervention marked photos by certain artists while others only bathed their photos in the delicious orange and yellow of light exposure. Many of the artists attended the reception where I first saw the exhibit, and perhaps being in the presence of so many people beaming with the glow of having their creations perceived heightened my own experience.

The truth is I enjoyed the simple pleasure of being a viewer. When I view photographs





Yet the portraits, in particular those taken by Devin Alejandro-Wilder and Marley Zollman, breathe with full-blooded warmth. They take the unnatural - a garment of synthetic fabric - and match it to the natural beauty of grass, flowers, and sunlight.

ISYSM's intended purpose is to challenge assumptions about what LGBTO, disabled, and chronically ill lives are supposed to look like. Those intentions color each photograph in the show as much as actual color film has. These are lives set still but still very much alive.

DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Mission Dolores was one of the most important Spanish missions in Texas for nearly 50 years. Today it's a state historic site in San Augustine, but you'll have to use your imagination to see what the Spanish outpost might have looked like.

Officially known as Mission Nuestra Señora de los Dolores de los Ais, it was one of six religious settlements established on Spain's northeastern frontier in 1716. The colony was less than 75 miles from the French community in Natchitoches and 1,100 miles from **Mexico City**.

The presidio soldiers at Los Adaes (now a historic site in Robeline, **La.**) were supposed to keep the French in check, and the missions were to convert the friendly members of the Caddo Confederacy.

Neither met with much success. The French were already wellestablished in the area, and the Native Ais people already had their own religion and agriculture. The mission was finally abandoned in 1773.

Within five years the towns of San Augustine and Nacogdoches began filling up with Anglos and remnants of tribes from the Southeastern U.S. The walls of the mission melted into the fertile soil.

Mission Dolores State Historic Site occupies a beautiful plot of land a few blocks from the San Augustine town square, and it's easy to see why the Spanish chose this spot. The state has added a visitor center, a small museum, and a well-shaded campground. Locals have added a **disc golf** course.



A walking trail leads around the wooded grounds. Near the creek are swales, the remnants of El Camino Real de los Tejas, the road (roughly SH 21) that led from Mexico City to Los Adaes, once on the farthest reaches of the Spanish empire. The area where the mission stood is a field of wildflowers.

LEAGUES CUP LOSS LATEST IN DISTURBING TREND FOR AUSTIN FC

While **Lionel Messi** was doing what he does Friday night, scoring a game-winning free kick in his Inter Miami CF debut in front of LeBron James and Kim Kardashian, Austin FC was doing what it does: losing to an (on paper) inferior team in a non-MLS competition in front of a smattering of disappointed Verde fans.

In the latest installment of what's become a nasty habit for Josh Wolff's club, ATXFC lost 3-1 to Liga MX club Mazatlán FC at Q2 Stadium in the opening game of the inaugural Leagues Cup tournament. Mazatlán, the youngest club in the Mexican top flight, most recently finished dead last in Liga MX's Clausura campaign in the spring. And yet, Mazatlán now joins the likes of San Antonio FC. AC Violette, and the Chicago Fire on a growing, comically diverse list of clubs to upset the Verde and Black in a competition outside the confines of Major League Soccer.

The details change, but the problems stay the same: Josh Wolff's club just can't seem to figure out how to juggle multiple competitions in the same season. In the last 15 months, El Tree has bowed out of the last two **U.S. Open** Cups in the early stages, the CONCACAF Champions League in the first round, and now finds itself at serious risk of getting bounced from the Leagues Cup in the group stage despite hosting every match at Q2 Stadium.

It's not for lack of want to. At least, not if you believe the pregame hoopla. Each new competition is unfailingly greeted with a heavy dose of aspirational chitchat about "growing the legend" and "showing what

we're about." But when it comes time to actually put ball into net, that's when things tend to fall apart.

A recurring trend in these ego-deflating eliminations has been an ATX starting lineup that leaves a lot to be desired. Such was the case Friday night as well, but to be fair to Wolff and company, much of that had to do with injuries. Sebastián Driussi, Dani Pereira, and Alex Ring all missed the match with various ailments, while Gyasi Zardes only managed 18 minutes of action before an adductor injury forced him to exit in the first half.

"It's a lot of guys that have a pretty big role inside the group, so it's difficult." Wolff said of the injuries. "But regardless of that ... the guys that were here, we had more than enough out there to get the result."

Mazatlán certainly didn't seem to think so. And a 3-1 scoreline suggests that Austin FC may have taken its south-of-the-border competition too lightly. Hopefully that lesson has been learned ahead of Saturday's final group stage match against FC Juárez. Anything less than a win won't cut it if Austin FC wants to avoid becoming one of just 17 teams (out of 47) to exit the Leagues Cup in the group stage.


Then again, the lesson wasn't learned against San Antonio. It apparently wasn't learned against Violette. Maybe Mazatlán will prove to have been the last straw. If not, the Verde and Black could be in for a very boring month watching Messi and the rest of North America's best from the couch.


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Wish You Were Here

The charismatic enigma who launched and left one of the greatest rock bands somewhat revealed in Have You Got It Yet? The Story of Syd Barrett and Pink Floyd

HAVE YOU GOT IT YET? THE STORY

OF SYD BARRETT AND PINK FLOYD

D: Roddy Bogawa, Storm Thorgerson; narrated

The story of Syd Barrett that has been told and retold is that he founded Pink Floyd, lost his mind to LSD-induced psychosis, and disappeared into a deliberate and determined obscurity. Of course, no life can be reduced to

three years between the ages of 19 and 22, so new documentary Have You Got It Yet? The Story of Syd Barrett and Pink Floyd puts that period into the context of the rest of his life.

