ZILCH ON ZILKER

Dear Editor,

Behind closed doors, a proposed \$200 million "vision plan" for Zilker Park has been developed with little public input but with ACL/C3 and LiveNation/Ticketmaster at the table – their presence denied until discovered by advocates. The Parks Department declined to reveal meeting notes and required an open records request – which is in the hands of A.G. Paxton. This "vision plan" proposes a three-story underground parking garage that violates regulations protecting the springs; a Visitor Center complex increasing impervious cover near the springs, moving the Hillside Theatre, etc. The massive construction will irrevocably alter the park. Most importantly, Zilker would be run by a "unified nonprofit," not the Parks Department. Years of what looks like deliberate neglect is being used to justify radical development, and if this happens, soccer players, runners, Barton's swimmers, and local kids will see our beloved park closed for months and years. Find out more and fight it! If you care about Zilker Park remaining a natural spot rather than an entertainment venue, please join us and show up at the Austin Parks Commission meeting this Monday, April 24, at 6pm at City Hall, council chambers.

May 6 General and Special Elections

City of Austin residents will have two competing propositions on their ballot for the Saturday, May 6, special election: Prop A, circulated by Equity Action, and Prop B, circulated by Voters for Oversight and Police Accountability (connected to the Austin Police Association). The Chronicle Editorial Board makes the following recommendations. (Meanwhile, voters in surrounding municipalities and school districts will have other matters on their ballots; see a sample ballot at your county clerk's office, as listed in the voting info box below.)

City of Austin Prop A: FOR.

It's time for Austin to enter a new era of civilian oversight of the Austin Police Department, which we feel Prop A can achieve. Within the past three years, the public has learned about a long-simmering scandal within APD that might have been uncovered earlier with more thorough oversight. The brutality Austin police officers showed Black Lives Matter protesters in 2020 – which, in addition to the pain and suffering inflicted on survivors, generated expensive lawsuits for the city – along with other high-profile examples of state violence have all underscored the need for more robust police accountability. Prop A may not create that system on its own, but its passage would represent the biggest stride Austin – and perhaps any American city – has taken in strengthening police oversight in decades.

City of Austin Prop B: AGAINST.

On the merits of each ordinance alone, we'd be in favor of Prop A and against Prop B. But the deceptive, underhanded tactics deployed by the Austin Police Association to get Prop B on the ballot just cements the case against their ordinance. If APA truly believed that Prop B provided a better system of oversight, then why didn't they campaign for it openly and honestly? They didn't, because they know it doesn't – what it would do, though, is install a system of oversight that the police union finds acceptable. As important as it is for Austin voters to embrace Prop A, it is almost as important for voters to reject Prop B.

May 2023 General Election – EARLY VOTING APRIL 24-MAY 2

TRAVIS COUNTY VOTERS may vote at any "vote center" (where you see a "Vote Here/Aqui" sign).

VOTER ID: Texas law requires registered voters to show one of seven forms of photo ID (current or expired within four years) issued by the Texas Dept. of Public Safety or U.S. government. Voters without photo ID may vote after signing a Reasonable Impediment Declaration and providing supporting documentation. Visit countyclerk.traviscountytx.gov/departments/elections for a list of acceptable forms of ID and supporting documentation. No photo ID is required when voting by mail, except for first-time voters who did not include ID information when registering. You will receive a notice with your ballot if ID is required.

Because cats breed only in the warm months, which can stretch from March through October in Central Texas, local animal shelters predict around **5,000 kittens** will be born outdoors this year. Experts in Austin – the largest no-kill city in America – warn against taking stray cats to shelters as they’ll likely be separated from caring mothers.

FLAT-TIRED OF CONSERVATIVE COURTS After a federal judge at a Dallas district court issued a preliminary injunction to remove the **FDA** approval of mifepristone – the abortion pill used in more than half of all U.S. abortions – the **Supreme Court** placed a hold on the request until April 19. The Supreme Court decided Wednesday to extend a pause on a lower-court ruling, ensuring mifepristone is available for now.

CONSPIRA-CYCLING Another person’s body was found in **Lady Bird Lake** on April 15, the fourth since February. Despite concerns online of a serial killer in Austin, investigators don’t suspect any foul play.

BACKPEDALING ON ZERO WASTE In 2011, the city department in charge of waste collection set out an ambitious plan of reducing the amount of trash sent to landfills by **90%** before 2040. KUT reports **Austin Resource Recovery** isn’t meeting those “zero waste” goals 12 years later. The diversion rate remains close to where it began, about 38%.

SADDLING THE EARTH WITH OUR TRASH While we’re talking about garbage, a recent report from **Greenpeace** found that about **5% of plastic** in America is actually recycled. Despite this, Austin city officials and the facilities that recycle our blue bin material say that about **80% of “recyclable” waste** – not just plastic – is repurposed, KUT reported this week after finding that many Austinites are skeptical of recycling.

THE SPOKES OF JUSTICE TURN SLOWLY Some gun safety advocates told The Texas Tribune this week that they see a greater willingness to discuss firearm restrictions at the state Capitol, almost one year after the **Robb Elementary** School shooting in Uvalde. It’s unlikely that **commonsense gun reforms** will gain any traction in the Legislature, but many observers say an open dialogue is the first step. With the biennial session ending in late May (special sessions pending), time will tell if it’s only lip service.

JUST KEEP PEDALING The city’s **Parks and Recreation Department** has made great progress hiring lifeguards, **Director Kimberly McNeeley** told City Council at Tuesday’s work session. She attributed the progress partly to better pay (\$20 per hour) and a \$750 bonus for those who complete training and start guarding lives, the Austin Monitor reports.

Chill Out, America!

Too many stupid shootings; TGI 4/20

Mistakes happen; best intentions don’t always lead to best results. But if the baseline is, you’re ready to use deadly force at any time to protect yourself from the bad guys out there, then bam!, those mistakes become deadly. That’s been the case in a string of high-profile gun tragedies this week: Ralph Yarl, the 16-year-old Black kid in Kansas City who was shot Thursday after ringing the wrong doorbell; Kaylin Gillis, the 20-year-old girl in New York who was shot and killed Monday after pulling into the wrong driveway; and right here in Central Texas, the two high school cheerleaders who were shot Tuesday night after opening the wrong car door in an H-E-B parking lot in Elgin.

Giving the benefit of the doubt, I can believe that each of those shooters believed in the moment that there was a legitimate reason to pull the trigger. But again, if a large number of people are primed to be ready to use deadly force “when needed,” some fraction of them are going to mistakenly see such a need every once in a while. Oops. And that’s not even counting people with actual bad intent. Part of the problem is that there are just too many guns out there, and just about any lunatic can get one, in most cases perfectly legally. (No word yet on the Elgin shooter.) The Gun Violence Archive, whom we’ve featured many times before, keeps among other things a tally of accidental shootings,

and there are so many that I couldn’t find the cases I was looking for. There were nine on Monday: “thought the gun was unloaded,” “showing how to disassemble; shot self in hand, friend in head, killing her,” “child picked up gun, shot self; child died in hospital,” “conducting safety training,” “accidentally shot friend while clearing gun” ... But a big part of the problem as well is attitude – the expectation that a kid knocking on your door is going to harm you, the feeling that your community is under siege by people who are not like you, and that just about half of the people in the country are either idiots, or plain evil. I blame right-wing media for a lot of that, especially the more violent side, though the left is to blame as well. The sad thing is, hate and



It's "an exciting opportunity to come together with industry leaders, hemp farmers and entrepreneurs who are blazing a brilliant path toward creating a prosperous future for U.S.-based hemp industries." Today's **Austin City Council meeting** includes a notable item, timely for Earth Day, "directing the City Manager to create a plan and implementation schedule to transition the City to **sustainable low-embodied-carbon concrete**," seeing as concrete, and specifically the cement used in it, is a huge contributor to climate change, and city planners are spraying it around all over the place these days (especially in parks, it seems). But if we really wanted to get serious about the issue, we'd start using **hempcrete**, which the University of British Columbia chose as its primary building material for a new 2,400-square-foot building called Third Space Commons. It was built "with a goal to reach near-zero 'embodied carbon' – the total amount of CO2 emissions associated with the production, transportation, and disposal of a material or product," according to an article this week in *Hemp Today*. The project has already won an award for its work in carbon accounting, and will be entered in the U.S. Department of Energy Solar Decathlon Build Challenge.

A recent article in *Forbes* called the hemp industry's prospects "truly exciting," especially in view of recent court rulings legalizing compounds like Delta-8 THC and elements of the new **farm bill** currently being developed in Congress, which could bump the legal THC limit to 1%, and liberalize other current restrictions. WILL TEXAS EXPAND MEDICAL MARIJUANA ACCESS?

Weed be a lot cooler if we did **BY DEX WESLEY PARRA**

When the **Texas Department of Public Safety** announced in January that it would accept new applications to license **medical marijuana dispensing organizations**, a budding chorus of advocates and patients celebrated the potential for greater access to cannabis. But as the April 28 deadline to apply approaches, many of them worry it may not be enough, given that current access to the **Compassionate Use Program (CUP)** is extremely restricted.

In 2015, the Texas legislature enacted the CUP law, enabling the Texas DPS to create a registry of licensed physicians authorized to prescribe low-THC cannabis to patients with intractable epilepsy. Several other qualifying conditions, including autism, multiple sclerosis, and terminal cancer, were added in later legislative sessions.

The law also required that DPS issue at least three licenses to dispensing organizations, but "no more than the number of licenses necessary to ensure reasonable statewide access." Each prospective dispensary must also pay over \$7,000 to apply and, if selected, owes the state close to half a million for a two-year term. Despite the number of patients enrolled in the program skyrocketing from a couple hundred in 2018 to over 50,000 by last month, DPS still only licenses three dispensing organizations for the entire state. Several sources said that only two, **Texas Original** and **Goodblend**, are still open for business.

Texas Original CEO **Nico Richardson** said the license for dispensing organizations requires companies to be responsible for cultivation, manufacturing, internal testing, and dispensing. He said that process benefits larger organizations with deep pockets, so granting new licenses could favor multistate operators (MSOs).

"Under the current license, you'd have to do [everything] in one location," said Richardson, whose dispensary is in South Austin. "But you also, under the law, have to serve the entire state of Texas." He

added that dispensing organizations must hire an entire fleet of in-house drivers, since they can't ship with the **U.S. Postal Service** or other couriers. "Until we can have access to off-site inventory, and allow patients to come pick up their prescription at a dispensing location across the state, [it's] very difficult to provide reasonable access to patients."

Medical cannabis advocates celebrated last week when the Texas House passed a bipartisan bill that would expand eligibility for CUP to patients with chronic pain. If approved by the Senate and signed by the governor, **House Bill 1805** would also authorize the Texas Department of State Health Services to add qualifying conditions without needing to change state law.

Texas NORML Executive Director **Jax James** said that compared to other states with medical marijuana programs, Texas has a much lower patient rate per population. And while she celebrated the passage of HB 1805, she said that ultimately the issue comes down to regulating delivery, which makes it difficult for patients to navigate getting their prescriptions.

In a mid-February DPS meeting of the Public Safety Commission, members discussed the future of CUP amid ongoing application reviews. At the time, 57 entities filed paperwork to become dispensing organizations (costing them each \$7,356). Chief **Wayne Mueller** of the **Regulatory Services Division** said they're looking at other states' medical marijuana programs, specifically Florida's, to avoid going "too far, too fast." He said the Texas' program isn't robust yet and that "it's going from infancy to toddler at this point in time." At the time of publication, DPS has not responded for comment.

"The good news is that there are people in Texas that are benefiting from cannabis right now, and that is bringing them great relief," said James. "We need to continue to put the pressure on to make sure that we don't leave any patients behind." ■

Putting Food on the Table

Ahead of farm bill, Rep. Casar taps local farmers for input

The first farm bill was enacted in 1933 – FDR’s response to the Great Depression and the Dust Bowl, meant to shore up agriculture, conservation, rural development, and nutrition programs. At **FarmShare** in Cedar Creek last Thursday, in a roundtable discussion with local farmers, freshman Rep. **Greg Casar** upheld the same goals: “We want to make sure that we’re moving forward a farm bill that actually supports healthier food options, a more resilient and stable food supply chain, where we have more access to local food, where farmers can make a decent wage.” As the omnibus bill comes up again this year for the first time since 2018, soaring food prices have puffed up already bloated agricultural monopolies with massive lobbying power. Meanwhile, 10% of Americans experience food insecurity, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and locally it’s 15%, according to last year’s **State of the Food System** report.

Coming from a discussion at the **San Antonio Food Bank**, Casar noted that one of his biggest priorities on the **House Committee on Agriculture** would be defending Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits from Republicans, including House Speaker **Kevin McCarthy**, who aim to cut it and the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC). SNAP’s success also has implications for producers. Casar told the *Chronicle* that for many San Antonio

farming families, food access programs are an important stream of income: “Vouchers for seniors, direct food delivery, programs for food access were basically the only reason that they were still able to make it and be on their parents’ land. These are folks that have been growing okra and eggplant for generations. That’s what we want our kids fed.”

