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



THE OUTDOOR RECREATION ECONOMY IN TEXAS DEPENDS ON EPA SAFEGUARDS

As a local bicycle shop owner, I know the value outdoor recreation can bring to people's lives. It's not just because it drives my bike business. Nature has always been, and will continue to be, a place for people to seek refuge from the everyday stress of their lives. In Austin, we are lucky to be able to exchange the hot expanses of cracked concrete for nearby soft grass and shady dirt trails littered with squirrels and lizards instead of cans and wrappers. Businesses like Bikealot that support outdoor enthusiasts absolutely rely on our pleasant public parks, rivers, lakes, and hiking/biking trails. Over the last few years, however, the entire country - Texas included - has experienced the devastating effects of climate change.

Walking outside is like walking into a hot oven these days. Our wildlife shrinks as their habitats swelter. Taking a breath of fresh air isn't just inhaling oxygen – it's

also inhaling acrid chemicals. Without immediate and meaningful safeguards, climate change is on a trajectory of rapid intensification. I speak for myself and outdoors lovers everywhere when I say that we urgently need strong commonsense protections against methane and other harmful pollution from the oil and gas industry or else my local bu

oil and gas industry, or else my local business, other outdoor recreation businesses, and all who enjoy the outdoors will no longer be able to find sanctuary in nature.

Methane is a menace to our climate, and oil and gas sites release a lot of it. In the U.S. alone, 16 million metric tons of methane are released annually by the oil and gas industry through flaring, venting, and leaks, which has the same near-term climate impact as 350 coal plants. Flaring is when methane gas is burned off into the atmosphere, while venting is its invisible release into the open air. Leaks typically occur by accident, but oil and gas sites are not currently required to patch all of them. The poor air quality created by methane and other air pollution from oil and gas operations contributes to smog and triggers asthma. It's not only harmful to the environment or the health of our communities, but it also harms our local recreation economies, which rely on the great outdoors. Our public lands are an imperative part of the well-being of the Austin economy, people, and wildlife, therefore, we must fiercely protect them.

In November 2022, the Environmental Protection Agency issued an updated draft rule to cut methane and other harmful pollutants from oil and gas operations. The proposed rule marks strong progress to help rein in excess emissions that are trapping heat in our atmosphere by conducting regular inspections of smaller oil and gas wells with leak-prone equipment and abandoned wells, requiring the transition to zero-emitting pneumatic equipment, and utilizing advanced technology monitoring, which

will spur innovation and create jobs. However, the EPA must strengthen the methane rule to eliminate pollution from the unnecessary and wasteful practice of routine flaring. Supporting and strengthening

the EPA's safeguards now is the only way future generations of Americans

will be able to enjoy all the incredible biking, hiking, camping, and rafting opportunities that so many generations have been able to enjoy before them. Families deserve to breathe in clean, fresh air when they bike Austin's neighborhoods and trails. Hikers should be able to enjoy Texas' terrain without passing out from record-breaking temperatures. Campers need the lush, canopied forests, the gushing, white-hemmed rivers, and the shaded, mossy rocks that make their trips worthwhile. We need to protect what makes Texas so special by curbing methane pollution.

Lifesaving Lobbying

It'll cost \$500 million to air-condition Texas prisons. Why haven't we yet? BY BRANT BINGAMON

Elizabeth Haggerty would have been out of prison by now and back with Hannah, her wife. Haggerty, known as Liz to her loved ones, made parole in February of 2022. She was transferred to the Dr. Lane Murray Unit this June in preparation for her release. It was supposed to happen on Aug. 2 - one day before Hannah's 31st birthday.

Haggerty had diabetes, high blood pressure, and asthma - conditions that can be worsened by heat. She had been moved from an air-conditioned prison to Lane Murray, one of many Texas prisons with no AC, where temperatures this summer have risen to 120 degrees and higher. Hannah's mother, Martha Romero, told us that Liz began having trouble immediately after the move in June. To make matters worse, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice hadn't sent her medicines with her.

"Liz was messaging me and saying that it was hot, that she felt sick," Romero said. "She was like, 'It's only one month, I think I can make it, but I feel so sick. I can't eat nothing, I need Gatorade and chips, that's all I can hold down.' That was the last email I got from her."

According to TDCJ, Haggerty died around midnight on June 28. She was 37 years old. very ill for three days before she passed. "She said that Liz was dehydrated, that she was having trouble breathing, and she was covered with a really bad heat rash from the top of her head to her feet, just all over," Romero said. "And she had no water. In the dorm, you have to get your own water, and Liz couldn't do it for herself."

Romero blames the heat, and TDCJ's inability to mitigate it, for Haggerty's death. It's a conviction shared by the family members of other Texans who have died in prisons this summer. These include Debra Schlegel, age 64, who died on June 22; Tommy McCullough, age 35, who died on June 23; and **Jon Anthony Southards**, age 36, who died on June 28. Each of them reported feeling overwhelmed by the heat, their loved ones have said.

As we wrote earlier in this series, TDCJ does not admit that these deaths – or those of any inmate since 2011 – were heat-related, despite research showing that the heat is responsible for 12% of inmate deaths each summer. (Agency spokesperson Amanda Hernandez told us Schlegel's death is thought to be the result of heart disease. No cause has yet been determined for the deaths of McCullough and Southards.) Prison advocates say that TDCJ officials know how dangerous the heat is – for example, the agency requires wardens to offer ice water and fans to prisoners. But its

leaders have never lobbied the state to install AC in the prisons, even though 20,000 of its guards suffer in the same stifling conditions as the prisoners.

Instead, TDCJ has provided cover for toughon-crime politicians by exaggerating how much AC would cost. In 2017, the agency estimated that airconditioning the Wallace Pack Unit in Navasota would cost \$20 million. AC was installed two years later for \$4 million. In 2021, it estimated that simply running AC systems, were

they to be installed, would cost \$140 million a year. The same year, TDCJ Executive Director **Bryan Collier** testified that the agency would need over a billion dollars to install AC in only half of its facilities.

Advocates say these numbers are so exaggerated that they amount to lies. "Collier answered questions in one of these hearings and it was excuse after excuse," said **Charlie Malouff**, vice president of **Texas C.U.R.E., Inc.**, a criminal justice advocacy group. "It was, 'Oh, we project \$1.2 billion for this and \$1.2 billion for that.' But when the hard numbers came in from the Pack Unit and [Rep. Terry] Canales's open records requests, no – we're talking about less than \$500 million."

That number – \$500 million – was approved overwhelmingly by the House of Representatives this legislative session in Canales' HB 1708, which would have brought AC to the state's prisons by 2025. The proposal died in the Senate Finance Committee, when the committee chair, Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston, refused to hear it.

It was the second session in a row that the Senate had rejected a House plan to air-condition the prisons. Advocates believe that the upper body has blood on its hands, particularly Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, the chair of the Criminal Justice Committee, who has said "We're not gonna air condition the prisons." On another occasion, he said "We need to have a grownup discussion of what's practicable and reasonable and what's politically acceptable. But I can tell you, the people of Texas don't want air conditioned prisons." Whitmire and Huffman did not return requests for comment.

Malouff is one of those who emphasize that TDCJ's guards are suffering along with the prisoners. He can't understand why Collier wouldn't ask the Senate to approve AC for his own employees' sake. Democratic Rep. **Carl Sherman**, a strong supporter of modernizing

the prisons, has visited a half dozen units this summer and spoken to many guards. "They wonder, 'Does anyone in the public really care about us?" Sherman said, "You know, that we're working in these environments, that every 30 minutes we're having to go up these stairs on each floor and there's no AC?' And sometimes they have heat strokes and ambulances and paramedics have to be called out to these facilities - for the workers, not just the inmates."

The heat is considered a major cause of TDCJ's ongoing staffing crisis. In researching this story, the *Chronicle* heard repeatedly of prisoners who weren't getting ice water or respite because there were no guards to provide it. It's an element of Liz Haggerty's story, too – an inmate told Martha Romero that she tried to find a guard to help Haggerty in the hours before her death but there was none on duty.

Romero said that when she heard Liz had died it felt as though the floor had dropped out from under her. Now she feels numb. Hannah, she said, is dealing with Liz's death in her own way, privately.

"I try not to bring it up," Romero said. "She'll bring it up when she wants to say something. And it will turn into a long conversation. Tears and laughter."

Hannah is not ready to speak publicly about her loss. Romero wasn't ready to do so either, at first. Now, she's adding her voice to those of other families and friends whose loved ones have suffered. "I don't want it to just be the end of Liz's story," Romero said. "I want the world to know that this was a person who lived and was loved. And what happened was not okay." FROM GAS STATION TO CHARGING

STATION The **Texas Transportation Commission** has approved the Texas Department of Transportation's electric vehicle infrastructure plan to build a statewide network of **EV charging stations**. The infrastructure will be funded by the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, which Texas will receive \$408 million from for this buildout.

100-DEGREE FEVER BREAKS The triple digit streak of **45 consecutive days** ended Tuesday thanks to **Tropical Storm Harold**, which touched down in South Texas on Tuesday, bringing much-needed rainfall to parts of the state.

HERE COMES A HISTORIC UPS CONTRACT

On Tuesday, **Teamsters** voted 86.3% – the highest in the history of Teamsters at **UPS** – to ratify a new five-year contract that raises wages for both fulland part-time workers, creates more full-time jobs, and secures workplace protections like air conditioning. This victory comes after bargaining broke down earlier this summer, causing a threat of a nationwide UPS strike.

DEL CONTE CONTRACT The **University of Texas** recommended the Board of Regents approve a contract extension for **Chris Del Conte** – football coach and vice president of athletics – of around \$20 million through 2030.

DROUGHT REACHES BLUE HOLE The drought has claimed another swimming hole, as Blue Hole in Wimberley is now closed for two weeks due to low water levels. Cypress Creek, which Blue Hole sits on, is currently about two feet below its normal level. Day passes purchased in advance will be refunded.

Chacon Moves On

Assessing Chief Joseph Chacon's legacy by Austin Sanders

Joseph Chacon will retire from the **Austin Police Department** in two weeks, ending a career at APD that spanned more than two decades and saw the El Paso native rise up the chain of command from beat cop to chief of police.

Chacon was named interim chief in 2021, succeeding **Brian Manley**, who took over the department in 2018. Chacon survived a months-long national search to become the only internal APD candidate up for the job. City Council made it official in October of 2021, awarding him the title on a 9-2 vote.

Chacon's tenure leading APD is one marked by missed opportunity. He was by no means a bad chief. Under his command, the department instituted a body-worn camera policy that requires some "critical incident" video be released within 10 days; he rejoined the Austin/ Travis County Sexual Assault Response and Resource Team, a collaboration of law enforcement and survivor support organizations tasked with coordinating community response to sex crimes; and he testified against House Bill 1900, the Texas law that makes it nearly impossible for cities to decrease police budgets.

On the broader challenges facing APD's response to sexual assaults, Council Member **Alison Alter** – who has led on the issue – reports that under Chacon, APD "has moved in the right direction." Implementation of changes mandated by the legal settlement between the city and survivors of sexual assault, as well as recommendations from a third-third-party report, are slowly advancing. "That work is happening," Alter told the *Chronicle*. "Folks are talking in a way that is open and transparent."

