Yup, Something's Different

Only one page into the paper, and your Spidev sense is already tingling, right? Something's different here. Indeed, it is: In this week's issue, we launch a redesign of our print newspaper. This certainly isn't the first redesign in our 42-year history, but it's one of our most substantive. I'll walk you through some of the changes.

For starters, we've moved to a cover story format to really throw our muscle reporting and design - behind a single longform story or package each week. There, we're going deep. On the other end of the spectrum, we're expanding our Headlines section, which rounds up the week's news in bite-sized chunks. Starting this week, that will also include developments in all disciplines, including music,

the arts, restaurants, and more. The goal is to give our readers an even wider bird's-eye view of the biggest news of the week.

BY KIMBERLEY We've been without a regular **JONES** Music column in the paper since Rachel Rascoe retired "Faster Than Sound" and moved into the Music editor chair. In this issue, Carys Anderson picks up the mantle with "The Off Beat" and widens the scope to cover not just music but broader culture topics in Austin. Carys' column will be in the paper every other week, rotating the space with Kevin Curtin's cannabis column. As editor of "The Austin Chronic," I never quite know what Kevin is going to hand in - a guide to holidays-withthe-family stoner etiquette or a field trip to the state's busiest medical cannabis facility? - but I know I always want more, which is why I'm thrilled that his column will now run a full page. Look for that next week.

The new Calendar section, under the stewardship of Ommunity Editor James Scott, marks maybe the biggest structural change to the paper. Gone are page after page after page of so-tiny-it's-tough-to-read event listings. Instead, we're presenting in print a curated, chronological list of about 30 events a week and going a little deeper on why we recommend them to our readers. (You'll find even more listings online every week at austinchronicle.com/events.)

The Calendar section is also where vou'll find familiar faces - Day Trips, Qmmunity, Music Notes, and – back next month – Eric Goodman's Austin FC column, "The Verde Report." The section concludes with Club listings and Roadshows, compiled by Derek Udensi. It's a smaller collection of shows than you're used to seeing in print, but you'll be able to find the complete Club listings online at austinchronicle.com/events/music.

Next up: a Reviews section that's going to look a little different every week. This week, we're covering a restaurant, a

> concert, an art opening, and new music tracks. (You can expect a film review most weeks, too; this just happened to be the once-in-a-blue-moon that no new release dropped. A good excuse to take in a repertory screening at AFS Cinema!)

All the months we were hatching this redesign, we jokingly referred to the last section of the paper as Fun & Games, and, well, the name stuck. That's where you'll find the crossword puzzle, comics, "The Luv Doc," "Mr. Smarty Pants," and our monthly legal column. "The Common Law."

That is a lot of change all at once, and I'll tell you the same thing Art Director Zeke Barbaro and I have been saying to staff: This is a work in progress. We're still figuring it out, and we're going to figure it out together. But a change was long overdue. For many years, we've been trying to put out more or less the same paper every week that we did 5, 10, and 20 years ago, with a dramatically smaller staff, while simultaneously making the transition to being a daily news outlet with new stories online nearly every day. This was a long time coming, and we're excited about where we're going to next. I hope you'll come along for the ride.

A Note From the Associate Publisher

Most of you don't know me. I've never had a byline in the Chronicle, never been onstage at any of our events, nor am I the face of any particular section or initiative. But I've been behind the scenes here for the last 25 years. silently doing all I can to keep the wheels turning.

Maybe it's time I introduce myself, and give you a bit of background on the issue in your hands.

It's going to look a bit different. This is the first major print overhaul in decades, and it's taken us the past year to get here. Some of the changes were by design. Editor Kim Jones, Art Director Zeke Barbaro, and I spent countless hours brainstorming how the Chronicle can best report on Austin, better respond to breaking news, be more visually interesting, and break through all the noise to deliver the most useful, wellinformed news and event calendar in a digital-forward city of almost a million people.

And some of the changes were by necessity. I don't need to get into the current state of media in our country, or how almost every newspaper has had its own sort of reckoning to work through.

We've held on to the status quo as long as we could, but we don't have the resources we once did. We've let our staff organically shrink over the past several years, with fewer and fewer people taking on more and more work, and made some difficult decisions along the way too, still trying to "hold what you got," as my father and Joe Tex would say. It's clear that now is the opportunity to think further downfield.

But also, the I-35 expansion has been hanging over our heads for what seems like forever. With TxDOT effectively kicking us out of the building we've occupied for 33 years, we've had to move, as of last week, into the old SXSW space. It's quite a bit smaller (if you can believe SXSW used to office out of a 1950s house, a cottage, and a petite two-story on 40th Street), so change was quite literally knocking on our door, whether we were ready for it or not.

Finally, I don't think I'm speaking out of turn here when I say that our publisher, Nick Barbaro, will tell anyone who asks him that he's trying to retire. Kim, Zeke, and I should probably let him soon. He guite literally has been propping this paper up, in more ways than I can even describe. so some of this evolution is us trying to envision ourselves being the stewards for the next 40 years. I can say that everyone who works here bleeds this place and wants to make him proud. We might make some mistakes through all of this, but we'll try our level best to not let anyone down.

If you feel like supporting us, keep picking up the paper each week. Find us online - we've got new stories going up every day. Sign up for newsletters, follow us on socials, come on out to our events, advertise with us and be patrons of our advertisers, buy our merch online.

Or, donate. It's not a "now more than ever"-type plea or a donation drive - it's more that we just will always need you. We need Austin's support to make this work.

I promise to use some of those donations to buy a dozen or two breakfast tacos then tell everyone to get back to work.

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





You're (No Longer) Hired

Jesús Garza's puzzling appointment of ex-APD Chief Art Acevedo backfires by Austin Sanders

rt Acevedo – the polarizing police chief who fled the Austin Police Department in disgrace eight years ago as a multitude of problems he let fester erupted into national scandal – landed an executive job at City Hall and had it taken away, all in less than a week.

It all began Friday, Jan. 19, when the Statesman broke the news that Acevedo had accepted a \$271,000-a-year position as an interim assistant city manager overseeing APD - a new role created for him by interim City Manager Jesús Garza. By Tuesday, Jan. 23, following an escalating pressure campaign by community advocates that spurred City Council members into action, Garza was forced to do something he has resisted since receiving the interim manager appointment one year ago - bend to City Council.

Jan. 23, just 15 minutes before city officials were set to issue a legally mandated apology to survivors of sexual assault at an event (an apology that was the result of a settled lawsuit stemming from a decade of mismanagement at APD, mostly occurring under Acevedo's watch), the former chief posted to social media that he was walking away from the job.

"Unfortunately, politics and power struggles have hindered our efforts to create real positive improvements for the people of this city," Acevedo wrote in the statement. "That is why I have informed [Garza] that I cannot accept this position and will pursue other opportunities."

What City Hall sources say is more likely is that at some point following a meeting between CMs Alison Alter, Ryan Alter, Paige Ellis, Natasha Harper-Madison, and Zo Oadri on Monday, Jan. 22, and the Tuesday apology, Garza called Acevedo and asked him to step away from the job.

In his interim role, Garza has made several executive decisions that irked Council, but with this one he finally overstepped the extraordinarily wide berth Council had thus far given him on other management decisions. Under immense pressure to reverse it, Garza did.

There are many crises and scandals Council and advocates pointed to throughout Acevedo's tenure as APD chief - and beyond it – to persuade Garza to reverse course. Like the time, in 2014, he defended Austin police officers who had violently arrested a woman for jaywalking by insinuating it could have been worse - at least they didn't sexually assault her. On a broader scale, Acevedo was criticized for his refusal to meaningfully address the ways in which the department failed victims of sexual assault – issues made public two years before he left APD. Issues so staggering in scale and harmful in effect that survivors filed a class-action lawsuit against the city in which Acevedo was a named defendant. (The city settled the lawsuit in

2022: one condition in the settlement was the public apology delivered Jan. 23.)

Acevedo's Under leadership, APD detectives in the Sex Crimes Unit "cleared" rape cases, even though they had barely been investigated at all, at shocking rates. He then allowed the SCU sergeant who raised concerns about this prac-

tice internally to be reassigned. Management of the department's DNA lab under Acevedo was so flawed dating back to 2010 that the city shut it down in 2016 and asked the Texas Department of Public Safety to take over that work. The years of mismanagement produced a backlog of some 3,000 rape kits, each of which represented a survivor who had justice in their case delayed or denied because of systemic failure at the lab and APD more broadly.

The list of concerns Council and community members had about Acevedo's appointment is long and legitimate. In a statement to the Chronicle, Garza acknowledged Acevedo's failed history in Austin - and defended the former chief's response to it. "As Chief, Acevedo was very vocal about righting these wrongs as soon as they were brought to his attention," Garza said. "Many of these came to light at the time he was leaving or after he left APD."

But, more than anything, it was the timing of Acevedo's hire that did him in – a decision sources say Garza made without consulting even Mayor Kirk Watson. Garza issued the memo to the mayor and Council announcing Acevedo's return to City Hall just hours before

the news would become public and four days before the public apology to survivors was to take place. The effect of that timing was emotionally traumatizing for survivors and politically catastrophic for Garza, Council is expected to discuss the hiring decision and other issues relating to Garza's job performance - in an executive session at next week's regular Council meeting, Feb. 1. The public will have an opportunity to share their own concerns with Council about Garza's performance during the meeting's public comment period.