SNAP is as hard to understand as any other bureaucratic agency, noted Casar, but “we have to make it so that you don’t have to have a legal department” to access benefits. **Michelle Akindiya**, education director for FarmShare, said Congress needs to “provide ongoing funding ... The same people that need SNAP this year will probably need it the next year.” She also urged the expansion of incentive programs such as **Double Up Food Bucks**, which doubles the amount of produce you can get when you use SNAP dollars, “to not just urban areas but grocery stores in rural communities.”

New farmers need the most help, but are also the most promising population to tackle the ag-fueled climate crisis: According to a 2022 study by the **Natural Resources Defense Council**, “97% of young farmers reported using sustainable practices and 86% described their farms as regenerative.” However, the programs in place that could help them become financially solvent aren’t being used: Only 21% are certified organic and only 11% have participated in programs that could reimburse them for organic certification costs. “It needs to be simpler

and more fruitful for young farmers to access resources that support organic farming” wrote the NRDC.

Access to land and startup capital are the biggest barriers to entry for young farmers. Especially in Central Texas, where prices are driven to astronomical heights by competition from developers as big as Elon Musk, farmers are being driven farther and farther from their markets – less than 1% of the food Austin consumes is grown here.

Loan programs that do exist, like the **National Resources Conservation Service** – which the roundtable noted is the most trusted program across the board – and the **USDA Farm Service Agency**, are consistently

underfunded and don’t do sufficient outreach. Steelbow Farm’s **Finegan Ferreboeuf** said FSA’s low-interest loan programs “don’t really make that much sense for the Austin market” as they’re “notorious for taking like, six to nine months. No landowner is gonna wait [that long]. And it’s also capped at like \$600,000. That’s nothing [in Austin].” **Greg Mast**, who works at the **Central Texas Food Bank** and also has a small vegetable farm in Elgin, urged “access to working capital that does not require a rapid repayment in the very early stages of growing the farm business. So many of the programs are reimbursement programs, but I don’t have any spare cash to front the expense.”

HAYS CO. JAILER INDICTED IN ER ROOM KILLING SKIPS JAIL

Is Comal County – where 71% of the electorate voted for Trump in 2020 – on track to becoming the next soft-on-crime San Francisco? Or perhaps lawbreaking law enforcement just enjoys a radically different justice system than the rest of us.

On Good Friday, the sheriff’s office in adjacent Hays County announced it was no longer employing **Isalah Garcia**, a jailer who’d been indicted the day before on a third-degree felony charge of deadly conduct. In December, Garcia fatally shot **Joshua Wright** – a pretrial detainee at the Hays County Jail who was accused of a few nonviolent offenses – multiple times in the back in an ER room where Garcia was charged with watching Wright.

On April 6, a grand jury determined the jailer’s actions were probably illegal, and so the **Hays County District Clerk** ordered Garcia arrested and brought to “the courthouse of said County in the city of San Marcos,” per Hays County Clerk documents. But rather than land on an unfamiliar side of the steel bars in the very building where he had been employed since 2018, records obtained by the *Chronicle* indicate that Garcia turned himself into **Comal County Jail** in New Braunfels at 8:15pm.

Anyone who watched the new *Super Mario Bros. Movie*, clocking in at 92 minutes, spent more time in the theatre than Garcia spent in jail. By 9:41pm – without posting a penny of bail for his felony indictment – he was again a free man.

Hays County’s district court administrator told the *Chronicle* that Judge **Andrew Leonle**, the magistrate in Comal County, issued a personal bond that enabled Garcia to go home without paying bail. While mainstream media broadly reported Garcia’s release on a \$25,000 bond, no outlet clarified that the jailer would only be required to fork over money should he skip out on his eventual court date. In contrast, Hays County Jail’s website lists Wright’s various bond amounts as totaling \$18,000. Deprived of a personal bond, Wright’s inability to afford bail meant that instead of similarly awaiting his day in court from the comfort of home, he was doomed to do so in custody, including under Garcia’s watch. – *Jordan Buckley*

On a larger scale, the farm bill could not only address food insecurity and encourage new farmers, but also coax agriculture away from **Monsanto** and toward a greener future. "Agriculture currently is a huge contributor to climate change, but we could be a huge part of the solution," Ferreboeuf noted. "But that takes a lot of money, a lot of time, a lot of innovation and creativity, and that needs to be big resources coming from top down. Little farms, we're experimenting, we're doing it, but that's somewhere where I feel we don't have support."

Akindiya added that big-picture, treating farming operations as a single-proprietor business is unsustainable: "That's probably one of the most fragile ways to set up your food system," she said, pointing to the example of **Johnson's Backyard Garden** next door to Farmshare, which sold to a developer in 2021 as a result of the owner's mental health crisis: "One person was able to make that decision about a farm that was feeding hundreds of people a week. Our food system doesn't have to be based on a small-business model. Other important infrastructure that we don't treat as a small business are things like power, water, gas. Maybe food is next?" ■

What Do You Have to Do to Get Fired at the Veterans Commission?

Allegations of racism, toxicity don't seem to be sparking change **BY ABE ASHER**

Allegra Geller was attending a team lunch in the Texas Veterans Commission's former offices in Chase Park in late July of last year when she made a comment regarding tensions in Swedish politics. She said the director of her agency, **James Bracken**, thought she was referring to tension over immigration from Muslim countries and reacted angrily.

"For five, 10 minutes, he just ranted about, 'I was over there, I was on the ground, I know what those savages are like, they're not even human, they're filthy animals, all Muslims should be dragged out into the street and shot,'" Geller recounted. She said she was so uncomfortable she wanted to leave the room. "I was so horrified," she said, "I thought, 'Oh my god, he's going to get our agency shut down.'"

Another employee, who declined to be named out of a fear of retaliation, said they overheard Bracken's comments as well. "He has a very loud voice, and he sounded very angry – hateful, really. [He said] that all Muslims needed to be shot," they told us.

At the time, Geller was working as a staff services officer in the **Fund for Veterans Assistance** – the branch of the **Texas Veterans Commission** responsible for coordinating funding for veterans' support services across the state. Geller left the agency in January to take a new job. Before leaving, however, she filed a human resources complaint against Bracken detailing the alleged hate speech incident and a range of other issues with his management.

The outburst at the team lunch was memorable, Geller said, but it was far from the only

instance in which she says she heard Bracken make demeaning, hateful, or otherwise prejudiced statements in the office. Multiple sources told the *Chronicle* that Bracken has made disparaging remarks about Democratic political candidates and their voters, and refused to grant accommodation requests in a timely manner. In the human resources complaint, which Geller submitted Jan. 6, she alleged that Bracken frequently spoke to her and other women in the office in a condescending tone and frequently told staff members, "What happens at FVA stays at FVA."

Bracken's conduct, Geller said, left her crying in the bathroom at work and calling in sick to avoid facing him. "I have accepted another position and am leaving TVC solely due to the toxic work environment perpetuated by Jim Bracken," she wrote in the HR complaint. "I have been bullied, demeaned, insulted, and disrespected by him, and my disabilities have been treated as an inconvenience."

The TVC declined to make Bracken available for an interview, or to answer specific questions about the incidents. "The Texas Veterans Commission takes all employee complaints and comments seriously," Public Affairs Officer Jim Halbrook wrote in a statement to the *Chronicle*. "Privacy considerations limit our ability to share confidential information outside the agency about our employees. The agency is aware of this particular complaint and has conducted a thorough internal investigation in accordance with our human resource policy. Ultimately, TVC has taken the necessary

appropriate actions concerning this investigation to ensure that all our employees are following TVC's standards of conduct."

Halbrook confirmed that Bracken is still employed by the TVC, but declined to say whether Bracken has ever faced discipline for his conduct or whether an investigation into his behavior is ongoing. Both Bracken and FVA Operations Manager Craig Towlson sent emails to FVA staff members asking them not to speak to the *Chronicle* for this story, per emails obtained by the *Chronicle*.

Bracken, a former U.S. Marine Corps member who completed four overseas deployments, joined the TVC in 2019. At that time, **Rob Harriss** was working as a staff services officer at the FVA. He said the change in atmosphere at the fund when Bracken joined was "night and day."

"Pretty much any time anyone walked into his office to ask him a question or share information with him, [Bracken] would always respond or retort in an extremely abrasive manner," Harriss said. "And if he wasn't extremely abrasive or pugnacious, he'd be extremely condescending."

Harriss said Bracken was particularly hard on female employees and that he was prone to outbursts of anger. Harriss filed a complaint about Bracken's behavior with Resource Management Director **Chip Osbourne** and asked to be transferred to another department within the TVC, but after a short investigation, Osbourne told Harriss that he could not substantiate his complaints and told him to either go back to work for Bracken or leave the commission altogether. Harriss decided to leave.

In addition to Geller and Harriss, sources told the *Chronicle* that at least one other person filed a human resources complaint against Bracken and had that complaint dismissed. Geller said she is uncertain of the status of her own complaint. Harriss blamed Bracken's ongoing employment in the face of those complaints on the TVC's leadership at its Austin headquarters.

"They are all retired military officers, so with that comes a sense of entitlement that comes with their positions, their past experiences in leadership ... and unfortunately, in the military, there's a little bit of impunity for improper conduct with midlevel and especially high-ranking military officers," Harriss said. "Naturally, that has carried over to the Veterans Commission."

For some lower-ranking employees, that culture of impunity continues to take a heavy toll. "I'm having a very hard time getting over this," Geller said. ■

TxDOT Takeover of Walnut Creek Trail Section for Self-Driving Cars Halted

On April 6, the **Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization** postponed a vote that would have reclassified part of the **MoKan Corridor** – a 28-mile stretch of abandoned railway from U.S. 183 in Austin to Georgetown, and a site for some final pieces of the **Walnut Creek urban trails system** – as a test road for autonomous vehicles. In response to public pushback, the **Texas Department of Transportation** asked CAMPO to push the vote, which was originally slated for April 10, "so a full public engagement process can occur" throughout 2023. Even elected officials were surprised to hear of the request – Mayor Pro Tem **Paige Ellis**, who sits on the CAMPO Board, told KUT it's unclear "who's asking for it," and TxDOT admitted putting it before the board was "premature."

The reclassification of the corridor to a "principal arterial" – renamed **Mobility for Connected and Automated Vehicles** (MoCAV) – would pave sections of **Southern Walnut Creek Trail** for a four-lane road running through Round Rock and Pflugerville to the Georgetown Capital Area Rural Transportation System station, and would be available for normal vehicles as well as self-driving cars, with a shared-use path. Mobility bonds from 2016 and 2020 have funded projects to connect all sections of the 19-mile Walnut Creek trail system, which would range from **Govalle Neighborhood Park** in East Austin to **Balcones District Park** in North Austin. The last pieces of the northern section – some of which overlap with the MoKan Corridor – are slated to begin construction next year, pending TxDOT approval. When asked if MoCAV construction, if approved, would necessitate abandoning the last of the northern section, a TxDOT rep wrote that they are "not planning to remove any trails through the corridor."

SHOOT FIRST, WRITE A LAW TO MAKE IT LEGAL LATER

For more than a year, the **Travis County District Attorney's Office** has been preparing to try 19 Austin police officers on felony assault charges for shooting protesters in the head with "beanbag" rounds during the **Black Lives Matter** protests of May 30-31, 2020. Now, a bill that would wreck the prosecutions is moving quickly in the Texas Senate.

Senate Bill 2593, introduced quietly two weeks ago, removes criminal liability for any police officer who exhibits or uses a "less lethal projectile device" to assault or injure a citizen, including a child, elderly individual, or disabled individual, so long as the officer did not intend to cause serious injury or death. The term "less lethal projectile device" goes undefined, but would include shotguns modified to shoot bags of lead shot, known as beanbag rounds. SB 2593 passed the Senate Criminal Justice Committee on April 18 on a 6-0 vote. It's expected to receive quick approval in the Senate before moving on to the House.

At the April 18 hearing, SB 2593 was framed by its author, state Rep. **Drew Springer**, R-Muenster, and even by liberal state Sen. **John Whitmire**, D-Houston, as a way to encourage police officers to use gentler, "less lethal" types of force in their encounters with citizens. Those opposing the bill said that removing criminal consequences for officers who shoot citizens will actually encourage more frequent uses of force. They added that the bill, like others at the Legislature this session, is an affront to Austin's self-governance, meddling with prosecutions already set in motion by Travis County grand juries.

Chris Harris, policy director of the **Austin Justice Coalition**, said SB 2593 would remove the last chance to bring accountability to the officers who shot protesters. "There's no administrative discipline that has occurred," Harris said, referring to the fact that the punishments handed out by APD leaders for excessive


uses of force at the protests were few and shrouded in secrecy. "Because of that, the criminal courts are the last real opportunity for the community to know the full truth of the matter. They're the last chance to assign accountability for people who suffered multiple skull fractures, for a pregnant woman who was shot in the stomach, for medics and passersby who were shot. So without a system that allows there to be accountability, the criminal system is the last resort. Now they're trying to close that off, too."