But is that good enough? Chacon assumed leadership of APD at a pivotal moment in the department's history – at a pivotal moment in the history of policing – and did little to seize on the promise of that moment. Instead, he settled for mere adequacy.

That's the key takeaway from Chacon's tenure offered by

Chris Harris, a local criminal justice advocate who has worked alongside a coalition of advocacy organizations determined to improve policing in Austin. "A lot of missed opportunities," Harris told us. "We have seen clear institutional and electoral support for real policing reform in recent years, but little has materialized." Consider some of the events preceding Chacon's appointment as chief. APD's DNA Lab was still shuttered and its **Sex Crimes Unit** still severely under-supported. The department was still reeling from a thirdparty investigation that uncovered a culture of racism and sexism that festered under the threat of retaliation. City Council responded with a suite of reforms intended to root out the causes of that toxicity and transform the police force into one that embraced the generally liberal ideas about 21st century policing held by most Austinites.

Months later, demonstrators flooded the streets of Downtown to demand a less violent, more accountable police force. As those protests waned, **José Garza** was sworn in as Travis County district attorney – bringing the progressive prosecutor movement to Austin. Six months later, a ballot measure supported by right-wing groups that would have exploded the size of APD's patrol force cratered. Earlier this year, Austin voters rejected a police oversight ballot measure embraced by pro-police groups in favor of one supported by police reformers.

All of these events could have been interpreted as signals that the people of Austin and their elected Council Members – finally out from under the thumb of the powerful and influential police lobby – were primed for a real change agent at APD. Someone who would be bold enough to go toe-to-toe with the Austin Police Association (APA) and insist that the Council-initiated reforms were not only necessary on a basic representative democracy level, but also vital to the future of the department.

If Chacon received those signals, it wasn't always evident in his leadership. Rather

than swimming in the same direction as Garza, the D.A. boldly charting a path toward a fairer and more equitable justice system, Chacon often stood in his way or did little to support him. Rather than advocate, behind the scenes or from the bully pulpit, for more robust civilian oversight of police, he sat on the sidelines and let the marginal views of the

APA dominate the conversation inside City Hall. A recent third party report examining efforts to change the training offered at the Austin Police Academy – a key aspect of Council's long-term project to "reimagine policing" – found that efforts were stalled due to a "lack of executive leadership" at APD.

Largest Mental Health Care Provider In Austin Plans Layoffs

Integral Care, the largest provider of mental health services in Travis County, is planning to lay off up to 5% of its staff.

The layoffs follow an unexpected revenue shortfall that will result in an \$8 million to \$9 million budget deficit for the agency in fiscal year 2023-2024, according to an internal presentation shared with staff and obtained by the *Chronicle*.


The agency, which serves as the **local mental health authority** (LMHA) for Austin-Travis County, employs about 1,000 people in the area, so up to 50 administrative and patient-facing positions could be cut. Last year, Integral reported serving more than 27,000 Travis County residents. Other cost-cutting measures proposed by management include no costof-living adjustment in the FY24 budget. Integral Care, like other LMHAs, is funded through a mix of federal, state, and local dollars. It is one of the few government agencies that has no taxing authority, so it cannot generate revenue through taxes.

United Workers of Integral Care, the employee union formed last year to represent the agency's frontline workforce, is warning that the cost-cutting measures will have an adverse effect on the agency's already overworked staff and, by extension, patients. UWIC co-presidents Carly Melancon and Tovah Moriarty wrote that the agency's frontline employees have "worked tirelessly" through a combined "mental health, housing, and pandemic crisis" to deliver critical care to patients.

In recent years, the agency has suffered from high levels of turnover due to "burnout and secondary trauma," according to Melancon and Moriarty. "The solution is not to lay off the staff who are still here doing the work for our community," the co-presidents said. "We need our local elected leaders at City of Austin and Travis County to press [IC Chief Executive Officer] **David Evans** for a more sustainable budget that protects workers and ensures that we are able to deliver the services our community needs."

Integral Care's board of trustees is expected to approve the budget cuts when they adopt the agency's FY24 budget on Aug. 31. In a recording of a virtual Aug. 14 meeting obtained by the *Chronicle*, leadership offered an explanation for the layoffs. Because Texas has opted out of receiving expanded Medicaid funding made available to states through the Affordable Care Act, Integral Care relies heavily on funds provided by the **1115 Medicaid waiver** – a federal funding agreement to support safety net providers and their low-income patients.

In 2021, the Biden administration refused to grant Texas an extension of the 1115 waiver for another decade, saying Texas hadn't received enough public input about how to use the money. They dropped that fight in 2022, securing the state 1115 funding for another decade. Still, the yearlong threat of losing 1115 funding led Texas to move away from that federal funding source and toward a model that would rely on more state-level funding for mental health authorities – primarily through two programs, the Direct Payment Program (DPP) and Charity Care Program (CCP). Integral Care learned in the last week of June - late in their budget process - that they did not provide as many services as the DPP anticipated. As a result, the agency had to return to the state \$1.6 million of the \$6.4 million in funds they received from the program. Agency leadership was also anticipating more robust mental health care funding from the state during the 88th legislative session, but that funding did not materialize. They expected \$4 million from the state's biennial budget; instead, they only received \$800.000. - Austin Sanders

Lawsuits mounting against Abbott's immigration enforcement scheme **BY BENTON GRAHAM**

Gov. Greg Abbott's immigration enforcement scheme now faces legal battles on two fronts. The American Civil Liberties Union, Texas Fair Defense Project, and law firm Covington & Burling filed a lawsuit on Monday over prolonged detentions in two Texas counties. And that comes on top of the Department of Justice's lawsuit over the state's implementation of floating barriers, or buoys (complete with serrated metal

plates that look like saw blades). That was filed in July and had its first hearing in Austin on Tuesday.

It's not great timing for Abbott's pet project. **Operation Lone Star** was already under the microscope this month after two people were found dead in buoys that had been put in the **Rio Grande** by the state. Additionally, the *Houston Chronicle* reported last month that state troopers deployed as part of the operation received instruc-

tions to push migrants back into the Rio Grande when the migrants tried to cross.

During a news conference prior to Tuesday's hearing, state Sen. Roland Gutierrez and residents from towns impacted by Operation Lone Star spoke against the governor's initiative and demanded that the Department of Justice take its lawsuit beyond just the buoy barriers. "Let's be real clear. A thousand feet of buoys, well, that may not seem like a lot to those of you out there in the public listening," Gutierrez said. "The fact is it pushes people into the deep water. It pushes women and children into the deep water."

Some residents noted that, while border security is important, erecting barriers ignores the symbiotic nature of U.S. and Mexican border towns. **Robie Flores** said there is a natural flow between **Eagle Pass** and **Piedras Negras**, speaking to her childhood memories of crossing the border to

attend dance class. That's how she sees her hometown, but for outsiders in the time of Operation Lone Star, she said, "What you see is a destitute place that needs a barrier because that's what our governor told you."

The Abbott administration has continued to defend its implementation of the buoys. "While I share the humanitarian concerns noted in your lawyers' letter, Mr. President, your finger points in the wrong direction. Neither of us wants to

see another death in the Rio Grande River. Yet your open-border policies encourage migrants to risk their lives by crossing illegally through the water, instead of safely and legally at a port of entry. Nobody drowns on a bridge," Abbott wrote to President Joe Biden on July 24 – less than two weeks prior to the bodies turning up in buoys.

Operation Lone Star, which began in March 2021, has funneled billions of dollars toward a range of enforcement, including the detention of migrants on trespassing charges.

The hasty creation of an entirely new arm of the criminal justice apparatus has led to the over-detention of some migrants, according to the second lawsuit. "Migrants who were arrested for misdemeanor trespass under Operation Lone Star were incarcerated an additional 13-42 days after their charges were dropped or their sentences fully served," a TFDP press release reads. The lawsuit targets **Kinney** and **Val Verde** counties, as well as the two counties' sheriffs and the **Briscoe** and **Segovia Unit** state prison wardens.

In the past, some immigration legal experts have speculated that lawsuits targeting Operation Lone Star could test previous **Supreme Court** rulings that place immigration enforcement under the federal government's jurisdiction. Some Texas Republicans have even welcomed lawsuits challenging Operation Lone Star that could give the current conservative Supreme Court the opportunity to undo past cases and allow states greater discretion to enforce immigration law.

However, TFDP's managing attorney for litigation, **Camilla Hsu**, said the group's lawsuit is pretty simple. "It's really about the bedrock principle that you can't hold people in jail if you don't have any legal authority to do that," Hsu said. "It's not a complicated idea, and it's not controversial in the law."

ACLU Texas' legal director **Adriana Piñon** said that while the two lawsuits address different legal claims, it's important to note that at their core, they both stem from Texas' disregard for the law. "At base, the actions that Texas is taking in implementing Operation Lone Star are completely unlawful. They're rife with human and civil rights abuses, and completely overlook the needs of the community and the humanity of people who are coming to our state."

SCHOOL'S BACK IN SESSION IN ROUND ROCK AND YOU KNOW WHAT THAT MEANS: DIRTY TALK

It's an irony of the book banning movement that the people who want to remove books from school libraries can't stop themselves from reading aloud what they describe as "pornography" in crowded school board meetings, often with children present.

The nationwide tactic was on display at **Round Rock ISD**'s first meeting of the school year, on Aug. 17. By this reporter's count, eight of the 48 people who spoke during the public comment portion of the meeting used their two minutes to read sex scenes from books they'd like to ban. It's tempting to quote the passages, but we'll refrain. (Of course, the speakers did not make an effort to show how the sex scenes fit into the narrative of the book.)

Several of the book banners, including **JIII Farris** and **Christie Slape**, who ran losing campaigns for the school board last year, wore T-shirts promoting Moms for Liberty, an organization widely described as a hate group. Most

began their remarks with a warning: "I will be reading an excerpt from a sexually explicit book in the Round Rock ISD libraries. This is inappropriate for children. They should be removed from the room immediately." No children were "removed," however, and when one of the book banners was admonished for using the word "fuck" she complained that she had told the children to leave.

Katie Kizer, social media coordinator for Access Education RRISD, questioned why the book banners are still harping on the issue, after the state's passage this legislative session of HB 900, which will ban books across the state. "It's clear that their only goal is to agitate," Kizer said. "But their tactics won't work here because parents are paying attention." Indeed, the book banners were decidedly outnumbered. Many parents expressed support for the district's librarians and opposition to banning books. Others were disinterested in the topic altogether. – Brant Bingamon

Here's how advocates' calls for action were and weren't answered **BY AUSTIN SANDERS**

By the morning of Aug. 16, the day City Council was set to approve a budget for fiscal year 2023-24, much of the \$5.5 billion spending plan had been cemented.

About \$1.4 billion would be allocated to the General Fund, which pays for city services like police, fire, Emergency Medical Services, parks, libraries, and housing assistance. GF expenditures are largely outlined by city management following a monthslong budget writing process that begins in February. For this year, the GF includes bud-

get line items proposed by Interim City Manager Jesús Garza, such as: \$80.9 million to respond to homelessness, \$6.1 million to buy generators for city facilities used as

shelters during extreme weather events, and \$4 million devoted to improving the city's permit review and Land Development Code amendment processes.

