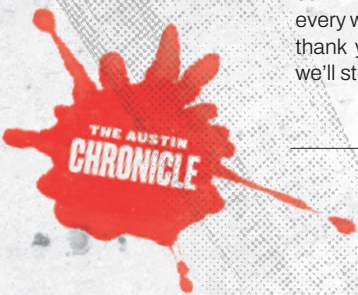

VEXING VOUCHERS

Dear Editor,

I am concerned that school districts are facing significant budget cuts because public school funding in Texas is held hostage to [Gov. Greg Abbott's] push for school vouchers ["How Texas' School Funding Scheme Contributed to Austin ISD's Massive Budget Shortfall," News, May 24].

The May 30 *Statesman* reported that billionaire Pennsylvania-based Jeffrey Yass recently donated millions to school voucher-friendly candidates in Texas races, including a \$6 million gift to Abbott. School voucher programs are controversial. They are opposed by many organizations, such as AAUW, League of Women Voters, Public Funds Public Schools (a national campaign founded by the Southern Poverty Law Center, et al.), National Coalition for Public Education, Truth in Education Funding, Texas Impact.

U of Houston professor Dr. Rottinghaus stated: "Texas is still a one-party state. It's the party of money." Dark money groups have ties to oil tycoons and Republican megadonors Tim Dunn, Dan and Farris Wilks. 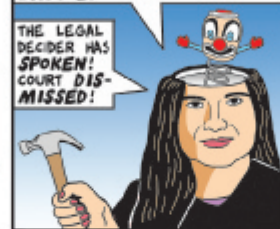

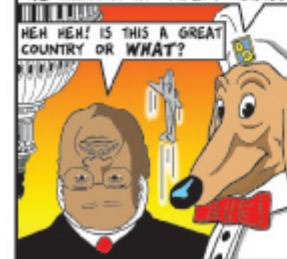

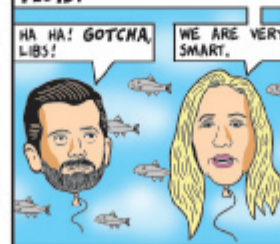

I Fought for Air-Conditioning in Solitary Confinement. Now I Have to Do It Again.

I survived eight Texas summers without air conditioning in a parking-space-sized cell that we called a pizza oven. The heat instantly would awaken me when my arm accidentally touched the burning wall. My neighbors' desperation resulted in self-mutilation and suicide attempts to get to the air-conditioned psych center. Daily, I witnessed guards quit, faint from the heat, change employment status from full- to part-time. Days without electrical power. Days without being able to flush the toilet. Days without ice-cold drinking water. I stopped buying sodas because the heat caused them to spontaneously explode. My toothpaste liquefied. The temperature in my cell was recorded at 129° as I experienced untreated menopausal hot flashes and had a heat stroke.

After back-to-back heat-related deaths in this prison, I wrote stories imploring the state to stop cooking us. The ambulance lived in this parking lot. Finally, the state decided to exercise humanity.

Last summer, we received a "cooling system" which worked intermittently to cool the solitary unit at my prison, Lane Murray, until it was discontinued in the fall. On April 16 of this year, cool air began blowing from our vents. A month later, I was approved to return to general prison population. Relieved, I entered a building expecting better conditions. I was wrong.

The heat inside the general population unit hit me like a baseball bat. Upon my arrival, the electrical power went out for over 24 hours. No power to blow hot air from my fans. Hot air is better than no air. But, the similarities to solitary didn't stop there.

Unlike solitary confinement, where I was often locked inside my cell all day, every day, in here administration gets around the prohibited 24-hour lockdown by issuing 23 hours and 59 minutes lockdown after someone misbehaves.

Due to severe staffing shortages we end up stuck inside our cells: no showers; no outdoor or indoor recreation; laundry and meals are delivered. The heat has triggered a person's

seizure. Tempers flared as heat rose and a fight ensued. A guard, whose weight was double the fighters combined, deployed tear gas. It's impossible to tear gas one person so we all struggled to breathe without a fan in this cauldron. The chemical irritant triggered another person's asthma attack. All of this happened during my first week out of solitary.

Off lockdown, the general prison population is forced to work unpaid and many are assigned to work back-breaking physical labor in the scorching fields. Refusal to work is a rule violation resulting in a disciplinary infraction that can lead to solitary confinement or parole denial.

Per policy, if we feel overheated we're supposed to request heat exposure/stroke prevention called Respite. This involves drinking cold water, taking a cold shower, and sitting in a designated air-conditioned space. The policy is moot when there isn't any staff to enforce it.

On a recent Sunday, I looked forward to sitting in the air-conditioned chapel for a lengthy Evangelical service. To my surprise, I was denied entry because my record of religion isn't Christianity. (I earned my religious designation after being asked by prison officials right after I was sentenced to a half-century in prison.) Back to my stultifying cell.

I now have a roommate who has never experienced a Texas summer in prison. I have been teaching her survival tactics: wetting her body and head, sleeping on a wet floor, keeping a bowl of water ready to douse yourself. I shouldn't have to teach survival tactics when we all know the most effective solution is to provide air conditioning to every incarcerated person in Texas before more heat-related deaths return.

Each year, we break the current record for hottest year. My efforts to prepare are no match for the rising heat.

Texans: Please reach out to your legislators and demand they stop torturing people in your name. Remind them we were sentenced to live in prison, not die here from the heat. ■

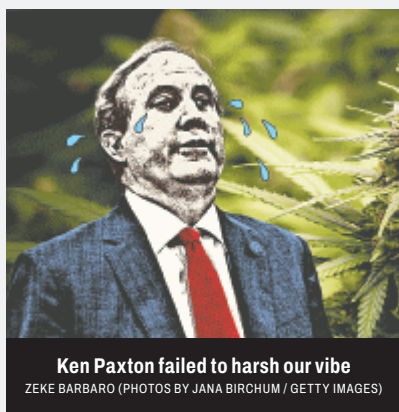

BRAND-NEW AUSTIN PODCAST: Looking for a new, Austin-focused podcast? City Cast, a nationwide network of daily local news podcasts, officially launched in Austin Tuesday. The first episode is a 20-minute conversation with Mayor Kirk Watson.

KATHIE KICKS OFF CAMPAIGN: Speaking of Mayor Watson, Kathie Tovo is running to replace him. At her campaign kickoff party last week, she talked to the Austin Monitor, criticizing Watson for the recently passed HOME initiative, which aims to reduce housing costs by increasing the supply, and for Watson's short-lived deal with the Department of Public Safety to patrol Austin streets.

CAPITALISM CAPITALIZING IN AUSTIN: Please forget about your salary before reading this paragraph. Suicides in Texas Prisons Have Dramatically Increased

Brooklyn Hogrell's mother says our prison agency failed her **BY BRANT BINGAMON**

Jennifer Rodriguez estimates that her daughter, Brooklyn Hogrell, spent 85% of her time in prison struggling with depression. Hogrell could feel a depressive episode coming on, Rodriguez said. When she did, she would become desperate and cut her arms and plead with corrections officers to be moved to a psychiatric ward. And she would call her mother on her prison-issued tablet.

"We were extremely close," Rodriguez said. "I've always been able to talk to her and calm her down. We would talk about different things, like how to stay positive and focus on what she was doing to get home. And she would tell me, 'Mom, it's just so hard in here because the officers are so rude and the other inmates are always talking crap.' I would say, 'Just put your headphones on,

try to ignore everybody, don't entertain the arguments."

Brooklyn dropped into another episode in early April but this time she couldn't talk to her mother. Her tablet had been taken away by prison authorities as punishment for engaging in a three-person call, Rodriguez said. Rodriguez tried to reassure Brooklyn

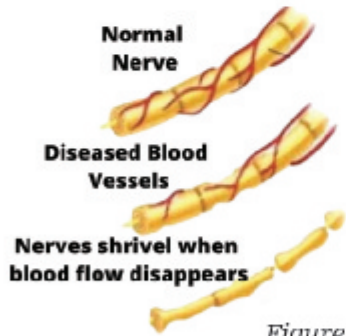

HENDERSON WON'T STAY CHIEF:

Interim Austin police chief Robin Henderson is not applying for the top job at the department, the *Statesman* reports. Henderson has served as interim chief since Joe Chacon's retirement last year.

BLOOD AND FOOD: We Are Blood, sole provider of blood for 50 medical facilities in Central Texas, is running its "Giving Double" campaign. Anyone donating blood in June can choose for We Are Blood to donate \$5 to Austin Humane Society, the Central Texas Food Bank, or Austin's TreeFolks.

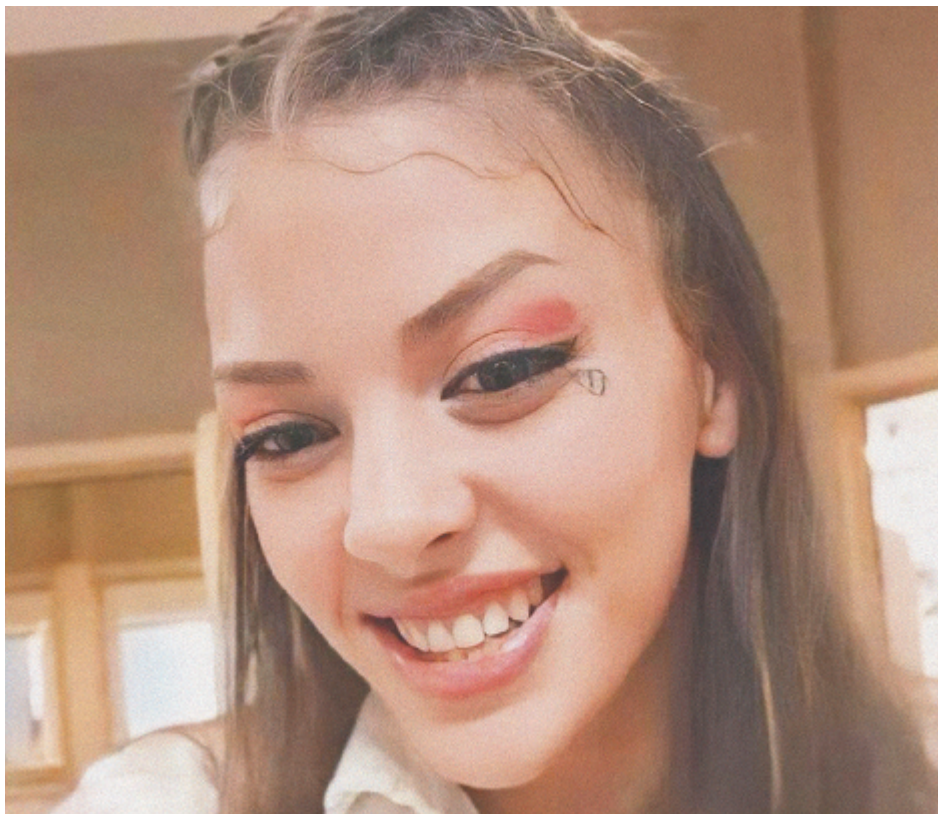

with multiple texts each day, texts that prison workers would print out and deliver. But she learned on April 17 – first from inmates, then from the warden of the prison – that her daughter had been taken to a hospital after attempting suicide. Brooklyn Hogrell was pronounced dead two days later at the age of 21.