As Barrett died in 2006, and had lived an extremely private life for most of the prior four decades, there's almost none of his own voice outside of the music. Instead, Roddy Bogawa and Storm Thorgerson must rely on archive footage, music, and extensive interviews with just about everyone whose lives and careers intersected with Barrett, all given chronological structure by Jason Isaacs' narration. The

film itself is an act of intersection, since Thorgerson's career as Pink Floyd's go-to designer was chronicled by Bogawa in 2011's Taken by Storm: The Art of Storm Thorgerson and Hipgnosis – and again this year in Anton

> Corbijn's Squaring the Circle (The Story of Hipgnosis) - and he died in 2013. Of course, it helps that Thorgerson and Barrett were childhood friends. opening up the designer's

by Jason Isaacs. (NR, 94 min.) address book for every school friend, lover,

> and collaborator, including the three surviving members of Pink Floyd: Dave Gilmour, Roger Waters, and Nick Mason.

Co-produced and edited by Austin filmmaker Karen Skloss, Have You Got It Yet? is as exhaustive a study of Barrett as possible. It does suffer from the flaw that affects so many biographical documentaries, that the subject is

What Bogawa and Thorgerson really note and as one of Barrett's exes explains bluntly - is that the idea that success was too much for Barrett and he cracked under the strain is simplistic. Instead, he sabotages the band and then self-sabotages. If promising young artist Roger Barrett hadn't assumed the persona of Syd Barrett, there would be no Pink Floyd - at least not as the importantly disciplined stadium band that they became. AFIRE

D: Christian Petzold; with Thomas Schubert, Paula Beer, Langston Uibel, Enno Trebs, Matthias Brandt. (NR, 102 min., subtitled)

A summer house nestled on the north coast of Germany is the destination of Leon (Schubert) and his friend Felix (Uibel), but car trouble forces them to complete the last few miles through the forest on foot. And if this beginning isn't inauspicious enough, they arrive at the house (owned by Felix's family) to discover unmistakable signs of occupancy. Nadja (Beer), the niece of a family friend, is staying there as well, but not to worry, Felix assures Leon, there's plenty of room. And physically that's true, although the two must now share a room: Whether there's room for anyone else's ego besides Leon's extremely fragile one is another story. Well, really it's this story.

Leon's a writer struggling with his second novel, and his time at the house is earmarked for revisions before a meeting with his publisher later in the week. Perpetually put upon and easily exasperated, Leon is a cocktail of arrogance and insecurity, able to enter a room full of fun and laughter and immediately begin sulking. He's a haughty child, or as previously noted, a writer. How he became friends with Felix, a generous and affable pure heart who's spending his time at the beach working on a photography project for his art school portfolio, is actually another story, for no clues are given here, other than Felix's amiability bringing Leon's stick-in-the-mud attitude into stark relief. To Leon, Nadja's presence is just one more burden to bear, although that doesn't stop him from snooping around her room while she's selling ice cream to tourists on the beach. As Leon agonizes over a manuscript he's not entirely sure about, Nadja, then Felix, befriends local lifeguard Devid (Trebs), and for a time Afire settles into an enjoyable social satire, an ironic and funny inquiry into the nature of human passion. It's a bit like an Éric Rohmer story.

But this is undoubtedly a Christian Petzold story, who just happens to be one of the most consistently compelling directors working, whose impressive body of work (Phoenix, Undine, Transit) is suffused with a sure-footed melodrama that elevates his films to new heights of poignancy. Afire is no exception, an oft mentioned wildfire raging nearby being just one of the Chekov's guns laying around. Buoyed by pitch-perfect performances from the cast (Schubert especially nails the insufferably delicate masculinity of Leon), the film balances its humor and pathos with a natural ease. ending with a satisfying conclusion. All qualities of any good story.

HAUNTED MANSION

The veil between Disney films and Disney parks is thin. Some of the most beloved rides at the Happiest Place on Earth are movie tie-ins, but the connection goes both ways. In the late 1990s and early 2000s, there was a brief spate of film adaptations of theme park rides. Most have been forgotten (who thought that getting Brian De Palma to direct a big-screen version of Mission to Mars would create memorable cinema?) with the Pirates of the Caribbean series being the rare exception. However, there's a small fan base for the 2003 version of The Haunted Mansion, which in hindsight was one of the highlights of Eddie Murphy's family-friendly era. With Disney having kicked off a new wave of attractionbased movies with Jungle Cruise, now they've wandered from Adventureland to New Orleans Square for a second family-friendly scare.

Haunted Mansion digs into the mythology of the version of the ride in Disneyland's New Orleans Square (don't worry, Floridians, the Magic Kingdom gothic destination gets its moment) and starts on a truly miserable note. Astrophysicist Ben (Stanfield) meets cute with haunted NOLA tour guide Alyssa (Jordan), who then dies offscreen, leaving him depressed,



drunk, and discredited. His unlikely chance at redemption comes when single mom Gabbie (Dawson) and her Urkel-meets-Manny-from-Modern Family son, Travis (Dillon), who wants him to prove that the ghosts in the house she just brought are real. The how is easy (he, for reasons, built a ghost-detecting camera) but the why is less clear: It's just a plot excuse to get him through the door, just as she does with a hip priest (Wilson), a wisecracking medium (Haddish), and a teppanyaki-loving architectural historian (DeVito).

But none of those names is why anyone will be buying a ticket. It's to see one of the most beloved theme park rides in the world get the big-screen treatment, and *Dear White People* director Justin Simien delivers, in a way. Fiftynine years later, the work of lead Imagineers Marc Davis and Claude Coats and their team still captivates park guests with its Victorian Gothic mix of scary, silly, and show tunes. *Haunted Mansion* is basically one giant collection of Easter eggs, from endless corridors to hitchhiking ghosts. Yet even fans of the ride will only get so much pleasure from being able to tick off the checklist of decorative nods.