Council members – and the advocacy organizations that lobby them – get to fight over a much smaller portion of available GF revenues. A week before the budget adoption meeting, Council's budget wish list, represented in the form of budget amendments, totaled around \$18.7 million in ongoing expenditures. By the morning of the adoption meeting, the list shrank to around \$10 million – slightly more than the \$7.8 million in newly discovered revenue identified by staff that Council could use to fund priorities not included in Garza's base budget, proposed in July.

Some of the notable and non-controversial additions to the budget include: \$1.3 million to continue a guaranteed income program that will pay \$1,000 per month to 85 households over the next year, with no strings attached (proposed by CM Vanessa

Fuentes); additional funding to ensure the Austin Police Department can continue employing 10 Victim Services counselors who are currently paid through federal grants (proposed by CM Alison Alter); and an additional \$1.8 million in one-time funds added to the \$210,000 proposed by Garza that will be used to build shade structures in city parks (proposed by CM Chito Vela).

But Council members weren't in total agreement with one another on which of their budget amendments should be added into the budget, or even with all of Garza's proposed spending priorities. Unlike in previous budget years, little of that debate occurred on budget adoption day – instead, it played out behind the scenes and in previous budget workshops. By 3:30pm on Aug. 16, the budget had been adopted on a 10-1 vote. (CM Mackenzie Kelly voted against, saying that "certain budget items" deviated from the city's "core priorities.")

But the final hours leading up to Council's adoption of the budget did produce a fren-

zy over three issues prioritized by a coalition of progressive advocates: a reduced allocation to the city's emergency reserve fund, more funding for rental assistance, and

the cancellation of a personnel transfer that would move 37 civilian positions into the Austin Police Department. As Council heard from public speakers throughout the morning portion of the meeting, advocates including Chris Harris, Kathy Mitchell, Alycia Castillo, Awais Azhar, JP Connolly, and others – all of whom largely operate under the Equity Action banner – huddled together in the atrium at City Hall strategizing over how to persuade at least six CMs to support their aims.

PAYING RENT


First, let's begin with the emergency reserve fund. To close the gap on the money needed to fund amendments, Council began tussling over how much cash should be stowed away in the city's two emergency reserve funds - the Budget Stabilization Reserve Fund (BSRF) and the Emergency Reserve Fund. The former is maintained through transfers from General Fund departments and is intended to ensure city services can operate smoothly in the event of economic downturn; the latter will be shored up with reimbursements from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and Travis County and is reserved for disaster response (\$15.3 million was drawn from the fund to respond to Winter Storm Mara).

Until 2021, city policy mandated that allocations to both reserve funds total 12% of all ongoing General Fund expenditures. In 2021, Council – acting on a staff recommendation post-Winter Storm Uri – raised the reserve fund allocation to 14% of GF expenditures. In the FY24 budget, staff recommended increasing the BSRF allocation again, to 17%, with 10% going to the emergency reserve fund and 7% to the BSRF.

The allocations would total \$134.1 million and \$91.4 million, respectively. Staff advised Council that the increase was necessary due to the increasing occurrence of extreme weather events, requiring expensive disaster response that takes a long time to reimburse (the city expects some pandemic expenditures will not be reimbursed by FEMA until next fiscal year) and that maintaining a larger reserve could help Austin increase its credit rating, which was recently downgraded.

A 3-percentage-point increase may not seem like a lot, but in real dollars it's substantial; about \$40 million – or, put another way, more than enough to have funded all of Council's budget amendments. Advocates pressing for a lower reserve allocation argued that reducing the total transfer into each fund – even 1 or 2 percentage points – could free up tens of millions of dollars that could be spent on community needs that exist now. That immediate need should be prioritized, they say, especially while the national and local economy are strong.

Council did agree to lower the reserve fund allocations, but only by a little. The FY24 adopted budget will have the city maintain a reserve fund totaling 16.6% of GF expenditures, which freed up another \$4.7 million to use on services in this year's budget. The push from staff to increase the reserve fund allocation by a few percentage



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

points may seem trifling, but it reflects the sort of self-imposed budget austerity that justice advocates say harms low-income Austinites in urgent need of relief.

Take the \$1.6 million Council ultimately approved for the city-funded rental assistance program called I Belong in Austin (IBIA). A coalition of progressive advocates first pressed Council to allocate \$12 million in rental assistance, but they knew that would be a stretch. When Garza's proposed budget offered just \$250,000 for the program, advocates pushed for \$7.8 million - equivalent to what Council approved in the last budget. The number was knocked down, again, to around \$4 million before Council consensus around the \$1.6 million allocation was reached.

But tenant advocates fear that renters struggling to avoid eviction will suffer from the lower allocation, especially as federal- and state-funded rent programs dry up. El Buen Samaritano, the nonprofit that has administered IBIA since 2021. reports having served 385 households with \$1.7 million during that time (from 2020-2022, the Relief of Emergency Needs for Tenants federal program delivered about \$77 million to nearly 19,000 households in need of rent relief). Most of the IBIA funds were given to households earning 30% or less of Austin's Median Family Income (\$20,800 for a single person), with 35% going to Black Austinites and 37% to Latinos. Nearly all of the funds were delivered to households on the Eastside.

The city said it could not provide a singular estimate for the amount of monthly rental assistance needed in Austin because "many variables exist when determining vulnerable tenants' need for rental


assistance," such as "medical needs, job loss, [and] disasters." But a budget amendment form submitted by Vela says Housing Department staff estimated the amount of funding needed at \$1 million per month, based on disbursements from similar programs in the past. Beyond that, a 2022 HousingWorks report found that 50% of Austin residents are renters and 35% of renters spend more than 30% of their income on housing (so a little over 160,000 Austinites). In June, El Buen had to pause intake for IBIA because the program ran out of money.

To meet the clear need for rental relief, Council authorized a contract extension with El Buen to continue IBIA for another three years, at a total cost of \$17.8 million. The first year of the contract (\$7.8 million) is fully funded thanks to the IBIA allocation in the FY23 budget, but year two (\$5 million) is only 32% funded through the \$1.6 million allocated in FY24, and year three is completely unfunded. If Council doesn't authorize more funds before the current allocations run out (likely sometime next summer), then the program will once again go dark. El Buen anticipates intake to resume no later than

early September; with the \$9.4 million in funding available to them, they expect to serve about 1.670 families.

For Awais Azhar, a housing advocate at City Hall last week, the new rental assistance funding Council approved is welcome, but not enough. "As a community, it is critical to ensure that we expand funding for IBIA so these services are provided without a gap to vulnerable Austin residents who may otherwise be forced to leave their homes and communities because they do not have money to pay rent or relocate to housing nearby."

WHO KEEPS APD'S RECEIPTS?

If Council failed to fund rental assistance at the scale of community need, as advocated for by progressive groups, they did respond to community organizations skeptical of Garza's plan to transfer a number of civilian positions into APD. In his proposed budget, Garza suggested moving into APD 25.5 positions from Human Resources, eight positions from Building Services, and four positions from the Public Information Office.

The stated reason from Garza's administration for the transfers was to improve operational efficiency. At the budget adoption meeting, Assistant City Manager Bruce Mills, who oversees the city's three public safety departments, said that shortly after he was brought on, some officers did not receive their overtime pay on time. Mills and Garza recommended moving the HR employees – who were mostly working on APD payroll anyway – into the police department to prevent something like that from happening again. Similar reasoning was applied to the Building Services and PIO positions.

But advocates with Equity Action, the coalition of progressive advocates that authored the Austin Police Oversight Act approved by voters in May, were skeptical. They argued that by creating more internal recordkeeping positions, APD could block the Office of Police Oversight from accessing some of those records, based on one interpretation of Chapter 143 of the Texas Local Government Code, which broadly outlines what civilian oversight of police can look like in Texas. The city's Law Department disagreed with this legal interpretation, but CM Chito Vela pushed for a budget amendment to cancel the personnel transfer. Mayor Kirk Watson, who told his colleagues that he didn't think the transfer would "make changes to the openness and transparency" of APD records, voted against the amendment – along with CMs Leslie Pool, Alison Alter, and Mackenzie Kelly.

The successful defeat of the Garzainitiated transfer is interesting for another reason: because it offered a small view into the increasing tensions over how Garza thinks the city of Austin government ought to be run and how some of his bosses – the 11 elected members of the City Council – think it should be run.

"Let me weigh in a little bit," Garza said, preparing to launch into the kind of mini civics lesson that he has delivered to his bosses on occasion. Two decades ago, when Garza was city manager the first time, organizational shuffles like this "would be consent and routine," Garza said, because "under the charter, the manager has complete and total control over personnel policies." This Council doesn't seem to grasp this, from Garza's perspective. "While you have that power." Garza continued, "it really undermines this form of government. Whoever sits in this seat after I leave has to be able to move the boxes the way they need to move them so that this organization is responsive and meets the demands of not just some of the public, but all of the public."

Despite Garza's chastising, the Vela amendment was approved. It marked the one outright victory progressive advocates secured in their final push for a budget that, from their perspective, better meets the needs of the Austin community. They also secured more rental assistance than staff initially offered, but not enough to sustain the program through the fiscal year. They failed to convince city leaders to sock less money away in savings so that more could be spent serving the Austin community now.

"It's a needlessly austere budget," Austin Justice Coalition Policy Director Chris Harris told us. "With the increase to the police department budget, we now have millions of dollars that are harder or impossible to access. When you compare the amount of funds taken off the table by staff with what Council approved through budget amendments, it's a real pittance. A small amount of money was ultimately put toward community investments."

In the future, Harris continued, "Council should better engage with stakeholders in how these funds are allocated before making these decisions that are very hard or impossible to reverse."

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

Die Felicia Crawls Back in the Coffin

Wear your best widow's weeds as Louisianna Purchase closes the crypt on the horror-themed drag show

In February 2016, a crypt opened on Chicon Street and out crawled Die Felicia: a goth horror drag show, staged at the now-defunct Badlands lounge, by former pro-wrestler Zane Zena and drag performer Louisianna Purchase. Over seven years later, that crypt closes on Red River, where the very last Die Felicia show will perform its swan song at Elysium on Friday, Aug. 25.

Louisianna Purchase has continued to host Die Felicia through the years, both solo and currently with the inventive Gothess Jasmine. According to the star of season 3 of reality/game show The Boulet Brothers' Draaula on Shudder, a year-round maca-

bre, horror-based show like Die Felicia didn't exist until they and Zane pitched it. "Zane Zena and I were frustrated with only getting to do the drag we loved in October or for Halloween

shows," they recalled. "It was a much different drag landscape then, and we had to make our own opportunities happen."

Opportunity came in the form of then-venue Badlands taking the pitch, and the audience for horror drag quickly came after. Louisianna remembered the whole space being packed tight, with former Austin freak icons like Christeene attending. This oneof-a-kind show drew all the curious people in, they said. During its run, Louisianna earned Best of Austin accolades for Best Drag Performer in town seven years in a row.