Scott Hendler, who represents several people injured by APD at the protests, asked the committee if it would be appropriate to apply the standard outlined in the bill – that officers are innocent if they don't intend to cause injury or death – in cases of drunk driving: "If a drunk driver doesn't intend to kill people, should that drunk driver be immune from liability?" He said the bill would encourage violence from rogue police officers. "We want to ensure that our officers exercise personal responsibility for their actions," he said. "They are guardians of our safety, not warriors."

Others pointed out that the bill is very broad. In addition to modified shotguns, "less lethal projectile devices" would presumably include Tasers, used by police throughout the state, and grenade launchers, which fire hard rubber balls. Each can kill or blind a person. **Justin Howell** and **Brad Levi Ayala** almost died after being hit in the head with beanbag rounds during the 2020 protests. **Sam Kirsch** was blinded in one eye by a rubber grenade. **Javier Ambler** died in 2019 after being tased four times.

If SB 2593 passes, the officers involved in these cases, and at least a dozen others, will almost certainly be found innocent of the charges against them. "The message being sent is that the state doesn't want local police to be held to account for anything they do," Harris said.

Hundreds marched this week in protest of the 140 anti-LGBTQIA bills moving through the Legislature

With Six Weeks Left This Session, Queer Texans Aren't Done Fighting

Bad bills keep moving **BY JAMES SCOTT**

Sweating in 92-degree weather Saturday, hundreds of queer Texans marched from the Bullock Museum to the front of the state Capitol, chanting, “Scaredy cat, scaredy cat/ Klick, Klick/ Silencing Texans/ Sick, sick, sick.”

Progressive nonprofit heavy-hitters **Equality Texas, Transgender Education Network of Texas, Texas Freedom Network, ACLU Texas, Lambda Legal,** and the **Human Rights Campaign** organized the protest of 140 anti-LGBTQ bills filed in this year’s Texas Legislature.

Once the circumference of the Capitol had been rounded, a rally formed at the south entrance. With a crowd shouting behind them, TENT Outreach and Communications Manager **Gin Nguyễn Pham** spoke with vigor about the need to fight back against the “bull” that conservative lawmakers are trying to pass. “My dream is for my community and myself to become trans elders,” they said. “I want to age beautifully. I want to age powerfully. I

want to be loved. I want to live here. I want to be with my community.” That speech was followed by words from **Ricardo Martinez**, CEO of Equality Texas, who emphasized the scant six weeks left in this year’s legislative session, while also praising the propulsive energy generated by the march’s huge turnout. “There are hundreds of people out here on a Saturday,” he said. “We’re giving up our time. Some of us have AP exams, okay?” Making that time, being visible, is what he contends will make all the difference. “We have never had institutional power in this state,” he said. “We’ve always had the people. It’s the people who have shown up time and time again to stop 99% of every bad bill that’s been filed in this state Legislature.”

The march comes on the heels of multiple bills targeting transgender youth and their health care being passed through House and Senate committees. Friday, April 14, the House Committee on Public Health passed a version of Senate Bill 14, which

would not only halt health coverage of gender affirming care for minors but also revoke the licenses of physicians prescribing that care. As reported by **Lauren McGaughy** of *The Dallas Morning News*, SB 14 was passed through the committee hastily – without any livestream or recording of the vote, and sans two members.

Adri Pérez of Texas Freedom Network pointed out that this bill hasn’t been testified against, unlike its twin, House Bill 1686, which notably had its list of over 400 testimony sign-ups cut short, with Rep. **Stephanie Klick**, R-Ft. Worth, citing time constraints. “They subbed out the bill that people did testify on for one that is sort of a Frankenstein conglomeration of every bad health care bill that they’ve filed this session,” Pérez said. “So this march couldn’t have come at a better time. It was really important for the community to be able to just see the incredible power that we are able to hold when we come together for events like this.” ■

Local Architecture Firm Opens Grant Application for Nonprofits

Community nonprofits looking to expand their services have a unique opportunity this month. The **Michael Hsu Office of Architecture** – the firm behind a slew of iconic Austin buildings – is accepting design proposals and will grant one winner \$20,000 in pro bono consultation.

“A lot of these nonprofits are having a hard time finding affordable space,” MHOA principal and founder Hsu said. “And there’s all sorts of challenges in trying to build something even if they do find a space because it’s so time-intensive. There’s a lot of hidden costs, and part of this [partnership] is our hope to just be a guide to help demystify what they can do on a certain site to meet their mission.”

MHOA has its fingerprints all over Austin – they designed **South Congress Hotel, P. Terry’s flagship,** and the **Waterloo Park Family Pavilion,** among others – and won the **2022 Texas Society of Architects Design Award.** MHOA opened their second annual Design for All Partnership applications in late March, with a May 19 deadline for nonprofits in the Austin and Houston areas, where the firm’s offices are located.

Hsu, a Houston native who earned his architecture degree from UT-Austin, views the partnership as a “seed program,” adding that the pro bono services don’t necessarily end with the \$20,000 grant because MHOA can also help promote the recipient through press and fundraising. “We don’t even have to be the architect that goes and executes the project,” he said. “It’s really like, ‘Here’s what we can do for you, and you can go forward and make your own decision.’”

Last year’s recipient, the **Austin Angels group,** built a community welcome center on part of a 2½-acre former church facility in Buda to support children and families in foster care. Hsu said they’re targeting “small but not tiny” nonprofits that are ready to build but could use some help.

Eligible organizations must be registered as a 501(c)(3) within 50 miles of the Austin or Houston metropolitan areas. Consultation services could include site analysis, feasibility studies, master planning, site planning, conceptual design, and architectural and interior design consultation. Master planning projects should be for 50-acre sites or smaller, and architecture or interior design projects should be less than 20,000 square feet.

Hsu said, “One of the reasons we’re interested in jobs like this is as real estate gets more and more expensive, how can we at least try and help some people to seed or stay in town, so they can be closer to the communities that they’re serving?”



Want Stronger, More Transparent Oversight of APD? Vote on It.

Next month's election has justice advocates and police fighting for control **BY AUSTIN SANDERS**

The May 6 election is about more than two ordinances named the Austin Police Oversight Act. The election is also about transforming the tug-of-war between justice advocates and the Austin Police Association over what civilian oversight of the Austin Police Department looks like and how it should be maintained.

Twenty years ago, city leaders and the APA negotiated the city's first ever police labor contract, covering oversight, pay, and benefits. Beginning with that first contract, the city has traded better pay (the first contract made Austin police officers the

highest-paid in Texas, and they remain among the highest-paid to this day) for stronger civilian oversight.

But for those interested in greater transparency around how APD investigates alleged officer misconduct, the struggle to maintain strong oversight has been constant. With every contract, the city must bargain to maintain whatever oversight was won in the previous negotiation – and pay even more to get new oversight authority.

But now, the May 6 election could fundamentally alter that dynamic.

The two Austin Police Oversight Acts may share the same name and much of the same language, but crucial (yet subtle) differences mean the two ordinances would create very different oversight systems. This chart is not comprehensive; it only considers provisions explicit in each ordinance and not oversight authority that may be restricted by state law or expanded in the police contract.

* Represents OPO authority granted in 2018 police contract, but stripped following 2021 arbitration ruling.

If voters approve Prop A and reject Prop B, two chapters in the former ordinance would prevent oversight from being used as a bargaining chip in future contract negotiations, while also protecting it from some legal attacks. City Council would not be able to approve any agreement unless it adheres faithfully to the ordinance – especially important are provisions allowing the Office of Police Oversight to have “unfettered access” to police records related to misconduct allegations and to play an active role in APD’s internal misconduct investigations. Prop A would also require future contracts to include language protecting these oversight powers from the contract grievance process – so long as OPO does not overstep the authority granted to them in the ordinance.

Prop A includes other critical oversight functions. Anyone could file an anonymous complaint alleging misconduct against an officer; if OPO recommends discipline against an officer and the chief of police – as the only person allowed to discipline officers – disagrees, they would have to explain publicly. The APA views this kind of oversight as an abridgement of an officer’s due process rights. Which explains why they, and other organizations affiliated with law enforcement, are the only groups supporting Prop B – an ordinance that, by all appearances, is just an edited version of Prop A that removes all of the parts that police groups dislike. If both propositions pass, each will be implemented, but conflicting portions will likely be resolved in court. ■

A one-person sociological study of springtime biking where every ride is his favorite

Many nights I've made this climb. Eight stories up on two wheels with one destination: the top of an unmanned parking structure reserved for state employees. It's a million-dollar view of Downtown Austin, free to innocent trespassers.

I've come here to clear my head, but first I'll break a sweat because my impulsive ass happens to be riding upon the heaviest bike on planet Earth – a 1960s Royal De Luxe three-speed that's so classically Dutch it looks incomplete without a large blond person riding on the

cargo rack. After ascending endlessly counterclockwise on straining calves, I bump down the kickstand and dismount into my observation deck of the city's kinetic core.

From up here, I study a flow of thousands of anonymous nightlifers strolling, stumbling, scooting, driving, and cycling among the ever-growing scape of skyscrapers. As I marvel at how unabashedly metropolitan this city has become, a notion strikes me: One of the few aspects of living in Austin that's become less of a hassle over the last 15 years is riding a bicycle.

Of all the great trails, routes, and neighborhood cruises, *my favorite* ride in town is the 30 seconds it takes me to descend this parking garage. I pedal just once then turn the handlebars to the perfect angle as gravity zips me down the ramp in a tight circle like droplets flowing down a corkscrew – faster and faster – until I’m spit out into street traffic where drivers may wonder why I’m smiling ear to ear.

Amongst researchers and city planners the world over, there have been repeated efforts to delineate the typology of cycling. Perhaps the most thorough model was published by industrial designer Dr. Robbie Napper, who categorized bike trips thusly: recreation, commute, work, sport, passenger, and tasks/errands. And, famously, Portland Bicycle Coordinator Roger Geller developed a classification for people’s willingness to bike in the city: Strong & Fearless, Enthused & Confident, Interested but Concerned, and No Way No How.

If I had to identify my own bicycle genus it would be: Experiential and Just the Right Amount of Paranoid.

I believe that life is an investigation and a bicycle is the perfect tool to aid in that endeavor. Ride through the graveyard, stop and admire that unusual pear tree in the stranger’s yard, take the scenic way, pause to listen to the busker’s song.

In addition to them being the ultimate stop-to-smell-the-roses vehicles, here are nine other things I like about bikes:

- They save you money on parking.
- Riding them is good for your health.
- They are incredibly efficient in speed and distance compared to the amount of effort it takes to pedal them.
- Passersby can see the full outfit you are wearing.
- Repairing and servicing them is much more approachable than working on automobiles.
- You can start riding one when you’re only 3 years old.
- They’re not petroleum reliant.
- Wheelies.
- They’re an extremely social mode of transportation.

ATTENDING MASS

If you enjoy riding with large groups of folks on bikes, that experience is extremely easy to attain in Austin. Just through events organized by Social Cycling Austin, you could find rides 3-7 days a week – for instance, the Saturday Morning Caffeine Cruise or the Sunday Bike Curious Ride or the Thursday Night Social Ride, which stands as the largest and most enduring group bike ride in town.

To find out more about the strength in numbers of social rides, I pay a visit to the

home of Corina Oliva and Derek Hansen, friends of mine for over a decade who I consider to be joyous bike freaks of the highest order. If you don’t know them, you might recognize them by their outfits.

“It’s a lot of onesies,” shrugs Hansen. “I have a rabbit one, we’re bees sometimes, and she likes the glam stuff.”

“Yeah, I wear wings and tutus and glitter and wigs,” Oliva jumps in. “When I charge my lights I also need to charge my shoes because they light up too.”

Oliva, a nurse who grew up locally, has been going on social rides since 2011. She and her husband, an electrician, attend the Thursday Night Social Ride almost every week and sometimes lead that and other SCA events. I ask if the draw, for them, involves a sense of community.

“Yeah, that’s where we’ve met most of what we call our ‘bike family’ – a bunch of our friends who we hang out with and travel and go camping outside of being around bicycles,” Oliva says. “So friendship is definitely part of it, but it’s also exploring your town – finding spots that you’ve never seen before or just saying, ‘Oh wow, we went all the way from Central Austin to MoPac and 183 on a bicycle?’”

The roughly 10-mile Thursday Night Social Rides, which meet at Festival Beach on the Eastside and draw 100-200 people, stop at lights, yield at intersections,

and obey traffic rules. Critical Mass – the monthly social phenomenon dating back to the Nineties in North America – has more of a lawless, make-your-presence-known ethos that makes the event feel as much like a demonstration as it does a parade.

Oliva invites me to Critical Mass, so I go. Though I used to attend it in the Aughts and early 2010s – both locally and in various cities like its point of origin San Francisco, where the ride was huge and riotous with cops threatening arrests and windshield smashing clashes between angry motorists and cyclists – I haven’t done it in over a decade, so I feel nervous and out of touch.