Hogrell's suicide is part of a disturbing trend. Data from the Texas Justice Initiative shows that prison suicides in the state have nearly doubled over the last four years, from an average of 28.6 a year from 2005-2019 to 56 a year from 2020-2023. The Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the agency that runs the prisons, told us it tracks suicides but that we would need to submit a public information request to get its numbers. However, a TDCJ spokesperson emphasized that "one suicide is one too many" and said the agency's self-harm prevention program is reducing attempted suicides. Here, the spokesperson did provide numbers, saying that since August 2021 the number of attempted suicides has declined from 171 to 117 per month.

TJI reports 12 suicides so far this year, but advocates say the number will probably rise as incomplete autopsies are finalized. Michele Deitch of UT's Prison and Jail Innovation Lab listed the commonly understood reasons for the increase in suicides. "Understaffing certainly contributes to people dying by suicide,

because incarcerated people are not being adequately supervised or checked frequently enough or because staff can't get to them quickly enough after an attempt," Deitch said. "There are also increased numbers of people with mental health issues who are incarcerated and not receiving proper care. Suicide can also be a reflection of despair: People are not hopeful that they're going to get out of prison someday. And then there's a correlation with suicides going up during the summers, which suggests that the extreme heat, and how miserable that is, contributes as well."

Rodriguez said Hogrell had struggled with severe depression, anxiety, and PTSD since being raped at the age of 8 in her hometown of Abilene. Hogrell received counseling and psychiatric care but was arrested as a 13-year-old for marijuana possession and placed in a Texas Youth Commission detention facility the next year for violating parole. This initiated a series of clashes with corrections officials culminating in a 10-year sentence for assaulting a public servant. Upon turning 18, Brooklyn was moved from TYC custody to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice's Lane Murray unit west of Waco.

Hogrell was housed in administrative segregation at Lane Murray, meaning solitary confinement. That was required for her participation in the unit's Mental Health Therapeutic Diversion Program, Rodriguez said. She believes the isolation of solitary confinement contributed to her daughter's depression and anxiety.

"It was way worse to be in [solitary confinement] than to be out in general population," Rodriguez said. "They would go weeks without even being taken to shower. They would go weeks without getting out of their cell for rec or anything. And even people that don't have mental health issues, they begin having mental health problems, depression or anxiety, because you're locked into a little room for so long."

Brittany Robertson, who monitors prison conditions as a member of Texas Prisons Community Advocates, said she has reviewed public information requests from TDCJ that suggest solitary confinement is involved in a disproportionate number of the suicides in prison. She said the unpleasant conditions of solitary affect not only the inmates but also the correctional officers, which contributes to TDCJ's inability to hire more COs to overcome the staffing crisis, which, in turn, makes the system less safe as a whole.

"It's not only the deaths, but also what it's doing to the staff that are there," Robertson said. "I'm hearing that pickets [officers who supervise other guards] are being left unmanned, and the pickets are the ones who are supposed to be in control of all the doors and the first ones to respond to an emergency situation. So that's going to reduce the response time in an emergency, which, right now, they're stating is about 15 to 20 minutes."

TDCJ told us COs are required to check on inmates at least every 30 minutes and that they did in Hogrell's case. "An investigation into the incident revealed that staff did conduct their 30-minute rounds during this incident and operated within policy," the agency said. Rodriguez does not believe it. "If the rounds were done when they were supposed to be done, Brooklyn would have been found in time," she said. "There's no way she was checked on within 30 minutes."

Rodriguez told us she has decided to speak publicly about Brooklyn's suicide to draw attention to the failings of Texas' prison officials. "I just want them held accountable," she said. "I just want them to know that I know that they could have helped her; they could have saved her. And they didn't. They failed my daughter. And I'm sure they've failed hundreds of people. It's just not right." ■

Amid Budget Crisis, Austin ISD Leaders Push Vaguely to “Rethink How We Work”

Sense of doom as no one solution will be enough

A troubling new reality has descended on Austin ISD. At school board meetings over the last six weeks, Superintendent Matias Segura has warned that the 2024-25 budget deficit – currently projected to be at least \$78 million, even after \$30 million of cuts to central office operations – can’t be fixed through more budget cuts. The superintendent has said the district needs a ground-up reassessment of its “workflows,” and that it needs to “work differently.”

Segura reiterated the warning at the board’s June 6 meeting. “I think it’s really important to talk about where we are,” he said. “We have just taken \$30 million in cuts and there’s still a way to go. And I have said this a couple of different times: We’re not going to be able to cut our way out of this. We have to rethink how we work.”

What exactly the super meant by “rethink how we work” was left vague – perhaps purposely.

Segura and many of the trustees remain cautiously optimistic that Austinites will vote to increase property taxes at an election in the fall in order to provide more funding for schools. The proposed vote, known as a voter-approval tax rate election, or VATRE, could bring an extra \$41 million a year to the district. The board will decide whether to ask for the VATRE at its next meeting on June 20. If it gives its approval, the proposition will appear on the ballot in November.

But as with the budget cuts, the additional money from the VATRE would only ease the current crisis, not solve it. Board President Arati Singh called attention to this by highlighting the district’s deficit projections for the 2025-26 school year. With a VATRE, that year’s deficit is projected to be \$51 million. Without it, it’s projected to be \$67 million.

“It’s, unfortunately, not that different,” Singh said. “So I think in either scenario we’re gonna have to do things very, very differently. And I do think that we’re gonna have to start that work in either case, whether or not we pass a VATRE. Even with a VATRE we’re still only good for a year.”

Regardless of these and other doubts, the district and its employees continue to push for a VATRE. During the public comment portion of Thursday’s meeting, members of Education Austin, the union that represents AISD’s teachers and staff, voiced strong support for the proposal. That’s perhaps in part because the district and union have an agreement to use \$17 million of the revenue a VATRE would generate to provide a modest raise in salary – what both groups are calling a market rate adjustment – for certain AISD employees. Brandi Hosack, the head of the district’s teacher recruitment team, told the trustees the adjustment would help keep district salaries competitive with those of other school districts in the area, allowing AISD to retain teachers, especially those with seven to 20 years of experience.

June 20 is the last school board meeting before summer break, so the trustees will vote not only on the VATRE but also the 2024-25 budget. Segura stressed that the district will continue studying the budget through the summer for ways to save and generate money. These include increasing class sizes, eliminating planning breaks for teachers, increasing student attendance, and generating revenue from the district’s real estate holdings.

“What I don’t want to do is to not go through that work prior to asking our voters, if the board supports it, for the passage of a VATRE,” Segura said. “We need to be able to communicate that we have done everything possible to stabilize the budget, get back to a balanced budget, and reduce our exposure when the state Legislature reconvenes in the spring of 2025. And that means that between July and October there is difficult work to be done in AISD.”

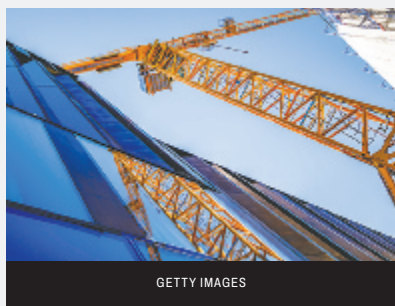

Mental Health Diversion Pilot to Begin by August

24/7 care instead of jail time **BY BRANT BINGAMON**

Travis County's mental health diversion pilot – aimed at providing psychiatric care instead of jail time for people without access to services – will finally begin later this summer, after a yearlong process of development. The actual diversion center won't be built until at least 2029, but programmatic changes to the county's mental health services are much closer at hand.

By the end of August, Integral Care will expand its Psychiatric Emergency Services (PES) walk-in clinic on Airport Boulevard to 24/7 care, increasing peer support services and access to doctors that can prescribe psychiatric medication. Integral Care will also add a new 23-hour observation service for people at risk of harming themselves or others. The county will repurpose the former Ronald McDonald House on 15th Street as a 25-bed, 90-day-stay Therapeutic Diversion Program (TDP) for further stabilization, housing, and connection to services.

First responders will use PES as "an entry point," says Marisa Malik, Integral Care's director of crisis services. There they'll receive a clinical assessment to determine the next step in care. That could mean immediate discharge, a 23-hour observation (for people

in extreme crisis), or transfer to the 90-day stay at TDP if they are at low risk of harm.

Integral Care, the county's mental health authority, has been responding with APD to mental health crisis calls since 2014 with its Expanded Mobile Crisis Outreach Team (EMCOT), along with clinicians at the 911 call center. There are already two buildings that law enforcement can take people in crisis to for short-term stabilization – the Guy Herman Center and the Inn. Within the jail, Integral Care helps connect incarcerated people with ongoing care upon release.

So what's changing? Access to services 24/7, says Malik. Currently, EMCOT lacks staff and funding to take referrals from law enforcement at all hours. When they're closed, officers either take the person to an emergency room, to Central Booking, or leave them in the community – increasing the likelihood of repeat contact

with law enforcement or an unnecessary jail stay. At PES, they'll have immediate access to a medical prescriber and connection to services.