With Die Felicia being their longest-running show, Louisianna has seen their beloved creature take on many forms. "We've always had an open door policy," they said, "so the cast has morphed and changed over the years. I also think it's good to have new talent come in and shake things up." Greats of the Die Felicia stage include Sticky Gold, who Louisianna pointed to when asked about their favorite performances. The "master of illusions" impressed them with her incredible transformations into the Blair Witch and House of 1000 Corpses' Captain Spaulding. Another cast highlight includes Louisianna's fellow Dragula alum Evah Destruction. Louisianna credits the horror drag competition show with not only bringing Evah into their life but also beefing up the audience for Die Felicia's style of drag. "The crowd that had been faithful to the show, since the beginning became even more so," Louisianna said. "It was exciting for the fans to see their local Queen get bigger and enjoy more opportunities."

Die Felicia has featured multiple special segments **DIE FELICIA'S LAST RITES!** that played on the cast and Fri., Aug. 25, 10pm audience's love of horror Elysium, 705 Red River trivia. "After becoming the sole hostess, I started Horrorpiece Theatre,

which is a segment where a classic horror film is parodied by us," Louisianna said, "and our gameshow Wheel of Death." The secret to Die Felicia's success were those interactions, Louisianna claimed. "[If] you want a show that lasts you've got to form connections with your audience," they said. "I want them to feel welcomed, safe, and that there is a space for the gothy scary movie loving drag fans in Austin."

As sunrise hits the mausoleum, the oncethought immortal Die Felicia must return to its metaphorical coffin - but that's no reason to shed a blood tear, Louisianna said. "It's my longest running show that I've created, and I want to see her go out while she's on top," they explained. "I also never want to feel beholden to anything, and stopping Die Felicia allows me to grow and take on new projects." Having seen many seasons of drag magic pass through Austin, "I also hope to see some of the younger/new drag performers who love

horror," Louisianna said, "bring something new and refreshing." Perhaps a witch- or vampire-themed show, which Louisianna counts as their favorite childhood horror themes. They remain tight-lipped about their own next night move besides teasing a few upcoming mystery one-off events. However, fans should note that Louisianna will be celebrating 10 years of drag this October at Cheer Up Charlies.

To all the die-hard Die Felicia fans weeping over the show's grave, Louisianna sends a message of immense gratitude. "I hope they know I love them very much," they said. "I created the house and they filled it with their screams, enthusiasm, and love! There's a lot of pieces to making Die Felicia work, and while it's a lot of work, I've loved bringing audiences a show that is groundbreaking to Austin."

Don't sleep on this new group show by wayne alan Brenner

Lying in bed on a sweltering summer's night, conscious mind shifting toward the wonders of dreamtime, you'd be fortunate to witness such visions as are held within the air-conditioned rooms of Davis Gallery's new group show. "Late Summer Dreams."

The collection showcases recent work by 34 Central Texasbased artists – longtime members of the gallery's family of creative makers – offering fresh takes on painting, mixed media, assemblage, sculpture, and photography, decking the walls and plinths of the gallery with vividly wrought renditions of the waking world and more.

It seems appropriate that this exhibition's subjects are often images or embodiments of the outdoors, as if offering the heat-wracked environment and its denizens a respite from the furnace that Texas has lately become. There are David

Everett's color woodcuts of avians – a kingfisher, a woodpecker, a caracara – chilling on one wall near the pedestal that holds his polychromed wood sculpture called *Eventide* that captures a barn owl in midflight. There are Jan Heaton's large watercolors of botanical abstractions, colorful shards from a garden of delight, bringing framed floral lines and hues to the Davis verticals. Denise M. Fulton's realist oils on panel capture the beauty of local trees, each one like the candid photo of an old friend, especially her *Pease Park*. And *Nest Egg II* by Fallon Bartos is a three-dimensional wonderment of bamboo, geode, and gold leaf.

It's not all about the outside coming in, though. Sometimes it's about who's done what to the outside and the people who once

lived there. Dana Younger's *Legends of the Lone Ranger* pieces are high-relief portraits, rendered in polyurethane and wax, comprising a series of American presidents – John Tyler, James Polk, Martin Van Buren, and Andrew Jackson, each wearing a domino mask – who presided over this country's early westward expansion.

"I'd like people to take another look at our shared history," said Younger. "Each president did something that made westward expansion possible, but at a great cost to our natural or cultural resources. I like the mask because it can be good or evil, depending on your perspective. I hope that humor, familiarity, and

the unexpected will draw viewers in and get them thinking."

The undulating lengths of Caprice Pierucci's entanglements of polished wood are equally organic and engineered, providing rhythmic punctuation throughout the gal-

lery – between the more representational works, the playful paper foldings of B Shawn Cox, the meticulous found-object constructions of Randall Reid, the painted-paper patternings of Amy Banner Updegrove, the surreally evocative assemblages of John Sager.

And – we might say finally, though there are more artists to discover in these storied rooms – there are the sculptures of Steve Brudniak. These are the stuff of mad scientists' dreams in any season: painstakingly wrought from antique laboratory equipment, sliced and spliced, transmogrified into apparatuses that aren't merely inside a contemporary space, but seem ripped from technology that might've existed in a more steam-powered future that we unfortunately dodged.

Pay a visit to "Late Summer Dreams" at Davis Gallery, though, and the only thing you'll dodge is the oppressive Texas sun, all while treating your waking life to a variety of wonders seldom glimpsed while conscious.

A STORM FRONT IS MOVING

IN: a *creative* storm front, that is. (Sorry to all those hoping for rain.) The **Front Festival**, a gathering/celebration of women and LGBTQ creators, hits Austin **Aug. 31** and moves throughout Labor Day weekend at the **Contemporary Austin**, **Cheer Up Charlies**, and the **LINE Austin** hotel.

According to Executive Director **Jane Hervey**, the initial Front Fest was a **singleday warehouse party** with more than 50 artists. The 2016 happening, however, was shut down early due to a lack of electricity. "I'd say we have come a very long way."

Hervey explains. "We're still grassroots and DIY, but we've had a bit more time and experience as an organization of creative producers to bring the whole thing together."

Seven years later, Front Fest continues to celebrate local artistry, albeit on a slightly longer timetable. The fest kicks off with a joint poolside venture between the fest and local **DJ Suxxy Puxxy**'s pulse-pounding party **Perreo Club** on Aug. 31. This year's festival splits its offerings between a Sept. 1 film showcase at the Contemporary at Laguna Gloria, featuring **15 films** by women and LGBTQ+ creators as well as a magic performance by **Black Girl Magic**, and a Sept. 2 music showcase held at CUC, with DJ sets, Latinx and Houstonian drag, mariachi, and a performance from **Grace Sorensen**.

Programs Coordinator **Wilhermina Beauchamp** points to Sorensen as her personal highlight as she's followed their work for a while, but the rest of the lineup fills her with just as much excitement. And the excitement continues in the post-fest proliferation of creativity. "[Post]-festival, we often see the results of connections that were made during," Beauchamp says. "New projects and ideas start bubbling up, the artists are more visible to the community as a whole, interesting conversations are had, and new friendships begin to form!"

Bolstering the work of women and LGBTQ creatives is the goal of Front Fest's creator org **Future Front Texas**, which is why they also run the **Creative Future of Texas Fund**. This grant program offers \$10,000 in micro-grants to a community starved of financial support by the state of Texas. As a group who also needed support to get off the ground, Future Front and by extension Front Festival know the imperative nature of providing funds to small creators. "That's how new skills turn into lifetime vocations," the organizers say. "That's how a neighborhood block party turns into an annual festival and community tradition."



DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

El Camino Real Visitor Center is a hidden gem among a gold mine of historic structures around **Goliad**.

The one-story sandstone keeper's cottage was the first building constructed when the **Civilian Conservation Corps** arrived in 1936 to reconstruct **Mission Espíritu Santo** and build the adjacent **Goliad State Park**.

Architects **Samuel Charles Phelps Vosper** and **Raiford L. Stripling** used the cottage that would also be their office during construction of the park as a studio to test methods and designs for the mission reconstruction.

The cottage is small, but holds a number of treasures. Inside the front door is a "log staircase," even though there is no second floor. The alternate steps are smaller than a usual staircase and were used by the Spanish for access in tight spaces like a belfry.

Look closely around the house and notice all the different construction elements: No two doors are alike, as the architects experimented with designs; likewise with the various styles of tiles commissioned from Mexico.

The keeper's cottage only takes a few minutes to go through and reveals some wonderful surprises. There are also displays explaining the area's part of the **Camino Real de Tejas** from Mexico City to Louisiana.

Stripling had a prolific career as an architect. Straight out of college he worked on buildings at UT and Texas A&M before coming to Goliad. In



1963, he directed the reconstruction of **Presidio La Bahía** across the river from the mission. He had an architectural firm in **San Augustine** specializing in historic preservation before he passed away in 1990.

El Camino Real Visitor Center is open free of charge daily from 9am to 4pm. It is a short distance north of the state park on the opposite side of U.S. Highway 183 next to the ballfields.

Austin FC goalkeeper Brad Stuver, in the final minute of the club's blowout loss to St. Louis CITY FC on Sunday, threw the ball straight at St. Louis forward Samuel Adeniran, who immediately shot the ball past Stuver for the expansion club's sixth goal of the night. It both sealed the record for the most goals scored against Austin FC in a single match and also revisited old trauma from the season opener, when Kipp Keller passed the ball straight to Jared Stroud for a costly and inexplicable goal.

Sunday's match, Austin FC's first in three weeks, always had the feel of a tone-setter. After trading Diego Fagúndez during the break and learning some hard truths about last season courtesy of new Sporting Director Rodolfo Borrell, the club had a chance to reset the narrative and back up claims that, despite the optics of an impending rebuild, Austin FC is still a threat to make some noise this season. Instead, a 6-3 loss had the club looking itself in the mirror and wondering what the hell happened.

"Our reactions need to be better. When we give up goals, bad passes, things happen, we got to move on. We got to stand up and be men and, you know, take accountability," substitute striker Will Bruin said. "I don't think this is a game that we just say we move on from. I think this has to hurt because we gave up six goals."

Stuver's mistake, coming in the dying moments of a match in which ATXFC already trailed by two goals, did not affect the outcome, but it did serve as a symbolic reminder of that fact that six months on from season start, the club is now more or less back to square one. With 10 games left in the MLS regular season, El Tree sits right on the hinge point of the Western Conference playoff race, in seventh but just two points above 10th (the first position left out of the postseason). Momentum, which the club had in droves before MLS hit pause last month for the Leagues Cup tournament, is nonexistent, and the club's 2023 identity is now more unclear than ever.

Perhaps the familiar battleground of Copa Tejas is exactly what Austin FC needs to get itself on track when it takes on FC Dallas in a hugely important match in Frisco Saturday night. The Verde and Black raised the trophy in the Toyota Stadium loading dock a year ago and has a chance to repeat the scene with a win this weekend. But really, the bigger prize on the line is three points toward the playoff race. Dallas currently holds that 10th spot in the standings, looking to vault at least one team to entrench itself in a playoff position. If Austin FC isn't careful, it could be that team that gets leapfrogged.

The road trip is sure to be a particularly significant one for Austin FC midseason acquisition Matt Hedges. The veteran center back spent 11 all-star caliber seasons in the red and white of FC Dallas, including as the club's captain for several seasons. He'll be making his Toyota Stadium return for the first time as a visitor and in-state rival.

Given the recent state of Austin FC's defense, Hedges will almost certainly have a big role in determining whether the Verde and Black make the trip back down I-35 empty-handed, or with a trophy, three points, and much-needed momentum in tow.