But was it mere incompetence? Or was it callousness toward survivors? Survivors who were plaintiffs in the high-profile lawsuit and advocates told us that the announcement - in such close proximity to the public apology was itself re-traumatizing. Garza declined to answer our questions about the timing of his announcement, but per Acevedo's statement, we do know that Garza offered him the job "earlier this month" (Acevedo announced he

Advocates and CMs were also concerned that Acevedo's hire, intentionally or otherwise, would undercut the authority of APD's current interim chief, Robin Henderson, a Black woman, Problems with Acevedo's APD leadership were, after

all, rooted in sexism and racism (gender-based assumptions affecting sexual assault cases, and police violence against Black and brown Austinites). If the Acevedo hire signaled a lack of faith in Henderson's independent leadership, those who work with Henderson and her staff couldn't see why. Advocates and her colleagues agree: She has made much more progress on improving the department's response to sexual assaults than her predecessors. Her commitment to reform seems sincere and lasting, unlike that of prior chiefs Brian Manley and Joseph Chacon, who said they were committed to reform but failed to demonstrate that commitment through their actions, advocates told us.

Adding someone like Acevedo to the mix could jeopardize that progress, advocates feared. "Under Chief Henderson's leadership, the Sexual Assault Response and Resource Team has seen more progress in improving APD's response to sexual assault than under the previous three administrations combined," wrote Shelli Egger and Emily LeBlanc, the co-chairs of SARRT, in a statement before Acevedo said he wouldn't be taking the job.

In a statement, Garza said, "Henderson is in charge – and will continue to be in charge – of the Austin Police Department. Creating this Interim Assistant City Manager role is meant to bolster resources for the Chief and APD." In her own statement, Henderson welcomed the support. "I appreciate the support and focus of the Interim Assistant City Manager role created by our City leadership as we all work to accomplish major priorities within APD," Henderson said through a spokesperson, prior to Acevedo stepping down.


As city manager, Garza does not have to consult with Council on personnel decisions nor seek their approval – and in most cases, CMs wouldn't expect the manager to do so. But the whole episode illustrates the value in city management working with elected representatives on high-profile decisions something that has not been characteristic of Garza's administration. CM Alison Alter, who has been a champion of the survivor cause for much of her time on Council, stressed that one of the most important lessons to be learned from the past week is that "due diligence is important" when it comes to making leadership changes.

"It's not perfunctory," Alter told us. "Particularly when we're trying to make changes to the police department. We need to make sure that the processes that we follow reflect the importance of what we're trying to accomplish."

For Julie Ann Nitsch, one of the plaintiffs in the class-action suit brought by survivors, the saga has inspired cautious optimism. "I'm optimistic because the outpouring of support survivors saw from the community and elected leaders shows there is a possibility for real change," Nitsch said. "Cautious, because Garza would be so incompetent, or have the audacity, to appoint this man to this job, right before the city apologizes to survivors."



It looks like recognition from management won't be a problem

The Texas Tribune Is Unionizing

After last summer's shocking layoffs, staff is organizing for stability, transparency by LINA FISHER

Just under six months after The Texas Tribune weathered its first-ever round of layoffs, staff announced Wednesday that they are unionizing with the NewsGuild-CWA and asking for voluntary recognition from management by Jan. 31. CEO Sonal Shah sent an email to staff 15 minutes after management was made aware of the union, writing, "Our response is simple. If Tribune employees want to be represented by a union, we will respect their right to representation ... We respect our colleagues' right to collectively bargain."

Talk of unionizing began when management alluded to budget shortfalls in the spring of 2023, but it was the layoffs that "created a sense of urgency to mobilize across the newsroom," said Uriel García, an immigration reporter based in El Paso. Those layoffs, which affected 11% of the staff, were shocking to many on staff - particularly the decision to fire the Tribune's only dedicated criminal justice and demographic reporters. Many were frustrated by the lack of explanation from management about the rationale behind the cuts. (One particularly chilling theory is that the decision was swayed by public institutions that had pulled sponsorships, which make up a significant portion of the Tribune's revenue.)

"The hope is the union will create an avenue for more transparency about the Tribune's financial situation, and generate more of a dialogue between management and employers," said higher education reporter Kate McGee. "This seemed like the right moment to

ensure that we the employees have a voice in future conversations about where the Tribune is headed."

Organizers are also looking to preserve benefits they currently enjoy at the Tribune, in stark contrast to other newsrooms like the Austin American-Statesman that are organizing in reaction to what

they describe as untenable working conditions and tense relationships with management, "The Tribune is very employee-first minded. Management is pretty considerate about letting us have a good work/life balance," García said. His previous employer, The Arizona Republic, took four years to negotiate a contract; he's more optimistic about the Tribune's management. He said in Arizona, the people who needed to recognize the union weren't in the newsroom. "That's a key difference here. The people who have the power to recognize us see and interact with employees day-to-day. Some of us have worked at newsrooms where they're owned by corporations. There's a reason why we came to the Tribune."

That collaborative environment extends to the organizing effort – the Texas Tribune Guild is a wall-to-wall union, meaning that it will represent not only journalists, but around 50 eligible staff members including photographers, designers, and engineers. "We all feel like none of us can do our jobs without one another," García said. More than 95% of eligible staff members have signed on to the union's mission statement; 90% have signed the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) authorization card.

Many at the Tribune come from other news organizations that were already unionized, or that they themselves helped organize. María Méndez, the Tribune's service and engagement reporter, was previously with the Statesman, where she saw how Gannett couldn't pull the rug out from under staff thanks to the Austin NewsGuild. After Gannett suspended 401(k) matching during the pandemic, the union filed an Unfair Labor Practice charge with the NLRB and was able to get that reinstated, along with back pay, due to status quo protections in place while a contract is negotiated.

"We have seen a lot of uncertainty and layoffs, even in the past few weeks, in

> newsrooms around the country," McGee said. Just a few weeks ago, the CEO of the newly formed startup Houston Landing fired its editor-in-chief and top investigative reporter without warning, followed by widespread outcry from staff. She said heading into a presidential election

year raises the stakes - the country needs robust news outlets covering politics, and she argues unionization creates the kind of newsrooms up to the task.

"Ultimately," García said, "the underlying point is we like our jobs, we like the Tribune, and we want to make sure that every current and future employee feels the same."

"We all feel like none of us can do our jobs without one another."

Austin Milk Bank Surpasses 10 Million Ounces Dispensed

The only accredited nonprofit milk bank in Central Texas isn't slowing down by maggie Q. Thompson

Humans have been wet nursing for thousands of years, and it's been four decades since the World Health Organization and UNICEF stated that donated human milk should be the first alternative if a biological mother is unable to breastfeed. Still, there are only 32 accredited nonprofit milk banks on the continent.

Austin is one of the world's lucky cities, being served by Mothers' Milk Bank at Austin (MMBA) since 1999. In January, MMBA hit a milestone: the nonprofit has dispensed more than 10 million ounces of human milk, they announced in a press release.

In 2023, MMBA screened and approved more than 1,000 new milk donors, 30% of whom were in the Austin area, Executive Director Kim Updegrove told the Chronicle. The milk bank provided milk to neonatal intensive care units in 17 hospitals, as well as 443 outpatients.

Grace Collins was one of those outpatients. Now 2 years old, the little Austinite was born on New Year's Eve of 2021. "She's one tough cookie," her mother, Kristel, told the Chronicle. "She entered the world mid-pandemic and remained in the NICU for 20 days before getting to come home." After undergoing many tests, Grace was diagnosed with Rubinstein-Taybi Syndrome (RTS) and left the hospital on oxygen, relying on G-tube feeding supplies.

As Grace was allergic to many formulas, parents Kristel and Demetrius turned to MMBA. For the next 17 months of her life, Grace drank donated milk via G-tube. Now, she no longer needs breast milk and she's no longer fed via the tube. "She is cruising and pulling up to stand," Kristel said.

Just north of Houston, Caylee Croft's baby boy struggled too. "It's been a lifesaver for my son," she said. His kidneys had to be removed at just 2 months old and he's been on dialysis every day since as they await a transplant. Breast milk is essential for his growth because most formulas are "not renalfriendly." Croft said, "I pumped and breastfed for seven months until my body gave up due to stress after my son's third hospitalization. Having MMBA milk for my son has relieved that stress."

On the other side of the coin are the donors women like Leigh Rappaport in Houston, who has given more than 25 gallons while breastfeeding her three children since 2017. "It's almost like a competition with myself honestly," Rappaport says, laughing. "I'm not sure that the word is out. It's a very simple process to be approved: It's an interview, a blood test, and some documents from the doctor. Being a mom is such a challenging thing and I'm just happy to be able to help in this small way, and with love. I'm doing this [pumping] for my own child out of love, and dropping it off, and they're doing the work on the back end. It's the coolest thing."

Despite a bump in donors in 2022 during formula shortages, the milk bank is always in need of milk donors and financial support, Updegrove said. "We couldn't save lives without the dedication of the mothers who donate their milk, the financial supporters who make sure we have the resources to never turn away a baby in need, and the dedicated staff and volunteers who make our work possible."


BLOCKING THE PUBERTY BLOCKER

COUNCIL APPROVES \$2 MILLION FOR HOMELESSNESS STUDY

Will it be money well spent? BY BRANT BINGAMON

The city is paying \$2 million for a study to look at every aspect of its work addressing homelessness – but not everyone is on board. The study will be executed by McKinsey & Company, one of the world's largest, richest, and most recommended consulting firms.

The city said the McKinsey study, due in April, will evaluate the effectiveness of the strategies that the city of Austin, Travis County, Central Health, Integral Care, and UT's Dell Medical School - together referred to as Healthier Austin Partners – are using to help those experiencing homelessness. According to City Council, the report will closely define the work that each organization carries out on the issue, including efforts to divert people from jail and shelters; to provide physical, behavioral, and mental health services; to provide wraparound services and case management; and more.