The best inclusion of all is Jared Leto as the malicious Hatbox Ghost: Much like his absurdly, delightfully hammy turn as Paolo Gucci in *House of Gucci*, he's having so much pantomime fun that his scenes are at least a little infectious. Unfortunately, you see about as much of the Hatbox Ghost on the ride as you do in the film, denying it an opportunity for a Jack Sparrowesque charismatic maniac.

It seems clear that writer Katie Dippold was hired on the basis of her credit for the 2016 *Ghostbusters* reboot, and *Haunted Mansion* fails because it also tries to summon the spirit of the 1984 classic. There was a special magic about three old friends who knew each other's comedic timing throwing themselves into a silly-serious horror. The cast smoothed out the

wild tonal shifts, something that the inhabitants of this haunted mansion can never achieve.

The experience is a little like being stuck in a Doom Buggy on a day when the ride is very stop-start. The flow of the attraction collapses, becoming individual cool designs but not a story. After all, the floating candelabra is awesome, but nobody wants to spend 10 minutes watching it when you know you're just so close to the Grand Hall.

On the two-year anniversary of her mother's death, Mia (Wilde) would like her attention to be anywhere else. So she flees her house to stay with Jade (Jensen) and Jade's younger brother Riley (Bird). Their family has effectively taken her in while Mia struggles to reconnect with her father (Johnson). The group soon finds themselves at a local séance where they can commune with an undead spirit using a hand-shaped talisman. But when Mia forms an unhealthy obsession with the spirit world, the friends soon learn that death is not a one-way door.

Early in the film, *Talk to Me* reminds us of how much fun it is to understand the "rules" of a horror movie. The rules behind the spirit hand are simple: Light a candle, open a connection, and invite the ghost in. Mia's friends also know that no one should remain in contact with a spirit for more than 90 seconds. Some films would spend most of their running time revealing these boundaries. Giving this horror setup clear guide rails from the outset is an ingenious piece of storytelling.

These flirtations with the afterlife build to a sequence where things finally veer out of control. Up to this point, writers/directors Danny and Michael Philippou lean into the comedic potential of social media-friendly possessions, but when the group of friends pushes a little too far, *Talk to Me* explodes into violence. This

is one of the best horror scenes of the year so far, as the combination of practical effects and dynamic camera movements ramps up the tension until a final, terrible release. Even better, the Philippous anchor this violence in the emotional connections between characters. People freeze or are hurt trying to save their loved ones, and all the thinly veiled posturing of these too-cool teenagers is wiped clean in an instant.

And then, just as quickly, the movie succumbs to convention. As Mia and her friends deal with the fallout of that final possession, the narrative begins to work at odds with the performances, backing characters into corners that seem to conflict with the relationships they've built onscreen. The best horror allows its characters to make the right decisions and then subvert them; *Talk to Me* moves forward with an unexpected turn toward hostility. Trauma has become a catch-all shorthand for many horror filmmakers, and as much as the Philippous prove their worth as horror directors, as writers the relationship between two families bonded by trauma proves too complex for them to bring home.

Talk to Me is hardly a bad horror film, but the disconnect between what was and what could be looms large over the final act. I will give the Philippous this: Few films end with as much confidence as Talk to Me. With the best bits up front and at the end, the movie is structured perfectly to make a lasting impact on horror fans.



Restaurant Review: Ezov

Chef Berty Richter's upscale Mediterranean concept is thoughtful, modern, and inviting BY MELANIE HAUPT

When you walk into Ezov, the latest concept from the Emmer & Rve restaurant group, the graffiti motif on the walls (the lyrics to Britney Spears' "Toxic" in Hebrew), on the paper lanterns, and the light fixtures that look like floating squiggles all lend the space energy and verve. You have the sense of having entered a party just in time for the good shit to happen.

Named after the Hebrew word for the garden herb hyssop, Ezov is chef Berty Richter's love letter to his home country of Israel, with the decor and cocktails gesturing to the nightlife and street art of Tel Aviv and the menu nodding to the diverse culinary influences of the Galilee region.

As with many restaurants these days, the format is shared plates, and you're encouraged to order all at once (except for dessert). with a suggested number of plates based on how many people are in your party. On our first visit, we cast as wide a net as possible, adhering to the suggestion of 8-10 plates. Nine plates wound up being too much food for our hungry party of four, but we enjoyed nearly every morsel.

From the smaller-plates portion of the menu, we loved the smashed cucumber, falafel, hummus, and frena (a thicker version of pita) with lamb butter. The cucumber was a glorious tangle of greenery atop rich smoked labna, adorned with green herbs and dressed with a tangy amba sauce. Even my cucumber-hating spouse went back for a second bite.

The hummus and falafel were truly glorious. Spooned into a deep divot in the hummus was a pool of roasted pattypan squash and tatbila sauce. We used the earthy frena - which came with a lamb butter, molded into a hamsa, and shredded beet horseradish - as a hummus delivery mechanism. (Some people may grouse that the hummus doesn't come with pita. To those folks, I say grow up and eat it with a spoon.) The falafel was crunchy and rus-

greens and sliced radishes to balance the oil; it was light and refreshing. The standout here was the shawarma, served speared in a tidy vertical round, a personal spit from which to carve a small portion. It was served assortment of sauces including an extraspicy red schug that made our eyes water.

We ended the meal with the Turkish coffee cake, which was the only dish of the night that didn't blow our collective skirts up. The flavor was deep and almost savory, with strong cardamom notes. Despite its petite size, it was far too heavy to consume on a scorching July night, the restaurant's HVAC struggling to combat the triple-digit heat, although the mascarpone helped lighten it up a bit.