Revenge of the New Nerds

The *Shiva Baby* team reunites for ridonkulously horny queer comedy *Bottoms* BY LINA FISHER

BOTTOMS

Man, Emma Seligman just gets it. The teen experience, the teen gay experience, the gross and shameful and liberating catharsis of blood-

lust and extremely silly horniness. In an increasingly bland last few years of sanitized, touchy-feely queer teen movies, in *Bottoms* Seligman gives us a high school sex romp with some actual punch.

As the star of Seligman's breakout debut, *Shiva Baby*, and co-writer here, Rachel

Sennott is fast becoming Seligman's muse. She would steal the show as PJ, with her predictably dazzling, commanding presence, if it weren't for the equally snort-inducing, wry Ayo Edebiri (of FX show *The Bear*) as Josie, the more measured of the two BFFs. PJ and Josie are on the same quest that Seth and Evan are in *Superbad*: to get some cooch before high school ends. It's difficult – people hate them not because they're gay, but because they're "gay, ugly, and untalented." When a lie about them spending time in juvie goes too far, they decide to capitalize

on the cred and start a fight club to teach girls self defense, and hopefully make out with them.

The rest of the cast not only keeps up, but each is memorably weird in their own way. We've got concerningly emotional tweaker girl, openly freaky religious girl, a bomb-obsessed sidekick, pansexual cheerleader,

supportive deadbeat teacher and club sponsor Mr. G (Lynch), and of course, Jeff (Galitzine), boyfriend of Josie's love interest Isabel (Liu) and the fruitiest football star to ever vibe to "Total Eclipse of the Heart" while his house gets egged by a bunch of gay losers. Like *Freaks and Geeks*, the ensemble doesn't have a weak link. The villainous football players are hilarious, playing up the queer undertones of sports hero worship and fragile masculinity. It's not an understatement to say that

Bottoms may go down in cinema history right alongside its favorite influences - Superbad and American Pie. But what sets Bottoms apart from its predecessors in buddy comedy is its camp, which is closer to But I'm a Cheerleader. It doesn't bother with subtly ragging on behaviors of teen males; it fully overplays them, characters commenting on their own archetypes, but never in a pedantic way. The more serious notes underpinning the script. nods to the darker side of being a teen girl, are neither dwelled on nor brushed off. Instead. they're just presented as a part of life, as much as wanting to bang a hot cheerleader. Not to overcomplicate, but I do think there's an aspect of the abject feminine here, which has recently been explored more in horror where girls are allowed to be evil and disturbed. In Bottoms, they're disturbed like the horndogs of John Hughes movies, like an older version of Pen15.

I could say *Bottoms* shines because it nods to nostalgia but feels totally of our time, or expertly inhabits the buddy comedy genre formula while providing its own absurdist twist – but most importantly, it is simply, joyfully, ridonkulous.

NEW REVIEWS ⇔ The Eternal Memory


Time is elusive in the Chilean documentary *The Eternal Memory*. When the film opens, a woman is gently waking a man from sleep. There are no title cards, nothing signifying where we are in their timeline. But there are clues. The woman has set up the camera bedside by herself, which we will eventually come to recognize as the time during COVID lockdown, about a half-dozen years into the man's Alzheimer's diagnosis. The frame is just out of focus, a happenstance illustration of art imitating life, or the other way around. His grasp of things is fuzzy, too. As he slowly rouses, he doesn't remember her, but he reacts warmly to this lovely woman telling him the bullet points of his life, reminding him of their shared history as husband and wife.

"Without memory, there is no identity," the Chilean journalist Augusto Góngora wrote in 1989's Chile: The Forbidden Memory, an anthology documenting the dark days under Pinochet. During the dictatorship, Góngora worked clandestinely in alternative media, an antidote to the state's scrubbed version of the news: after the return to democracy, Góngora became a preeminent culture journalist, documenting Chile's returning/evolving sense of identity. Which is all to say: If you're going to make a movie detailing one man's excruciating loss of memory, what luck - a cruel word for the circumstance, and we'll come back to it - for the man in guestion to have spent his professional life reflecting on the meaning of memory and its essentialness.

We'll go one further: What luck for him to be married to a woman like Paulina Urrutia, an actress and arts advocate with a trilling laugh and determination to keep her husband rooted in reality for as long as possible. We see her initiate conversations with a sense of play – following him to wherever his mind has drifted or tenderly coaxing him in another direction, exercising his mind like she does his body – and incorporating him into social and professional moments, normalizing his presence in a way that is so contrary to the way dementia patients are often treated by society.

Director Maite Alberdi became the first Chilean woman to earn an Oscar nomination with her previous film, 2020's The Mole Agent; another nomination for The Eternal Memory seems preordained. (In January, it was awarded the World Cinema Grand Jury Prize for Documentary at the Sundance Film Festival.) Skillfully interweaving archival footage (the benefit of profiling two people who've led very public lives), home movies, and fly-on-the-wall observations of the couple at home, The Eternal Memory is a deeply intimate portrait, shot by a crew of three – Alberdi plus a sound engineer and director of photography – until COVID struck and Urrutia becomes the only person there to record Góngora's worsening dementia. Even as his mind goes, he still feels the warmth of her love and care. When that disappears, it is devastating.

The couple never explains on camera why they consented to the documentary, to have their most vulnerable moments documented, though in press materials the filmmaker has said that Góngora and his family saw the value in recording the progression of his disease. Truly, it is elucidating for folks who've never seen dementia up close, and guttingly familiar to those who have. But even more profound is the film's record of a remarkable love. There is such tenderness there, such obvious joy they take in being together. To get to witness that bond, even - or especially - as everything else falls away, I count myself lucky indeed. - Kimberlev Jones ****

GOLDA

The first shot of Israeli Prime Minister Golda Mier (Mirren) is a close-up of her lighting a cigarette. That prop might as well be a character in Golda. Gus Nattiv's wartime thriller of the Yom Kippur War of 1973. Mier is on her way to a panel where she will defend the choices made during the war, and the cigarette represents her calculated nature, the chemical stick that feeds into her edge, that strength she presents to the men around her that motions to them that she's not one to be fucked with. She is the "Iron Lady of Israel," after all.

Throughout Golda, Mirren does a lot of smoking and rumination in steel gravish-blue rooms and on top of washed-out beige buildings. The color treatment is cold and biting, used to convey the dire nature of the conflict Mier had to navigate. Mirren is an actress who can usually make the most average of films somewhat compelling just by her sheer presence, but there's something off about Golda. Mirren, caked in makeup, is unable to utilize much of her face.

The prosthetics plastered on her make her features stiff and unmoving, from her tough jowls to her accordion neck. There's nothing about Mirren's appearance that looks real:



She's a moving statue, with her eyes working overtime to translate any kind of emotion onscreen. Then, of course, there's the fact that Mirren is not even Jewish, and when you add that into the mixture it's hard to understand the decisions behind casting such a slender woman to play Mier. Even the cast around her feels a bit wasted and watered down - particularly Lior Ashkenazi, who has been a force in such movies as Foxtrot and Big Bad Wolves.

A gripping performance from Mirren could have salvaged a film that, for a thriller, is tremendously slow-paced. The film feels like it came out of an undergrad film program – pristine lighting, creeping pans, and perfect match edits. Yet although Golda is competently made, there's a sterile nature to its clean filmmaking. While there are a lot of cigarettes being smoked, there's no actual grit to the film, a quality Golda so desperately needs to generate the level of intensity for which Nattiv (director of the Oscar-nominated short "Skin") strives. It's a chamber drama with no tension, a funnel for a history lesson. There's no claustrophobia, and an even lesser sense of urgency, which is astounding given the incredibly short timeline of the Yom Kippur War - lasting only 18 days from first offensive by the Arab coalition to the cease-fire.

Golda isn't a failure of skill, but one of vision. Nattiv and writer Nicholas Martin deliver a biopic that feels like a complete misfire. Stale and without any sense of self, Golda unfortunately does nothing for Israel's only female prime minister.

In Richard Hammond's memoir On the Edge, he wrote, "All of us, each and every one, lives a life that is, in its own right, an epic." Hammond, a television presenter most well-known for his work on the BBC's Top Gear and subsequently

Amazon's The Grand Tour, wrote this line after his devastating car crash that almost claimed his life. In Gran Turismo, Jack Salter (played by Stranger Things fan favorite David Harbour) constantly reminds Jann Mardenborough (Madekwe) of the risks of race car driving, and lives in fear that his ultimate failure will result in his death, or that of another.

Gran Turismo is Chappie director Neill Blomkamp's return to the big screen after over a dozen online shorts and 2021's sci-fi supernatural thriller Demonic. It's a biopic about Mardenborough: a real teenager who was offered the chance to become a professional race car driver based off his excellence in the racing stimulation video game of same name. Packing up his baggage, daddy issues and all, he leaves his life behind in Cardiff, Wales, to compete with fellow sim drivers to drive for Nissan and obtain his professional license to race for a living.

Gran Turismo coasts through Mardenborough's trials with some ease, and the race to the finish line is sometimes on the predictable side. Yet there's a clean kind of excitement watching Blomkamp's direction of the races that somehow keeps the movie pedaling forward, a swift momentum that hits the right beats to make Mardenborough's story an entertaining one.

A solid sports movie, after all, is often easy to get sucked into. Rags-to-riches stories are classic because it's easy to keep rooting for the underdog, especially in a sport where money equates to success an obscene amount of the time. The stakes of racing keep it nail-biting, and Blomkamp does his best to inject that sense of adrenaline into Gran Turismo. For the most part it works - every race Mardenborough competes in is stimulating, with smooth camera movements and editing that propel each scene forward.

The dangers of racing are emphasized so often, though, that when Mardenborough finally finds himself in a horrific crash, the weight of the scene doesn't stick as much as it should. There's not an easy way to tastefully re-create an accident that claimed someone's life, but Blomkamp does his best to showcase the emotional baggage Mardenborough carries with him after the wreckage. A solemn speech given by Salter gets our racer back on his feet, but Gran Turismo is too entrenched in its own PR stunt to dig deeper into the psychological effects such an accident might have had on Mardenborough.

Gran Turismo is perhaps a more basic film for Blomkamp, but a welcome reminder that his breakthrough first feature District 9 wasn't a fluke. He manages to give a film that is more or less an ad for a video game a little bit of heart. He brings Mardenborough's story to life, and it's as sweet as it is thrilling, giving his victory of becoming a professional race car driver the epic treatment he deserves.

Kids should like this brewery. They had [spring riders and mulch] but it was pretty small. My parents had fun because they talked a lot and laughed together with their friends. – **Tallulah**

It's really a brewery that's best for like 6-, 7-, 8-, and 9-year-olds, but maybe a middle schooler would like the tacos there. – Enzo

Like Laz Original on East Sixth, Laz 2's menu is Mexican street food-themed, which, of course, kicks all kinds of ass with a Prodigal Pils, at least to a bunch of 40-year-olds wishing they were disembarking a cruise ship in Mazatlán rather than drinking by a feeder road. But the kids were happiest with the thick-glassed bottles of Mexican Coke and the juice boxes.