Integral Care hopes to open both facilities by mid-August, after hiring 22 additional staff at PES, roughly 17 positions at TDP, a jail liaison, and a landlord outreach position to fit people with housing. They'll also train APD, the Travis County Sheriff's Office, and EMS on who is a good fit for the program.

The program is 100% voluntary, says Malik – but there are many ways someone could access it. "If someone is experiencing a medical emergency, [first responders] would route them to the emergency department first, but they could get transferred over to PES. Or if they're intoxicated to a point where they're not able to meaningfully engage in an assessment, they would go to the Sobering Center, then be transferred to PES." If after the 23-hour hold they're still at imminent risk of harm, they'd be transferred to higher-level inpatient care.

So who is *not* a good fit for this program? County Judge Andy Brown stresses that this is "not the place for people who are having severe mental health crises." Those will be served by phase two of the diversion program, possibly including involuntary commitment. For this first phase, it's "a fairly light touch – providing people medical care, a place to stabilize, and a place to live for 90 days," says Brown. "What does that do to solve this problem?"

Also down the line, Malik says Integral Care is working with the County Attorney's Office to offer direct admission to the program from the jail. Mental health public defenders and the County Attorney's Office already make referrals for some "coordinated releases," but there are thousands of people

in county jails across the state deemed incompetent to stand trial, but who are awaiting treatment at the Austin State Hospital. The state psychiatric facility just underwent an extensive renovation, but did not add any beds, meaning that the waitlist problem isn't behind us. Luckily, Malik says the county could use TDP for competency restoration later on. And for jail releases, Integral Care is currently negotiating a grant with Texas Health and Human Services that could unlock more funding by August.

For now, Brown says the goal of this first phase is to "track the data and understand what the circumstances were. We're really just trying to learn from this." ■

The Many Crusades of Adam Reposa

MONTHS AFTER BEING RAIDED, LAWYER CONTINUES TO TAUNT THE COURTS, THE COPS, AND KEN PAXTON

I doubt the SWAT van had even been refueled before Adam Reposa began scheming on how to turn getting raided into an opportunity for new freedom-pushing antics.

The brazen attorney – whose lawyering sometimes resembles villainous wrestler promo – had been running an unlicensed cannabis dispensary out of an East Austin home before officers representing three different agencies stormed in for a morning raid on Jan. 22, seizing roughly 100 pounds of purported marijuana, plus edibles and cash.

As reported in the first installment of this serialized saga (see “Notorious Lawyer Adam Reposa Gets Raided For Running an Illegal Dispensary,” March 15), charges have yet to be filed against Reposa or the two associates present for the raid, and District Attorney José Garza was granted a motion to be recused from prosecuting the case. A D.A. official, on background, later told *The Austin Chronicle* that the recusal had been done to avoid conflicts of interest with Reposa being a practicing defense attorney and someone who office staff knows personally. No other court has since filed charges against Reposa.

You’d assume that someone who’d just had flash-bang grenades thrown into their home would quietly check themselves out of the game, not fly into fuck-you mode. But since Adam Reposa already firmly exists in fuck-you mode, it was time to lean in.

His ATX Budtenders business – which he described in a recent legal filing as a “Washington D.C. style gifting dispensary” – would soon begin selling a line of Mr. Chinga T-shirts printed with a variety of imaginatively illustrated caricatures. Among them are an unshapely Ken Paxton (“Ken Sucks Ton”) with pockets full of bribe money, Greg Abbott depicted as a Nazi scientist, and a rendering of Deputy Sheriff Mario Sotelo – who was the affiant of the search warrant – as Nintendo’s Mario, on a ghost ship with bags marked “Property of Adam Reposa.”

And what would any public spite campaign be without a theme song? In a parody of Motörhead’s “Ace of Spades,” Reposa manages a surprisingly solid Lemmy Kilmister impression, replacing the titular phrase with “Ounce of Weed.” The song taunts both TCSO officers, who he calls “Plastic badge federales,” and the courts, snarling: “I see it in your style/ Let’s have a jury trial.”

The motive of the aforementioned antics are obvious: Reposa, a freedom junkie born on the

Fourth of July, is taking aim at people and institutions he views as infringing on Americans’ fundamental rights: life, liberty, the pursuit of happiness, and smoking blunts. Meanwhile, other extracurricular crusades can blur the lines between righteousness and antagonism.

Outside the Travis County D.A.’s Office in late May, Reposa looked like an attorney from the shoulders down: cuffed dress shirt, suspenders, pleated trousers. Up top, he wore the shaggy mane of a *Weedwolf* character, while holding a picket sign that says: “No Way José!!! Do Your Job!”

Three costumed associates held signs reading: “No Child Should Have to Look at Olde Man-Dyck.”

Reposa’s admitted animosity toward Austin’s courts, which have twice jailed him on contempt charges, has inspired this side quest, spotlighting the bias and “white entitlement” that he claims is ingrained in the local municipal culture.

On that day he was proclaiming that a prominent Austin defense attorney is being undercharged after allegedly masturbating in front of children and their mother on a walking trail.

Indeed, an arrest affidavit obtained by the *Chronicle* reports that Christopher Gunter, who actually served as Travis County’s assistant D.A. in the

Eighties, was arrested on April 27 in the Mills Pond park on an indecent exposure charge. The police filing includes this passage:

“The victim was informed by her 14-year-old child that he knew Christopher was masturbating and that his, Christopher, penis was fully erect because they just talked about sex education in school.”

Reposa was stoking outrage over Gunter’s alleged incident being classified as indecent exposure, a misdemeanor, with no bond conditions restricting his contact with children. Reposa views it as a clear felony case because kids were involved. As proof, he’s produced an affidavit of a June 23 arrest involving a separate individual also masturbating near a local running trail, also in the vicinity of a 14-year-old, that resulted in felony charges of indecency with a child.

“The question is: Is it a threat to our democracy that a high-profile lawyer gets to jerk off in front of kids without the same liability that this Black dude gets?” Reposa challenges. “And if you ask that to these West Austin people, they’re going to look at you like you’re speaking Mandarin fuckin’ Chinese. That’s what white entitlement is.”

Attorney Gene Anthes, a law partner of Christopher Gunter who’s representing him on this matter, says Gunter is innocent and characterizes the arrest as “clearly a case of misidentification on the part of the complaining witness.” Anthes believes he and Gunter proved as much to the case detective by taking him to the scene of the alleged incident last week and showing him where Gunter had been at the time.

Asked if he considers Gunter and Reposa rivals, Anthes said: “You know, goddammit, Adam is an excellent litigator, but I think the thing that makes him an excellent litigator is his mental instability. So I wouldn’t say they’re rivals, I’d say we’re all tired of Adam’s shenanigans.”

Our D.A. source explained that the D.A.’s Office has no input on initial charging decisions – which, in this case, were made by TCSO officers. As a misdemeanor, the case goes to the county court and, for it to be elevated to a felony, it would need to be presented to a grand jury.

Speaking of legal disagreements, Ken Paxton’s lawsuit against the city of Austin, aiming to reverse a voter-approved ordinance that decriminalized marijuana possession locally, saw its earliest in-person court hearing on June 10 in Travis County District Court. Prior to the hearing, a representative for the city’s litigation department confirmed that both the city of Austin and local progressive organizers Ground Game Texas have filed motions to dismiss the attorney general’s suit. On June 4, Adam Reposa joined the fray, filing his own motion to dismiss.

While the other two motions read with measured legalese and contain vast case law references, Reposa’s filing comes in hot, calling Ken Paxton a “Nazi party throwback,” comparing Texas’ handling of cannabis laws to a “new era of Juneteenth,” and declaring the dangers of marijuana to be a myth created by government actors, while making a constitutional claim on the 14th Amendment.

“Americans have a fundamental right to be free from government lies as a promise of life liberty and the pursuit of happiness,” Reposa’s motion reads. “Adam Reposa, having been lied on by government, robbed by government, and unafraid of government, represents the fundamental nature of American freedom and comes to ask this Court as an American and a Texan to find with total clarity once and for all that the facts are clear, Marijuana is not dangerous, and to characterize marijuana as such in your search warrant affidavit violates the protections guaranteed by the Texas Constitution and the U.S. Constitution, and is rank player hating.”

Then in a legendary move that seems daring even by his standards, Reposa included the ATX Budtenders current menu on the legal filing against the attorney general:

“21 strains from \$80 an ounce to \$240 an ounce Gummies up to 200 mg of CDB Pens vapes and all that Concentrated Chinga, Mr. Chinga, Chinga Dinga Bringa Thinga to Ringa and Singa Pre-rolls 5 pack \$20.”

COME?

From plantations to prison farms, Texas' legacy of slavery lives on

On a 90-degree June day at Memorial Unit in Southeast Texas, the humidity makes the heat cling to your skin. Live oaks line both sides of the long driveway to the prison. There's the faintly herby scent of the fields and the curdled hint of something dead when the wind shifts. Grackles swoop down, with their telltale squawks.

To the right, prison fields eventually run into privately owned land on the Providence Plantation; a sign by the road reminds you it was established in 1824. But just ahead, there's the prison – red brick, ringed with barbed wire. In a field behind the prison, you can see a group of mostly Black and brown men at work for no pay.

It's uncanny how little life has changed here in 200 years.

A short drive away, you can see the rubble of slaver Abner Jackson's home and sugar mill. The live oaks around his plantation are covered in Spanish moss, and they're older and larger than the ones lining the driveway to Memorial Unit, but otherwise they look the same.

Jackson owned the Darrington plantation that the Memorial prison was built on. He also owned close to 300 slaves. Some of those enslaved people worked in the same fields that prisoners do today, on the 6,000 acres of state-owned land that surrounds Memorial Unit.

In 1865, the 13th Amendment of the Constitution abolished slavery "except as punishment for a crime."