But on the last Friday in March, I’m met with a welcoming and not at all intimidating scene at the Pfluger Pedestrian Bridge. As the 175 or so congregants pour onto Lamar Boulevard to cross the river, I feel a unique excitement I’d forgotten existed and realize that this is *my favorite* ride in Austin. I love pedaling amongst a wide slice of weirdos – some with dogs and youngsters in their baskets, some riding wheelies and surfing on their frames, many blasting music on Bluetooth speakers. The route appears to be spontaneous, encircling Downtown, bombing the Seventh Street hill, briefly flirting with overtaking I-35’s upper deck (the ballsy few who do are followed by a police truck shouting at them to disperse), and then flowing all over the Eastside.

I like that Critical Mass turns heads. Ninety percent of onlookers have their phone cameras out and smiles on their faces, but there’s also the mad honkers: motorists unjustifiably losing their shit because of being delayed 45 seconds while a procession of bikes rolls past.

“That’s one reason we wear the costumes – they can help de-escalate things,” Hansen tells me at the midride beer break. “How are you gonna try to fight someone dressed like a bee?”

There are currently two Critical Masses in Austin (both on the last Friday of the month, one departing from the pedestrian bridge at 6:30pm and one from 15 Chicon at 8pm), which – if you believe nearly 300 recent Reddit comments – are at odds over traffic etiquette. In a great plot twist, the March ride sees those two Masses intersect. Half expecting a *Braveheart*-style battle, I’m pleased that instead the two groups just become one giant ... mass.

At least that’s how it appears from the view of my handlebars. Two-and-a-half weeks after the ride, the plot twists again when a group called Ride Bikes Austin, who organize the latter Critical Mass, issues a 22-page call to action alleging that the other ride joining theirs was an act of harassment and a threat to public safety.

A CHEAT CODE THROUGH DOWNTOWN

Nathan Wilkes, senior project designer of the city's Active Transportation Street Design Division, tells me it's safe to say there's now more people bicycling in Austin than ever before, though it's a purely anecdotal observation. Reliable ridership figures are hard to come by, partially because e-scooters throw off the counters, but also because, in the past, most bicycle data centered around people commuting to work – which has been made less relevant by a sharp rise in telecommuting.

"The work trip still has its purpose, but it cannot be the centerpiece [of city data on bike usage]," Wilkes says. "Even just getting out and getting fresh air on your bike is just as valid as going to work."

As such, Wilkes can't pinpoint what is Austin's most utilized bike route, but he says the shortlist includes Congress Avenue, the Drag, several parts of the Butler Trail loop near river crossings, and the greenway that crosses Downtown via Third and Fourth streets. That circuit's actually called the Lance Armstrong Bikeway, which is unfortunate because I don't want to mention Lance Armstrong's name in this story for the same reason I don't want to mention accused murderer Kaitlin Armstrong – they are sport cyclists and I'm intending to focus on cycling for pleasure.

But the Lance Armstrong Bikeway actually brings me a lot of pleasure because it's long been my gateway to live music. Typically, I park my van on the Eastside near Plaza Saltillo, jump on the bike and ride that protected bike lane under the overpass and into Downtown before turning right up Red River or staying on to the Warehouse District or going even farther to Seaholm or Lamar. It feels like such a cheat code for getting through Downtown on a raging weekend night that I will confidently challenge any car in a race from the White Horse to the Moody Theater. For that reason it's probably *my favorite* bike ride in Austin, but I think they should find a different local bicycling icon to rename it after, perhaps that older gentleman who used to ride all over town in a G-string: Thong Guy Bikeway.

GO INTO NATURE

One of the blessings of living in East Austin is having Lee Gresham as the owner of my neighborhood bike shop. I've been coming to Eastside Pedal Pushers for 15

years, usually dragging an old, broken bicycle accompanied by a sentimental plea on why it's worth fixing. Like most great, small, independent businesses in America, ESPP's best asset is its humans, and Gresham's the kind of person I really look up to: humble expert, keeper of obscure cultural history, intellectually curious.

Lee and I look the same age, but he's 20 years older than me and twice as strapping. I suspect it's because bicycles keep him young. In 1996, he set off from Texas on a solo bicycle tour that stretched all the way to Ontario, Canada, and altered the course of his life. Bikes have been the focus of his existence ever since, both as his foremost means of transportation and his profession. So when I invite him over to my barn for a midnight interview, I'm curious to know where he's struck by joyous moments on two wheels.

"Alleys," he says. "Some of my most fun and joyful experiences are riding through alleys in town: Hyde Park, South Austin, and even East Austin. I don't want it to sound like I'm a weird creeper, but cruising through alleys – if you have a decent headlight – I think that's fuckin' fun as hell!"

There's something about bicycles, says Gresham, that "taps into this feeling of freedom or mischievousness" that's reminiscent of being a kid, and I agree. That also factors into his other joyous bicycle pursuit: off-the-grid trail riding. He got into it many years ago with a local bike club that held a Wednesday night Interpretive Trail Ride where they'd traverse Austin's green spaces on "bandit trails" or "hobo trails" – unmapped paths cut through the woods by mountain bikers, BMX riders, dirt bikers, or transient people. Lately he's been in love with a relatively uncharted trail ride that heads south out of Onion Creek Metropolitan Park and into the passed-over wilds of deep South Austin.

"It's like, 'Where the hell am I? I'm going under I-35 on a bike in the watershed!'" he recounts. "It just feels mischievous, like I'm not supposed to be there."

For Gresham, this kind of riding where you're especially cognizant of nature has become life-affirming and, at times, helpful in staving off depression.

"It's so beautiful to be out there and, if I'm not going too fast where I have to focus on the trail, I can look around and absorb so much consciously and unconsciously, like thinking about all the different plants I'm

going past and the ecology of the woods – the tall trees and the understory stuff and the vines and thorny vines and poison ivy and the birds ... I fuckin' love all that stuff!" he says, laughing self-consciously. "Maybe I'm just getting old, getting into birds."

Riding on bandit trails is also how Gresham has come to know the many veins of pathways through the East Austin forests, which are intersected by a main artery: the Southern Walnut Creek Trail.

The SWCT is *my favorite* bike ride in Austin, so I'm lucky that it lies just beyond my backyard. I can jump on my bike and, within three minutes, be cruising on a 10-foot-wide paved path lined by trees, water, and fields that make you feel like you're cycling in the Netherlands – except instead of an occasional windmill, you'll ride by a towering steel electrical pylon with dozens of buzzards staring down, so it still has a Texas vibe.

The roughly 10-mile path, which opened in 2014 as Austin's first official urban trail, is officially scenic as fuck. You can ride almost all the way to Manor while hardly seeing any cars or indications that you are still in the 11th-most populated city in the United States – though a monster hill north of the Loyola Lane crossing rewards summiters with a sweet view of Austin's skyline.

Yes, a significant population of SWCT riders wear aerodynamic spandex, but it's a generally easy ride also suitable for families or people who took mushrooms and correctly thought it was a fun idea to get on a bicycle and ride into nature.

The popularity of the SWCT, the lead chunk of a planned 19-mile connected trail system extending into Northwest Austin,

can be evidenced at its starting point, the once sleepy Govalle Neighborhood Park, which now on weekend mornings looks like the starting line of Le Tour de France.

WHAT DOES YOUR BIKE SAY ABOUT YOU?

Bikes can make you look cool. I should know because I read far too much into passing strangers by the bicycles they ride: *This person's all about their cardio and mile times, or that individual's got a real utilitarian ethic, or they probably have young kids so they're on a weird long bike, or maybe this person recently got a DUI because they're wearing a tie and don't look like someone who bicycles.* Undergrads from the university are easy to spot, riding semi-nice, very practical bikes their parents recently purchased for them ... which they'll later ditch or hastily sell on Craigslist, I'm guessing. I was elated when I won an auction at UT Surplus Property for a basically new Fuji Crosstown, clearly left behind by a student – on just an \$85 bid. Regrettably, this ergonomic seven-speed, listed on the manufacturer's website as a "comfort bike," makes me look so palpably uncool.

I'm never more aware of this than when I'm pedaling around the Butler Hike-and-Bike Trail that goes 10 miles around Lady Bird Lake. To me, the loop has such an idyllic vibe and everybody there is at the top of their game: staying physically fit, picking up the poop of interesting dogs, paddleboarding on Hinge dates, or just being chill retired people on beach cruisers ... who astonishingly look much cooler than I do on my lame navy blue Fuji. I'll always ride that

bike on the Lady Bird Lake trail, though, because it's got real versatile tires for the trail's combination of dirt and cement surfaces. Also an extremely efficient east-west cut through town at the river, I often use the Butler Trail as part of my commute and I treasure the scenic decompression I feel riding home – especially when it's nighttime on the boardwalk and the lights from all the buildings are reflecting off the water and it looks like stained glass. This definitely is *my favorite* bike ride in Austin.

EXPANDING THE NETWORK

A few months ago, city crews bolted down hundreds of floppy white poles along Springdale Road to establish a protected bicycle lane. The following week, I repeatedly hit them with my huge van – either while turning or just riding too far to the right in my lane. As I'm relating this on a video meeting with division leaders for Austin Transportation, Laura Dierenfield asks: "After hitting them, did you habituate to a new turning movement?"

What a fitting question from a self-described street design wonk. And the answer is yes; those flex posts did their job, keeping my vehicle out of the bike lane and influencing me to drive more carefully.

Dierenfield manages Austin's Active Transportation Street Design Division, on which Wilkes serves as senior project designer. Together, they oversee the vision and implementation of our city's bicycle infrastructure, which is guided by the Austin Bicycle Plan. I ask for a nutshell summary.

"In 2014, the last Bicycle Plan was the big pivot in strategy where we are past painted bike lanes and we're talking about All Ages and Abilities bicycle infrastructure," Wilkes explains. "The centerpiece of it was envisioning a safe network ... The big deal is that streets need to be safe and self-enforcing for safe outcomes and give people mobility choices."

Instead of painted bike lanes, which Wilkes compares to "walking on a street with a painted line and calling it a sidewalk," modern bike lanes are barriered with either the aforementioned flex posts, concrete buttons, or protected curbs. The goal is having an expansive network of streets with protected bike lanes, urban trails, and neighborhood bikeways that all connect so cyclists can get all around town without riding next to high-intensity traffic.

To illustrate how Austin's network of bikeable thoroughfares has expanded thus far, Dierenfield and Wilkes show me zoomed-out road maps of Austin with All Ages and Abilities lanes highlighted, progressing from 2010 to present day. The difference is extraordinary, and it's equally remarkable

to see the projected map for 2026 (in the coming post-Project Connect light rail era) where Austin's bicycle network looks like Amsterdam. Ultimately, Austin's bike network promises to be 430 miles, of which about 56% is currently completed.

All of this is part of a seven-layer dip of city programs, state projects, and private enterprise contributing to urban bike transit design. For one, Dierenfield and Wilkes' division is scheduled to present to City Council for ATX Walk Bike Roll, a multi-department project that will update the Bicycle Plan to more effectively integrate protected bike lanes with urban trails and public transit. Wilkes also emphasizes how seemingly disparate things like the Texas Department of Transportation's I-35 expansion, private developers being leveraged to contribute infrastructure, Project Connect, the Corridor Mobility Program, and bond funding from 2016 and 2020 will all play into how Austin's bicycle network will expand.

But Airport Boulevard – the major thoroughfare where cyclists make death-defying

choices between dodging drive-through customers on an inset sidewalk, riding on a sketchy slim shoulder, or merging into 40 mph traffic where neither is available – that will still suck to bike on, right?

"Airport is going to be amazing in three years," says Wilkes, pointing to it being part of the billion-dollar corridor program. "It's going to be a massive positive change in places that used to be deeply inaccessible or not safe."

ALL AGES, ALL ABILITIES

Seeing as though it's the prevailing tenet behind the city's vision for designing bicycle routes, I ask Dierenfield who she pictures when we talk about All Ages and Abilities.

"For me, it's 9-, 10-, 11-year-old kids who are ready to be independent and need the social and physical scaffolding of a community in order to be able to grow and develop as a human," she replies.

There's an abundance of bicycle programs for children in Austin, but the one I'm most excited to take my son to is the

Yellow Bike Project's Earn-a-Bike program, where young people can pick out a bike and learn how to work on it by doing this full overhaul checklist – then they get it for free.

The All Ages and Abilities framework, of course, also applies to older people and folks with physical challenges. Dierenfield clues me in about the Golden Rollers, which, yes, as you guessed, is a 50-and-up bicycle and tricycle club. The program, founded in 2015, provides free weekly classes and urban trail rides for seniors on a fleet of comfy, low-impact bikes and trikes.

In early April, I volunteer at the Lend Your Legs ride at the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired, which – go figure – has what must be the largest collection of tandem bikes in the state. My bicycle-built-for-two buddy is a young man who has vision and hearing impairments. The only part of riding a tandem that's challenging is starting from a stop, because if you're not in relative unison it can get wobbly, but I'm lucky the student I'm pedaling with is so brave and trusting and chill. The ride, which takes place over the course of six consecutive Mondays in both the spring and fall, is a long neighborhood cruise through the lovely residential streets around Allendale and the group is equally lovely – just a bunch of super nice people helping facilitate a cool experience for the students. No doubt, *my favorite* ride I've been on in Austin.