I ate queso [Dad Note: It's fundido] and played hide-and-seek and that's good for little kids. **– Theo**

I didn't like the queso, it's like glue. [Dad Note: It's fundido, dammit! And it's freaking good, just eat it!] It's not the type of queso I like, too thick, but they did have the oversized bottles of Mexican Coke. **– Enzo**

I liked the queso, I mean, it's queso! And I drank a juice box. **– Tallulah**

Yeah, I think Lazarus is pretty good for families. Just one family though, maybe one other family too. But three kids is the limit. – **Theo**

HI SIGN BREWING Beergardigans' Brewery Grade: B+ 730 Shady, hisignbrewing.com

At first I thought I was gonna die of sweat on the patio, but then we went inside and it was very cold. **– Theo**

I'll say this about modern taprooms: They come with AC now. Taprooms used to be these industrial workspaces, but now they're handsome, frigid lounges. Turns out this is the kind of setting the kids were wanting all along. I feel like that 1960s boomer dad who brought home a brand-new Plymouth Satellite with ozone-depleting refrigerant. You see, kids! We're not sweating all the way to Magic Mountain this year!

We are usually outside at breweries so it was nice to be inside for once. I liked the long tables because you can fit a lot of people and toys. They didn't have a playground but I brought my own Barbies. – **Tallulah**

There was no room to play on the ground so you had to sit at a table. – **Theo**

There weren't really any activities for kids. The tables were good, and it was cold in there, which is good for Austin. **– Enzo**

I'm convinced that the first-ever food truck was a brewery life hack finding a way for people to keep buying Pilsners while gorging on tacos. A good brewery food truck is as valuable as a great tap list, even if it's less flexible and diverse. You don't want roadkill sushi for lunch, kids? Tough! Fortunately, Hi Sign features two food trucks – Ranch Hand and Norte – and neither of them are demanding on a kid's palate.

Beergardigans the Third

More subjective taproom thoughts from Austin half-pints

The saying goes, "Many hands make light work." But as a father of three, I dare say that many *little* hands make light work seem gargantuan. This is why I often take a break from parenting and let a brewery handle 'em for a couple hours, giving all those fun-seeking Gen Zers in the taproom a little head start on parenthood. This is my public service to the beer industry: observable contraception.

No, actually, my li'l taproom tax refunds are super duper: calm, funny, well-behaved. No need to send any angry screeds to my editor. These kids are, in fact, the Beergardigans – Enzo, 11; Theo, 7; and Tallulah, 5 – Austin's half-pint brewery critics who are back for a third dash of taproom goofin', rating their experiences at the local beer mill that their parents drag them to on an early Saturday afternoon when their little minds and bodies are at their freshest.

This time around, the Beergardigans took a look at three highly regarded brewing institutions: Lazarus (Airport location), Oddwood, and Hi Sign. Places, one might note, that are not out in the rolling hills of Dripping Springs or among the industrial heat sponges of some of the more spacious warehouse-y places over by Q2 Stadium. Nope, these breweries are more urban by design, and as such, are less hospitable to hipstercore A-frame cedarwood playground sets and 5v5 soccer pitches. The Beergardigans would have to be extra creative in their own mindspaces this time around. But what else would we expect from Austin's perennial preteen brewery watchdogs but the very best opinions?

LAZARUS BREWING (AIRPORT) Beergardigans' Brewery Grade: A 4803 Airport, Iazarusbrewing.com

Oh, the blue brewery! – Theo

Authentic to local culture, the blue brewery replaced an iconic duplex in I Luv Video and ColdTowne Theatre with the only, ONLY(!) thing acceptable to neighborhood townsfolk: a place to drink \$7 beers. In 30 years, the "blue brewery" on Airport will be as iconic a landmark to the youngsters of Austin as a moontower or the last leaning house on Rainey.

I liked the lounge upstairs. It's so chill. It's the best part of the brewery. It's like a really good coffee shop. – **Theo**

We love the upstairs part the best. But the outdoors is not too hot because it's under shade. – **Tallulah**

How many Austin breweries build outdoor patios to flex their Gen X consciousness? All of them. How many erect bombastic metal and stained glass renditions of the Virgin Mary above the patio to silently judge our Christ-free Sunday fundays? Just this one. It does indeed provide great shade and anyone who's been in town longer than 30 seconds knows that you just can't drink

I got a burger and I ate it all up. Then I had another burger and I ate that one all up, too. I was pretty hungry and thirsty. The food was really good and I liked the [organic sparkling] soda. I had never tasted it before, but I liked it. So, I drank two. – **Tallulah**

They need a bigger drink selection for kids my age; Sprite, lemonade, Dr Pepper, something like that, because the soda was just OK. I didn't really like it. The hamburger was solid 8 out of 10, though. – **Enzo**

Visually, Hi Sign is stunning. It's the picture of what an urban taproom should be: engaged with its community, embedded in a walkable neighborhood. It is hip in the sense that many components contribute to a tight experience: cold beer, sleek furniture, good burgers and tacos, and you'll run into someone you'd been meaning to text anyway.

My parents had fun because there were other parents to talk to. They were smiling and talking about everything. And the wallpaper in the bathroom was really cool, too. **– Tallulah**

The painting of Downtown Austin on the wall really got my attention. I think my parents had fun there because they were talking a lot. I think I'd go to that brewery by choice if I was an adult. But my advice for kids? Bring a phone to play on. – **Enzo**

For kids, this brewery was just really family-friendly. Do you know what family-friendly means? It means it's really nice and no one says bad words, right? Even the grownups working there treat kids really nice. – **Theo**

ODDWOOD BREWING Beergardigans' Brewery Grade: A+ 3108 Manor Rd., oddwoodales.com



Oh yeah, I know Oddwood. It's one of my favorite places in the state. – **Theo**

We should really get this kid out to some more museums and such, but also, this little fella tells no lies. Oddwood is a staple of ours for its agreeable menu (pizza and Egyptian-/ Texas-style BBQ truck KG BBQ), their dazzling selection of drinks (Maine Root Root Beer in bottles for the littles, Pool Dad for the bearded one), and a free-play arcade game room cosplaying as the 1992 Iowan basement of your richest friend (*Sonic* 2!).

There's a bunch of old-school console games and NBA Jam was free. It seems like a brewery that my parents would have built. A very dad vibe. – **Enzo**



What Hole in the Wall's Freshly Inked 20-Year Lease Means for Other At-Risk Venues

The Iconic Venue Fund plans to dish out more aid, but needs time, additional funds **BY GENEVIEVE WOOD**

On August 15, the Austin Monitor reported that Hole in the Wall had acquired a new 20-year lease agreement with the help of \$1.6 million in aid from the city's lconic Venue Fund. Founded in December 2020 as a joint undertaking between the city and the semipublic Austin Economic Development Corporation, the lconic Venue Fund seeks to bolster venues, restaurants, and bars hit hard by skyrocketing real estate prices and COVID-induced business losses.

For decades, a dark cloud of closure threats has loomed heavy over the West Campus mainstay, with the venue shuttering its doors from July 2002 to May 2003 and narrowly avoiding a second closure in 2015. Signed in collaboration with real estate firm the Weitzman Group, the freshly inked contract will allow Hole in the Wall to remain open for its 50th anniversary next summer. Management remains in the hands of General Manager Austin Leos and owner Will Tanner.

"We're super grateful for sure – to the city, to the AEDC, and to everyone that came in and supported us," says Leos, who has managed the Drag venue for nine years. "We're a no-frills bar with a vibrant history and a vibrant community, and we're kind of a holdout on the street.

"You can see a band every single night here, and that's part of Austin's culture," he continues. "There are a lot of places that still do that, and I hope they apply as well." In November 2021, the AEDC released its first call for proposals to venues looking to receive funding for real estate related and/ or capital projects. By the spring of 2022, the entity had received 45 proposals, amounting to over \$300 million in need. The AEDC narrowed the applicants down to a short list of 14 spaces, four of which were music venues. On why Hole in the Wall was selected as the first venue to receive Iconic Venue Fund cash, AEDC Chief Transactions Officer Anne Gatling Haynes cited the urgency of the dive bar's expiring lease.

"They were prioritized because they were on a year extension, and they've been on year extension leases for a few years now," explains Gatling Haynes. "We knew that if we couldn't get something together that would help them feel confident to sign a lease for the long term, we would lose them, so they became one of the priority projects."

Funding for the Iconic Venue Fund does not derive from taxpayer dollars, but rather a combination of hotel occupancy taxes and a 2018 bond package designed to funnel funds into art-focused spaces. A variety of venues are eligible for consideration, so long as they reflect Austin's "unique character and brand," as per the fund's founding ordinance. Gatling Haynes says that the public should expect additional funding announcements in early fall.

"I wouldn't say there's anything that's ineligible right now," says Gatling Haynes. "We're trying to be as creative as possible,

but ultimately, we have to make sure that the sponsor of the dollars – the city – is comfortable with the way that we propose."

While the names of current candidates to next receive funding are not public, the lconic Venue Fund's founding resolution provided a list of potential priority venues including the Victory Grill, Broken Spoke, Continental Club, Hole in the Wall, Antone's, Stubb's, and others. Could the fund's intervention be the saving grace of such spots?

According to Gatling Haynes, the answer is yes, but with additional time and funding.

"In the past year, we've been working under the lconic Venue Fund to try and invest in as many [venues] as possible," she explains. "There are certainly some that we may not have money for immediately, but we're trying to help advance them so that when there is money we can actually invest in them.

"There are other active projects from that long list – in fact, all 14 are active," she continues of the program's short list. "We're not trying to get people off the list. On the contrary, we're trying to keep moving the projects forward as best as possible."

Gatling Haynes expressed AEDC's hope to receive additional funds from the city, as well as a desire to explore options for private partnerships. "We really need property owners to be our partners in this – we can't solve it with just city money. We don't have a line out the door of people that want to donate to the program yet, but we'd like to see the public and private come together with building this fund so we can actually do more projects."

As rent soars across town, many venues find themselves in a similar position to Hole in the Wall – strapped for cash and inching ever closer to looming end-of-lease dates. Gatling Haynes encourages venues who missed the most recent call for proposals to make their needs known to the AEDC.

"I know people will want to know, 'How can I apply?' There is no application process, but I am taking in content information and hearing what the high-level issues are," she says. "People can certainly contact me for more information. Again, we're busy doing these current projects and trying to get those across the finish line, but I'm happy to make sure I'm aware of what folks need us to know.

"The more I know what the needs are, the better we can at least advocate for new funds."

In April, the 58-year-old Broken Spoke received historical landmark designation with the help of AEDC's recommendation. Ginny White-Peacock, general manager and daughter of Broken Spoke founder James White, speaks highly of the city's recent efforts to maintain longstanding venues and hopes to benefit from the Iconic Venue Fund.

"We're so thankful for everything that the City Council has done for the Broken Spoke," says White-Peacock. "Without them, we couldn't have received the Historical Zone status.

"The Iconic Venue Fund is another way that the city can help out some of the legendary businesses like the Broken Spoke. Tourists come to Austin to visit these great places. They certainly don't come here to tour a bunch of condos."