Today, Texas is one of a handful of states, all in the South, that pay no wages to incarcerated workers. "Every inmate who is physically able has a job in the prison system," Texas' prison agency explains in an FAQ. "Inmates are not paid for their work, but they can earn privileges as a result of good work habits."

Texas prison agriculture generates roughly \$90 million in revenue each year, according to a 2021 state audit report. Most of the goods stay within the prison agency – food crops feed inmates and cotton goes into their uniforms. But roughly a quarter of prison-produced goods are sold outside. This year, the Associated Press looked at about a dozen state prison farms, including operations in Texas, and traced prison labor in the supply chains of McDonald's, Whole Foods, Pizza Hut, and other major corporations.

Thirty miles south of Memorial Unit, Robert Hockley looks out a car window to the fields behind Clemens Unit, a prison established on a former slave plantation in 1893.

As a teenager, Hockley picked cotton here by hand, filling a bag slung to his chest.

"In 1996, I was a slave," Hockley says. "I was a slave legally, by the Constitution of the United States. I worked for free, in the worst conditions you can work in."

THE RIGHT TO SAY “HELL NO”

Hockley was a kid from Galveston caught up in gang life. He was 13 at the time of his first arrest. In 1996, at age 17, he and friends burglarized a home looking for jewelry, a purse, whatever they could find. “Materially, I did not take anything of value. But I did take these people’s sense of safety. Outside of material value, I traumatized someone.”

When Hockley arrived at Clemens Unit, he’d never seen a cotton field. A few months later, he and a group of other young prisoners walked to the fields, surrounded by officers on horseback with rifles. “It was all white, from here to that line of trees,” Hockley said, looking out at Clemens fields.

His first sight of the cotton field was something he felt in his chest.

“You felt the agony. You felt the suffering,” Hockley said. “It’s no different from seeing a gas chamber. You’re like, well damn. Many people didn’t make it out of here.”

He was in shock, looking for other people around him to affirm that they couldn’t really be there to pick cotton. But many of them had been to the fields before. As he explains it, it was a rebellious spirit that landed him in prison to begin with, and that spirit had not been broken yet. “I was like, ‘There’s no way I’m picking cotton. To hell with this.’”

That’s how he learned that heat could be a punishment.

“At 17, I’m under the assumption that I have rights. And my right is to say ‘hell no.’ And I was sadly mistaken. They had designed the system for people like me, who would say ‘hell no.’ And that system was as brutal as I could ever be.”

When Hockley refused to pick cotton, horses surrounded him. Officers made him kneel, handcuffed him, and brought him to the back of a trailer, enclosed by metal fencing. He was the first, but he was soon joined by four other young men from other squads who refused to participate. For four hours, they sat bunched together and handcuffed on the metal floor in the heat. “That was my introduction into burning hell.”

Craig Anderson remembers the cages well. He worked in a “hoe squad,” as prisoners call the farming teams, at Connally Unit during the Nineties. It was a new facility, but with similar antiquated practices, including armed guards on horseback called high riders.

“They had a trailer that had about a three foot by three foot metal cage. And if somebody got into a fight or got unruly, you’re gonna sit your ass in that trailer, that little metal cage,” until the work day ended.

Back at Clemens, after Hockley returned to the prison after hours in the cage, he was disciplined for his refusal to work. He spent the next 15 days in solitary confinement. Hockley said that broke him. Soon, he decided picking cotton would be better than losing what little freedom he still had in prison.

A Texas Department of Criminal Justice spokesperson points out that a small percentage of prisoners are working on the field force at any given time (in April there were 219 inmates working in fields on average, out of 132,995 prisoners total.) Also, prisoners stopped picking cotton by hand and started using machinery to harvest cotton. “I don’t have an exact year, but it has not happened in quite a while,” said TDCJ’s Amanda Hernandez. Officers do still observe inmates from horseback at times, but the hot cage punishment is “not a practice in TDCJ,” she said.

Today, a prisoner who refuses to participate in farming will be disciplined. Per the disciplinary rules, minor penalties can lead “cell restriction” for 30 days per disciplinary case. That means a prisoner is not allowed outside their cell except for certain essentials including showers and doctor’s visits.

The spokesperson declined to answer whether the TDCJ agrees with prisoners’ descriptions of their work as “slave labor.” But generally, the agency frames fieldwork as a benefit to prisoners.

“The inmates learn to use equipment, which translates to job skills to help them gain employment upon their release,” Hernandez said.

Regardless of any perceived benefit to inmates, the benefit to taxpayers is not clear. The 2021 audit found that, while the state brought in more than \$90 million selling agricultural products in one year, it would have saved \$17 million over five years by buying canned foods and certain crops instead of producing them. Cotton and cottonseed in particular cost \$5.6 million more to produce with prison labor than to purchase externally.

“When you think about cotton picking in Texas, where the state does not pay, the point is to remind people that the state owns you,” said Bianca Tylek, founder of Worth Rises, a nonprofit opposing forced labor, in an interview with the Marshall Project in 2021. “They want to make it parallel to slavery, and they are willing to do it at their own cost.”

THE CELL HASN'T CHANGED

Though prisoners today benefit from some modern equipment, conditions are still “miserable,” as the recently released Anderson told us. “I don’t know how to describe it except that it’s miserable.” Current inmates and their families describe water that stinks or isn’t clear, poor ventilation, sack meals that aren’t filling, and constant bug bites.

But the top complaint, by far, is the heat. At the end of a day of fieldwork, prisoners may return to cells that exceed 110 degrees in the summer.

“The living conditions haven’t changed,” said Hockley, whose brother is still incarcerated at one of the state’s oldest prisons. “Yeah, picking cotton has, but living in a hundred-degree cell hasn’t. So how far have we come?”

Anderson’s first stint in prison was as a young man in the Nineties. On his second stint, from 2011 to 2022, he didn’t work in a hoe squad but tailored inmates’ cotton uniforms with no air conditioning. “It’s nasty this time of the year,” he said. “I mean, you sweat all the way up to one or two o’clock in the morning when it finally starts cooling off a little bit. And then at four o’clock, they start feeding breakfast and everybody goes to work.”

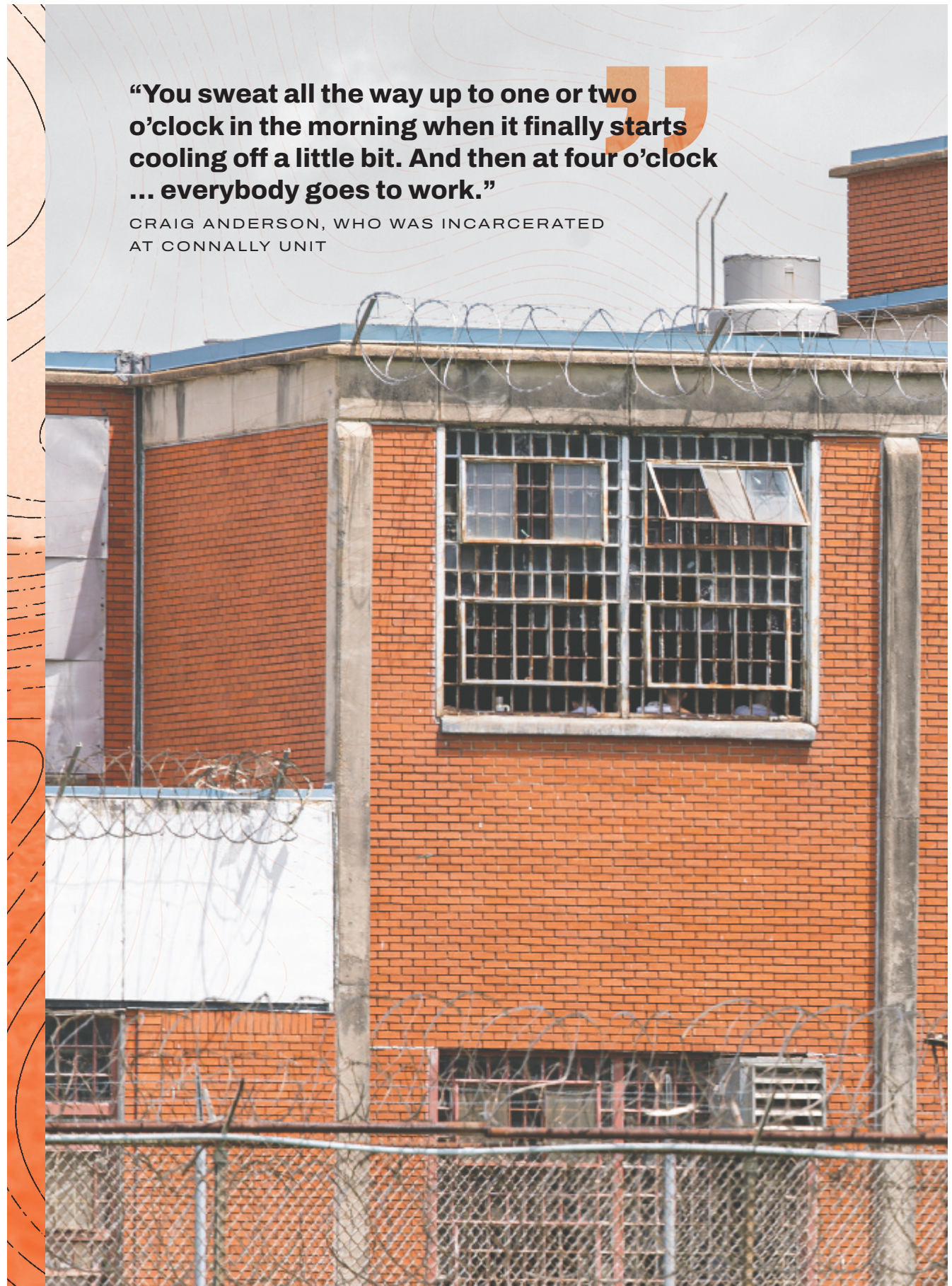
As a tailor, he said he had a fan blowing hot air on him, “but I couldn’t blow it too hard on me because it’d blow my strings on my sewing machine.”