A city spokesperson told the Chronicle that the leaders of Healthier Austin Partners agreed during a meeting with Mayor Kirk Watson to authorize the study. "This review is necessary because a systems-level approach is necessary to help individuals exit homelessness," the spokesperson said. "A systems-level approach involves a coordinated and integrated response involving various stakeholders to address homelessness comprehensively."

Per the terms of the released agreement, the city expects to be reimbursed by Travis County, Central Health, and Integral Care for half the cost of the report, with the county and Central Health kicking in \$400,000 each and Integral Care \$200,000. But community members raised doubt about those expectations at last Thursday's Council meeting.

"This week, the [Travis] County Commissioners Court politely declined the city's offer to fund a portion of the proposed

McKinsey study," Equity Action's Kathy Mitchell told Council members. "I would expect, as it continues to grapple with its own budget issues, that Integral Care may also so decline. Without the cooperation and support of our regional partners, it seems impossible that any of the objectives laid before you for this contract can actually be met."

One public speaker at the Council meeting, John Ireland, criticized the study as a waste of money, calling McKinsey "the most expensive consulting firm in the world," which we couldn't confirm, though a 2020 ProPublica investigation described hiring McKinsey as "a famously expensive proposition, even when compared with its leading competitors." Ireland pointed out that similar homelessness studies McKinsey completed for other cities are available for free, saving, "They're all the same 30,000-foot views of what's going on in the city, and they all make the same recommendations."

The Austin Justice Coalition's Chris Harris took issue with the study too, calling it a "do-nothing \$2 million contract" that was the result of a "laughably corrupt procurement process," in a Jan. 19 tweet. Meanwhile, the neighborhood association Friends of Hyde Park reacted to the McKinsey news and the hiring of former APD Chief Art Acevedo by tweeting, "The city of Austin has just become a giant slush fund for McKinsey and [interim City Manager Jesús] Garza's friends."

Watson, in his most recent "Watson Wire" newsletter, wrote that the city, county, and area health providers need to get on the same page. "We want to examine how we all collaborate and coordinate our efforts to provide comprehensive services to those living homeless," the mayor said. "I believe this work will give us recommendations for improvements in strategy design and implementation to better align our work."

Mitchell noted that she generally supports studies, like those from Kroll Associates on police misconduct. But she said the message that McKinsey will deliver is implicit in Council's recommendations and criticized the use of synonyms and repetition in the documents supporting the study: "The term 'align' or 'alignment' appears five times in the objectives and scope. Drought Conditions, Meet Rainwater Tanks

Collecting rain prevents pollution and reduces flood risk

When **Ron Van Sickle** founded his rainwater harvesting tank company **Cqure Water** more than a decade ago, many of his customers were environmentally concerned or wanted better water quality. Now, Van Sickle said it has evolved into something else: "There's no other water."

A result of this past summer's scorching temperatures and limited rainfall, Austinites now face stage 2 watering restrictions, and last month the **Barton Springs/Edwards Aquifer Conservation District** declared a stage 4 drought for the first time in its 36-year history. Less rain also means pumping deeper into wells for water, and at least one company – Aqua Texas – has pumped more than its fair share.

Van Sickle said these conditions might account for the increasing demand of rainwater tanks that his company has been experiencing.

"It's gorgeous out here, but water is a huge problem," said Darlene, a Southwest Austin resident who installed a 30,000-gallon rainwater tank last year. "All of the conversations with people out here are, 'water, water, water.'"

By installing a rainwater tank, Darlene said she would be taking some pressure off of the groundwater supply that her neighbors also depend on. And she sought to avoid the local groundwater's sulphuric fragrance, which might be a result of bacteria.

While Darlene said the \$35,000 tank made sense economically for her, **Texas A&M** professor of biological engineering **Fouad Jaber** says reducing runoff into streams in Texas is a plus, preventing pollution and reducing flood risk. According to a study from the University of Southern California, rainwater tanks also help avoid sewage overflow.

Texas has several laws encouraging rainwater harvesting, including a mandate that no city in Texas ban the use of these tanks. The ballpark cost of a rainwater collection system for a family of two to four would be \$10,000 to \$12,000, according to the Plum Creek Conservation District based in Lockhart. But tax incentives exist, too: The Texas tax code exempts rainwater harvesting equipment and supplies from state sales tax. Also, the city of Austin offers rebates for certain water-quality-focused residential upgrades, including up to \$5,000 for installing rainwater harvesting equipment.

For the many people who can't afford rainwater tanks holding thousands of gallons, Jaber pointed out cheaper ways to work with rain. Rain gardens and green roofs, for example, still reduce runoff. The latter also helps to cool rooftops. More simply, rain barrels can collect rainwater for everyday purposes.

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

CHANGING PETITION PROCESS: For now. any citizen or group can get their suggested policy change on the city ballot by collecting 20,000 signatures. The program's cap on personal net wealth will increase to more than \$2.2 million from the previous cap of \$1.82 million.

CITY LEADERS APOLOGIZE: As part of the terms of a lawsuit settlement, city leaders issued a public apology Tuesday for the past mishandling of sexual assault cases by the Austin Police Department. "We can all agree that the cases of the survivors were involved and were not handled appropriately," interim Assistant City Manager Bruce Mills said, per KVUE's report.



NEW HOMELESS RESPONSE PROGRAM:

Downtown Austin Alliance will partner with Urban Alchemy, the nonprofit group that manages two downtown shelters, to launch the Homeless Engagement Assistance Response Team (HEART) program. The six-month pilot costing about \$150,000 will start Feb. 1, with three-person teams reaching out to unhoused Austinites to address nonemergency issues, the Austin Monitor reports.

> **RAZOR WIRE GETS CUT:** In a dispute over razor wire at the border, the U.S. Supreme Court decided in favor of the federal government this week. In a blow to Gov. Greg Abbott and A.G. New Wells in Austin to Monitor Oxygen Levels for Endangered Salamanders

AMID DROUGHT, FLOWS INTO THE AQUIFER ARE DWINDLING BY LINA FISHER

Despite a rainy start to the week, Central Texas' historic drought is not turning around anytime soon. The Barton Springs/Edwards Aquifer Conservation District declared a Stage 4 Exceptional Drought for the first time in its 36-year history in December, after its Lovelady monitoring well measured alarmingly low water levels - and forecasters are expecting another hot, dry summer. Diminished flows in the Edwards Aquifer don't only affect human permit holders; they cause dissolved oxygen levels in the water to go down, making it harder for the endangered Barton Springs and Austin blind salamanders to breathe.

To better understand what's affecting the salamanders, the aquifer district is installing two new, permanent monitoring wells this month which will collect data on flow, oxygen levels, and other features of groundwater. The district already gathers data from more than 40 wells in the Edwards and Trinity aquifers, but "most of our monitoring wells are residential, being used domestically, and the property owners have given us access," explains Jeff Watson, a hydrogeologist with the district. "So these are special in that they're owned and operated by the district, and specially constructed with monitoring in mind."

The two new wells - one in Zilker Park and one in Garrison Park - are five years in the making and were included in the original

2018 Habitat Conservation Plan for the salamanders that allowed the city to continue operating Barton Springs as a public pool with a permit from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Data from the wells will also tell the district how feasible it is to deploy a strategy that might make the salamanders' lives more comfortable: manually injecting oxygen into the aquifer.

"A key question would be: Where in the aquifer do we want to inject it?" Watson said. "Because we're talking about a package of rock three to four hundred feet thick, so you've got a lot of options." The Zilker well by Barton Springs will gather data throughout the whole aquifer instead of at a single water level, allowing geologists to observe "from top to bottom." The Garrison Park well sits along a known flow path that feeds Barton Springs, which makes it an ideal location for monitoring for things like water quality and contaminants, Watson said. Plus, biologists would have access to deploy salamander traps in the deeper part of the aquifer.

Construction is starting this month and is expected to finish before the end of March. and the district expects to publish preliminary findings sometime this year. But the wells are permanent, and Watson said. "It's really with many years of data collection that we develop more interesting datasets for analysis."

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Kathy Valentine Departs "This Town"

BLUEBONNETS' UNSAPPY UK SENDOFF INVITES JOHN DOE AND SUE FOLEY

"We used to complain that we could never pack the Continental Club," Kathy Valentine said Saturday night. "Guess it just takes leavin' to get y'all to come."

She moved to the UK earlier this month, but the former Go-Go and perennial Austinite couldn't settle across the pond without a few going-away shows. Alongside her Bluebonnets bandmates, a very Texan whirlwind of guest stars proved the perfect unsappy showcase for the tough-edged artist/author, who's always been more of a rocker than her power pop reputation implies. Valentine and the Bluebonnets followed up last night, Wed., Jan. 24, at C-Boy's Heart & Soul.

With a thunderous wave of scratchy guitar and drum-roll theatrics, guitarists Valentine and Eve Monsees, drummer Kristy McInnis, and bassist Dominique Davalos – joined onstage by keyboardist Emily Gimble – rattled through an hour-and-a-half set traversing the band's three-album discography, a hearty blend of classic rock & roll and blues.

Davalos, with a seductive roar optimal for the group's irreverent tunes about love and sex, usually provided lead vocals, growling through opening originals "Carboy" and "Why Ya Don't." While she plucked out the low end, Valentine and Monsees, mouths agape in joy, took turns ripping guitar solos, hitting the whammy bar in synchronicity.