The namedrop follows the quartet's March release of critically acclaimed *Miracle-Level*, their 17th studio album in 28 years. In keeping with Wizard Rodeo tradition, the genre-merging festival will also feature performances by its three founders and their respective outfits: Lindsey Verrill of dreamy folk duo Little Mazarn, Jesse Ebaugh of twangy groovers the Tender Things, and Kraut-country rocker Garrett T. Capps.



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NO DOGS OR COOLERS



Meet the laid-back ringleader behind Wild Child and Sir Woman's spiritual grooves BY DOUG FREEMAN

Kelsey Wilson floats into the Pershing in her familiar long black dress, and immediately the private Eastside club pops with a new energy.

Her band, Wild Child, soundchecks on stage, but gravity recenters as the singer wanders around the room with her strange combination of laid-back chill and com-

manding authority. The early April secret show serves as a trial run before Wild Child leaves for an East Coast tour. Dates are already selling out, and the band's new album, *End of the World*, plays in heavy rotation on Austin radio.

Yet none of this was really supposed to happen. After nearly 10 years and a rising national profile, Wild Child had effectively ended following the tour behind 2018's fourth LP, *Expectations*.

In fact, things had gotten so bad that Wilson nearly stepped away from music altogether.

"I didn't want to pick up an instrument, didn't want to write anything," Wilson confesses. "That was heartbreaking. Music has always been the only way I can express anything, but I needed to take a step back. It was very important that I figured out how to not lose that. I can't hate music."

Today's Wild Child is an entirely different animal from its previous incarnations. Whereas before the band sprawled informally with friends and family behind the anchoring duo of Wilson and Alexander Beggins, the outfit now tightens with Cat Clemons on bass, John Calvin Abney on guitar, and Micah Motenko on keys. But the biggest change is Wilson herself.

"I've been singing by her side for so many years, but she has this new kind of confidence and lightness on stage," notes Beggins. "She feels very at home in front of a big audience now. I see that she really feeds her soul from the live music. It's powerful." Wilson and Beggins kick off the Pershing show on familiar territory, pairing harmonies on the ukulele-strummed "Pillow Talk." Soon enough, though, Beggins steps to the side and Wilson takes center stage command. Her powerful voice growls with teeth on new songs like "Dear John," yet also rips open a vulnerable vein. Loose but suave, she

draws the crowd in less by singing to them than through them.

It's a side of Wilson now familiar through her other main project, Sir Woman. The powerhouse R&B- and soul-integrating pop band garnered Best New Act at the 2020 Austin Music Awards and took home Band of the Year in 2023. Together, Wild Child

and Sir Woman express two sides of Wilson – the former intimate and sincere, the latter a brazen,

funk-fueled dance party of defiant anthems. Both allow her to create the kind of healing experience that she believes music can encapsulate, for herself and her community.

"[She's] surrounding herself with people that she wants to be onstage with, musicians that are of a high caliber, and people that she wants to work with. You probably couldn't always say that about every lineup we've ever had," adds Beggins. "In order to feel that kind of freedom onstage, in the studio, it's all about building that community around her."

PARTY CITY

Patches of sunflowers spring in wild riot out front of Wilson's South Austin home. The nearly acre plot spreads like a bohemian oasis – part clubhouse, part hippie commune. Out back, a tentative treehouse overlooks a chicken coop made from the set of Sir Woman's "Party City" video as Wilson's sister, Helyn Rain, sets up for their weekly informal songwriters circle.

Inside, every inch of wall space seems covered with posters and photos and artwork, an intentional clutter. Sitting cross-legged on the floor of her home studio, Wilson reflects on the tension between her house as both a respite and a hub of constant activity.

"I grew up in a house with probably nine kids all the time, home-schooling, parents always there, just chaos," she laughs. "I went from that to compound living to touring in a van with eight people and sleeping on floors together. There was never ever solitude.

"The pandemic was such a mindfuck for me. It was incredible. Turns out, I don't want to be around 30 people all the time! But sure enough, when the world opened up again, I went straight back to it. I don't know how to be alone, still to this day."

The past five years presented a series of reckonings and resets for Wilson, who found her voice while moving into her 30s. Wild Child's 2011 debut, *Pillow Talk*, launched the band into a whirlwind of national success for which they were ill-prepared, a barrage of festivals and late-night shows, and a deal with Dualtone Records. (See "Aloha!" Nov. 8, 2013.)

Wild Child's appeal hinged on the charming chemistry between Wilson and Beggins as they plucked bittersweet folk-pop ballads. According to Wilson, however, an

increasingly chaotic scene swirled around the band.

"I was like, 'Damn, you guys are traveling around in a ukulele band playing for teenage girls and you're on crazy drugs," says Wilson. "The music was never gonna get to that place as long as half the band were on uppers and the other half were on downers. Zandy and I were always looking at each other like, 'This is terrible!'

"I ended up being just the mom of the compound," she recalls. "I ended up in like the caretaker, babysitter role, doing all the driving. I couldn't fire everybody, so I just fired myself."

SINKING SHIP

The stress of holding the band together wasn't Wilson's only inflection point for leaving Wild Child. Rather, the bigger pull came from wanting to create a new sound that didn't fit with the band's more winsome ethos.

"I knew the music that I wanted to make, sonically, but if the ukulele is fronting a band, you can't really veer too far from like folk/Americana," she says. "There's so much love there and I feel so indebted to fans of Wild Child, so I kept dedicating most of my time to Wild Child, even knowing that I needed another outlet. That was hard. I felt very, very guilty for a long time."

The catalyst came with Glorietta, a supergroup organized by Austin-based Delta Spirit bandleader Matthew Logan Vasquez that wrangled Adrian Quesada, Nathaniel Rateliff, David Ramirez, and Noah Gundersen, among others. Vasquez insisted Wilson join them in New Mexico to make the band's 2018 album, even as she balked at the opportunity.

"I wasn't gonna go, was fully like, 'No fucking way, that sounds terrifying," she laughs. "But I learned what I bring to the table that week. I had so much shame around the fact that I can't play guitar or piano or bass, and I don't know how to speak about music. But there's a place for what I do – the melodies and lyrics, just capturing emotion is what I'm really really good at.

"By the time we came back, I was like, 'It's on, I have so much to do.""

The subsequent hard-partying Glorietta roadshow didn't alleviate a lot of Wilson's den-mother impulses, but for the first time she was playing with professionals and unleashing a powerful, even joyous sound onstage. Expansion beyond the comforts of co-writing with Beggins unlocked a confidence. Back home, she began collaborating with multi-instrumentalist and producer Taylor Craft on what would become Sir Woman.

After Wild Child's 2019 tour, and with Sir Woman's first singles gaining traction, the tensions of Wilson's creative commitments finally crashed. Unsure of her next direction, and struck by her sister's death from an overdose, she walked away from all of it, just as the pandemic shut everything down. "My relationship with music was about to be destroyed," she reflects. "The songs that I liked the least were the ones that always did the best. I was starting to resent the [Wild Child] audience, in a way. And being around so much drug and alcohol abuse, it was just so much, and writing a song meant I was gonna have to deal with that."

HIGHROAD

Wilson's solution came from the opposite extreme. She stopped drinking and smoking, cut out caffeine and sugar, dedicated herself to meditation, and began exploring musical therapy based around frequencies. Launching into what she calls an intense "spiritual masochism," she tried hallucinogens, DMT, and ayahuasca.

"I was like, 'I have one year before I turn 30, and I'm just gonna fix generations of trauma and knock it all out," she laughs. "I came home completely broken. I just, like, broke my brain. Turns out you can't just schedule healing, no matter how clearheaded and prepared you think you are."

That spiritual journey did, however, feed into her music. She realized how Sir Woman could be an outlet for healing, confrontation, and catharsis. And audiences felt it, too. Whereas Wild Child hinged on heartbreak and yearning nostalgia, Sir Woman drives forward on deep grooves and celebratory independence.

"I was so intentional with the writing for Sir Woman, doing a lot of work around different keys that were good for different vibrations and organs in your body," Wilson explains. "If there was a song about speaking your truth or dealing with dishonesty, I would put it in the key of F, because that's your throat chakra. I basically was trying to turn pop music into medicine, but without anybody knowing."

2020's *Bitch* EP introduced Wilson's new sound with the exuberant soul blast of "Highroad," shifty beats and basslines of "Making Love," and slick anthemic statement of the title track. In 2022, Sir Woman's eponymous debut LP cemented the dance party vibe, with Wilson torquing like a gymnast through racing lyrics and soaring ballads.

Wilson's quick to credit Sir Woman's complex yet hook-laden sound to the collective of standout artists she's recruited in the band, though. The current lineup includes Erykah Badu drummer Cleon Edwards, Gary Clark Jr. keyboardist Jon Deas, bassist Montez Garner, and the powerhouse vocal duo of Spice and Uncle Roy (who recently launched their own project, US!).

"Kelsey loves to collaborate, and she's also the type of person who really, really loves to see people shine," offers Spice, who has taken an increasingly prominent role in the band alongside Roy. "She always pulls us forward, like we're all doing this together. She's not afraid to share that space at all, and I think that is a beautiful thing about her."

Glorietta's Vasquez echoes: "She knows that it doesn't have to be some big ego train, and in fact it's better when other people get involved. She realized at some point that she just can grab the reins herself, and be the boss. I feel lucky to have witnessed that transition."

Wilson likewise sees Sir Woman as a platform for building community as much as a band. Her role is less as mother these days than as ringleader and orchestrator. She's determined to use her success to open doors for others, like insisting on her bandmates as opening acts.

"I have a platform where I can make demands, so it's just a matter of demanding that space for them," says Wilson. "If I can make music I really believe in, with people that I love, and also make Austin just a tiny bit more diverse, I'll just keep doing that. It's a lot more work, it's a lot less money, but I get to do more damage in the music industry than anyone."

GET WHAT YOU WANT

Another Pershing evening, another black dress – this time with sunglasses and a gold robe. The private July show preludes Sir Woman's upcoming tour, part of Wilson's tireless schedule that has alternated runs between Wild Child and Sir Woman all summer.

Starting the show with gospel-infused "Good Lady," Wilson catches the club's attention with high trilling notes before the full sixpiece kicks into the wicked basslines and racing pulse of "Making Love." The audience begins to shift in their seats as Wilson lets the band lay into the groove. By the end of the evening, the crowd's packed the front of the stage, dancing wildly to "Blame It on the Water." "My focus with Sir Woman is really more [on] showcasing every piece of the band, so I'm steering that ship differently and it's a different show," Wilson allows. "I wrote music that's so complicated that I really have to focus on what I'm doing. I'm singing so fast, and the melodies are so hard, and I'm fronting a crazyass band – it's just bouncing the whole time. I'll start a Sir Woman show and I'll just black out, and then it's over."

Even amid the constant summer schedule, which has included playing Newport Folk Festival with Sir Woman and Blues on the Green with Wild Child, Wilson is plotting her next move. Unsure whether the Wild Child revival will continue beyond this season, she's still seeking balance between her whirlwind creative energy and necessary respite. As she prepares Sir Woman's sophomore LP, she's also leaning more into producing, including the debut EP from her younger sister, Skylar Rose.

"I'll always make records, but I think I'm a producer – write songs for other people, get the right players together, produce the albums," Wilson admits. "I don't have another 10 or 15 years on the road, not like active touring. There's just no way of balancing healthy relationships, spending time with family, taking care of your body and your mind.