The Lend Your Legs rides are open to the public, whether or not you are captaining a School for the Blind student. You can

bring your own bike or you and a friend can use one of their extra tandems and be part of the group.

One of my earliest memories is riding double, sitting in the baby carrier on the back of my mom's road bike, my head bobbling around on the rocky dirt road in front of my house. On a recent road trip home, I unearthed that early Eighties Araya – a glowing station-wagon-brown 10-speed with exquisite geometry – and strapped it atop the van, driving it 1,500 miles home to Austin where I promptly brought it to Lee Gresham at Eastside Pedal Pushers for a tuneup. Now I ride it all the time. The little piece of metal framing that connected my baby carrier to the seat post is still intact and, soon, our 5-month-old baby Casper will be seated on it.

His older brother Quinn rides on the back of the preposterously heavy Dutch bike, but soon he'll be ready for training wheels and, before I know it, my children will be big enough to go explore the Southern Walnut Creek Trail without me. It's funny; when I think about raising kids in Austin, I think of bicycles – and I have hope for the future.

LEGITIMIZED

Back in the barn, I'm doing some math in my head and I inform Lee Gresham that Eastside Pedal Pushers has now been open for 20 years.

"Yes! I'm aware," he laughs.

So, how has Austin changed as a bicycle city since he opened the shop in 2003?

"It's for the better – there's more visibility from drivers and biking's seen as a more acceptable and cool mode of transportation," he says. "And there's just shit-tons more commuter cyclists and recreational cyclists. That's amazing to me. When I first

started Pedal Pushers, I knew a lot of the people who came in for repairs. Now I don't know who these people are!"

Gresham says his little shop has benefited from being nearby the Southern Walnut Creek Trail (ESPP relocated from Fifth and Onion to Springdale and Bolm in 2019) and likely from people moving into newly built apartments in the area, but the biggest impact on his business was bicycles becoming hugely popular during the pandemic. Typically, repairs outpace sales at Pedal Pushers, but throughout 2020 and 2021 he sold all the bikes in his shop and couldn't get his hands on more. Though that bike boom has now tapered off, he continues to see Austin grow as a culturally bike-friendly community.

"In addition to all the physical infrastructure that's around, it just seems like bicycling is more legitimized," he says. "As far as I know, Austin's the most bikeable big city in Texas, and that's because it's historically liberal. That makes a difference. Because the population is more left-wing, pot-smoking, and has been somewhat educated with the university here, people do acknowledge cyclists as more or less legitimate users of the street."

The cultural influence that Gresham cites when talking about Austin's relationship with bicycles makes sense to me, even though I've never really viewed bikes as being inherently political. Except that riding a bicycle does, in some ways, make you part of the proverbial solution – and that's a good feeling to have.

"I think about why this has been the focus of my life since that bike tour," he reflects. "It's my anti-war, anti-petroleum economy, anti-capitalist something-to-believe-in." ☺



Review: St. Ed's Luchadora!

LET'S GET READY TO STUMBLE BY BOB ABELMAN

When a well-worn lucha libre mask is found in an old briefcase, an inspiring personal journey that touches on cultural identity, family traditions, and female empowerment is set in motion in Alvaro Saar Rios' delightful *Luchadora!* And by motion, we're talking high-flying aerial techniques, bone-rattling piledrivers, and thunderous brain-busters since this piece of fairy-tale storytelling is grounded in the colorful, Spandex-clad world of Mexican freestyle professional wrestling.

First staged in 2015, the play is now being performed by St. Edward's University's professional-track acting majors. Its story travels back and forth between modern-day Milwaukee, Wisconsin – where Nana Lupita (guest artist Tonie Knight) reveals the family's past involvement in lucha libre to her teenage granddaughter Vanessa (Sonia Mariah Fonseca) – and the small Texas town of Santa Teresa in 1968 – where the younger version of Lupita (Mia Ramirez) first unmasks the family secret. She then defends her family's honor by defying the traditional roles of women and wearing the mask of her injured father (guest artist Victor Santos) into the ring to fight El Hijo (Marcelo Rivera), the world champion son of her father's longtime nemesis.

Because the script is imbued with magical realism, Nana Lupita and her granddaughter are able to be present and provide commentary as their family's past unfolds. It also allows college-age actors (Claire Lane and Emile Sivero) to play young Lupita's childhood friends, and encourages director Kristián Méndez Aguirre to make whimsical choices in his staging, such as having those children riding imaginary bikes and bouncing in unison while traveling in an imaginary truck.

Unfortunately, many of Aguirre's creative choices and those of scenic designer Tenzing Ortega

stumble rather than astound. The wrestling ring – the epicenter of much of the play's action – is a makeshift creation consisting of two large mats and imaginary ropes that characters pretend to climb through when entering the ring and lean on when in it. They don't share the same aesthetic as the gorgeous hand-painted mosaic design that covers the theatre floor for this production.

Aguirre's direction also results in a plodding pace. Dead air repeatedly fills the in-the-round performance space as unwarranted pauses between actors' lines go unchecked, onstage

actors are left with nothing to do while one of them leaves and returns with a prop, and the desired call-and-response between audience-baiting wrestlers and spectators goes largely unfulfilled. And the play is put on hold when the

wrestling ring is assembled for a short bout and, again, when it's disassembled.

The wrestling bouts, choreographed by Roén R. Salinas, are also underwhelming affairs. Though the fairy-tale nature of the play allows for the wrestling moves to be stylized approximations of the real thing – and Luis Ordaz Gutiérrez and Guicha Gutiérrez do wonderful work providing costuming for the wrestlers (Ariel Blanco, Tyler Donovan, and Christian Meaux) – the aforementioned aerial attacks, piledrivers, and brain-busters are sadly reduced to mere slaps and kicks that never come close to their mark.

It's really the play itself and the players that make *Luchadora!* worth seeing. Guest artists Knight and Santos set a high bar when it comes to finding the charm and authenticity in their characters, and most of the cast – particularly Fonseca as young Vanessa and Ramirez as Lupita – follows suit. When they capture the playwright's playful and often poignant intentions in their performances, the show absolutely soars despite the staging's shortcomings. ■







DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Lake Arrowhead State Park, 15 miles south of **Wichita Falls**, isn't a particularly pretty park, but it has charisma. The park's colorful sunsets, dark night skies, and cool waters make the 524-acre green space appealing despite being covered in a forest of spindly **mesquite trees**.

Park Superintendent **Adam Bowers** says the mesquite savanna has taken over the grasslands of the park in a generation. A naturalized species, mesquite seeds were brought from South Texas with the cattle drives and have spread across North Texas ever since.

On a sunny afternoon, a **beaver** sat on the riprap covering the shoreline at the lighted fishing pier, preening its thick brown fur. It was cautiously watching the few people in the day-use area before diving into the water to keep a comfortable distance from the two-legged interlopers.

Bowers says they'll occasionally see beavers in the coves that line the park's shoreline. Sometimes an adult will be with little ones.

Beavers are fairly common in Texas waters. Around lakes they'll burrow into the banks instead of building dams. The bucktoothed herbivores' favorite food is the inner bark of **cottonwood** and **willow trees**, or aquatic plants. April to May is birthing season with litters of one to eight kits.

The 16,200-acre lake on the **Little Wichita River** is popular with fishermen for its crappie, bass, and catfish. Anglers don't need a fishing license in the park, but they do if fishing from a boat.



The park's 72 campsites are generally well-separated by the thick underbrush. More than 5 miles of multiuse trails wind along the shore, and the 18-hole **disc golf course** is one of the best in the region. The day-use area has a large swimming beach as well as picnic shelters.

Slumping Austin FC Searches for Answers in Front of Goal

Austin FC's players don't need reminding. They're well aware. They know, after Saturday night's 0-0 draw against the **Vancouver Whitecaps** at **Q2 Stadium**, that they've scored just one goal in their last four games. They know that it's been over 260 minutes of action since anyone's found the back of the net. And they know that's not good enough. Not by a long shot.

"It sucks," winger **Ethan Finlay** candidly assessed. "We've got a lot of good goal-scorers in that locker room, and no one can knock one on the board right now. So it's definitely frustrating."

In soccer, as in all sports, slumps are a part of the business. No player is immune to a spell of bad form, bad luck, or a combination of the two. When a team has one or two passengers on the struggle bus, often it can just power through. But when a club's entire attacking unit – including its superstar playmaker – is in the doldrums, things can go south in a hurry.

So it goes for the Verde and Black, who have been plagued by a collective dip in confidence in front of goal for the better part of a month. It was painfully evident against Vancouver, as ATX squandered multiple scoring chances with errant or apprehensive finishing.

"If you win two or three in a row [coming in], you probably take two or three of those chances and you run off with it," head coach **Josh Wolff** said. "But when it's elusive, it's elusive."

Slumps in soccer can prove especially annoying because, unlike in other sports, you can't really "shoot your way out" of them. Basketball and baseball players, who compete

multiple times a week and get several opportunities per game, don't have this problem. But soccer players are usually limited to one game per week and one or two or maybe three scoring opportunities within each game. As a result, slump-busting is mainly addressed on the practice field, where Austin FC has put nose to grindstone in recent weeks.

"I wish you guys could see a week of training. I mean, that ball goes in the back of the net. We've had some great weeks of training and this was one of them," Finlay told local media after the Vancouver match. "Josh and the coaching staff were honest and they were pushing the tempo ... creating those moments when training feels like it's the bright lights and you're under pressure. You're in a situation where you must score."

"Just seeing the ball hit the back of the net," Finlay said. "It sounds so silly and so stupid, but that's what it is."

Here's the silver lining about slumps, though: Eventually, they end. Austin FC boasts several proven goalscorers among its ranks, from **Sebastián Driussi** to **Maxi Urruti** to **Gyasi Zardes** to Finlay to – allegedly – **Emiliano Rigoni**. Count **Diego Fagúndez** among that group, too, if the Uruguayan is able to avoid missing significant time due to a groin injury sustained at the weekend.

If the scoring chances keep coming, some combination of those players will inevitably catch fire, and the goals will follow. The size of that "if," though, depends largely on Wolff's ability to press the right tactical buttons. Time is still on El Tree's side, but it won't be for long.

"You don't want to keep saying there's a lot of season [left]. There's urgency," Wolff said. "Once the seal breaks for one or two of these guys, hopefully it lifts the group's confidence." ■



The Flow of History

Willem Dafoe narrates gorgeous and timely documentary *River* **BY RICHARD WHITTAKER**

Two films. One narrator. One orchestra. One director. And they begin in almost exactly the same way. Black-and-white footage of musicians tuning up, and Willem Dafoe joking lightly at the microphone. This simple set-up is oddly reminiscent of the opening to Disney's *Fantasia*, in that it precedes an extraordinary cavalcade of images that will leave your eyes open in wonder and your heart overflowing like a weir in the rainy season.

In 2018, Dafoe narrated *Mountain*, a conceptual documentary about humanity's surprisingly brief relationships with the highest wild places. The text was taken from Robert McFarlane's *Mountains of the Mind*, and the Australian Chamber Orchestra performed a score by their lead, Richard Tognetti, all under the directorial eye of Jennifer Peedom. Now the ensemble gathers again (with Peedom joined by Joseph Nizeti as co-director) for *River*, a work that is equally enthralling, captivating, and insightful.

Mountain's thesis – beyond its beauty – was that people have only interacted with peaks for a few centuries, having previously eschewed them as bleak, cold, and dangerous places. But *River* posits a different view: that the Anthropocene epoch of humanity's existence was only facilitated by rivers – for water, transport, power, myth, community. Yet, much like mountains, our relationship with them has changed dramatically in recent times – how to run them as machines, as Dafoe intones from McFarlane's words.

Much as with *Mountain*, the power of *River* is not in presenting a radical new idea: It is in synthesizing what we already know and

presenting it as a holistic whole. We know that we have turned rivers from mystical places into resources, but in its sumptuous 75-minute delivery *River* allows us to see the flow of that narrative. And it is beyond gorgeous, as visually dazzling (if not quite as stomach-churning for acrophobics) as *Mountain*: luscious landscapes of quiet streams, poisoned fish and angular dams presented as abstract patterns, and the quiet joy of swimming.

It's fascinating that *River*, originally released in Australia and the UK in 2022, finally gets a U.S. release for Earth Day 2023, and hot on the heels of the far more didactic drama *How to Blow Up a Pipeline*. Yet *River* is no less a work of polemic than its more openly revolutionary peer. The first half of the documentary is about our historical relationship

with water; the second, about our current state of unbalance. And having Dafoe, with that gentle, forceful, menacing, soulful, and tender voice deliver the message – no stats but plenty of evocative facts about how much damage we have done and continue to do – brings it home.

Yes, *River* flows in the wake of other documentaries, and some have called it redundant. But it is rather another drop in the flood of documentaries, and without all those drops, especially one so beautiful and challenging, there will never be any erosion of our antipathy to change. If the purpose of *Mountain* was to humble the viewer, then *River* is intended to quietly terrify us. Maybe that's exactly what we need.