As is tradition for goodbye shows, the evening packed covers and special guests. McInnis took the mic for "Be My Baby," the Ronettes classic so perfect that an outsider's take normally just makes you miss the original. Somehow, the drummer sounded miraculously close to Ronnie Spector, while Davalos and Monsees provided appropriate girl-group harmonies.

Even more fitting, the band tipped their hats to "Austin icon" Ray Wylie Hubbard with a take on his woman-worshiping track "Chick Singer, Badass Rockin'." "I wish he was here," Valentine said of the Texas outlaw afterward. "I think we forgot to tell him."

A tribute to late Texas guitarist Denny Freeman unlocked the band's love for a blues scale. Once Monsees' dirty riffage combined with Gimble's banged-out piano, the artists, previously locked in and tight, loosened up. "Chick Singer, Badass Rockin'" indeed, the jam session welcomed Sue Foley – a favorite of Valentine's, who's always sought

women collaborators. Later came hyperactive roots modernizer Zach Person, who dropped a cross-generational new single "We Don't Play" with Valentine earlier this month. Though mostly full of boomers, the room swayed in appreciation.

The evening's biggest surprise came about three-quarters into the set when punk innovator John Doe of California act X came aboard, toting his own bass. As Valentine recalled, she first heard the Go-Go's needed a bass player at an X show all those years ago. "If I hadn't gone to see my favorite L.A. band that night, I wouldn't have ended up where I did," she said.

"Thanks for coming," Doe replied, before launching into "The New World" alongside Davalos on vocals.

Though marking a definite end of an era, the show avoided nostalgia. "I'll be back," Valentine said, promising her friends in the crowd that they'd each get in hellos and goodbyes. Still, just once, she sighed.

"Maybe I should stay."

RED RIVER CULTURAL DISTRICT ASKS PUBLIC TO RALLY FOR CITY FUNDING

The Red River Cultural District is calling on Austin City Council to pass an "immediate aid package" to support its growth and operations, and asking Austin residents to contact their representatives on Council in support of the funding initiative.

Home to over a dozen music venues and sponsor of beloved no-cost festivals Free Week and Hot Summer Nights, the district went public with the request in a Jan. 23 press release arguing contributions "as an economic and cultural generator for the 'Live Music Capital of The World.'" Over 300 musicians got paid to perform at this year's Free Week, which district organizers estimate some 15,000 people attended.

The nonprofit first approached the city about financial aid at the Jan. 8 meeting of the Music Commission, where interim Executive Director Nicole Klepadlo told commissioners that the RRCD should receive funding that is "financially consistent" with what is allocated to other city-designated cultural heritage districts like Six Square (Austin's Black Cultural District) and the 5th Street Mexican American Heritage Corridor.

In the past, the city has recommended \$300,000 allocations to Six Square per

fiscal year, while a recommendation from December outlined a \$120,000 contract for corridor consulting with the Mexic-Arte Museum. At the Jan. 8 meeting, the commission passed a recommendation to city council for further RRCD funding.

The district was previously denied a \$75,000 grant from the 2023 Elevate Grant program. At the commission meeting, Klepadlo said the organization didn't apply for the Live Music Fund because she believed nonprofits were ineligible – a misconception, since the RRCD counts as an event promoter. On grant eligibility, Music & Entertainment Division Manager Erica Shamaly said, "We need to do better with our communication."

When asked what grant funds would be used for, Klepadlo said the RRCD is in "desperate need" of an economic impact analysis, while Commissioner Lauryn Gould suggested city funding should go toward increased pay for musicians at district-booked events. The organization currently pays bands \$350 per show, while Live Music Fund grant recipients are required to pay each musician at least \$200 per hour.

Per the statement, the RRCD would also use funds to develop Free Week and Hot Summer Nights, document the area's history, and expand full-time staffing. According to the press release, Council members can vote to provide financing at the midyear April budget amendment meeting, or craft a separate resolution outside the budget process. The district offers a script for Austin residents to contact representatives at redriverculturaldistrict.org.


KMFA Classical 89.5 announced 2024 composer-in-residence Sophie Mathieu at a Jan. 23 event at the station's Draylen Mason Music Studio. Launched in 2022, the initiative seeks to diversify the classical music world in honor of late Austin musician Mason. Mathieu, a cellist who earned a master's degree from the Butler School of Music and also plays in the indie folk band Middle Sattre, will spend a year curating events, leading music workshops, and composing a piece that the Austin Unconducted chamber orchestra will premiere this fall.

KUTX 98.9 FM has played nothing but white noise since Saturday. The station pointed to issues with its over-1,000-foot Bee Cave broadcasting tower, made inaccessible by weather. Engineers plan to place a low-power transmitter on top of the station's UT-Austin headquarters, but it "could be weeks" until its far-reaching signal is restored. Music continues to stream online at kutx.org.

Mange, a queer hardcore group, announced their breakup in light of last year's anti-trans state legislation. "We knew eventually we'd have to stop doing music together and move somewhere each of us could actually live," the band wrote on Instagram. "Kind Clinic had to change how they billed their patients, trans kids are getting forced out and there's no political force in Texas that's going to do something about it. So the girls and boy in Mange [are] heading out to more friendly states." The quartet's final bow comes Sunday, Jan. 28, at Mohawk with Petra von Kan't.










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The debate over how and whether to jail kids in Austin is just getting started

n Nov. 23, 1996, high school sophomore Bill Wallace was involved in a dispute between two groups of men near Rundberg Lane in North Austin. Both groups drew guns and shot. A 32-year-old man lost his life. Wallace was arrested six weeks later, taken to the Gardner Betts Juvenile Justice Center, and held on suspicion of murder.

Gardner Betts is essentially a jail for children who commit crimes in Travis County. It sits on several acres drawn back from Congress Avenue near Oltorf Street in South Austin, in such a way that most people don't know it's there. Wallace was held at Gardner Betts for three months as prosecutors worked to get him certified as an adult.

"Right now, I don't think it's even the practice of Travis County to certify juveniles as adults," Wallace told the *Chronicle* recently. (It hasn't happened since 2014, Juvenile Probation told us.) "But back then that was a thing. It was the Nineties, and it was very in vogue to be as harsh as you could on juveniles, with the 'war on drugs' and the 'superpredators' type of language."

Wallace remembers being scared as he sat in Gardner Betts. But the county had provided him with a free attorney, Kameron Johnson, from the Juvenile Public Defender's Office, who was able to comfort him. After a judge declared Wallace an adult for purposes of his trial, he was provided another attorney, the current head of the district attorney's civil rights unit, Dexter Gilford.

To this day, Wallace is grateful for Johnson and Gilford. "I'm Black, I'm African American, and those two Black guys really impacted my life," he said. "They treated me as a human being, just as a person, at a time when I was very vulnerable. And I love them for that. I'm indebted to them. I don't know how that happened, how the universe allowed that to happen."

A year after his arrest, Wallace was tried for murder. He was found guilty, and prosecutors asked for a 45-year sentence. They asked the jury to send the message that Austin does not tolerate juvenile violence. Gilford humanized Wallace to the jury. He reminded them that Wallace was 15 years old at the time of the offense, that he had been in the National Junior Honor Society, had played football in school, and had never been in trouble before. The jury gave him 25 years in adult prison.

Johnson and Gilford went on to become leaders in what, for the last 20 years, has been a countywide rejection of the myth of superpredators and harsh sentences for children who commit crimes. Wallace is now part of that movement. He was released from prison in 2017 after 20 years of confinement and started the nonprofit Tomorrow's Promise Foundation, which mentors at-risk youth, virtually all of them people of color living in poverty.

Wallace recently learned that Travis County is proposing the construction of a new facility to hold kids accused of crimes. It would sit across the street from the Gardner Betts building and that building's twin facility – the Jeanne Meurer Intermediate Sanctions Center, called the ISC. The new building is conceived as an innovative, homelike alternative to incarceration at the ISC. Its backers say it will be "non-secure," meaning the kids committed to it would not be locked up. They hope it becomes the latest advance in the county's years of effort to keep kids out of the juvenile justice system.

Wallace is familiar with the plans and the reasoning behind them. But he has no faith that the new building would be different from the ones in which he spent half of his life. "I think these buildings strip young people of their identity and try to turn them all into the same thing, which just prepares them for prison," he said. "It's systemic. It's in the rules and regulations. It's in the structure and code. It's in DNA. It's in the walls.

"These places are made to break human beings, to separate families. And they cause them to come back and make this a cyclic thing. They're not made to redeem people."

GARDNER BETTS AND THE ISC

Rubén Castañeda has represented thousands of kids over more than two decades as an attorney for the county's Juvenile Public Defender's Office, which provides free representation for kids accused of crimes. In May, he became the leader of the office – taking over when Kameron Johnson stepped down as chief after 22 years. Castañeda told us that, by state law, kids as young as 10 years of age can be arrested and held at Gardner Betts. He has personally represented 11-year-olds.

The offenses kids are arrested for can be relatively small matters, like shoplifting. In Travis County, those arrested for the first time on this kind of misdemeanor are offered diversion programs and never see the inside of a courtroom, Castañeda said. But those accused of violence, or who have repeatedly broken probation agreements for nonviolent offenses, are placed in Gardner Betts - a term used by those who work in the county's juvenile justice system to refer to the system as a whole and the actual building, a 120-bed detention facility with its own courthouse.

The Jeanne Meurer Intermediate Sanctions Center sits next to the Gardner Betts building and is also used to hold kids. The population in both buildings is dramatically disproportional to the community at large. Attorneys and judges told us that in recent years about half of the kids have been Hispanic, and 30% to 40% have been Black, though Hispanic and Black Austinites make up only about 32% and 8% of the population, respectively. Our sources say practically all of these kids are disadvantaged and come from the east side of Austin and Pflugerville.