Current inmates describe similar problems with the heat. Mary McConnell said her husband has a postgraduate degree in electrical engineering from UT-San Antonio, but at Ramsey – another prison on a former slave plantation – his job is unloading boxes from a delivery truck. As a man in his 60s, heavy lifting in the heat wears on him. To cool down, he bought rags from the commissary to wet and hang around his neck. He said during their water breaks, he sometimes finds the water orange from rusty pipes.

Nick Wood, who’s been incarcerated for 24 years, said new equipment had made fieldwork much easier, but the heat inside has only gotten worse. On the worst days and nights at Wainwright, he soaks his clothes and lays on the wet floor to cool off.

COOKED TO DEATH

A lawsuit filed in April claims Texas prisoners are being “cooked to death” in prisons that lack A/C, and that the Texas Department of Criminal Justice has grossly underestimated the number of deaths caused by heat.

The prison agency claims there hasn’t been a heat-related death in a Texas prison since 2012. The lawsuit claims there have been more than 270 heat deaths since 2001, and advocates identified a dozen last summer alone. Last summer, Tona Southards Naranjo told the *Chronicle* she viewed her son Jon’s body after he died in prison and saw heat rash from head to toe. “What happened was a judge sentenced my son to 20 years, but the TDCJ sentenced him to death,” she said.

State data shows that the air-conditioning problem isn’t distributed evenly. It’s concentrated in the prison system’s southeast

region, where the state’s predominant slave counties were before emancipation, and where the state’s prison system was born.

Most of the state’s roughly 100 prisons today are only partially air-conditioned and about 15% have no A/C in housing areas at all, per data from TDCJ. But the rates are much worse among the prisons which we know were built on former slave plantations. Among those, roughly 85% have no housing A/C at all. (We presented the TDCJ with a list of 13 prisons built on former slave plantations to fact-check. A spokesperson responded, “I don’t have that information.”)

The TDCJ explains that the units without any air conditioning are the older facilities, where it would be more expensive to add air conditioning. The current projects underway to add air conditioning are mostly in facilities that are already partly air-conditioned. A spokesperson explained why the

agency isn’t prioritizing older prisons on former plantations. “To ensure funding goes further, we are air-conditioning other units as it would allow us to provide more cool beds,” a spokesperson said.

In prisons with partial air conditioning, generally many cells are still hot, while other areas including medical and warden offices are air-conditioned. When people show signs of overheating, guards may bring them to the cooled areas for respite.

The majority of these partially air-conditioned prisons, and the majority of Texas prisons overall, were built in the 1990s.

Michele Deitch, director of UT’s Prison and Jail Innovation Lab, is familiar with the conditions at the state’s oldest prisons. “In some ways, I’m more shocked that we bought 100,000 beds in the Nineties when air conditioning was common and didn’t put air conditioning in these facilities.”

HISTORY REPEATS

Hockley suspects that the lack of air conditioning was never an oversight. Instead, he sees it as one part of a larger, intentional effort to dehumanize prisoners.

He points out how some improvements that might seem compassionate – like the introduction of tablets, which help prisoners contact family more easily – also give the state even more control. With a shortage of guards, the tablets allow prisoners to watch each other and report misbehavior to officers.

“It’s like a tree. The roots are so deep and rotten,” Hockley said. “The people there are like, ‘Look at the top. We green now. Let’s not go into the roots. Let’s not go down that rabbit hole.’ Because if we fix the air, we’re gonna have to fix this, we’re gonna have to fix that – you’re gonna have to fix this whole system.”

So, what are the roots?

In the public imagination, Texas history often centers around ranching and oil, but that’s only part of the story. Slavery dominated the state’s economy for decades. In the mid-1800s, roughly one in three Texans were enslaved. A geologist at the time noted that in Texas, “dazzling white [cotton fields] create rather a painful sensation in the eyes.”

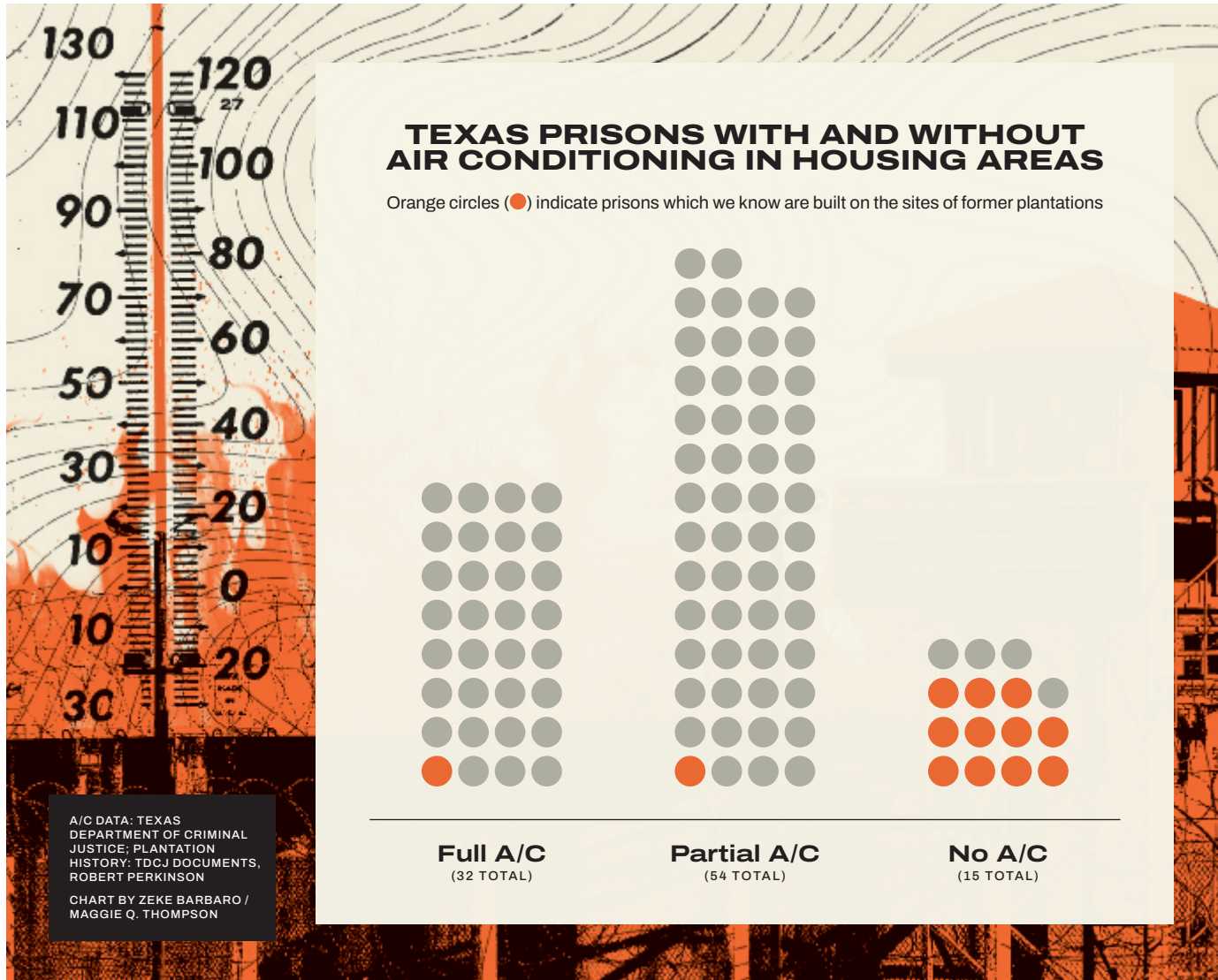
Texans initially resisted the construction of prisons, but as attitudes changed just before the Civil War, the potential for slave labor figured in. “If a profit of several thousand dollars can be made on the labor of twenty slaves,” posited the *Telegraph and Texas Register*, “why may not a similar profit be made on the labor of twenty convicts?”

Texas began building prisons before the Civil War. Texas was also the last state to free its enslaved population, nearly two years after President Abraham Lincoln emancipated enslaved Africans in America. It wasn’t until June 19, 1865, that union troops arrived in Galveston Bay and shared the news.

By that time, Texas’ first prisons were already built on former plantations, but the state had come up with another scheme to work around emancipation.

Recall Abner Jackson, whose plantation land was turned into prison land. After the Civil War, the sugar mill near his house didn’t stop operating, and it didn’t start paying workers either. Instead, the state leased nearly 200 prisoners to operate the sugar mill for a 15-year period, says Angela Villarreal, curator at the Lake Jackson Historical Museum.

Finding prisoners to lend to plantation owners wasn’t complicated. After the Civil War, “Black Codes” led to arrests of freed African Americans for minor offenses like vagrancy and petty theft. In many ways, she said, conditions for workers got worse.



“The company leasing prisoners did not have to pay to replace them,” Villarreal said. “They did not care about their health or the harsh working conditions they had to endure. If a prisoner became ill, or worse, died, they were easily replaced.”

Long after convict leasing ended in the early 1910s, treatment of inmates at prison farms closely mirrored treatment of slaves. For decades, Texas prison laborers were routinely whipped and beaten. In 1978, a national corrections expert described Texas’ prison farms as “probably the best example of slavery remaining in the country.”

Around the same time that Hockley was released from prison in the early 2000s, professor Robert Perkinson was witnessing a prison farm in Texas for the first time. “Nowhere else in turn-of-the-millennium America could one witness gangs of African American men filling cotton sacks under the watchful eyes of armed whites on horseback,” Perkinson wrote in his book, *Texas Tough*, published in 2010. “Plantation prisons at Sugar Land, Huntsville, and elsewhere have preserved the lifeways of slavery in carceral amber.”

THE CONDITION

Twenty years after his release from prison, Hockley finds himself thinking about certain guards who, at this point, have “done more time than me.” From inmates, the *Chronicle* heard descriptions of guards fainting from the heat and leaving their jobs, and how the resulting short staffing causes even more trying conditions for prisoners who can’t leave.

As we drove on an unobstructed road around Ramsey prison – also built on a plantation – a guard stopped us. “You can get shot for driving around the unit. We’ve got guns in all these towers.”

Later, parked far away, Hockley defended her.