BEAU IS AFRAID

While only being in his mid-30s, Ari Aster has already proved himself as a remarkable and visionary director. The same could be said of Steven Spielberg when he was around that age – and that's when he made *1941*, a glorious mess of a movie that Spielberg himself has referred to as raisin soup (people like raisins, and people like soup, but that doesn't mean you should put them together).

Thus it is with *Beau Is Afraid*, Aster's absurdist comedy starring an as-always excellent Joaquin Phoenix as the titular Beau, a middle-aged Jewish man with a beyond-fractions relationship with his guilt-trip-inducing mother, Mona (LuPone). She's initially only heard on the other end of a phone, tut-tutting at her near-catatonic offspring, incapable as he is of functioning in the modern world. And who can blame him? After all, he lives in a spider-infested apartment in a crumbling building in a corner of a fictionalized crumbling urban hellscape that looks like what Lloyd Kaufman would create if he was given the budget.

Let's be clear, this is not (curse the term) elevated horror, but elevated Troma. Beau is a baffled naif, attempting a cross-state trip to visit Mona that becomes even essential due to a curiously, grossly hilarious accident. In what seems to be a reference to Greek epics, Beau bumbles from strange encounter to stranger environment, placid and overmedicated. The road out of Tromaville leads to John Waters-esque plastic-covered-couch suburbia before rumbling on to a Lynchian surrealist nightmare mansion, almost as if Aster is aping the masters of Americana. To sate fans of his earlier horror work, *Hereditary* and *Midsommar*, he throws in a decapitation and a death by rocky plummet, but they only serve as a reminder that Aster is trying something new here.

Beau Is Afraid is never boring, but still manages to be tedious. It's endlessly inventive but lacks the narrative or conceptual discipline to turn those inventions into something functional. It's rare to watch a film so constantly rip defeat from the jaws of victory, and vice versa. If Aster were a lesser filmmaker, then the end result would be simply unwatchable: But he's capable of pulling off wondrous storytelling, like a long storybook-style fantasy section in the middle that evokes both the bittersweet fabulism of Michel Gondry and the glowing visual control of Sophie Muller.

But at the same time those wild tonal shifts lead to a certain incoherence, like how Phoenix's neurotic catatonia sits uncomfortably with some wild but deliberate overacting from a woefully miscast Nathan Lane and an ill-served Parker Posey as the adult version of Elaine, whom Beau has been mooning over since a cruise decades earlier. Those flashback

sequences (with Nahapetian as young Beau, Antonelli as the teen Elaine, and Lister-Jones as a disturbingly Oedipal Mona) set up what could be an emotionally meaningful ending, but instead Aster devolves into a subplot about giant testicles. Talk about Freudian symbolism revealed with all the subtlety of a brick.

Ultimately, *Beau Is Afraid* can never escape that it's a very belated addition to the oft-dissected shrewish Jewish mother trope, with LuPone as another domineering muter exposed in an increasingly heavy-handed resolution. The episodic nature of Beau's misadventures serves as both distraction and bloat, a metaphorical cavalcade that lacks the acerbic agility of many of its predecessors. There's even a certain level of indignation that Woody Allen did something similar with his "Oedipus Wrecks" segment of 1989's *New York Stories* in about a quarter of the time. This raisin soup results in cinematic constipation.

D: Stephen Williams; with Kelvin Harrison Jr., Samara Weaving, Lucy Boynton, Ronke Adekoluejo, Minnie Driver, Alex Fitzalan, Sian Clifford, Marton Csokas. (PG-13, 107 min.)

A cocky Joseph Bologne – the central figure of historical biopic *Chevalier* – brandishes his violin bow and fencing saber with the swagger of a young man who thinks he's invincible. As played by Kelvin Harrison Jr. (*Elvis*, *Waves*) with bravado to spare, the 18th-century wunderkind musician and swordsman is a virtuoso superhero in breeches and powdered wig.

The extraordinary performances on the Paris stage and fencing piste come early in *Chevalier*: They set a bold and lively tone the remainder of the film has trouble matching. Instead, it melodramatically proceeds, trope by trope, as Bologne receives his comeuppance for believing in his own brilliance. Even as it valiantly labors to give this uncelebrated figure largely forgotten by history his due, *Chevalier* succeeds in revealing the astounding life of a man to an audience unfamiliar with him – which may be enough in itself.

The movie gets the biographical facts largely right, with some fudging here and there. Born on the Caribbean island colony of Guadeloupe in 1745 to a married white plantation owner and one of his Senegalese slaves, a teenage Bologne is later sent to a private academy in Paris. His wealthy aristocratic father does so to promote a sense of excellence in his illegitimate mixed-race son, a rare patriarchal move for the day. There, the musical prodigy is predictably bullied by his upper-class white classmates for being different, despite his evident achievements. He later crosses the threshold of respectability and societal acceptance after besting a fencing master whose fearmongering sponsor publicly refers to the young man of color as a “mulatto,” a belittling epithet used more than once here.

In the early sections of the film, the character of Bologne – knighted by royalty as the Chevalier de Saint-Georges in recognition of his lineage and accomplishments – feels modern and alive. He confidently inhabits the Parisian beau monde in the years preceding the French Revolution, making his artistic reputation as a composer of symphonies and navigating the salons of the French capital with an eye toward the ladies drawn to his exotic allure and talents. (The movie concocts an exaggerated BFF relationship with a flirty Queen Marie Antoinette played by Boynton, who's dressed in delicious confectionary colors by Oliver Garcia.) But by the end of this well-intentioned biography scripted by Stefani Robinson (a Writers Guild of America winner for the FX series *Atlanta*), it's reductively treating him as a symbol vaguely embodying the revolutionary rallying cry of “Égalité!” as the emerging Republic embraces the Rights of Man. It's a rather grandiose narrative turn, needlessly stifling *Chevalier* with the mantle of self-importance.

A lot of attention – too much, really – is paid to an adulterous relationship with the Marquise Marie-Josephine de Montalembert (Weaving), married to Marc René, Marquis de Montalembert (Csokas), a conservative military general. This storyline faithfully adheres to the basic particulars of the tragic affair, but it's at the price of convincingly developing a legitimate political awakening in Bologne, a man who's lived his entire adult life cushioned in comfortable privilege despite the racism he's encountered. As it is, his enlightenment – the seeming *raison d'être* of *Chevalier* – appears foisted upon him, all for a disconcerting parting image of him walking through a street mob of his new peers with the expressionless intensity of the Terminator. *Je reviendrai*.

Mel Brooks once famously said, “Tragedy is when I cut my finger. Comedy is when you fall into an open sewer and die.” When people talk about the *Evil Dead* franchise being horror-comedy, what they mean is the open sewer is especially dark and fetid, making the joke even funnier. That's wisdom that *Evil Dead Rise* takes to heart.

The fifth film in the franchise, after the original Sam Raimi-directed trilogy and Fede Álvarez's 2013 remake/reboot, finally breaks with tradition. The earlier films are rural affairs, kicked off by the discovery of the Book of the Dead in a cabin. Not so this time, where it's not the Book of the Dead but a Book of the Dead, and this copy of this limited-print-run grimoire was sealed up in a vault under what is now a condemned apartment building in Los Angeles.

All it takes is an earthquake, and said malevolent tome falls into the hands of a loving if dysfunctional family: mother Ellie (Sutherland), wannabe DJ son Danny (Davies), sulky but wise-beyond-her-years middle kid Bridget (Echols), and little sister Kassie (Fisher). If earthquakes, unearthly evils, and impending eviction weren't troubles enough, they're also contending with a surprise visit from Aunt Beth (Sullivan), a traveling guitar tech whose life is being thrown into disarray even before big sis Ellie gets possessed by everyone's favorite soul-swallowing entity.

Writer/director Lee Cronin seems like a natural fit for this somewhat changed-up addition to the franchise, having already handled supernatural maternal horror in his 2019 debut, the sadly underseen *The Hole in the Ground*. However, there's a giddy inversion here. His last film was about a mother risking magical malice to reclaim her child: This time, Ellie is physically and mentally corrupted by the things unleashed from the book and spits the angry truths that every mother has muttered under their breath at some point. Sutherland rips into the flesh of the script's obnoxiously hilarious dialogue, making her the most memorable Deadite since Lou Hancock as poor, doomed Henrietta in *Evil Dead II*.

That's the verbal abuse accounted for, so how about the gore? The franchise has always taken real pleasure in pushing envelopes, and while it can no longer embrace the levels of underground depravity found in surprise mainstream hit *Terrifier 2*, Cronin still opens the floodgates. *Evil Dead Rise* is an all-out assault on the senses, best played loud and on a big screen, with severed limbs, torrents of blood, and every available item shown in the first 20 minutes given the full Chekhov's gun treatment.

Cronin never feels quite comfortable with Raimi-style slapstick (mercifully restricted to one extended sequence), nor does he really take advantage of the claustrophobia and limited space of the location. There are too many scenes where the survivors simply lose track of each other – quite an achievement in a two-bedroom apartment. When what's established between them is highly bonded chaos, there are just too many moments when a character wanders off just because it's narratively convenient. No one is expecting airtight scripting and characterization here (gore 'n' laffs first, logic second) but can no one keep an eye on little sister Kassie for two minutes?

Still, Cronin's film feels very *Evil Dead-y* – no mean feat considering these films have evolved from low-budget gorefests to comedies to high-budget gorefests. There are elements of all those prior summonings, making *Evil Dead Rise* a chimera that is somehow unique.

GUY RITCHIE'S THE COVENANT

D: Guy Ritchie; with Jake Gyllenhaal, Dar Salim, Alexander Ludwig, Antony Starr, Jason Wong. (R, 123 min.)

How soon after a military operation gone awry does Hollywood depict it on the big screen? With *Guy Ritchie's The Covenant*, his first conventional war film, the answer seems to be: as soon as the event begins to fade from public consciousness, if not sooner.

The latest Guy Ritchie action flick (coming out weeks after his box-office flop *Operation Fortune: Ruse de Guerre*) takes place in 2018, but the subject matter demands a 2021 frame of reference. Remember the withdrawal of U.S. troops from Afghanistan, the fall of the Afghan government, and the ensuing Taliban takeover? Ritchie's picture, which began filming in 2022, won't let you forget.

Guy Ritchie's The Covenant opens to the fitting tune of America's 1971 hit “A Horse With No Name” as a drone shot of the Afghanistan hillside accompanies a refresher, of sorts. Title cards blanket the screen, informing viewers in a slapdash rundown of the American invasion of Afghanistan. Like most of the following narrative, broad strokes take precedent over the details.

After a truck explosion kills his translator, Master Sgt. John Kinley (a subtly menacing Gyllenhaal) finds a replacement in a U.S.-trained Afghani, Ahmed (Salim, a quiet powerhouse). Their relationship, which begins with hostility partly thanks to Ahmed withholding disclosure of his one-time allegiance to the Taliban, grounds the entire film as they slowly form a bulletproof bond. Even though it takes a drawn-out exposition and a visceral loss of life to get there, the army of two that forms out of a devastating ambush, sending them on a heart-pounding cat-and-mouse standoff with the Taliban, serves as a testament to the power of brotherhood born of shared trauma.

For a writer/director known for babbling spy thrillers, *The Covenant* works best when the two leads are forced to be silent lest they tip off prowling combatants. That comes in the *Warriors*-esque second act, brimming with no-holds-barred intensity. Some true-to-form editing techniques (choppy cuts, sudden slow motion, the works), a suspenseful violin soundscape, and dizzying tracking shots advance the plot swiftly along. Then, act two ends. All signs indicate the movie should be over, too, but fatally, it isn't.

After a grueling mission to get back in one piece, the last thing an exhausted moviegoer wants to see is a title card that reads, "Day 01." And yet. From there, the film splits into a second story altogether (and likely the one Ritchie cares more about). It's certainly the more timely of the two, as it takes a strong stance against the failure to obtain visas for the thousands of Afghani interpreters left behind post-departure, but the pacing suffers immensely.

Time and time again, Ritchie proves to be an effective action director. When it comes to writing the picture, less so, and *The Covenant* stands as another reminder of that sturdy dichotomy.

☛ THE POPE'S EXORCIST

D: Julius Avery; with Russell Crowe, Alex Essoe, Daniel Zovatto, Franco Nero, Pablo Raybould, River Hawkins, Ryan O'Grady. (R, 103 min.)

All hail Julius Avery. In 2018, the director released *Overlord*, a World War II horror film that combined Nazi experimentation and underground combat to great effect. *Overlord* suggested that Avery held a unique gift for crafting delightfully silly art from serious artists. That film also demonstrated a confidence in production design and staging that went beyond most second-tier horror titles. And with *The Pope's Exorcist*, Avery has proven that his eye for over-the-top horror was hardly a one-movie affair.

Despite his role as the Pope's personal exorcist, it is said that Father Amorth (Crowe) refers 98%

of the cases he investigates to psychiatrists and mental health clinics. Unfortunately, Julia (Essoe) and her family happen to fall into the remaining 2%. When Amorth is sent to Spain to investigate the alleged possession of a young boy, he is paired with Father Esquibel (Zovatto), a young priest with a clouded soul. Together the two men must discover the secrets of a vengeful demon or face the very destruction of the world itself.