"Gardner Betts is basically for kids who were just recently arrested or are awaiting their court appearance," Castañeda told us. "It is like jail. The kids wear uniforms. The uniforms are like jail uniforms.

"The ISC is for kids who have been adjudicated and ordered to be placed in the ISC by the court. They also wear uniforms, but the uniforms the ISC kids wear are not like prison uniforms. They are closer to street clothes, but they're still uniforms. Their day is very structured. They have different units. And when they go to bed at night they're locked in, like jail."

The kids ordered by a judge to be held in the ISC are often there for sentences of nine months to a year, according to Castañeda. During their detention, they receive different kinds of counseling and treatment, referred to as programming. Programming may include mental health services, anger management counseling, courses to prevent gang violence, and life and social skills training. The ISC, like Gardner Betts, also provides regular school instruction for detained kids. Both buildings have classrooms. Together, they constitute a designated campus of the Austin Independent School District. (AISD did not respond to our interview requests for this story.)

Dr. Daniel Hoard is a psychologist and the deputy chief of the probation department's Health Services Division, which provides clinical services to kids and their families. He described the types of offenses that cause kids to be placed in the ISC. "The youth that we work with are most typically here following serious, felony-level offenses," he said. "These are not adolescents who have engaged in teenage misbehavior but in serious offenses that place the community at risk."

These kinds of offenses almost always include an element of violence. Channing Neary of the District Attorney's Office recently analyzed 10 years of records and found the most frequent offense was family violence. In many counties, children who commit this kind of offense are sent to the youth prisons managed by the dysfunctional Texas Juvenile Justice Department. (Formerly known as the Texas Youth Commission, The Texas Tribune described TJJD in 2022 as "on the brink of collapse.") Hoard told us that the county's juvenile justice leaders broadly agree that it's preferable not to send kids to the state system but to work with them locally.

"Travis County doesn't typically send away our kids," Hoard said. "That's why we have the ISC. We keep them here with us on probation, working to provide education and vocational services and treatment for them and their families, while preparing for their reentry into the community. We really don't want to send kids away from their families because we've come to understand the importance of family work and addressing needs at that level. Those are needs we can address."

A couple of important points about Hoard's employer, the Juvenile Probation Department: First, it is huge and complex. With over 500 employees, it is far larger than the Juvenile Public Defender's Office and the county court system. Second, it is, as Hoard calls it, a "one-stop shop for juvenile services." The department cares for kids from the moment they are brought to Gardner Betts to the time they're released and afterward.

The Gardner Betts campus has courtrooms, probation offices, detention areas, and spaces for many types of therapeutic services. Hoard and his team screen every kid brought into the system to determine what level of risk they might present to the community and what needs they have. The department has diversion programs at different steps of the process to prevent kids from getting more deeply involved in the system. It provides services including mentorship, mental health assessment, and individual, group, and family therapy, among other things. It is, many told us, the most respected and innovative probation department in the state.

And, of course, Hoard is just one of many compassionate people who work at Gardner Betts and the ISC. But that doesn't mean the detention facilities aren't frightening places for kids, especially those locked up for the first time. Angel Carroll is a former foster kid who works as the director of advocacy for the Austin nonprofit Measure (she's also running to represent Round Rock's House District 52 in the Texas Legislature). Carroll said she lived in a dozen child detention facilities in her teenage years. She spent time in Gardner Betts in 2009 and remembers it as cold and traumatizing.

"I had been accused of a crime but then they had recanted and I had to stay there while CPS found a placement for me," Carroll said. "And I'm not saying this about any one particular facility, but none of them are supposed to be warm and comforting. As a whole, there's a lot of abuse that goes on. And the abuse is not always physical or sexual abuse. It's turning kids against each other, favoritism, playing on food insecurity. For me, reading was an escape. And there were times when a book was taken away as a consequence. Like, 'Oh, you didn't do this, so we're going to take your book away.' There's a lot of illogical things that happen."

A NEW VISION?

Travis County's judges, probation officers, attorneys, and advocates have heard stories like Carroll's before. They're the reason the probation department and some judges are proposing a redesign of the Gardner Betts campus. The redesign is called the comprehensive facilities plan. The central element of it is the construction of a new, large, multifloor building across the street from

Gardner Betts and the ISC. The plan has existed since 2016 but went mostly unnoticed until last summer, when the Juvenile Board voted to reserve \$3 million from the county budget to push the project forward (more on that later).

In recent months, Hoard and his boss, Chief Juvenile Probation Officer Cory Burgess, have made a pair of PowerPoint presentations laying out their vision for the new facility - one to the Iuvenile Board judges, the staff

of Gardner Betts, and the Juvenile Public Defender's Office: and another to criminal justice advocates. The PowerPoint is not yet public, but Burgess told us the goal is to create a softer facility for kids in the system, something nonsecure - that is, no locked doors – that fits the national trend of moving kids out of jail-like settings. He explained that there is no available facility for kids who need services but don't need to be locked up, and calculated that about 40 Travis County children currently fall into this category.

"If a judge wants to order a kid to a nonsecure facility, we have to send that kid to a private provider outside of Travis County," Burgess said. "So the goal is to build some nonsecure residential placement buildings so we don't have to send kids away. If we don't have a nonsecure place to send a kid,

we may have to consider a secure placement." That placement would be the ISC.

Hoard said the proposed building would keep kids closer to home, so their families can be involved in their programs. He believes it would help the department take the lightest touch possible in addressing kids' needs while preventing future recidivism. Of course, the building is not yet designed, but the probation department wants it to have four main elements: new courtrooms to replace those at Gardner Betts; an activities space for programs and services for youth; an unlocked space for therapy and services; and independent and assisted living spaces. Hoard said that in addition to providing services for the kids who are currently sent to private program providers, he believes the new facility could result in fewer kids being held in the ISC.

"The intent would be to work with youth in the ISC towards a successful transition into a less restrictive, non-institutional setting," Hoard said. "Or, ideally, they would never get to the ISC in the first place because there would be a local nonsecure option to

address their needs."

Hoard described the two kinds of living quarters the department wants to see in the building. "The assisted living and independent living plans are actually two separate things that we're proposing to be able to have options available for two different types of kids, the kid who can be pretty independent and what that would look like is almost a mini studio apartment - and then the kid who needs a little more support. That would be a dorm-style

space. We want to develop somewhere to live – likely for a matter of months – while we work to transition them to stable housing."

Guards would be stationed at the new facility - Hoard said that is required by state law but he and Burgess emphasized that kids could walk out the door anytime they choose. The chief told us the new building could also provide room for offices, allowing the department to remodel the courtrooms at Gardner Betts and enlarge the classrooms, visitation areas. and counseling rooms there and in the ISC.

"Ultimately, the vision is just to more effectively address issues with kids," Hoard said. "Philosophically, I think the impact would be that kids would have less juvenile justice involvement because they would have spent fewer days behind a locked door."



THE CASE AGAINST BUILDING

At some point in the next couple of years, the Travis County Commissioners Court may be asked to provide the money needed to create the building. Before that happens, Travis County's elected judges will have to vote to approve it. There are 22 of these judges: 21 heading civil and criminal courts, plus the county's general manager, County Judge Andy Brown. All of the judges sit on the Juvenile Board. That body makes decisions on the county's juvenile justice system at public meetings every three months.

It was at one of these meetings last August that it became clear that several judges have doubts about the need for a new building. When the board was asked to reserve \$3 million in this year's budget to pay for the building's design, three judges – Aurora Martinez Jones, Maya Gamble, and Selena Alvarenga – began asking questions. The judges ultimately agreed to reserve the money, but only after being assured that it wouldn't be spent if they decide the county doesn't actually need a new building.

Judge Martinez Jones told us that she and some of her colleagues see a cognitive dissonance in creating a new space to house kids when diversion programs and changing state laws are keeping more and more children out of the system in the first place.

"We've had years of changes to the state statutes – for example, truancy is no longer treated as a crime. Certain other charges, like for runaways and things like that, are not being treated as crimes," Martinez Jones said. "There are certainly less cases being filed than there were
10 years ago. So we
have that question –
and it's been an ongoing question – about
the drop in the number
of cases being filed. We
are wondering: Are we
still in a situation where
we feel like a new facility
is what we need?"

Castañeda said it's been years since the Gardner Betts and ISC buildings have been anywhere near capacity. He gave us representative numbers in a conversation in late December: "The Texas Juvenile Justice Department website says the ISC has a rated capacity of 118 beds. Right now, there are 27 kids in it. For Gardner Betts, the TJJD says they have a rated capacity of 120 beds. I checked this morning and right now there are 38 kids there.

They've been averaging between 30 and 40 kids for quite some time. There are units in Gardner Betts that are completely empty, that are unused. Which is a good thing."

Castañeda speculates that it could cost \$100 million or more to erect a new building. He thinks that sum would be better spent on treatment services, counselors, and programs. He said that in some ways the county provides fewer services for kids now than it once did.

"Twenty years ago there used to be four levels of drug treatment in Travis County. There were drug education classes, outpatient treatment facilities, and there was day treatment, where the kids attended school five days a week and received treatment. And then the most restrictive level was inpatient treatment. Right now, there's really no drug treatment for juveniles with these issues. So instead of pouring money into a brand-new facility, why don't we pour some money into trying to get resources such as these to help these children? I think it's

better to pour money into humans, rather than concrete and brick and mortar."