When we returned a few weeks later, we brought our vegetarian friends; I'd noticed on our previous visit that there was only one vegetarian entrée on the menu and I was curious whether the 8-10 plate guideline

tic; make sure to drag it through the spicy green schug to give it a little kick.

We leaned into the animal proteins for the larger-format dishes, choosing tilefish, chicken shawarma, and kofta. The tilefish was lightly breaded and fried, reminiscent of fish and chips, and came with a pile of fresh

with a mess of pickled vegetables and sautéed onions and herbs, as well as a large piece of laffa (a large, thin flatbread). The chicken was tender and juicy; the flavors of the chicken, pickles, and flatbread combined truly popped. I was too full to register the kofta, sadly, but it did come with an

would suit a meatless context. We revisited some of the previous dishes we'd tried: they were consistently good, although the falafel was a bit overcooked this time around.

We added the roasted cabbage to the roster, unsure of what to expect. What arrived was roughly a quarter of a head of cabbage, charred on the outside and increasingly tender on the inside. It was salty and briny, and as we moved toward the core, it tasted more and more like sauerkraut. It was an interesting dish, if not entirely successful.

We also ordered the sabich sandwich, which arrived much, much later than the rest of our food (perhaps 20-30 minutes after our smaller plates had been cleared). It was an enormous riot of vegetables, truly a showcase piece. Two halves of a loaf of frena were stuffed with eggplant, thinly sliced yellow squash, cucumber, and egg, drizzled with tahini and schug and topped with a generous mound of parsley. It was delicious, but I question the choice to serve a large, unwieldy sandwich within a shared-plates context.

We ended the meal with an order of baklava, which my companions devoured enthusiastically, while noting that it was more like a pistachio cobbler than a traditional layered baklava. The scoop of tahini ice cream that accompanied the dish was very nice, not too sweet and perfect-

ly creamy. In all, we ordered seven plates (plus an extra side of frena that was cleared before we were done with it) for four people; despite it being an all-veg meal, the richness of the sauces meant that we were satisfied without feeling overfull. I suggest

that, rather than adhere to the two to three plates per person guideline, order based on your personal appetite to avoid spending or eating too much. You can always order more food if you need to.

My spouse and I both fell in love with a cocktail at Ezov. For him, it was the Tom Selek, a mezcal-based drink with beet, pineapple, lemon, and chile. Mine was the Take Me Out, with Cappelletti (an Aperol-adjacent aperitivo), pomegranate, tonic, and lime. My teetotaling friend got the Curcumada zeroproof cocktail; the flavors of ginger and tur-

> meric harmonized beautifully in this refreshing summer beverage. We were so enamored with our cocktails that we didn't even register the extensive wine list, which features wines from Greece, Lebanon, and other parts of the Mediterranean.

A few words about service:

Our first visit to Ezov was on a very busy Friday night. Yet everyone who served us was pleasant and personable, rather than harried and frantic. We left in high spirits, having had a really wonderful time due in large part to the quality of service we experienced.

The service during our second visit was adequate but not as stellar as the first. Our server was polite but seemed irritated by our (very few) questions. Despite the very long gap between courses, we started to feel unwelcome the moment my friend set down her spoon after taking the last bite of dessert. It was a rather disappointing way to end our dining experience.

I'm not an expert in Israeli food and I've never been to Israel, but I do know what dishes excite me and which ones I'm okay with limiting to just a bite or two. At Ezov, almost all the dishes we tried fell into the former category. My impression is that Ezov is a thoughtful, creative, loving tribute to the varied culinary traditions in Israel, presented in a lively and inviting space. If you're lucky enough to vibe with your waitstaff, you may very well enjoy one of the best dining experiences on offer in Austin.

Baltierra Family Bonds

Solid roots support the Tiarras' indie Chicana sound and strong convictions

ophia sensed a creeping tension in the air from behind the drum set. Tiffany held eye contact with her as she maintained a steady bassline. Then it happened: Tori spontaneously leaped onto a speaker and broke into a vacillating solo of yowling riffs, reluctant to end their fan-favorite rendition of Cuban folk song "La Negra Tomasa."

"I was not expecting her to do that," admits Sophia, as the three Baltierra sisters reminisce about their favorite set at this year's South by Southwest – during Austin nonprofit DAWA's showcase at Stubb's – through separate windows of a Zoom call. Emblematic of their assorted reach, they also played a TikTok-presented party and Rodeo Austin's outdoor stage that month.

"But yeah, the sister telepathy really helps us in those moments."

Bonded by blood, the Tiarras always attribute their success to family.



GIRLS, ONCE

Known until last year as the Tiarra Girls, the Austin-born-and-bred triumvirate first found music at their father Hector Baltierra's many DJ sets. As he shuffled between cumbia rhythms, R&B hits, and hip-hop hooks, the kid sisters danced around, played imaginary instruments, and sang into unplugged microphones. They marveled in awe as their father controlled crowds – themselves included – with his diverse mixes.

"What he played as a DJ really influenced our own tastes in music," says Tori, lead singer and guitarist. "It was a big mix of everything, but the Tejano songs he played influenced us to learn more about our Chicana culture, while also not confining ourselves to the machismo culture and its norms."

In 2012, Tori told her father: "I want to start a rock band."

Then 14, 12, and 10, respectively, Tiffany, Sophia, and Tori took music lessons individually. Hector and Debbra Baltierra already had the idea for a family band floating in their heads. Tori merely lit the fuse.

The Mexican American parents poured themselves into realizing their daughters' dreams: Hector sold some DJ equipment to buy them used equipment, while Debbra chased down opportunities for them to play in the city.