For *The Pope's Exorcist*, Avery and company have stripped the exorcism movie down to the elements that really matter. A possessed child and their family? Required, but don't give them any more backstory than is absolutely necessary. Complicated mythology about secret organizations within the Catholic church? Essential viewing. Much of the fun comes in the historical retellings and the grand set designs of the family chapel. *The Pope's Exorcist* even has the gall to retcon the history of the church, which is the kind of pop punk theology that either endears you to the movie or turns you off it forever.

And at the center of it all is Crowe's Amorth. After years of playing the Hollywood heavy, it is delightful to see the Oscar winner chew through the scenery as he did in the earliest days of his acting career. Father Amorth presents as something of an apostolic Fox Mulder, and Crowe finds just the right balance in embracing the humor in the role but not treating it as a joke. Even his language selections – moving between Italian and English as a sign of disrespect – becomes a fun grace note in his hands.

The full effect is an unserious movie handled with consummate craft. In decades gone, movies like this would dominate the shelves of our local Blockbuster for months on end, but those days are long gone. In a world of blockbuster franchises and micro-budget horror – where movies above a certain budget seem to justify their own expense by adopting a detached irony – *The Pope's Exorcist* is the kind of goofball sincerity so many of us hunger for. It's not going to work for everyone, but if you are the kind of viewer who ends up on its wavelength – by god, what a ride.

SOMEWHERE IN QUEENS

D: Ray Romano; with Romano, Laurie Metcalf, Jacob Ward, Sadie Stanley, Tony Lo Bianco, Sebastian Maniscalco, Jennifer Esposito, James Ciccone, Jon Manfrellotti. (R, 106 min.)

As nondescript movie titles go, *Somewhere in Queens* is a good one, being both unmemorable and uninformative. Things become clearer upon realizing that this is the directorial debut of sitcom royalty Ray Romano, who wrote it with *Scrubs* veteran Mark Stegemann. But even if that doesn't clue you in on the manner of entertainment offered up for consumption, there's the solid one-two punch of Louis Prima and Jim Croce for the opening music medley that removes any lingering ambiguity. So when "Buona Sera" segues into "I Got a Name," all systems are go for an Italian-themed, follow-your-dreams heart-warmer (minus the laugh track).

So, somewhere in an Italian American, middle-class neighborhood in Queens, Leo (Romano) works at his father's small construction company, forever the second fiddle to his brother (and foreman) Frank (Maniscalco). Leo might not be the smartest guy around, but he's got heart, quotes the *Rocky* movies when doling out advice, and loves his family. The classic everyman Leo is, alternatively buoyed and harangued by his wife, Angela (Metcalf, another sitcom noble), and living vicariously through his son, 18-year-old Matthew (Ward), who goes by the nickname "Sticks," although not because he's a good jazz drummer, which is what I was initially hoping for. It's because he's tall. And he plays basketball.

So on top of the cliched Italian American family dynamics – profanity and slaps on the head as

modes of expression, humor based on the eternal overabundance of food, operatic displays of emotion, garish interior design – on top of that is the actual plot of *Somewhere in Queens*, which is that Sticks is so good at high school basketball, he gets the chance to try out for a scholarship at a small Philadelphia college. Sticks is so good at basketball because he suffers from acute anxiety, and when Leo introduced him to basketball at a young age, Sticks was all focus, no panic. So Sticks and Leo have this basketball thing, but more and more, it's looking mainly like it's Leo, who has gone to every practice and game his son has participated in, because cheaper than therapy and no stigma probably. But there's a problem, and here's where the real actual plot of *Queens* kicks in. Sticks has a girlfriend, Danielle (Stanley), a kindly, free-spirit type who breaks it off with Sticks before his college tryout. Heartbroken Sticks wants nothing to do with college tryouts, so Leo convinces Danielle to remain his girlfriend until after the basketball tryouts.

Leo's plan works until it invariably doesn't, and the whole thing gets exposed with nearly every cast member present for the full dramatic effect. In the interest of giving Metcalf something to do, Angela is five years on the other side of a battle with breast cancer, but still terrified of its return, her stress and fear downplayed by her husband. Romano's not afraid to play Leo as a selfish prick, but he's an oblivious selfish prick, so with self-awareness comes redemption. And with redemption come reflections on the lessons learned. Competent and unassuming, mildly problematic but ultimately harmless, *Somewhere in Queens* is alloyed family sitcom nostalgia sourced from stronger materials.

Eat Trash, Save the Planet

Fighting food waste locally via Too Good to Go

Who amongst us hasn't eyeballed a perfectly good donut in the trash and seriously contemplated eating it à la George Costanza? Yet tons of perfectly edible food gets tossed every day.

Food waste in its final form becomes methane gas, which is why Austin offers citywide composting. By providing cans and curbside pickup, the city can convert food scraps into nutrient-rich soil instead of letting them off-gas in our already bursting landfills. Simply put, unchecked food waste is terrible for the environment.

It's also terrible for our wallets. A 2020 study by researchers at Penn State University found that American households waste approximately 30% of the food they buy. The study, published in the *American Journal of Agricultural Economics*, suggests that this is equivalent to \$2,000 per family. Think about what you can do with \$2,000 diverted from the trash can, especially considering that grocery prices went up 11% between January 2022 and January 2023.

One way to attack the food waste problem while also reducing your food bills is to search locally for businesses that sell their end-of-day offerings at a deep discount, instead of tossing them, via the app Too Good to Go (toogoodtogo.com). The international app was designed to connect consumers with any local business that sells food, and it maintains a running count of how much food they've saved the way a water fountain measures how many bottles have been saved from a landfill.

Sarah Soteroff, a rep from TGTG, says, "We want businesses to have an avenue to recoup the money they may be throwing out. If you are throwing out \$300 every week, you can reduce that amount. Inflation prices are hitting food so hard, which in turn are hitting businesses. [TGTG] is giving them flexibility to meet that unpredictability."

What benefits bakeries and restaurants (being able to sell food they'd otherwise toss) is naturally a boon to consumers looking to lower their food bill. I am an avowed cheapskate with a hollow leg but am reluctant to dumpster dive, so I was preternaturally thrilled to search the app for bakeries less than 5 miles from my house and spring for a surprise bag starting from \$3.99. My first pickup was at my local Tiff's Treats: an assortment of a dozen-ish cookies for \$5.99.

Then I picked up a surprise bag at Ovenbird, a charming cafe with a serious coffee program and many in-house baked goods. When I stopped in, the pastry counter was almost empty, save for two treats and a fistful of cookies. The fellow at the counter cheerfully piled everything into a box for me, noting that the cookies were his faves. They were pillowy gingerbread, topped with a snowy-looking sweet glaze, and memorably delicious. I considered this a steal, and these were also items I may not have tried but for the "mystery" element. Same for La Pâtisserie, where I was handed a box containing a luscious pecan roll, a pain au chocolat, and an almond croissant, all

gorgeous and elegant. I picked up multiple times from Casper Fermentables because I loved the sourdough loaves, bagels, and delicious cookies I randomly scored. Each pickup was smooth and easy, and it's all done through the app.

The app relies on social media to help recruit new users. Users post their TGTG hauls on TikTok, Instagram, and on Reddit (r/toogoodtogo; be prepared to be jealous of European hauls). Participating Austin restaurants include Hey Cupcake!, Bouldin Creek Cafe, Jo's Coffee, and Honest Mary's,

among many others. There are also national chains like Shipley's Donuts and 7-Eleven on the app, and some outfits offer groceries and ingredients. It's all good, because it wouldn't benefit the businesses to sell you something that isn't edible.

So why can't/don't businesses give all this good food to people in need, rather than sell it (or toss it)? Ben Hollander, owner/operator of Casper Fermentables, explains it all. "It's cheaper and less work to throw away the leftovers rather than pay someone to package them into individual portions and deliver them to specific people." There are laws protecting people who donate food from being sued, in case a person who consumed the food became ill or worse. The Good Faith Donor Act was enacted in Texas, and the federal Emerson Good

Samaritan Food Act followed. Even the National Restaurant Association created a helpful, seven-step guide for restaurateurs (conserve.restaurant.org/downloads/pdfs/food-donation-tips.aspx) who want to donate any leftovers they may have, and Step 1 is "find an organization in your community to partner with." Logistics for starting a donation program are on the owner. Anyone want to start coding for that app?

Hollander continued: "[Casper Fermentables] would rather not throw away our leftover breads but we also don't have the resources to find people in need, individually package the food, and coordinate delivery or pickup with them for free." They don't want to sell out and disappoint their customers, but giving away remainders to people is work.

Here's how the financials break down: For instance, TGTG sells a surprise bag containing \$15 of goods to the public for \$5, and takes \$1.80 of that sale as a service fee. The business gets \$3.20 from the sale of that bag. There is also an annual fee of \$89 to use the service, deducted from quarterly payouts. This, said Hollander, is enough of an incentive to spend time bagging up individual orders and overseeing the pickups.

Individual consumers can't solve the food waste problem in the United States. No one said you have to celebrate Earth Day, but should you choose to adopt anti-waste lifestyle methods while also keeping your food costs low, try rescuing some food before it reaches the dumpster, in the name of saving the planet. ■



Austin Psych Fest Reboots

Levitation team's eclectic three-day comeback invites Automatic, Vieux Farka Touré, and more

What's old is new again. Austin Psych Fest – launched in 2008 by the local festival- and vinyl-presenting team that evolved to become Levitation in 2015 – makes a notable springtime comeback April 28-30. (Companion event Levitation will continue to take place across Downtown venues in October.) Held for the first time at South Austin's spacious Far Out Lounge, Psych Fest headliners include Toro y Moi, Cuco, Black Rebel Motorcycle Club, Yves Tumor, and event co-founders the Black Angels playing 2008 breakout *Directions to See a Ghost*. Adding to the eclectic sonic mix, Melody's Echo Chamber makes a long-awaited Texas debut, following unexpected Levitation cancellations in 2015 and 2016. The festival released more tickets yesterday, freeing up both daily (\$88) and weekend (\$223) passes at levitation.fm. Beyond, Mohawk hosts A Place to Bury Strangers for the kickoff show (Thursday 27), while Parish hosts afterparties with the Marked Men, Colleen Green, and True Widow (Friday 28 – Saturday 29).

ANTI-LOVE SONG L.A. TRIO AUTOMATIC Friday 28, 10:20pm, Janis stage

Why write a love song when you could soundtrack the crushing reality of our dying planet with melodic synth-pop? So believes Los Angeles trio Automatic, whose last album *Excess* mourns an Earth ravaged by capitalism – to the tune of their most anthemic instrumentals yet.

“Being female artists, any opportunity to just not be associated with men is good,” says bassist Halle Saxon of the band’s “no love songs” rule. “Not [that] I think they should all just go away or anything, but so often our identities are tied to them, and our relationship to them. And so to not even have love or relationships as a topic ... I find it empowering. We’ve got other stuff going on in our minds.”

“Other stuff” includes billionaires turning to Mars for fresh resources – the subject of *Excess* opener “New Beginning,” which laments “endless service of desire” through deceptively infectious keys. Other tracks examine the morals that diminish as white-collar workers ascend the corporate ladder. The latter fuels “Skyscraper,” where sirens blare as Izzy Glaudini sings disapprovingly, “Every dollar gets you off.”

Avoiding the personal also helps Saxon, Glaudini, and drummer Lola Dompé, who collaborate equally, write as a unified front. Dompé points to Automatic’s California home base as inspiration, describing a “facade of happiness and sunniness.” Rampant homelessness exists next to Hollywood sets and parties.

That juxtaposition especially inspired “Skyscraper,” Dompé’s favorite track on the record. Composed during a writing retreat in the “gnarly” desert suburb of Apple Valley, the band witnessed drugs and poverty from atop a house on a hill. “The fires were happening at the same time,” Dompé recalls, “so I think that really inspired the vibe of the song.”

“We were feeling particularly dark at that moment,” Saxon agrees.

Austin Chronicle: How did the Khruangbin collaboration come about?

Vieux Farka Touré: Really naturally. My manager Eric Herman suggested recording Ali’s songs with an American band and he suggested Khruangbin first. I was able to see them perform in London and talk about the album. Then we scheduled studio time in Houston and got to work. They’re really genuine people that care a lot about music.

AC: Given your experience here, how are Texas and Mali similar/dissimilar?

VFT: The environment: lots of sun and open spaces. Texans are friendly, straightforward people, which I like a lot. Music is an important part of life in Mali and in Texas, though Mali doesn’t have the technology and infrastructure of Texas.

AC: *Les Racines resonates physically, palpably.* What goals did you set for it?

VFT: My previous albums had a lot of influences and this time I wanted to make a truly traditional Malian album. I started writing before COVID, [but] began recording right at the start of the pandemic, so everything was recorded at my home studio in Bamako. Usually I wouldn’t have so much time to work on the arrangements and experiment, but because I was home and not touring, I spent a lot of time on *Les Racines*. I’m really happy with how it came out.