Some have asked whether the ISC, or a portion of the ISC, could be remodeled to create unlocked residential spaces for kids. Hoard doesn't believe the cinderblock building would work for this purpose. "The ISC was built in 2001, and we've tried really hard to make it less institutional feeling, to soften it up with colorful paints, carpets. But it really has limitations in terms of its layout and overall design, including insufficient natural light. It simply was not built to support a modern, nonsecure, noninstitutional-feeling program."

MORE TO SORT OUT

Alycia Castillo of the Texas Civil Rights Project has worked for years to close down the TJJD's youth prisons. She's not a fan of incarceration, but there are elements of the facilities plan that intrigue her.

"The plan, as I understand it so far, is unique, specifically in that the facility promises to be a 'nonsecure' detention center," Castillo said. "And I agree we need more loving, safe, noncarceral placements for when a child has nowhere safe to go. But 130-plus years of juvenile detention reform in Texas has shown that as long as a law enforcement agency builds and runs it, it will be carceral."

Castillo thinks the money for a new building would be better spent on expanding programs that are separate from the juvenile justice system, including the behavioral health diversion center, currently under development, and violence interruption programs. She's also enthusiastic about the new Travis County Transformation Project, which seeks to remove kids accused of family violence from the justice system.

Martinez Jones told us she is dead set against any new detention facility (and that she remains uncertain to what extent the probation department's proposed building would resemble one) but that she's not opposed to the idea of building something.



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"I want to look at community-based housing – not a facility, not a hard space, but a soft space that's a homelike environment, that's an alternative to having to go to detention. I would love to see our community be at the forefront of that. But when I went to the presentation for the current facilities plan, I had a lot of concerns about the dormlike and apartmentlike buildings. The plan still felt like 'facilities.' It didn't feel soft. It still felt hard."

Martinez Jones said a soft residential space could be helpful for the "dual status" kids that she works with – those who are in the juvenile justice system and in Child Protective Services, because they have been taken out of their homes. She thinks a new facility could help some of these kids avoid entering the foster care system by creating a "cooling off" period for disputes between them and their families. She believes if the county offered outpatient care that some parents might be able to take their kids back.

Castañeda and Martinez Jones share a major reservation about the plans as they understand them. They say the Gardner Betts building has an advantage the proposed facility would lack: it doesn't require kids to be shackled for their court appearances because its detention areas are located next to its courtrooms. The pair are worried the new facility would make it necessary to shackle kids because it replaces the courtrooms at Gardner Betts but does not include secure detention spaces. So children would have to be driven across the street from Gardner Betts to the new building's courtrooms for their court appearances, and they would be shackled for those transports.

"Shackling means leg irons, it means handcuffs, it means belly chains," Castañeda said. "There's a lot of research on how that is traumatic in many ways. It makes the children – and the parents for that matter – suspicious of the system and less trusting. And it would have to happen every time

a kid appeared before a judge – twice. When I heard about this, I made the comment that it is unacceptable. And it still is. Shackling children is inhumane. It's undignified. It's traumatic."

Hoard acknowledged that shackling children is a problem. "I don't disagree with Rubén on that one," he said. "That's something we would need to think about. I would like for us to come up with what would be the best proposal, and I don't know what that would exactly mean. But there might be, if we think of the worst-case scenario, some trade-off there to where kids do have to be shackled."

Castañeda also worries that creating a new facility will inevitably lead to Travis County detaining more kids. Wallace agrees. "It's like that old saying – 'If you build Juvenile Public Defender's Office, judges, and advocates. He stressed that an unlocked residential facility would be a major innovation for the community.

we will be open to continue having discussion and dialogue with our partners, including JPD and the advocates in the city."

In December, Judge Rhonda Hurley, who has led the Juvenile Court since 2009, announced that she would not seek reelection when her current term ends in the fall. She has already resigned as the chair of the Juvenile Board. Judge Maria Cantú Hexsel became the new chair this month. She is one of a group of recently seated judges including Martinez Jones, Gamble, and Alvarenga who promise a wave of change in the county's juvenile justice system.

"It's a time of transition," Judge Cantú Hexsel told us, "and that provides a really good opportunity to assess where we are in this work. I look forward to talking with all the stakeholders, including the people who don't think they want or need a building now. The facilities plan exists to serve our youth and focus on programming that diverts them out of the juvenile justice system. So the question is, how could the building add to all that? It could be great. We just need to figure out what that is exactly."

it, they'll come," Wallace said. "And that's just the truth. And you know why they'll come? Because we'll make sure they come. And we'll hold them longer when they do, because we've got to have somebody in these big buildings we're making."

Burgess told us he has been surprised by the doubts about the facilities plan but he's eager for continued discussion with the "I assure you, there's a stark difference between being in what is essentially a juvenile jail versus being behind a door that's not locked, where a kid could walk out of the building at any time that they wanted to," the juvenile probation chief said. "That's a difference. But the probation department is committed to working with everyone to make sure that we meet the needs of the community. So


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

In Geoff Sobelle's *FOOD*, **An Interactive Exploration of What We Eat**

FOOD runs Feb. 1-4 at

McCullouah Theatre

(2375 Robert Dedman Dr.).

An enormous table sits in the middle of the stage. Dozens of audience members seated around the periphery await the proceedings with semi-nervous chatter. As lights dim, creator and performer Geoff Sobelle enters, clad in the traditional garb of a waiter. The next hour and a half will be filled with stories, magic tricks, self-reflection, and the subject of the night's affair: food.

This isn't Sobelle's first excursion into immersive theatre. He has devoted entire projects to things and our accumulation of them, as well as the concept of home. With FOOD he has possibly the most elementary of ingredients needed for life.

fuseboxlive.com/project/food. "It's something that is so basic - you must eat or you will die - to the highest cultural echelon," Sobelle tells the Chronicle. "And it's holy. It's both holy and profane."

"It asks, too, 'What is food?' The show is not called DINNER. It's called FOOD, which I kind of love because the most basic way of talking about food is that the word food is not just cuisine or something that you get at a restaurant."

In FOOD, the table itself is large not just in size but in import. "The idea of sitting at the table means you're also sitting

with other people at that table." Sobelle explains, "and that's hard to escape, that way of looking at one another and being there, present at a kind of meal. And that's important. That's a valuable way of being together, because you're sort of there at a performance, and you're sort of there, kind of in a restaurant, and then we can kind of riff on what that might mean to all. Be seated, like you all have your place at the table, which also means that you all have your place at the table like you're not just an onlooker. You're in some way a participant, and you are not excused."

While this piece originated in a city of great food, it has made its way outside of New York City, with performances in Scotland,

> Nashville, and now Austin, where FOOD will have its Texas premiere as part of a partnership between Fusebox and Texas Performing Arts.

> "I myself have never been to Austin," Sobelle said, "so I don't really know what to expect. I haven't the slightest idea. What's cool is that each

of these places is radically different. It's not a vibe or a feel that I could even name, just something that really feels different, place to place. The laughter is different. The silence is different. It's just different."

Being a product of the theatre, Sobelle can't help but quote Shakespeare, a playwright who ostensibly discussed everything under the sun.

"There's that awesome thing of Hamlet right where he says, 'Where's Polonius? He's at supper. Not where he eats, but where he is eaten.' That we will also provide food from our matter. We will at some point go back into the earth."

What big ideas will come out of these performances of FOOD? Only time, and the audience, will tell. - ROD MACHEN

DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

The Reel'em Inn in Rockport provides a room with a view and a thousand-foot private pier for saltwater anglers, birdwatchers, and those just looking for a coastal hideaway.

By 2020 the 1950s-era tourist court had fallen on hard times. Three families of friends from Central Texas discovered the old motel at the southern end of Water Street and saw the possibilities. After a yearlong renovation designed by San Antonio's Lake Flato Architects, the motel reopened with a modern, minimalist aesthetic in October 2023.

"One of our first clients was a repeat from the old motel," said Natalie O'Roark, the property manager. "They were blown away and loved it."

The nine guest rooms - four double queens, four kings, and an ADA-compliant suite - could be described as "coastal chic." Each room comes with a refrigerator, coffeemaker, bath robes, beach towels, and dog bowls. Yes, Reel'em Inn is dog-friendly.

In the courtyard are grills to cook your catch of the day, and a fire pit can be added. O'Roark says they have golf carts and kayaks for rent. The lighted pier is equipped with fishcleaning tables and benches at the T-head.

To my mind, the thrones of the castle are the Adirondackstyle chairs outside each room overlooking Aransas Bay. When you sink into the chairs and look out over the water, the first sound you'll hear will be a collective "aah."

Rockport is still a largely unspoiled small town. The culinary scene has improved over the last few years. Tour boats leave the harbor on fishing trips, birdwatching tours, and excursions to see the whooping cranes at Aransas Wildlife **Refuge.** The town has a vibrant art scene, and recently expanded its parks and hiking trails.

Reel'em Inn is at 1603 S. Water St., a short drive from downtown. Rooms average around \$250 per night. For more information, go to www.reeleminnrockport.com.



All that's needed to create art is magic.


Case in point, the camera obscura: a pinhole camera that uses light and mirrors to create images. Living up to that namesake, new interactive film and dining experience Camera Obscura from performance artist Gothess Jasmine remodels Austin School of Film into a "vampiric tundra" where audience members can view 2007 fang feature 30 Days of Night. Through the blending of the film screening with live cello accompaniment by Texas-based musician Meta Phoricx as well as vocals by Égaux Sells (BluMoon) and drag by MK Ultra and Seisnueve, Jasmine says guests can expect a "hauntingly impactful" experience on Saturday, Jan. 27, at 6pm.