Their No. 1 rule? Never leave the girls alone.

"Wherever they had to go and set things up, or even the restroom, I was always with them," recounts Debbra. "While they performed, I would be on one side of the stage, and Hector would be on the other. When people wanted to interview them or take pictures with them, we were always there."

In 2017, then Tiarra Girls released their self-titled debut EP. In just under 10 minutes, the three-song offering revealed the trio's various influences: Opener "Answers" evoked Bob Marley with a funky reggae backbeat, Tori's soulful vibrato echoed Selena in jazzy follow-up "Lonely Room," and bright, jangly rocker "I Made a Garden" closed out the teenage effort.

As for early live shows, covers stumbled onto their set lists via Hector's picks. The wedding DJ, also one of the originators of Austin's B-boy scene, suggested Stevie Wonder's "Isn't She Lovely" and Cyndi Lauper's "True Colors." Making his choices

their own, the young stars won over the city and brought home Austin Music Awards for Best Performing Band Under 18 in the final three years – 2016 to 2018 – of the category's inclusion.

DAUGHTERS, STILL

In the Tiarras' studio recording of onstage staple "La Negra Tomasa," a wailing wah-wah riff whirls over a psychedelic cumbia rendering of the Cuban folk

number, popularized by Mexican rock band Caifanes. Yet another recommendation from their father, the March release came after a live performance Tori posted on TikTok found online virality last summer, with some even dubbing the trio *Chicana* Batman.

"We were bullied into the studio by our fans," jokes Tori.

These days, the trio's music reflects a more reciprocal dialogue between them and their parents. Beneath zesty shakers and a hypnotic backbeat, 2021 Latin groove "Let Love Free" unearths Tori's catharsis coming out as lesbian to her parents: "Believe, we know it's hard/ But you gotta let love free/ And scream what's meant to be."

"We cried when we first listened to it," recalls Hector. "We knew where it was coming from, and as parents, we want our children to never, ever be afraid to come to us with anything. Debbie and I didn't have that kind of relationship with our parents, so we found it important to help build their character and who they want to be."

In a video posted in February of last year, the Tiarras revealed their name change with a nostalgic montage soundtracked by the Beastie Boys' "Girls."

Old elementary-schoolage news footage and photos chronicled the sisters' growth. With a keen sense of self-awareness, then came the announcement: "We are changing our band name. Yes, we are still Austin's favorite young, Latina, sister-power trio, but we are growing up," said Tori onscreen.

"As we've stepped into our womanhood, our music has followed, and we want our name to reflect that," added Sophia.

Wasting no time, catchy bongo rhythms elevated yet another caterwauling guitar solo on "They Don't See Us" in March 2022. Lamentations of unrealistic beauty standards and feeling invisible on the track

echoed the empowerment of 2021's "Soy Chingona" - which tapped into a wave of reclamation of the Spanish term for an overaggressive woman, chingona, now slang for badass. Then, October followed up with syncopated fretwork and choral harmonies in "Cumbia en el Cielo," inspired by Tori's encounter with their great-grandmother in a dream.

Both deeply personal, the Tiarras' post-rebranding singles prove serious testaments to their musical growth.

The band says they've received affirmation from many families for sparking conversations about coming out and carving out a safer space for open discussion. Still, others hounded the sisters for mixing sexuality and politics into their music, which has included endorsement of progressive state and local candidates. Undeterred, they also recently performed at the queer, Latinxfocused Preciosa Night fest in Los Angeles.

"The reason we love music so much is because it's a way that we can express ourselves," says Tori. "So why would we limit something that's relevant in the world, relevant in our minds, relevant between each other?

"We don't want to be a pretty thing that people just look at. We're really standing our ground and saying what we want to say."

Staving true to that mantra, the sisters take pride in their growing impact on younger musicians. Recalling an encounter with a young drummer in Fort Worth, percussionist Sophia says: "Her words were that I inspired her. I hope to hear that a thousand times more in the future, because that's exactly what I want to do."

As for her own inspiration, Sophia notes Austin drummer/vocalist Clemencia Zapata, who moved to Austin in 1985 and was a founding member of allgo (then known as the Austin Latino Lesbian & Gay Organization). She's known for years of prominent performances around town with acts like Conjunto los Pinkys, Conjunto Aztlan, and Susan Torres y Conjunto Clemencia.

"When we started, I didn't see a lot of females playing, specifically Latinas in Austin, but I did cling onto one," says Sophia. "I always talk about [Clemencia]; she's a percussionist in Austin and I love seeing her play, I love the way she would groove behind her drum set. I hope to be that, and pave a way for other girls everywhere, not just in Austin."

SISTERS, ALWAYS

Currently making demos during weekend sessions at Firefly Sound Studio and Michael Ramos' Brown Recluse Studio, the Tiarras continue to hone their artistic voice and indie Latin style in their upcoming debut album.

"A lot of the music we're working on right now is about empowerment, womanhood, and love," says Tori. "We're all at that age where we're realizing our worth and diving deeper into love. We haven't shown that a lot in music because we started when we were so young.

"A lot of people know us as the Tiarra Girls, and now we're like, the Tiarra Women."

During a May show at Flamingo Cantina, an enchanted crowd broke into a cumbia circle while Tori and Tiffany swayed in sync to Sophia's steady beat. With a decade of music behind them, the laidback venue, known for hosting dub and ska acts, remains their favorite. With plays in reggae influences, the Tiarras act as a perfect bridge for the 32-year-old venue's integration of next-gen Latin

and hip-hop scenes.

In fact, they ascribe their footing in the nightlife scene to venue owner Angela Tharp, who gave them opportunities to open for other cumbia bands early on.