“No telling how much time she’s done in that prison,” he said. “This place exists because of the condition that is created that makes this place happen. She has been stuck there. I did eight years. I came home, I found my way. I have a family, I have a business. I am far away from that prison. I’d tell them, listen: the difference between me and y’all [guards] is that I’m gonna leave one time. All I need to do is walk out the gate once. Y’all walk out and come back up here every day thinking you’re getting ahead. Because you exchange your time for money, you are under that impression.

“This place doesn’t serve you or me, in no shape, way, or form. It victimizes everybody.”

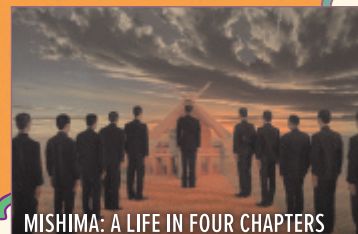

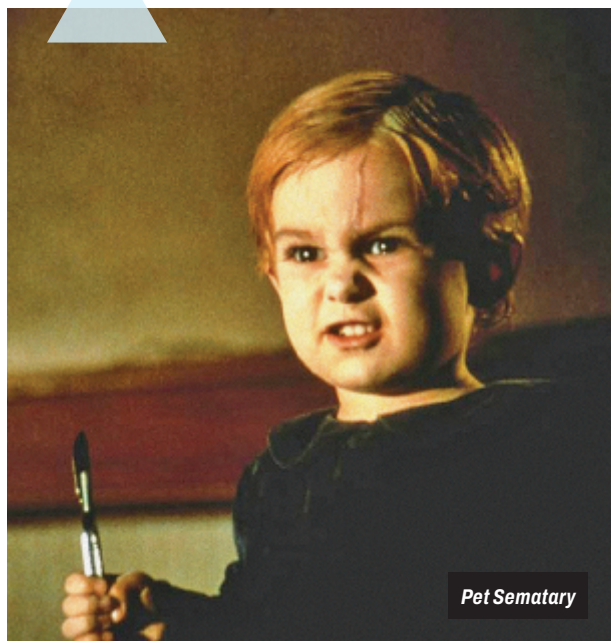

CULTURE CLASH: PAPER CUTS COMBINES LITERATURE & FILM

One may not think an event that could easily bring the Austin film and literary communities together exists, but then one does not have the same brain as Austin Film Society's associate programmer Jazmyne Moreno and the team at Alienated Majesty Books – creators of the new Paper Cuts series. So what is Paper Cuts? According to Alienated Majesty's website, Paper Cuts is "where films are paired with books to enrich your movie-watching experience." The inaugural event, premiering June 16 at AFS Cinema, pairs Derek Jarman's arthouse film *The Garden* with his book *Modern Nature*. Both works concern themselves with Jarman's HIV-positive status in the midst of the AIDS crisis and the literal and figurative gardens he builds to sustain himself in the wake of such a diagnosis. The screening will have a pop-up of purchasable books in the AFS lobby, as well as a discussion led by Francesca Balboni, doctoral candidate in the Department of Art and Art History at UT, who Alienated Majesty's Stephen Krause refers to aptly as a "Jarman obsessive."

"As a programmer, I like to think of what's missing or what's not there," Moreno says, sitting diagonally to me at the table in the corner of Alienated Majesty's 29th Street location. "This gives you a way to connect with something you maybe never would've considered as pieces of material that could be connected to one another or enrich one another's experience."

"I'm always trying to impress myself with the work that I'm doing. If I'd want to go to this event, then job well done."

Krause, who first worked with Moreno at the now-defunct Austin pillar Vulcan Video, expresses the Alienated Majesty team's excitement was palpable when Moreno first approached

them with the idea. "We all wore denim jackets to the meeting, we were so excited," they say.

"With our events at the store," Krause says, "we don't really care how many books we sell. We instead prefer events to show people we have a community space we want to share with them." Alienated Majesty's previous events have already proven the bookstore's unorthodox, community-driven playfulness: In addition to the expected book readings, Alienated Majesty has hosted an after-hours metal show, a comedy showcase, and proto-Paper Cuts screenings of *Road House* and David Cronenberg's *Crash*. They are changing the expectations behind what a bookstore can – and should – do. A series with AFS like Paper Cuts feels only natural.

Both explain that the post-film discussions are the true meat to the collaboration's potatoes, with the intent to go beyond the average Q&A. While patrons are encouraged to read the paired

book beforehand to contribute their thoughts and feelings during the discussion, the two assure this is not necessary for overall enjoyment of the event. "If you want to raise your hand just to say 'I liked this movie,' go on ahead," says Moreno. "I want people to feel like they're just talking." The event's significance is the ability to weave two separate, seemingly disparate art forms into one cohesive whole – not pitted against one another, but rather entered into a marriage of thought expansion as to what a film or a book can be.

Moreno and Krause tell me they hope what starts on June 16 becomes a long-held monthly tradition. Interested parties can purchase *Modern Nature* from Alienated Majesty's storefront or website, then grab tickets for AFS's *The Garden* screening at austinfilm.org.

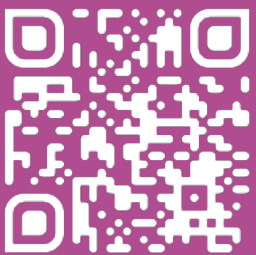

Bastrop restaurants have come a long way in quality and quantity over the last few years. These three eateries make the quaint downtown worth a visit.

Neighbor's Kitchen and Yard's decks offer a stunning view of the Colorado River and the old iron bridge from the Old Town section of downtown. The restaurant has indoor and outdoor dining.

The menu covers an extensive list of sandwiches and salads, but the pizzas are outstanding. They even offer gluten-free crust. Their draft beers come from the **Iron Bridge Icehouse** next door.

At 601 Chestnut, Neighbor's Kitchen is open Sunday through Thursday from 11am to 9pm and until 11pm on Friday and Saturday.

Maxine's Cafe and Bakery on Main Street has set the standard for good eating in Bastrop from many years. The little diner often lands on lists of the best small-town cafes in Texas. Come for breakfast, lunch, or dinner, but don't forget the pie.

I'm partial to Maxine's meatloaf, but the fried chicken and chicken-fried steak can't be beat. Start your day with a stack of Maxine's Legendary Griddle Cakes.

Maxine's Cafe is at 905 Main Street in the heart of downtown. The grill opens daily at 7am and closes at 3pm, except on Friday and Saturday when they stay open until 8pm.

The monster-size burgers are equally impressive, and the lunch and dinner menus go beyond regular pub grub. The historic building is rustically chic, and the small patio was a pleasant place to enjoy a cold brew.

At 919 Main Street, 602 Brewing Company opens during summer at 11am and closes at 9pm on Tuesday and Wednesday, 11pm on Thursday, and midnight on Friday and Saturday. They're closed on Monday, and open Sunday 3-9pm.

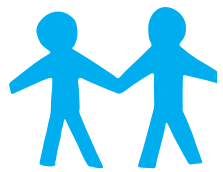

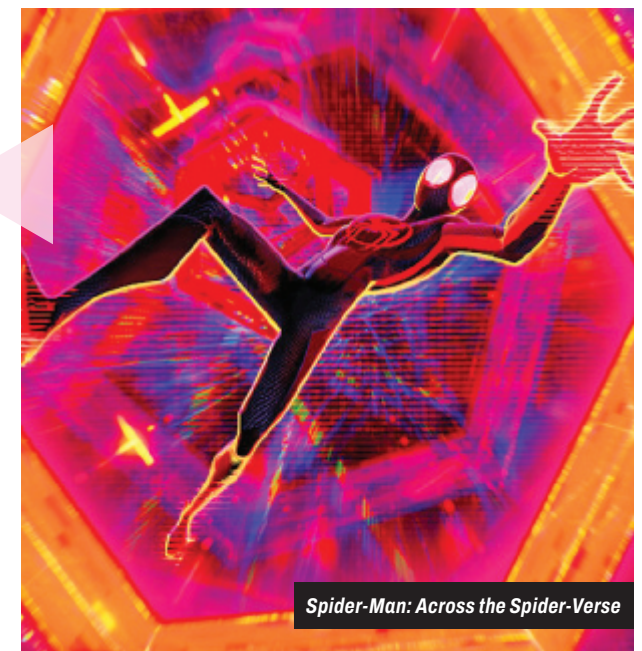

There was a time when Austin FC selecting Dani Pereira with the first overall pick in the 2021 MLS SuperDraft was considered a reach.

To their credit, MLS's own mock draft correctly predicted that Austin would select Pereira ... they just figured it would happen with the club's other first-round pick, No. 11. There were 10 players viewed by experts as better draft prospects than the Venezuelan midfielder from Virginia Tech.

Now, admittedly, grading college soccer players on their pro potential is a dicey proposition any year, never mind during a pandemic when most NCAA conferences didn't even stage a season. The important thing is Austin FC saw Pereira as the best player in his draft class and a future MLS difference maker.

Three and a half years later, the club has been proven absolutely right. While just about every other player taken in the 2021 SuperDraft has struggled to make any kind of mark in the league, Pereira has been an impactful starter for ATX since, literally, day one.

But the gregarious, dynamic midfielder has long aspired to things bigger than what Major League Soccer can offer.

"Obviously, my goal is to go to Europe," Pereira said last year.

There's not a men's soccer player alive that hasn't at one point dreamed of suiting up for a club in one of Europe's top five leagues in countries like England, Spain, and Italy. But Pereira now has a legitimate opportunity to make that dream a reality.

Pereira – who, at 15 years old, left Venezuela for Virginia with his mother as asylum seekers – is set to play in the biggest matches of his life later this month when he dons the "Vinotinto" (red wine) colors of his birth nation at the 2024 Copa America tournament.

Venezuela's first two group-stage matches, against Ecuador on June 22 and against Mexico on June 26, will take place in California. The third, against Jamaica, is booked for June 30 at Q2 Stadium in Austin, where Pereira is sure to enjoy plenty of support from his hometown Verde fans.