Guests will also be witness to a thematic menu, made entirely gluten- and shellfish-free by Fork Fantasies' Dan'Chaye McGruder.
This three-course meal includes both vegan and carnivorous options, with the full menu available on Jasmine's website amazingaeffects.com. Potion Pixie, aka Xander, crafts alluring mixed drinks utilizing sponsor spirits Bacardi and Grey Goose.
Jasmine assures, also, that any leftover food won't go to waste: All extras will be donated to food-insecurity fighters Keep Austin Fed.

The event's centerpiece film, 30 Days of Night, serves as inspiration for Camera Obscura's space as Jasmine says it "takes place in a fantastical world filled with gore and societal commentary." The film's combination of horror and reality is what endears them to it, and Jasmine notes that 30 Days of Night "[provides] us with an opportunity to consider what an alternate future might look like."

"It feels like an otherworldly call to action," they say. "Always stand up to oppressive murderers no matter what form they take."

Bringing this interactive cinematic event to Austin School of Film continues Jasmine's close relationship with the cinematic arts stronghold: Since 2020, Jasmine has been a sitting member of both the Motion Media Art Center and Cinemaker Space, where they've observed ASF's work making filmmaking more accessible for marginalized communities. "They have provided me with space, support and a home for my art," Jasmine says, "especially when I was most in need."



While 30 Days of Night's blood and guts will break the seal, Jasmine's thrilled to announce that Camera Obscura will be a quarterly event. Plans are underway to increase guest participation with an opportunity coming up for the audience to select the next film from three options: Us, Nope, and Cabin in the Woods. For now, however, Jasmine asks all guests to dress up in keeping with the night's gothic themes: "We are honored to have guests who seek horror, art, and community!"

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Happy Meals for Adults 📼

Whimsy meets elegance at Elementary BY MELANIE HAUPT

You might think, upon walking into Elementary, that the primary-colored refrigerator magnet letters, the little cubbies in the back corner stuffed with jackets and backpacks, and the menu designed to look like notebook paper complete with doodles in the margins is a bunch of gimmicky hand-waving. "Elementary school" is a cute framework for the concept, which opened on South Lamar last July, but these folks - chef and culinary director Colter Peck, creative director and beverage mastermind Chris Arial, and operations director Allan Bautista - are no freshmen poseurs. Instead, they're bringing a fresh (and refreshing) perspective to established cuisines and dishes.

Over the course of two visits. I was able to sample almost two-thirds of Elementary's playful, globally influenced menu. Informally divided according to traditional courses like starters, seafood, pastas, and proteins, the menu reflects the seasons and what is available at any given farmers' market at the time. On our first dinner visit, our party of four ordered six plates, each of which afforded everyone a modest sampling portion.

The burrata toast and the baked salad were the hands-down faves of the meal. The toast was thick and hearty, and the creamy cheese. strawberry, and fig balsamic worked together to emulate a very fancy PB&J. The baked salad - a heap of kale. Brussels sprouts. sweet potatoes, pickled apples, and pecans sprinkled with toasted panko crumbs - was a triumph of balance. Each bite was a perfect marriage of sweet, umami, acid, and crunch. The golden beet dish was similarly popular, with the walnut vinegar adding a butterscotch note to the bright and tangy beets and orange segments and crunchy, salty hazelnuts.

Our favorite among the non-veg options was the ramen risotto, with Japanese flavors overlaid on an Italian preparation. It's actually a perfect dish to split among four people, as the pork belly, egg yolk, and rice all add richness and heft; just make sure you're getting your fair share of pork belly when you spoon your portion onto your plate.



We ended our meal with an adorable dessert, a plate of milk and two chocolate chip cookies, served with a pool of dulce de leche for dipping. Half a small homemade cookie was just the right amount of sweetness to finish the night.

When my spouse and I returned for dinner. it was just the two of us, so we decided to go light, opting to share a Steelbow Farms salad, gnocchi, and a wagyu New York strip steak. I absolutely loved the salad, which comprised tender butter lettuce and slices of radish, dressed with dashi and citrus and topped with a generous swirl of nutty salsa macha. The tender gnocchi was napped with a cauliflower puree and studded with smoky sunchokes; the dish started off tasty, but was eventually overpowered by the intense smokiness. The steak was fine, not bad but nothing to write home about.

Despite the fact that alcohol isn't very fashionable these days (I guess we'll have to wait a little longer until microdosing is part of the official dining experience), the cocktail menu here is both fun and creative. You don't have to be a Gen X lady who binge-watched Sex and the City during grad school to enjoy the Kool-Aid Cosmo; the fermented kids' drink adds an edge and depth of flavor to what might otherwise be written off as a pandering throwaway. But one sip of the clarified gochujang sour made me mutter, "oh, go to hell." The crystal-clear concoction - an intoxicating blend of tequila, passion fruit, Cointreau, lime, and milk - is smooth and refreshing and entirely too drinkable. Make a plan for someone else to drive if you decide to have more than one.

The spirit-free options here are equally delightful. My friend enjoyed her nonalcoholic Riesling, describing it as "a

nice, crisp finish to the meal." I enjoyed my shrub, a seasonal tincture of chamomile and pear vinegar that somehow managed to be both bracing and mellow.

Elementary is a small restaurant with only about 15 tables. As such, they run with a lean crew, so set your expectations accordingly in terms of timings. On any given night, you will see one or two waitstaff running the floor with support from the host and a couple of server assistants. This means that you're going to wait a little while before being greeted at the door with "still or sparkling water?" and the first table touch from your server. On our second visit, our waiter was serving 10 or 11 tables; to his credit, he remained friendly, cheerful, and unruffled the entire time. In fact, everyone we encountered at Elementary was warm, friendly, and seemed genuinely glad to be there. It's not kindergarten teacher levels of cheerfulness, but nonetheless positive and mood elevating.

My one criticism is that, like most restaurants in Austin these days, Elementary is extremely loud. When the restaurant is full, it's literally impossible to hear the waitstaff and your dining companions. I also worry that someone in a wheelchair or other mobility aid would find the space difficult to navigate, given how close together the tables are. Most importantly, if you're dining with someone who has nut allergies, make sure you communicate this to your waiter, because

while many of the menu items list things like almonds, pistachios, and hazelnuts, some items, like the salsa macha, contain stealth nuts not mentioned on the menu.

If you've got time before dinner, be sure to pop in to Hopscotch, the tiny 15-seat bar catty-corner to the restaurant. There you'll find a sassy assortment of martinis (my spouse enjoyed his classic martini, served dirty), a healthy selection of retail wines (my glass of C.L. Butaud's Frenchy Cinsault rosé was a smooth drinker), and a cheeky "bartender's choice," which on the night we went was an exquisite five-spice Old Fashioned topped with an adorable tiny rubber ducky.

I have left smiling every time I've dined at Elementary, and that's not a particularly common occurrence. Not because every dining experience I have is bad, but because dining here made me happy. During a challenging time for the restaurant industry and beyond, Elementary is a revelation, fearlessly coloring outside the lines and joyfully embracing both whimsy and elegance when we need it the most.

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Myth and Culture Mingle in Annalise Gratovich's Complex Prints VISUALARTS

Ongoing "Carrying Things From Home" project nears its close BY CAT MCCARREY

Picture a Russian nesting doll, but instead of a palm-sized stackable figure, it's on canvas and large enough to look you in the eye. Now you're close to grasping the immense scope of Annalise Gratovich's ongoing print collection. "Carrying Things From Home."

Presented as part of PrintAustin, a monthlong festival spotlighting Austin's printmaking scene, Gratovich's decadelong project is up to seven towering works in what will be an eight-piece series (final print The Fool should be done by the end of the year). Each canvas centers a matryoshkaesque doll figure, complete with elemental names like The Mariner, The Hunter, or The Mother. Their black shadowed eves stare outward. Wrapped in richly decorated robes and surrounded by plants, the rounded figures offer stylized symbols of their trade - an arrow-riddled whale, a curled rabbit, the sheltered face of a child.

The latest exhibition debuts The Healer, a massive being decked in an elaborate smock, crowned with leaves and webs. Mossy greens and browns spotlight sprouting fungi at the doll's feet. Intricate details - the spiderweb headpiece, the whorls of the smock, overlapping leaf tendrils - invite closer scrutiny. The mind whirls to draw mythic connections in each inked element. The other six prints equally evoke alluring riddles. Why the drooped bird in The Builder? What is held in The Undertaker's tiny coffin? Are the trees in The Mother there to show personal growth or

According to Gratovich, "Carrying Things From Home" consciously stems from her own cultural landscape. The dolls and textiles pay homage to her Ukrainian heritage. The flora and desert-tinged color palette nod to her Texas home. One of the oldest prints, The Musician, is directly inspired by her history. Here the doll holds a large accordion, a lit cigarette dangling from its lips. This harks back to Gratovich's great-grandfather, a Ukrainian refugee during World War II. He fled the country but took his accordion, which he used to entertain American troops in exchange for cigarettes. The archetype holds the actual tokens seen in the story.

This series is a labor of love, heavy emphasis on the labor. Gratovich uses the chine collé woodcut technique, where a paper design is overlaid on the woodcut to add color and dimension. Selective of her hues, Gratovich hand-dyes the paper. The Healer contained roughly 60 paper elements, carefully and quickly applied with wheat paste before finalizing the print. With work this big - each canvas is 71 by 40 inches - it takes a team to complete the process. helped Gratovich set and handle the art. The chine collé process adds a delicate layering to each piece, slight fuzz and depth. Between that and the sheer size of the prints, witnessing this collection in person is a must.