"I could see, for Sir Woman, a couple more years of work and pushing another album," she adds. "So that's why this year is so crazy. I'd rather do a year of touring both bands than a year of each. I was just like, 'Get it all done at once,' like my spiritual masochism."

SUN JUNE'S STILL-LIFE "GET ENOUGH"

"It's a study for a painting." Dissonant drones pile on by the close of "Get Enough," Sun June's lead single for forthcoming third album *Bad Dream Jaguar* (releasing in October via Run for Cover). The sextet's follow-up to name-making 2021 LP *Somewhere* enters ears with a light tread as usual, Laura Colwell's hush contradicting the all-consuming love – and accompanying loneliness – she vocalizes. Here, the indie-pop group's knack for name-drops (Karen O, Patti Smith) expands with an imaginary reunion of the Beatles as a metaphor for something once lost. Sun-sweltered guitar licks tickle throughout, disrupting the still-life portrait Colwell imagines at track's end.

MEAT JOY, "ANOTHER PAIR"

As the 2008 *Chronicle* penned, Gretchen Phillips "co-founded the punk-concept, art-damaged spectacle Meat Joy, launching from there into high-profile lesbian post-folk superstar act Two Nice Girls." Delightfully cranky, brash, and bare-bones, the unearthed "Another Pair" announces the October reissue of Meat Joy's sole 1984 self-titled LP. The original lineup of Phillips, John Perkins (aka actor John Hawkes), Mellissa Cobb, Tim Mateer, and Jamie Spidle reunites, too, for two local fall gigs. On Bandcamp, Cobb says the blunt group lyrics were meant to encourage Spidle out of a sucky relationship. Spidle writes: "As the subject of this song I recall basically thinking at the time, 'Well, of course he wants to cheat on me! I'm lacking in boobs!" – Rachel Rascoe

EL COMBO OSCURO, "SOL Y TIERRA"

Just as "Guantanamera" defines the patriotic Cuban romanticism of the early 20th century, the sashaying cumbia rock of El Combo Oscuro keeps banging the keys of new millennial Latinx in ATX. As the local sextet continues working up its full-length bow, their singles jukebox cues up another guacharaca-esque rhythm: scratching percussion, whirling organ, and hip-gyrating choruses. "The light from the stars, the cosmos are in your eyes/ The galaxy is in your mind, we all return to earth," intones John Dell, also bandleading El Tule. Cooking underground pibil-style, we rise from said earth for the cosmic bump-n-grind of "Sol y Tierra." - Raoul Hernandez

HALF DREAM, "WILL I STILL BLOOM?"

"If I find myself somewhere in the middle, does that mean I'm just a little less special?/ Will I still bloom?" The Austin dream rockers look at themselves head-on in the mirror on their first release of 2023 and find a blazing existential crisis staring right back. Feverish basslines, soaring vocals reminiscent of Florence Welch, and a relentless drumbeat set the tone for earnest, cathartic angst. It's an aching, explosive listen, a primal shout into the void, and a sincere question to the heavens of what still lies in store. - Elizabeth Braaten

CURVED LIGHT, "II (AMBER)"

"Night dreams of day, light dreams of darkness," posts veteran ATX dreamweaver Peter Tran, whose Curved Light delivers both with every keystroke. Six cuts averaging eight minutes each, this month's digital full-length Patterns of Environments I refracts elemental ambience: azure, ruby, amber, amethyst, topaz, emerald. From kickoff "I (Ruby)" to crystalline closer "VI (Amethyst)," POEI pops. Second track "II (Amber)" washes synthesizers, plucks keyboards, and phases musical figures and pinging riffs. Like the LP, it sounds like weather, ever-shifting currents of earth and sea and sky captured in time-lapse pulses of energy and motion. - Raoul Hernandez CRUCIAL CONCERTS EDITED BY RACHEL RASCOE

TEMPLE OF ANGELS, MUJERES PODRIDAS

Guitarist Avery Burton recently gave Brooklyn Vegan a succinct rundown of his inspirational Texas music pals: "Victor Gutierrez (Impalers/Fugitive), Mike Sharp (Hatred Surge), Cole Tucker (TOA), all of our friends in Narrow Head, Nosferatu, Stunted Youth, legends Iron Age and Power Trip." With such hardcore connects, when I call Burton's new Temple of Angels record gushy, you might assume I mean in the abrasive lyrics and disgusting album art way. Rather, it's all head over heels, Eighties jangly, and effusively in love over here. Still making best punk lists despite

years of Cocteau Twins comparisons – not to mention fest placements like Sound and Fury and Not Dead Yet – Temple of Angels embraces Cure-ish pop anthems and windswept, powerhouse delivery from vocalist Bre Morell on July release *Endless Pursuit*. Their first new music in four years, the Run for Cover debut maintains gothic, shoegaze-twinkled tones for the heavy crowd. Recent press reveals that Morell, relocated to L.A. between releases, has moved back to Austin to join Burton, Tucker, and Patrick Todd. Proper homecoming, TOA reunites with Austin punk companions Mujeres Podridas, fronted by Dru Molina, and a new band of familiar DIY players, Touch Girl Apple Blossom, led by Olivia Garner. – *Rachel Rascoe*

DJ CHICKEN GEORGE BENEFIT Empire Control Room & Garage, Saturday 26

The GoFundMe campaign Help Chicken George Kick Cancer currently sits at a whopping \$82.625 thanks to the 821 donors. fundraising just \$7,375 short of its ultimate goal. That absolutely reflects the beloved status of sound architect Jeff Henry, who deep in the pandemic found himself diagnosed with cutaneous T-cell lymphoma, a rare form of skin cancer. DJ for jazztronic MCs Third Root, DJ Chicken George helped define Austin's funk and rap scenes with deep grooves and thick sonics, all co-signed by the homegrown, heavyweight all-stars headlining this benefit: Riders Against the Storm, Blackillac, Third Root, and Adrian Quesada. - Raoul Hernandez

BÖNDBREAKR, THROAT PISS Mohawk, Saturday 26

BÖNDBREAKR and Throat Piss offer a second chance at a rite of passage with Piss Prom, a dance for metalheads that inaugurates EPs from both acts. "Progress and Change" previews the former's Exile with a blend of hardcore simplicity and metal theatrics. Gerilyn Hayes-McCloskey evokes a demon's snarl in the single's breakneck verses but comes to for the clear-eyed refrain, "Enough waiting/ For a better day." Meanwhile, Whitney "Swamp Wench" Creep's scream proves nearly impenetrable in Throat Piss' "Intergalactic Space Kush," a steamroller of guitar riffs and saxophone squall. Mange, Parasiticide, and Molly Ringworm round out the bill. Formal wear - Carys Anderson encouraged.

INGEBRIGT HÅKER FLATEN Cloud Tree Studios & Gallery, Saturday 26 Soundspace at Captain Quack's, Sunday 27

The original titans of free jazz have mostly blazed into the next world, but a few legends still walk the earth. Thanks to Epistrophy Arts, maverick saxophonist Joe McPhee has been an Austin frequent flier for years. To make this latest visit even more special, he'll be accompanied by former Austin bassist and Sonic Transmissions proctor Ingebrigt Håker Flaten and his fellow Young Mother Stefan Gonzalez for the kind of throwdown that may well pass into local legend. IHF stays over for a day to play Captain Quack's cool music room with Little Mazarn, Jonathan Horne, and Thor Harris. – *Michael Toland*

SOAP CREEK SALOON REUNION SHOW Sagebrush, Sunday 27

"If the Armadillo World Headquarters was the heart of Austin's music community in the early Seventies, Soap Creek Saloon was its soul," wrote Margaret Moser in the *Chronicle* in 2001. The notorious Southwest Austin dive hosted many a raucous night, and the Austin Museum of Popular Culture revives those vibes to honor its 50th anniversary. Tendervoiced Austin-via-Uganda songwriter Jon Muq opens, joined by McKenna Michels. TG BAD kicks guitar fury behind icons John X Reed and Speedy Sparks with special guest Shawn Sahm, who grew up across from the original bar. The Uranium Savages unleash vintage mayhem and Ray Benson shuts it down with a gathering of friends. *Doug Freeman*

ROME STREETZ Antone's, Tuesday 29

Local booker iLL MaNNER pieces together another national hip-hop lineup supported by Texas-connected emcees. Rome Streetz, NYC rhymer signed to grime-made-glorious label Griselda Records, headlines with a barrage of street-oriented lines delivered with gripping conviction. Last year's Westside Gunn executive-produced Griselda debut, *Kiss the Ring*, added a luxurious layer of production to his bar-heavy tracks "ringing off from Australia to Austin" ("Tyson Beckford"). Astrokeyy represents the local scene while Denver-based KNDRX (fka Cory Kendrix) returns to the city where he spent years creating with LNS Crew. – Derek Udensi



Dear Luv Doc,

I work at a Downtown coffee shop as a barista. It's not my chosen profession, it's what I do to pay bills while I am working on my degree. Most of my customers are nice people and regulars. This morning I was talking to one of the regular customers about different varieties of coffee. I was trying to explain to her the difference between fruity- and nutty-tasting coffees. We'd been talking for a while, but not more than five minutes or so when a guy in a suit a few people back in the line said in a very angry voice. "Excuse me, could we have this conversation some other time? Some of us are trying to get to work!" I told him I was trying to explain the different types of coffee and he cut me off and said, "Google it!" and stormed out cursing

I'll be the first to admit, it's not for everyone. That said, being a barista is not for everyone. In fact, to go one further, being in the service industry is not for everyone – especially not for those who don't have a clear understanding of what service they are actually providing and why it's valuable.

That dude in the suit could have totally been me – as long as the suit had some really cool, embroidered, pink bald eagle feathers and tequila bottles and whatnot, because otherwise, why even have a suit? But anyway, that totally could have been me losing my shit. Like anyone else, I have had those days. I have had those moments of utter bewilderment when the situation playing out in front of me doesn't jibe with my sense of reality and I think to myself, "Is it me, or is this fucking barista having a leisurely conversation about coffee varietals with – pretty sure I read this right – a minimum of three other people waiting in line?" Not today, Jesus. Not today. Please call the owner of your coffee shop immediately and demand that your manager be fired.

Because ... and let me be very clear about this ... a reasonable person should be allowed to have a reasonable expectation that a service industry employee is at least trying to provide service in a fast, efficient manner. Ask yourself: Does anyone ever want slow, apathetic service? OK, I mean other than in a marijuana dispensary, because, let's be honest: Stoners get really freaked out by people who move too quickly. But in a coffeehouse? In the morning before work? People want that caffeine hit and they want it yesterday. I don't mean to oversimplify, but that's pretty much it. Getting coffee fast is like 98% of the job. No one wants some dopey-eyed dreamer carving a meticulously detailed tree of life into the foam of their latte – well, not unless they can get it done in like five seconds. Otherwise, save that shit for the 10am social media influencer crowd who will be camping out all day with their laptops anyway.

So anyway, I'm sorry that guy in the suit was a dick to you. That's not OK – even if he was insanely frustrated by your inability to efficiently serve your customers. Not everyone is good at their job. Well, not yet at least. The robots are coming and they are going to make a five-second tree of life latte. Count on it. Until then, have you considered being a pet sitter?