"I like working with young artists and helping develop them in our market," says Tharp, who first booked the trio for a Valentine's Day show in 2020, inspired by their music, style, and story. "I am so impressed with their growth and development that I feel that the world is their peach, and to devour it as they see fit.

"We feel like they have become part of our family."

Last week, the band continued a twoyear run of playing Hot Summer Nights at the Flamingo – last year with El Combo Oscuro, and this year with El Tule.

"It was really awesome to find a community that was comfortable saying the word 'Latinx.' because even that was very controversial," says Tori. "There are times where it does feel like, 'Oh, we're playing a Latin night,' or, 'Oh, we're playing Margarita Day again.' But I think because we're aware of being pigeonholed, we won't allow it, you know? We're kind of doing it now because it's what feels good, and what's been helping us find our crowd.

"I don't think there's a set date as to when we're going to feel like we made it and we

can start headlining every single show, but I definitely have a feeling it's coming soon."

Now 25, 23, and 21, the young women find importance in nurturing their identities beyond music. Offstage, Tiffany works as a nurse in a cardiovascular stroke unit, Sophia works as an administrative assistant, and Tori splits her time between audio engineering and wholesale fulfillment.

The Tiarras have been signed to Texasbased label Lucky Hound Music, also home to Austin artists Walker Lukens and Nobody's Girl, since 2020. They're co-managed by the label's sister company, 484 Artist Management, and Cosmica Artists (Luna Luna, Estereomance). Yet, the Tiarras still look to their parents - "mom-

> ager and dad-ager," dubs Sophia - for guidance, with Hector continuing to oversee the logistics of every show, while Debbra helps organize the band's finances.

> "There's a lot of trust in having our parents help manage us," says Tori. "They don't want to take from us, they just want to set us up for a good future. And it's really fun, overall, to experience all of this with our family. because it just brings us closer together. We have all these great memories and we get to learn about one another and ourselves every day."

> Cognizant of their limited time together, especially after Tiffany moved out of

the family home last year, Tori continues: "But sometimes we have to regroup and not focus on the business aspect as much when we're having family time. That comes second. We're a family first."

Likewise, the Tiarras will always remain sisters first.

"When we started the band, our dad would always tell me, 'Protect your sisters,' because I was the oldest," says bassist Tiffany, finally chiming in. "Now that we're all women, I feel like Tori is the head."

Tori adds: "But we all look out for one another, especially at the shows, because things can get crazy.

"When it comes to that, we're all the big sister."

FRESH FINDS FROM HOT SUMMER NIGHTS

We asked four writers to review bands they'd never seen before by the music TEAM

GRACE SORENSEN SKATES THROUGH VELVETEEN GROOVES

Closing out the hip-hop-heavy KUTX Summer Jam showcase inside an ultrasoupy Stubb's on Friday, up-and-comer Grace Sorensen coursed through a 40-minute set dense with exquisite sounds that simultaneously drew from the past and looked toward the future of R&B. A live quartet of keys, guitar, bass, and drums provided some much-appreciated sonic heft as Sorensen flexed her artistic and vocal range, from vibey pop to neo-soul. Think H.E.R. meets Ari Lennox. She crooned over velveteen grooves ("Miss Majesty") and chromatic ear-candy riffs ("This Isn't Love"), promptly hushing the clattery audience into a more attentive gaze. She only briefly broke character during a cover of Ashanti's early-Aughts chart-topper "Foolish" to gleefully shimmy along to the track's instrumentals as the front row hyped her up.

"You guys know that one video of the cholo riding his skateboard to this next song?" asked Sorensen, referring to TikToker Nathan Apodaca, who found internet fame after uploading a video of himself lip-syncing to Fleetwood Mac's "Dreams" while skating down a highway in Idaho. "That's like, my perpetual mood. So I'll be singing that for you guys tonight," she said as the band

smoothly segued into a twangy rendition of the 1977 megahit. The 20-year-old concluded her set some minutes before midnight with the irresistible "Digits." Surprise guest MC Megz Kelli of much-lauded local hip-hop duo Magna Carda joined Sorensen onstage and jolted the audience into motion with an utterly flawless verse. – Nayeli Portillo

WITCHES EXIST'S PSYCHEDELIC **CONCOCTION COMES TO A BOIL**

If witches exist, they probably hid backstage at Mohawk's indoor space on Saturday night, secretly helping stir up this namesake quartet's swirling concoction of 11 songs. If not, the 44-minute set only testified to the Austin noisegaze band's hypnotic prowess. Flicking on the flames at 10:57pm, a warbling synth flung open the doors to a barrage of expansive riffs and thunderous drums in "Worms Against Humanity." Led by multi-instrumentalist Jackson Baker's ethereal vocals, the foursome's chords swelled into a hazy vortex. They slowed into the drowsier atmospherics of "Garden" before pivoting to the twangier, post-punk-infused "Double Homicide." Following unreleased tracks borrowing from the acid-tinged Sixties, synth-led number "Hell" ironically proved dreamiest, two-thirds through their set.

Like their mysterious launch on Instagram last year - eight posts with dark imagery accompanied by cryptic captions across four months, before finally announcing an August band debut - the soon-to-be 1-vear-old fourpiece kept up an enigmatic front, with Baker only ever pausing between songs to repeat the band's name. Diving into two final tracks still packed with roaring distortion, drummer Derek Ivy and bassist Anthony Day paired relentless fills with hurtling basslines, while Baker and guitarist Jimmy Mercado slung astral riffs across the room. The quartet's raucous energy came to a gurgling boil onstage, before fizzling out into a wavering transmission of feedback. - Waune Lim

VERMIN THE VILLAIN WIELDS HIGH-GRADE HIP-HOP HUBRIS

Amidst Hot Summer Nights' Sunday comedown, San Antonio-based rapper Vermin the Villain (aka Lord Verm) won over a modest-sized crowd by flipping the script to deliver a fierce come-up at Mohawk. Taking the stage with his face obscured by a half-black, half-white balaclava, short curly hair emerging from the cutoff top, the Laredo-bred artist unleashed an 11-song flurry. The bangers imbued with more boom bap than one might expect from the younger generation. Backed by fellow Laredoan Dave Montova on live drums. Verm wasted no time asserting technical prowess, pingponging between turntable scratching, busting beats on an MPC, and rapping at breakneck speed reminiscent of Blackalicious MC Gift of Gab - with obvious nods via wordplay and grit to MF Doom and Wu-Tang Clan.