While the "totemic beings" of the dolls are the exhibit's focal point, Flatbed also displays a smattering of Gratovich's letterpress and collage work. There are folkloric botanical prints, smaller-scale works full of sinewy leaves and branching roots, every so often interrupted by ominous skeletal forms.

Her collages, amalgamations of print remnants framed in copper and wood, combine similar floral motifs with hands or faces. Gratovich turned to collage after diagnosis and treatment for an autoimmune disease. "The collage was the work I could take with me when I had to leave home, work in bed, or during my hospitalizations," says Gratovich of that time. "I lost a lot of physical ability and of course, creativity, in illness. I had done a little collage work previously but that practice really bloomed when I wasn't able to be in my studio or to develop new print work." The yearning, grasping motifs in those pieces particularly echo her journey. I especially enjoyed Metamorphosis I and II, where clips of leaves, stars, and falling flower petals circle an animalistic head.

Regardless of the work, whether small woodcuts or her epic figures, Gratovich's work spins through nature's cycles, holding the fraught tension between death and growth. Her depictions of health, doubts, fears, and hopes leap off each inked form. Gratovich's art may be directly sown from her being, but perfectly presents a universal passage through humanity.

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A Freight Train Ride Through Lucinda Williams' Artistry

Former Austinite stood tall on the blues in soundtracked ACL Live read-along BY RACHEL RASCOE

Given Lucinda Williams' spring 2023 memoir Don't Tell Anybody the Secrets I Told You, the singer's reception at ACL Live at the Moody Theater on Friday night felt a bit like seeing the movie adaptation.

Her throaty narration and funny details, alongside archival photos onscreen, reintroduced the characters of her life sparked with the interest of them not quite matching your mind's eye. The generally chronological set list, tapping the 70-yearold's most regarded records, felt hand-picked to specifically soundtrack the read-along.

Coming off a big year for re-bundling concerts with other forms, like Taylor Swift's career-recapping Eras Tour film, the conceptual continuation of Williams' memoir into a weighty two-hour-and-twenty-minute live show makes a smart fit. Though her road dates stretching back to last July were billed around latest release Stories From a Rock n Roll Heart, the album provided only two tracks in this new bookfocused tour run. Her life story, and its spongy alignment with many facets of American music

history, led the show. No opener needed, just her fourpiece Buick 6 band, now including guitarist Marc Ford from the Black Crowes.

Of course, this historical trajectory energetically peaked early around the turn of the century, making some track choices a little obligatory. Long spoken introductions, "the stories behind the songs," walked a similar path from the Louisiana-born singer's memoir with funny, live-wire additions from a decadesdeveloped orator. Like when she moved from Austin to Los Angeles in 1984, as she wrote, her Texas friends taunted that she'd be back with her tail between her legs - but she didn't write that they also warned of California Mexican food topped with sour cream.

Back in the Austin stomping grounds of her early singer-songwriter days, she returned to the Moody Theater for the first time since 2019. Not long after, in 2020, she suffered a debilitating stroke.

Opener "Blind Pearly Brown" - the set list's only unreleased track - paid tribute to a preacher who would sing gospel blues downtown during her childhood in Macon, Georgia. She detailed her current status as singer and storyteller: "I'm not playing right now due to this stroke I had, but it's just temporary. I'm planning on getting back out." The winter wear/Western wear-donning crowd who had already cheered as she padded, with assistance, up the stage stairs in Converse high-tops - didn't need any consolation.

The night's only run of covers detailed her early totems: Elizabeth Cotten's folk blues ("Freight Train"), Bob Dylan's blues rock ("It Takes a Lot to Laugh, It Takes a Train to Cry"), and Hank Williams' country blues ("Jambalaya [On the Bayou]"), the last of which appeared on her debut all-covers LP and ushered in her own rambling Eighties barroom sound onstage. Prior, the first notes of the Dylan track, and a meaningful look at her aiding stagehand, brought her to her feet. She never sat back down for the next two hours, which felt victorious enough.

Beloved breakout "Car Wheels on a Gravel Road" came early, made a little more zydeco/

psych-ish as her band treaded gingerly on the night's most recognizable hits, keeping time with whichever way Williams' rugged and stillbeautifully-standing voice threw the lines. (While home for Christmas, I recently realized this song was ingrained in me early via my mom's Williams-Sonoma-produced compilation CD called Backyard Barbecue.) Freeway lines kept flying on "Bus to Baton Rouge," where granular lyrical detail and pedal steel best displayed that she's been retelling her childhood in song since the very beginning. Friday night's speeches just upped the context.

Shifting gears to a structure mirrored in her memoir, the show's most successful run skipped through stories of "misfit" men in her life, pinpointed ultra-openly with old pictures onscreen. "Little Angel, Little Brother" showed her sibling, "Pineola" the poet Frank Stanford, and "Lake Charles" her onetime boyfriend Clyde Woodward III. We're lucky Williams isn't the type of artist who doesn't want to say exactly what a song's about.

Before the hometown highlight of Blaze Foley remembrance "Drunken Angel," she said Charlie Sexton - due for his own ACL Live gig with Elvis Costello the next night visited her backstage in Dallas the day before. She only stayed vague before the sharp lines of "Those Three Days." Summary of the evening: "You can find out more in my book."

Fans didn't seem as jazzed for slow ponder "Fruits of My Labor," Williams' most currently embraced song in millennial covers by national acts like Waxahatchee and Rostam. Locally, it's easy to absorb her sustaining influence on the indie scene in recent memory: Lomelda and More Eaze took on "Lonely Girls," On Being an Angel recorded "Metal Firecracker," and Keeled Scales label head Tony Presley covered "Six Blocks Away" at the Cactus Cafe last summer. Only hitch in the chronological sweep, those kinds of Nineties/2000s bright spots felt sorely unrepresented.

Williams touched on current preferences after the bare-bones burner of "Heaven Blues," asking, "Do v'all think that song goes over OK? Is it too repetitive?" After admiring the Black Keys and the White Stripes, the final stretch pulled Stories From a Rock n Roll Heart's title track and "Where the Song Will Find Me." Finally breaking her own rules, "Joy," which she performed on the Austin City Limits TV show in 1998, jumped all the way back to Car Wheels.

The determined roots rollick fit right in with her latest songs, bringing home that, for Lu, it's always been the blues.

New project of Glaze members Firas Isat and Jake Villarreal. Shutterr leader JD Salazar, and Polyvinyl Records art director Janelle Abad, No Desire puts their saddest foot forward with debut single "Try Aging." "Bury yourself in the clouds and never come down," Abad sighs over a melancholy guitar line. "Everything you wanted disappears when you think it's honest." Despite its gloomy overtones, the track maintains an agile pace: Isat and Salazar's trills uplift the murky melody and humming feedback offers in-the-room depth. By the end, Abad repeats, "I wanna try again" - not quite the song's title, but a welcome, optimistic spin.

From the excellent Lone Star artistmixing Texas Wild compilation, released last fall to benefit the Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation, this pairing of two starry-eyed, country-loving pop practitioners finally uploads to streaming. Perfect timing, the song arrives from the lo-fi, high-impact catalog of the late Daniel Johnston, who would have turned 63 on Monday. The new duet stretches out with spacey synth and pedal steel, an unhurried extension of the searching subject matter on Shakey Graves and Jess Williamson's respective 2023 records. Williamson, who traveled from Marfa to join Graves onstage for producer Walker Lukens' Paramount Theatre variety show last month, lends extra intrigue to the line "this is a promise with a catch." - RACHEL RASCOE

Box Step, "Zombieland"

Indie rock newcomers Box Step ponder the woes of 21st-century existence on this charmingly cheerful apocalyptic prelude. The group, made up of four friends and fronted by vocalist Sofia Ortiz Neidhart, have spent the last year playing shows around town ahead of their art-rock-saturated debut LP Left Foot Forward, released earlier this month. Dominated by a funky bassline and an-all smiles guitar riff, "Zombieland," the album's stripped-down opening track, is a sharp reckoning with all things metaphysical. Punchy one-liners. thoughtful musings, and perceptive witticisms abound, breathing new life into modernity's sea of the walking dead. - ELIZABETH BRAATEN

Amigo the Devil, "The Mechanic"

Second single from the upcoming Yours Until the War Is Over, "The Mechanic" encapsulates what makes Danny Kiranos, aka Amigo the Devil, special: folk-shaped melodies supporting plainspoken lyrics that face truth squarely, without pathos. Accompanied by acoustic guitar and gently enhanced by nearly subliminal strings and piano, the song's protagonist admits to his faults and acknowledges the hurt he's caused, looking for a path forward without asking for grace. "I know you weren't broken." he sings with neither self-pity nor disdain. "I just needed something to fix." Seeking forgiveness without asking, Kiranos lets the underlying need remain obvious but unspoken. - MICHAEL TOLAND

francene rouelle, "Love Wasn't Enough"

Iced with sugary, ribboned resonance, francene rouelle begins her princess reign with a diaphanous, pop-R&B realization of her pain from a toxic relationship. Marking the first single released under local Asian American-forward label mHart - spearheaded by producer-manager waverly – "Love Wasn't Enough" leans into liquefied melodies and riffs that underline the 22-year-old songwriter's vocal agility. The first-generation Filipina glistens over a reverberant bass and crystallized swishes and synths, flowing into an unfettered path toward catharsis. Debuting EP finally a fairytale on April 19 as mHart's second signing after promqueen, francene rouelle embraces a feminine, frilly aura in presenting her narrative. - ANGELA LIM