AC: What did the guitar give mankind?

VFT: It’s amazing to see all the different ways people play it. I use the guitar to help the people of Mali be together as one. Just like Bob Marley, Jimi Hendrix, and B.B. King used their guitars to tell their stories.

AC: They call Austin the live music capital of the world, but you’ve seen the world. What are the best music cities and why?

VFT: That’s a tough question! London has some amazing venues and musicians. Every town or city in Mali is a great music city because music is such an important part of life here. I recently toured in India and had amazing audiences there, so I’ll put Mumbai on my list. New Orleans has a lot of talented musicians and history. Austin is definitely a great music city! ■

Black Pumas' JaRon Marshall Grounds Atmospheric LP *earth sounds*

Journeying the keyboard maestro's solo debut

During Adrian Quesada's 2022 *Austin City Limits* episode showcasing the album *Boleros Psicodélicos*, the colorful mini-orchestra of musicians and singers provided plenty of action for the crew to cover. Amongst the sea of strings, horns, and stylish international guest vocalists, the cameras often settled on keyboardist JaRon Marshall. Tall, beshaded, and topped by a yellow wool cap, the Black Pumas member casually tapped his fingers on his ivories with the cool taste of a modest virtuoso, applying exactly the right licks to the grandiose baladas.

It's the kind of performance that plants a seed in the back of your mind: *This guy is a star. He'll be leading his own band soon.* Sure enough, Marshall was already prepping *earth sounds*, his funky, atmospheric, and swinging debut album with his group the Collective.

Born in Lafayette, Louisiana, and raised in nearby Loreauville, the 30-year-old Marshall began playing piano at age 11, joining his church's band. He learned the fundamentals of music in junior high before acquiring a MIDI keyboard and a freeware version of FruityLoops, making his own beats and demos. "If you'd asked

me what I wanted to be when I grew up," Marshall says from Austin Proper Hotel, where he DJs on Fridays and Saturdays, "I'd say music producer."

One day after a performance, his church bandleader/mentor David Mitchell handed him 50 bucks. "That's when I started the journey," he proclaims, using a word he often deploys when describing his career. The Baptist churches in which he performed taught him things like walking basslines and dominant seventh chords, which led him to test out of theory class for his first semester at the University of Louisiana.

"That's when jazz made sense," he says.

Marshall's college years put him in clubs for the first time, and he moved to Austin in 2016. He immediately scored gigs at the Sahara Lounge and the Domain, played in wedding and cover bands, held a weekly church gig in Waco, taught at Eastside Music School, and backed Riders Against the Storm (a hookup via fellow keyboard maestro Jonathan Deas). At 25, he met Quesada, which led to recording with Rod Gator and Nané before being invited to work on an album featuring "this R&B singer he was working with."

Old Settler's Music Festival was his first gig with Black Pumas, the breakout Austin band combining Quesada's production with Eric Burton's vocals. Marshall's stayed through world tours, *Austin City Limits*, Joe Biden's inauguration, and their other accomplishments. "We were still in the van in 2019, so I got to see everything naturally happen," he notes about the Grammy-nominated Pumas' rise. "It's always been super cool and super chill. It's been a thrilling journey."

While in the Pumas, who have been on hiatus since last summer, Marshall continued writing and recording, crafting beats, and working with local MCs. Joined by drummer Michael Longoria and singer James Robinson, he released a digital EP titled *The Black Power Tape* in 2020. *The Prequel* followed in 2022, debuting the Collective: Longoria, bassist Chris Loveland, and saxophonist/flutist Brian Donohoe, leader of Progger and also a member of the *Boleros Psicodélicos* band. ("We call him the Oracle.")

With a crew of that caliber on hand, Marshall took them into the studio to record his debut live to tape, everyone in the same room. "I named it *earth sounds* because it's organic music," Marshall explains. "It's all analog instruments, even the synths. In a world where everything is digital, it means something to record to tape.

"And I do care about the Earth. Post-industrial revolution, I don't think we can sustain this. That's why I was turned on by the artwork of the Earth on fire. Whatever people are fighting for, that's what sets the world aflame."

With improvisation at a minimum, the melodies do the talking, giving the music an almost cinematic feel. "I liken it to an orchestral moment when everyone's just sitting down playing their part," Marshall says. "I got my start with the choral hymnals – play those four parts and that's it. Of course we stretch it out live."

That approach allows the emotion behind each tune to shine, something very important to their composer. Dig the sense of contemplation in "constellations," freedom in "flying high," or love for ancestors in "dungeons."

"Whether it's a chord or whatever, I always was interested in attaching an emotion to it," he says. "Instrumental music especially. That's why 'punk jazz' is a protest song. I made it last June, when I left the house to go to the protest at the Capitol around Black Lives Matter 2020. That's what I was going through emotionally, and I do take inspiration from emotional things. That's a big part of my process."

Perhaps the most direct sentiment powers closing track "the magnolia tree": a boy's love for his mother. "Where my mom worked when I was growing up, there's a magnolia tree," Marshall explains. "Whenever I would go, I would get [a flower], and I'd keep it for an extended period of time. So that one's a dedication to my mom."

In contrast, of the album's more ominous feelings, Marshall says: "If you listen to 'ride or die' or 'punk jazz,' I really love to create dark, sinister moments. But I like the relief, too, so I felt that was the perfect way to close out the album."

With the record wrapped, Marshall and the Collective played their national coming out party at this year's South by Southwest. For the bandleader, who anticipates more shows in the future, it's just another step in the journey – as outlined by the song "journeyman."

"My dad was a mechanic growing up," Marshall says. "I treat music like that. I feel that for people, especial-

ly from my generation on down, music is this lauded thing. But I treat it like it's a methodical thing, something that makes sense for me to build a future for me and my family."

That future looks bright and busy. The Austinite adds: "We're gonna do LP No. 2, more touring, hopefully more support slots, and just go for it. I'm taking that energy into the whole year." He'll need that energy for his biggest endeavor of all.

"I'm having my first child soon, a daughter," Marshall notes proudly in late March. "We're about seven or eight weeks out. I already feel this centeredness – I'll be even more relaxed than I am now. And I don't even smoke weed, man!"

OTIS WILKINS & JAKE LLOYD'S ROCK STAR COLLAB "BUBBLE SHUFFLE"

Otis the Destroyer boss Taylor Wilkins, rockist maximist, and homegrown cottage industry Jake Lloyd, who represents every entry in the spectrum of Black music – soul, gospel, rap, rock – lob a grenade into the greater music landscape with "Bubble Shuffle." If one didn't know better, they would swear it signaled a new Gary Clark Jr. single: the power riff, silken soul-blues vocals, and bristling rockaria building into 21st-century roots radicalism. That fatback Black Keys echo gives it girth, life force. On maverick ATX brand Spaceflight Records' Instagram, the photo shoot looks positively rock star, while Wilkins warned on Facebook, "Hold on tight."

MORE EAZE, "ETERNITY"

Australian label Longform Editions pursues deep listeners via its bimonthly curation of four records from electronic auteurs worldwide. Austin multi-instrumentalist More Eaze (Mari Maurice) takes a quarter of the reins this month via "Eternity," a 43-minute journey through a vast array of sonic contexts, from sticky, shimmering synths to whirring, mechanical pop-gospel. "I often think about how to say the same thing a different way," Maurice describes in her Bandcamp notes. As such, bright, oscillating keys transform into a somber guitar line before bleeding into celestial echoes. Murmurs crackle into a final act of orchestral waves and wails. The piece's divergence is bolstered by its seamless flow – a weaving stride that mimics our ever-changing frames of reference.

PROMQUEEN, "XI XON"

Is it too soon to keep track of song of the summer contenders? The debut drop from Vietnamese American singer-songwriter Cassie Luong's fiery promqueen project is an early favorite. Over punchy 808s and rolling hi-hats courtesy of Cambodia-born beatmaker waverly, Luong bounces gleefully between Vietnamese and English, her two native tongues. Taking notes from Thai sensation MILLI and Vietnamese rap pioneer Suboi, promqueen delivers bars with an undeniable bravado but refuses to lose sight of her beginnings. The track name translates to "extra sassy," a title lovingly bestowed upon her as a child by her parents.

BEING DEAD, "MURIEL'S BIG DAY OFF"

"Live it up!" blazing garage rock duo Being Dead rejoices on the lead single of upcoming Bayonet Records debut *When Horses Would Run*. Well, it's technically not their first LP, if you count the three full-lengths the pair released as darker alter ego Zero Percent APR. But "Muriel's Big Day Off" – and its accompanying video starring "creature burlesque" performer Baldie Loxx – floods a fun and freewheeling portrait into surf rock harmonies and a loungey jazz interlude. Here, the pair maintains their sun-stroked sonics while slicking them back (à la Muriel's eyebrows) in their crispiest record yet.

RF SHANNON, "HEATHEN NIGHTS"

Shane Renfro's songs move like a deep Texas fever dream, sweating and hallucinatory with a touch of dread and wonder. RF Shannon's fourth album, *Red Swan in Palmetto*, out May 26 via Keeled Scales, plays both expansive and insular, chronicling the songwriter's decision to move back to Lockhart from L.A. with a sense of escape and rejuvenation. New single and closeout track to the LP, "Heathen Nights," lingers in the pull of mellow after-hours camaraderie, sinking into a dreamy mirage somewhere between Iron & Wine and Beck's "The Golden Age" as the constellation canopy rolls by overhead.

ZANDER SCHLOSS, SOLO AND WITH CIRCLE JERKS

Carson Creek Ranch, Saturday 22**


Actor/musician/composer Zander Schloss is the quietest sorta punk rock legend. He's acted in most of director Alex Cox's films, beginning with *Repo Man*, where he met the cameo-ing Circle Jerks, whom he joined on bass guitar, playing on five LPs and countless tours. From there he became a prime collaborator with another Cox repertory member, Joe Strummer; reactivated '77 L.A. punk heroes the Weirdos; and other luminaries including Thelouious Monster and Mike Watt.

So why's he playing solo acoustic at the tiny Chess Club on Friday night? Well, it's likely because he will be assuming his bass duties with the Circle Jerks on Saturday, at NOFX's two-day farewell tour stop.

The more intimate Chess Club gig will certainly promote his newly released first solo album *Song About Songs*, which he indicates is less about high-volume punk bashing and more about "space and vulnerability and excruciating, almost subconscious emotions." He'll be joined by other punk legends flexing their acoustic sides, including Riverboat Gamblers' Mike Wiebe & Ian MacDougall, Chris Gates (Big Boys/Poison 13/Junkyard), and PEARS' Zach Quinn.

Schloss, Wiebe, MacDougall, and Quinn all exercise their punk sides the next day at Carson Creek Ranch, when Circle Jerks, Riverboat Gamblers, and PEARS take the stage at NOFX's Punk in Drublic Festival, alongside UK anarcho-punk heroes Subhumans, Codefendants, Days N' Daze, and San Antonio punkjunta Piñata Protest.

LEMON TWIGS, ANDREW H. SMITH 3ten ACL Live, Saturday 22

With Beach Boys harmonies, Todd Rundgren melodies, and Sweet riffola, Long Island's Lemon Twigs channel Me Decade glam rock, soft rock, and power-pop into impeccably crafted, fervently performed ingots of pure rock & roll. Despite being too young to experience that music directly, the D'Addario brothers – sons of Sixties/Seventies singer-songwriter Ronnie D'Addario – sound so steeped. Only seeing their baby faces in person will dispel the illusion of listening to a long-lost act from the era. The band's fourth album *Everything Harmony* comes out in early May. Garage-pop clown Andrew H. Smith opens.

DREAM HOUSE QUARTET Bass Concert Hall, Tuesday 25

Led by veteran French pianists Katia and Marielle Labèque, and featuring guitarists David Chalmin and the National's Bryce Dessner, the Dream House Quartet grew out of the sisters' ambitious 2013 album *Minimalist Dream House*. As with that record, the DHQ highlights minimalist composers like Philip Glass, Meredith Monk, and Aphex Twin, alongside new works by Chalmin and Dessner. The group's brand new self-titled EP, released on renowned international classical label Deutsche Grammophon, presents their rich, gorgeous sound in all its luminous glory. This tour also features the first North American airing of Thom Yorke's classical opus *Don't Fear the Light*.

ENSLAVED, INSOMNIUM Come & Take It Live, Tuesday 25

According to our records, Norwegian black metal vikings Enslaved last stormed these landlocked shores March 13, 2008 – at a SXSW day party. First act on at Stubb's during an afternoon bill headlined by Motörhead, the now-32-year-old extreme pioneers clamored onstage around 12:20pm and played exactly 19 minutes, British mag *NME* later calling the performance "aborted." Short, yes. Thrilling, YASSS. Fifteen interminable ages later, they return for a full set on the occasion of 16th full-length *Heimdal*, a typically progressive and fully ripping uptick from 2020's *Utgard*. Finnish melodic death metallers Insomnium and blackened NYC thrashers Black Anvil support.