The 23-year-old is still a neophyte in his national team ranks. He's only appeared in four friendly matches to date, though that's partly due to the fact that, prior to obtaining his U.S. visa late last year, Pereira was unable to travel out of the country.

But Pereira still projects to be an important player in manager Fernando Batista's squad. In March, Batista brought Pereira on as a substitute in a friendly against Italy, then gave the ATXFC midfielder a start days later against Guatemala, in which Pereira played the full 90 minutes.

If Pereira feels he's ready to take his talents to Europe, he'll get the chance to show it. Copa America is the oldest and one of the most prestigious international tournaments in the sport. Eyes from all over the globe will be locked in, anxious to see what fresh young talent the Americas have to offer. A strong tournament from Pereira will likely result in a flood of calls to ATX sporting director Rodolfo Borrell's phone.

Make no mistake, it would sting Austin FC in the short term to lose its rising-star midfielder. But recuperating a multimillion-dollar transfer fee, plus establishing itself as an active exporter of young talent in the marketplace, would benefit the club in the long run.

And regardless of Austin FC's own interests, Pereira has certainly earned the right to chase his dream, wherever in the world it lies. ■

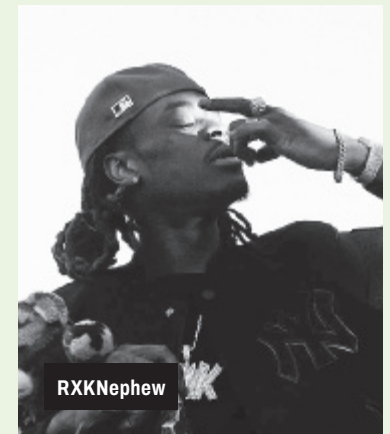

Deanna Miesch Dares You to Embrace the Weird and Wonderful

Dreaming young girls and reimagined worlds run rampant in new solo exhibit

Flatland, the 1884 novella by Edwin A. Abbott, tells the story of a two-dimensional universe in which women are lines and men are polygons. These geometric shapes and their distinctions are a metaphor through which Abbott explores the hierarchies and prejudices of the Victorian era. In “Flatland Revisited,” artist and gallerist Deanna Miesch takes inspiration from both *Flatland* and Lewis Carroll’s *Alice’s Adventures in Wonderland* and uses these sources as a launch pad to delve into her own realm. Yet despite both Abbott’s and Carroll’s mathematician backgrounds and the heavy mathematical subject matter in *Flatland*, Miesch’s exhibition seeks to interpret the more emotional elements of their work.

What Miesch seems to derive from these two stories is an affinity for a more fantastical approach to viewing the world.

Debuting at her own Lydia Street Gallery, Miesch’s intention for the show is a defense of fantasy and an example of its proper execution. The show’s description reads: “From ‘fake news’ and conspiracy theories to the advent of artificial intelligence, there are numerous threats to truth, reality, and our biosphere in these tumultuous times.” “Flatland Revisited,” therefore, serves as Miesch’s response. Using photography, sculpture, and paintings, Miesch encourages mysticism and childlike exploration of adult concepts.

In this two-room exhibit, the first room consists almost entirely of film photographs.

Sans digital manipulation, Miesch frequently employs a double exposure method in-camera that results in one photo containing different layers of images. The image on top is more transparent, hovering over the other like a ghost. This technique breeds dreamy results, making the final product look like a fading memory. Vast natural spaces and pensive little girls are the most common subjects, apt for her distinct moody vision. *Aspen Power Supply, Nathrop, CO* (2019), for example, is a black-and-white picture that layers two different images of tree-filled landscapes. Both the coloring and the double-exposure technique give the natural wonders a haunting ephemeral quality.

In the second room, the imaginative elements of the show escalate. Playful and eccentric in contrast to the more severe and nostalgic pieces of the first room, this section of the exhibit feels like a real-life pop-up book, in which characters and objects from children’s books are in the room with you. *Killer Bunny* (2024) shows a human-sized rabbit made of felt, sitting in a chair and holding a knife. Numerous artistic reworkings of globes hang from the ceiling. A huge felt mural titled *McTree Forest* lines the back wall and incorporates everything from a giant peacock to a tree that sprouts eyes from its branches.

Though whimsical and youthful, Miesch’s work still seeks to interpret various political and social matters. Her repeated use of globes in an exhibit pointedly titled “Flatland Revisited” pokes fun at flat-earthers. The sculpture *Emerging from Flatland* (2012) references the book once again, but with a focus on women taking form and journeying beyond a two-dimensional existence. Most prominently, there is a reverence for nature’s beauty and wildness that underscores the entire exhibit.

Miesch acknowledges the discursive quality of the exhibit, noting “disparate” sources for the themes in the exhibit’s description. While there’s a slightly unfocused approach to the social and political commentary, her most overt argument centers around the importance of making a clear distinction between a created mythical universe and the world we live in. For Miesch, it’s vital that we don’t lose touch with our ability to know what is and isn’t real. It’s also important that we continue to engage with imaginative thinking. Fantasy, overall, reminds us of our dreams and encourages new perspectives. In “Flatland Revisited,” Miesch strengthens the muscles of the mind that push us to question our norms and conjure up fresh ideas. ■

Inside Out 2

Animating All the Feels FILM

Inside Out 2 and *Robot Dreams* navigate our emotional terrain **BY KIMBERLEY JONES**

How do you transcend transcendence? That was the impossible task set for *Inside Out 2*, which is – not to be cruel – a lesser film in every way to its predecessor, Pete Docter's 2015 Pixar film that brought a breathtaking inventiveness to exploring and explaining the life of the mind. The newness, unavoidably, has rubbed off.

A quick run-through by Joy (voiced by Poehler), the driving emotion inside of the head of San Francisco transplant Riley (Tallman), recaps the first film and reintroduces Riley, now 13 and a happy, well-adjusted kid on the brink of high school and her greatest ambition, making the ice hockey team. Joy has found peace sharing the wheel with her fellow emotions: Anger (Black), a fire-breathing ragemonster; Sadness (Smith), an existential slump, Sad Trombone personified; the eye-rolling, grimacing Disgust (Lapira, replacing the original's Mindy Kaling); and shrieking

Fear (Tony Hale, replacing Bill Hader). All, seemingly, is contentment.

That is, until puberty announces itself like a five-alarm fire and Joy – who, let's be honest, is a total control freak – deals with the intrusion the same way she does most uncomfortable thoughts or icky feelings: by banishing them to deep in the recesses of Riley's mind. That strategy works until it doesn't, when the arrival of a whole new batch of emotions complicates the delicate balance they've struck at HQ.

Envy (Edebiri), Embarrassment (Hauser), and Ennui (Exarchopoulos) are bit players (and not very memorably designed or voiced), but Anxiety (Hawke) is here to challenge Joy for dominance. An orange-hued overachiever who looks like a benchwarmer Muppet and acts like Jessie on that one *Saved By the Bell* episode where she discovers caffeine pills, Anxiety is convinced of the righteousness of her cause

("I plan for the future" is how she benignly describes her process, the little despot). Soon, Joy and the original team are sent to cool their heels with Riley's other suppressed thoughts (I won't spoil the scene's secrets but it gets closest to the first film's giddy, anything-goes imaginativeness). From there, the gang must go on a quest to restore balance to Riley.

If this all sounds familiar, it's because the sequel follows much the same structure as the original as it journeys deeper inside Riley's head. It arrives at the same epiphanies, too – that shoving uncomfortable feelings away will only stunt our emotional growth, and a happy mind is one that encourages harmony, not a solo artist, among the chorus of emotions. Did I long for the daring of the first film? Its sense of wonder? I did. But new director Kelsey Mann, along with screenwriters Meg LeFauve (who co-wrote the first film) and Dave Holstein, are about expanding the brief

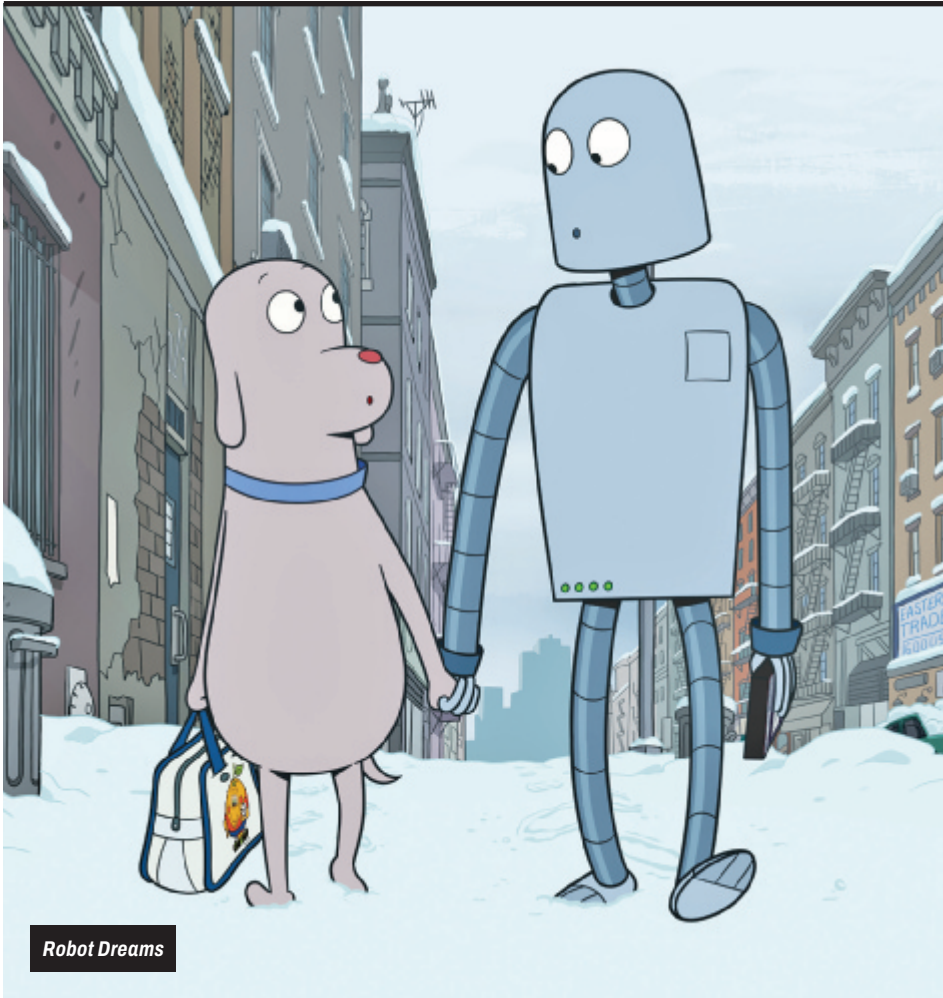


of the original, not venturing out in startling new directions. Both *Inside Out* films provide a language, a framework, for young people to process complex emotions; in particular, I suspect the sequel's artful evocation of an anxiety attack will be helpful for parents negotiating their own bundles of joy-turned-bundles of nerves. A utility belt kind of film, *Inside Out 2* gets the job done, which is exactly as inspiring as it sounds.