Not to mention the Doom mask and Wu W rings worn on each hand, those influences were especially evident during two new tracks, "Lust" and "Greed," off an upcoming concept album based on the nine circles of hell depicted in Dante Alighieri's Inferno. As if those acrobatics weren't enough, the MC revealed himself as a prolific jazz pianist, manning the keys for an instrumental cover of Herbie Hancock's "Tell Me a Bedtime Story," then wrapping his set with aptly titled fast-rap attack "Coltrane 001." (To boot, he also held down drums for following act Ariel & the Culture.) Verm is a high-grade example of how to wield hip-hop hubris: back it up beat for beat, rhyme for rhyme with the skills to match. – David Brendan Hall

WALLFLOWERS BLOOM FOR **ARIEL & THE CULTURE'S CATCHY CUMBIA POP**

Sunday night, 100 degrees, 8pm: Folks with any common sense could be found at home, nursing their hangovers or preparing for the upcoming workweek. Nevertheless, an intimate but dedicated crowd convened

at Mohawk to celebrate Ariel & the Culture's first return to Austin since South by Southwest, and the Latinx-focused iEso Es! festival in December. Headed by Jason "Ariel" Bobadilla, the Dallas-based indie project hit the gas pedal early and never let up for a sweltering 45-minute set. Combining dance-ready cumbia drum lines with bedroom-pop guitar stylings, the tight threepiece gave Bobadilla the opportunity to flex his R&B-infused vocal chops. On "Tú v Yo." the vocalist burst into a fullblown Justin Timberlake falsetto on the half-English, half-Spanish ode to a distant lover.

The early evening crowd was timid for the first half of the show, opting to hang in the back of Mohawk's spacious outdoor patio. "First one to take a step forward, I've got a gift for you," encouraged Bobadilla, revealing a pack of Spongebob-themed Go-Gurt pouches from behind his back. The tactic broke the ice just in time for the criminally catchy "Dame Tu Amor," an equally fresh and nostalgic blend of Latin pop and Nineties hip-hop. Couples and friends twirled under the dawning pink sunset, wallflowers no longer. Don't fret if you missed Sunday's performance: The crooner returns to Austin on August 5 for a Hotel Vegas performance alongside Chicano rap collective CHROMA. With or without Go-Gurt pouches, Bobadilla is sure - Genevieve Wood to charm.

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MALIK BAPTISTE'S STATEMENT OF SELF, "WHO!?"

After unspooling his emotional DNA through a color-coded concept album in 2020, Malik Baptiste – perhaps the most skilled rapper/producer to call Austin home – went dark for 2½ years. But in 2023, he's been going off, releasing four singles that feel comparatively unfettered, yet more effective as statements of self ... and his best work. The latest, with its banging beat, downtuned hook, and staccato sixteenth note flow, basically says; I'm back with a lot to prove, and this shit's easy for me. A closing ad-lib, "Let the story begin," nods to Kanye West mentor No I.D., who releases Baptiste's music on his ARTium label. - Kevin Curtin

LOST PATTERNS, "DRY MY EYES"

The first offering from the new duo of local mainstays Beth Chrisman and Silas Lowe as Lost Patterns settles squarely in the kind of laid-back, front porch picking perfect for a sweaty summer night. Lowe takes lead on "Dry My Eyes," the debut single from the band's upcoming eponymous LP, with his hard twang shaded by Chrisman's fiddle and harmonies. The expert playing is expected, but it's the sharp, easy lyricism throughout the album that truly shines, cutting tongue-in-check cleverness ("Saturday Night in Jail") with sincere yearning ("When the Nights Are Cold"). Two exceptional players combine to find their songwriting voice, together. - Doug Freeman

EXPLOSIONS IN THE SKY, "TEN BILLION PEOPLE"

Turning 24 this month (revisit "Born on the Fourth of July," Oct. 24, 2003) Explosions in the Sky here teases its alarmingly titled September LP, which the press release addresses: "End marks the band's seventh, but not final, studio album." Indeed, ATX fireworks instrumentalists extend a new branch off previous growth, 2016's The Wilderness: skittering digital resonance powers classic post-rock. Nü Radiohead meets vintage Radiohead. Drum slap, key viscosity, and axe ecstasy populate "Ten Billion People," whose organic grandeur blooms immense and wondrous. Chris Hrasky, Michael James, Munaf Rayani, and Mark Smith still pop emotional uplift through - Raoul Hernandez celestial tones.

HOLY WAVE, "NOTHING IN THE DARK"

A haunting, buzzing synth ushers in light, steady drumming and pointed, arpeggiating guitars on psych rock quartet Holy Wave's "Nothing in the Dark." Previewing their sixth album, Five of Cups, due in August via Seattle indie label Suicide Squeeze Records, the single douses Ryan Fuson's spacey vocals in rippling reverb before swelling into a cosmic explosion of fuzz. Despite the track's reassuring refrain ("Nothing in the dark to fear/ Where the shadows disappear"), its spooky music video directed by Vanessa Pla captures multi-instrumentalist Joey Cook summoning ghostly bandmates with a swirling candlelit séance in an empty house.