Robot Dreams

If the *Inside Out* films are about finding ways to talk about our feelings, the Spanish-French co-production *Robot Dreams* skips talking altogether. That it manages to have something profound to say about loneliness and striving for connection without saying a word is one of the small marvels of this lovely and touching film, nominated last year for a Best Animated Feature Oscar.

We've all been there: dead-eyed on the couch, bleary from playing *Pong* or some other pleasurable-until-it's-not time suck. In *Robot Dreams*' imagining, it happens to dogs too – in this case, a dog named Dog. After another frozen mac & cheese eaten solo on the sofa, Dog has a eureka moment when a TV offer pops up onscreen. (“*Are You Alone???*” the commercial blasts in neon.) Dog places an order right away for a robot companion, the Amica 2000, and soon Dog is

assembling a new robot friend. Hand in hand, Dog and Robot explore a vibrant 1980s New York together – passing a monkey punk on the street that’s flipping them the bird, then an octopus busker banging on drums in the subway. (There are no names in this animal kingdom, and no genders either.) A perfect day in Central Park includes roller disco – the cheeky era signifiers tap *Earth, Wind & Fire*, *Basquiat*, and *Kim’s Video* – but another seemingly perfect day on Fire Island ends in a sad separation for Dog and Robot.

This is Pablo Berger’s first animated film, but not his first no-talkie; 2012’s *Blancanieves*, a black & white film that retold *Snow White* with matadors, used the occasional title card but otherwise let silent-era expressionism tell the story. Based on a graphic novel by Sara Varon, *Robot Dreams* is less showy (well, excepting a delightful *Busby Berkeley* homage). It’s such a sweet curio, I don’t want to oversell it or overburden it with weighty expectations. It leaves a lot of room for interpretation – depending on how you come to it, you could read Dog and Robot’s relationship as platonic or romantic, straight or queer – but the takeaway is all tenderness. ■

Hyde Park's *My H-E-B* Shows Humanity, Explored

Like the store, in this work the *people matter* BY CAT MCCARREY

Food, water, shelter. The basic human needs. Hunger, thirst, protection. Basic human urges. And, at least in Texas, H-E-B fulfills them all. In *My H-E-B*, playwright Raul Garza plays with human needs. Not just for fresh groceries, but the deeper yearnings those groceries reveal. As one character states, H-E-B is “the perfect place to satisfy all kinds of hunger.” Hunger for food, for acceptance, for connection. All appear in the imagined aisles.

My H-E-B began life as an award-winning short play from 2015's FronteraFest. It's an

unsurprising winner, with a deeply local setting and effective monologues. Garza stretches his play from 22 to 77 minutes, keeping the monologuing structure but diving deeper into character study.

It's a sparse three-person cast: the crotchety older Loretta (Janelle Buchanan), the food-loving Mandy (Giselle De La Rosa), and the chipper-but-belabored stocker Wilson (Kenah Benefield). They are opposites in their views and approaches to life, but share love for H-E-B. Garza uses them to closely

examine people, making a statement about universal commonality. They have different food tastes, experiences, and values, but the current beneath it all is the grocery store as a place of safety.

The elderly Loretta may grouse about how things have changed since back in her day, but beneath the crusty exterior is the fact that she's sad because she cares. Buchanan plays her as a True Texan™, full of salty sweetness. Providing food for her family has been a touchstone. The ability to craft frugal

meals is a point of pride. This H-E-B has been a bastion of community for her through the ages, and she misses the simplicity of being able to provide.

Mandy's segments made my stomach growl, as she lovingly described her delectable recipes, switching from English to Spanish so naturally and deliciously it only enhanced the descriptions. Some were handed down from her mama, some discovered through her own gastronomic exploration. But again, the through line was love. Love of food, love of the freedom and adventure it gives, love of the chance to fly against expectations and get lost in flavor. To her, H-E-B is a reliable resource fueling this essential part of her persona. It provides the food that makes her, and her entire life, full.

Wilson, who stocks the shelves, plays the voice from the inside. Benefield threads the needle between genuine love and excitement for H-E-B's people-forward mission. He doesn't sugarcoat the nastiness of the job, the messes and arguments and tediousness. But he also shows there's some hope. When he talks about his advancement from bagger to his current position, it feels like a bygone era, where jobs provided actual opportunities for growth in-house. Again, there's that feeling that H-E-B is taking care of him, just as it cares for us all.

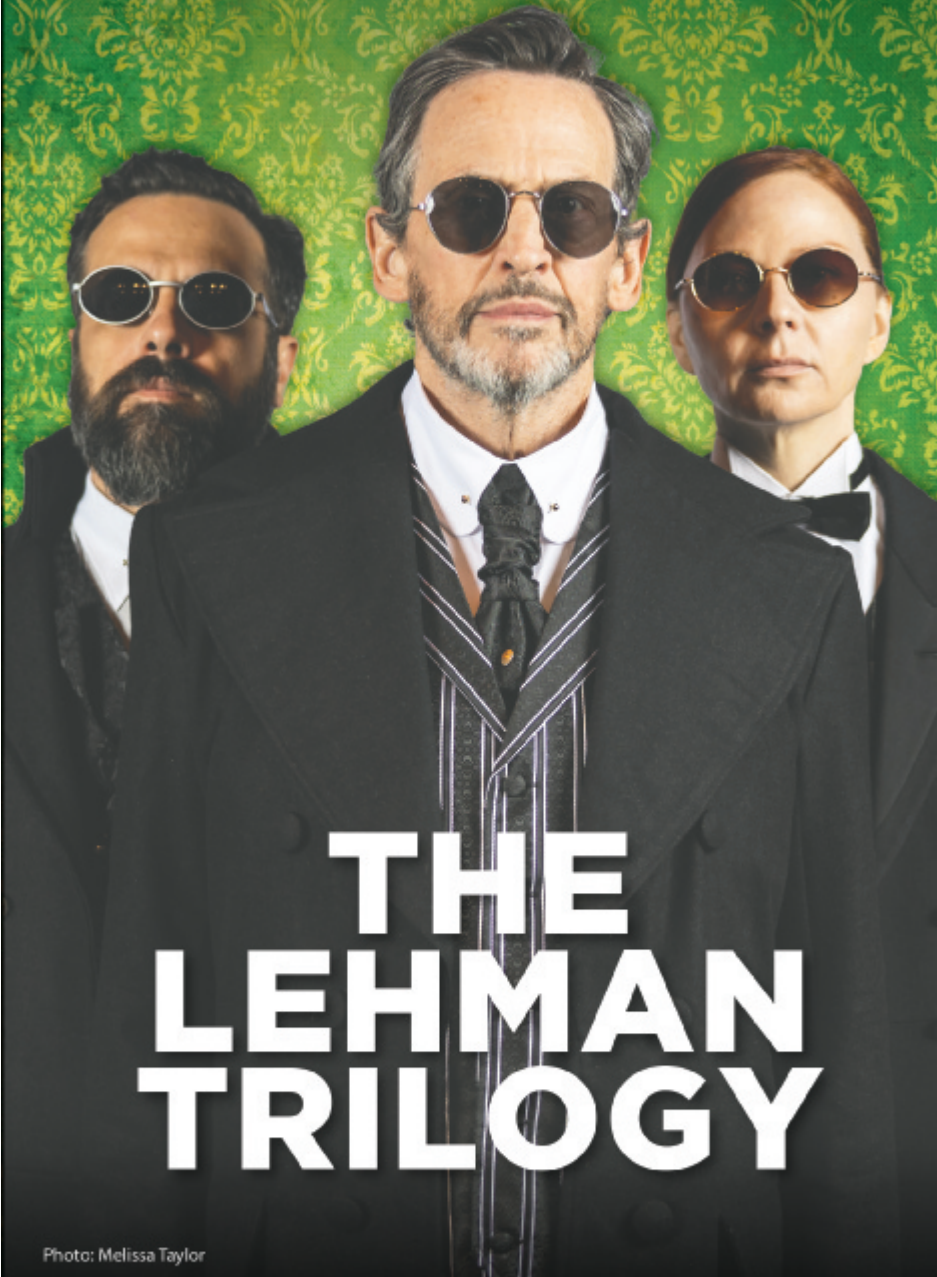
For the majority of the play's run time the three exist in isolation. One enters, speaks, then exits as the next character emerges. There are brief crossovers, particularly toward the end. It's a shame there's no real interaction until that point. It makes sense with where the story goes in the conflict, which only works because we know who these characters are and where they've been, but it would have been so beautiful to see these talented performers bounce off each other.

All this occurs in a clever space that captures the feel of H-E-B, with perfectly painted logos on the walls, plastic refrigerator strips on the stage door, and sparse props crafted from paper bags. Set designer Mark Pickell and painting/prop designer Lilly Percifield built an H-E-B haven. It's all complemented by sound designer Robert S. Fisher's interstitial music built around register beeps and ambient noise.

My H-E-B is still clearly a short play made long, an elastic stretched a little too tight. But in that tension are deep truths, crafted words that skillfully illustrate characters who spark with life. They just need more plot to fully show their stuff. Still, audiences won't walk away hungry. ■