MOODY BANK\$ & TONY22,

Strung on soft acoustic guitar, Moody Bank\$'s latest leans light and bubbly after the sure-footed, loungey R&B statements of 2022 record FEELING COLORS. A sing-along loop by Bank\$ plays throughout most of the airbrushed pop pleasantry, instilling the déjà vu of persistent time-wasting relationships. Fellow Austin artist Tony22, having launched a seriously large following on a past YouTube presence, guests with a hyper-earnest verse mentioning both prayers and cop cars. Both acts sound about as smooth as the anime cover, or the stuffed animals Tony22 snuggles on social media. - Rachel Rascoe

JORDAN MOSER'S AUGUST RESIDENCY

Hole in the Wall, Tuesday 1

For his first single since thoughtful folk exploration Long Night (2019), Jordan Moser offers a blunt instruction: "Get your ass back to the wild." But since it's a work of the San Marcos-based, Keeled Scales-approved singer-songwriter, who's also involved in various environmental causes, the line sings much more subtly, like a mantra. Following Molly Burch's collaboration on his last record, Wimberley's excellent Natalie Jane Hill takes backup here - and duets on the prayerlike "Memory Palace."



With Moser's full album out this Friday, Hill aptly applauds PERIL for "shedding light on the harsh realities of this world, while keeping that light on and showing the beauty too. To me. PERIL is a record of hope and accountability." Looping in like-minded Austin songsmiths on such efforts, Moser plays the Hole in the Wall every Tuesday in August. Genevieve Poist joins August 1 with wisps of country influence and truck bed Americana scenes as Virginia Creeper. More to orbit Moser's tearstained globe: Tyler Jordan and Emily No Good (Aug. 8), Alex Dupree and Fishplate (Aug. 15), Ryan Sambol and Blair Robbins (Aug. 22), and Little Mazarn and Jenny Carson (Aug. 29). - Rachel Rascoe

EXERCISE ALBUM RELEASE

Hotel Vegas, Friday 28

With a name perfectly unsuited for search engine optimization, Exercise serves those yearning for the Aughts' post-punk revival through loose lyrical derisions and twiddling synths. Debuting their sophomore album following the passing of co-vocalist and synth player Keller LeVine in 2020, the foursome strides forward with Ipso Facto. Tickling guitar lines remain amid bold grievances. "It's so fucking unfair what happened to you," they echo on second single "Glue." Chords barrel forward with the spirit of langle pop. but carry forth a lush atmosphere like LCD Soundsystem. Vocals inflect with slightly more charisma than James Murphy's sad drone. Call that post-post-- Laiken Neumann

MILLER TIME: SCOTT MILLER/RHETT MILLER 04 Center, Friday 28

04 Center, Thursday 3

Not a double bill, but this week's in-through-the-out-door at the 04 Center begs branding and a sponsor. Nineties alt.country pioneers turned Americana vets, these Millers belong in a Western together. Friday, selfavowed "singer-songwriter/farmer/malapert" ("impudent person") Scott Miller took up the family business (that middle one), so the Virginian reaping loyalty in one of his favorite Southwestern hot spots becomes increasingly precious. Austin-born Big D demon Rhett Miller (Old 97's) rolls through Thursday with last year's The Misfit, which sounds like a George Harrison solo disc from the Seventies: searching, personal, melodic. Bonnie Whitmore serenades for the former and Fort Worth countryman Grady - Raoul Hernandez Spencer reps the latter.

HAYDEN PEDIGO, CACTUS LEE

Sagebrush, Sunday 30

Hayden Pedigo carries a West Texas absurdist mystique, a line drawn explicitly in the Amarillo native's support from Terry Allen on 2017's Greetings From Amarillo. Yet even as the 29-year-old's persona as a high plains eccentric expands, his music mesmerizes behind subtle, intricate finger-picked guitar instrumentals, meditative yet complex. This year's sixth studio LP, The Happiest Times I Ever Ignored, draws apt comparisons to John Fahey and William Tyler. The Mexican Summer release proves Pedigo's most polished, as he returns from tour opening for Jenny Lewis, Local songsmith Cactus Lee opens strumming new single "Alpine Skier." - Doug Freeman

NIKI, SUSANNAH JOFFE Moody Amphitheater, Tuesday 1

In a method old as TikTok, Austin native Susannah Joffe had commenters begging for the release of June single "You Mother's Name" off an immediate, darkly emotional sound bite months prior. "Unrequited love is part of being young/ But I'm tired of sleeping by a warm gun." Now based in NYC, Joffe started releasing upbeat bedroom pop with devastating, foggy-window lyrics during Radio-Television-Film studies at UT-Austin. sometimes co-written with her musician dad. She plays locally for the first time in almost a year opening for Indonesian pop singer NIKI, signed to hitmaking platform - Rachel Rascoe

WAVEFORM*, THEY ARE **GUTTING A BODY OF WATER**

Parish, Wednesday 2

After a touring stint in 2021, alt-rock romancers waveform* team up once again with Philadelphia noise-pop outfit They Are Gutting a Body of Water in looming feedback. Connecticut duo waveform* wields lo-fi haze amid troubadour lyricism but gains clarity via somber thrashes in 2023 LP Antarctica. Lineup neighbor TAGABOW pairs whimsical electronica with heavy guitar scratches, forging a uniquely synth-leavened shoegaze. Two of the East Coast's most buzzy acts meet openers in the dire heat of Texas, which produced the twangy pulse of Dallas' Teethe and hometown heroes alexalone's softly cataclysmic doom. Somehow, sensory overload feels good in a place like this.


